
Citizenship Goes To Arsenal Folk



Health Insurance Pay Plan Given

Ben Chreitzberg, state manager for Service Health and Life Insurance Co., underwriters of the Redstone health insurance plan, says some confusion has resulted regarding payment of hospital and surgical bills due to lack of knowledge of the company's operation.

Pay Once A Month

The insurance manager said that hospital claims are taken care of once a month, and that surgical bills cannot be paid until a hospital claim has been received.

The company, monthly pays a percentage of the gross Redstone premium receipts to the hospitals in the plan on a probability of patient care arrangement.

In other words, if there are 100 members in the plan, and ten lived near hospital A, that hospital would receive ten per cent of the amount paid to the hospitals.

The hospital charges are paid by these percentage checks. Any claims over the amount of the checks are adjusted each month.

However, Chreitzberg said, until claims are made by the hospitals, adjustments cannot be made. In addition, although there is a percentage check arrangement, the hospitals still have to file, once a month, claims showing their right to the insurance money.

Before a surgical bill can be paid, the insurance manager said that a hospital claim has to be filed.

Insurance Plans Granted, Officers Picked By RFCU

Redstone Federal Credit Union members, under 55, now have life insurance equal to the value of their RFCU shares, and also have loan protection insurance, according to Thurman Smith, treasurer.

Petition Granted

The RFCU's petition for life savings insurance and loan protection insurance have been granted.

Under a scaled system, RFCU members between six months and 55 years of age are covered by insurance equal to their holdings in the mutual savings group.

Also RFCU loans outstanding to be paid up in event of death of the borrower.

Union Pays

Both of these services are paid for by the local credit union, Smith said.

Underwood Promoted

In a report on other credit union activities, the treasurer said, Oscar F. "Jack" Underwood, III, has been promoted from bookkeeper to assistant treasurer. Underwood, as the union's only paid employee, will be the person handling the bulk of the work in connection with RFCU business.

Smith also said Walter Wiesemann, Logistics, has been named to the credit committee and to the board of directors to fill a vacancy left by the resignation of James Lutz, Budget and Fiscal.

Area Wage Survey Is Now Underway

Representatives from three North Alabama armed forces installations are joining with the Army-Air Force Wage board in two surveys to see that government-employed hourly rated employees' wages are in line with local industrial pay scales.

Three Installations

The 13-man committee is composed of a survey team from Redstone Arsenal, and a team from the Anniston Ordnance Depot and Air Force Specialized Depot, Gadsden. Kendall D. Lee, Washington, Army-Air Force Wage board representative, is chairman of the group.

The surveys, which began with a meeting at Redstone Aug. 26, will conclude Sept. 29, when the group assembles to compile data collected and draft final reports to the Army-Air Force Wage board.

Huntsville Area

Hourly wage information for Redstone will be collected from 33 industries in the Huntsville locality which includes Decatur, Florence, Sheffield and Tusculmbia. The Anniston-Gadsden locality will include about 35 industries.

The survey team will collect information on 31 key hourly rated jobs. Information from these 31 key jobs, selected to indicate an overall pattern, will be used for a master scale against which the pay scales of the military installations can be compared.

Confidential Date

Information received from the individual industries is kept entirely confidential by the wage survey (Continued On Page 8)

Competition To Bolster Interest

Col. Harton Is New Blood Coordinator For Arsenal Effort

Which Redstone group is going to do the most in helping Redstone Arsenal crack the 1,000-pint Blood for Defense mark, Sept. 19?

New Coordinator

This is the question that Lt. Col. Thomas G. Harton, Post Engineer, and new arsenal blood drive coordinator, is putting squarely up to arsenal personnel.

The national arsenalsites have done an excellent job in contributing to the defense reserves of the nation's blood and health plasma supplies, and he thinks they can do even better.

First Anniversary

The September blood collection will mark the first anniversary of the bloodmobile to Redstone. In its visits here 910 pints have been collected. A quota of 165 pints has been set for the Fall visit. At least 200 donors are needed to assure adequate minimum donations.

Scoreboard

Col. Harton said the blood program at Redstone will be set on a competitive basis to see which units at the arsenal do the most to bolster the defense program. A scoreboard will be run in The Rocket showing how the organizations set up.

SR Is Revised On Professional EMs

WASHINGTON (AFPS) — For the fourth time since the beginning of the program the Army has revised SR 615-25-11, dealing with the identification, classification, assignment and utilization of scientific and professional enlisted personnel.

Contains Changes

The new regulations recently instituted in the program and outlines in more detail many of the procedures. It establishes authority for separating those identified as scientific and professional into Types A and B.

Type A denotes those personnel who have been given assignments in their specialty by the Department of the Army.

Type B denotes those not assigned by the Department of the Army in their particular field because of limited vacancies. Nevertheless the names of these men are kept on Army for futur use.

One important subject broached in the regulation is proper orientation of such personnel. In explaining the Type A and Type B classification the regulation points out that an assignment in their particular field does not make them exempt from other responsibilities.

Personnel designated as scientific and professional are given eight weeks basic training before being reassigned.

610,000 Inductions Seen For 1952-53

WASHINGTON (AFPS) — Defense department officials estimated approximately 610,000 men will be inducted into the Armed Forces this fiscal year.

Dependencies Next?

The general said there is no intention of "wiping out" the dependency category, but a review is of the "utmost importance" because of sharply increased induction quotas beginning in October.

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

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

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
