

## Widening Roads To Ease Traffic

Arsenal traffic conditions are in for some relief according to the Provost Marshal's office. Expected to open this week will be a three-lane section on Patton Rd from Goss Rd. north to old Gate 11.

A second three-lane sector will be constructed later on Redstone Rd. to Gate One. Both the north and the proposed eastbound roads are widening of existing facilities.

With the new roadways, Provost Marshal plans are to use two of the three lanes to handle rush hour traffic at quitting time and in the mornings. The third lane will be for opposing traffic.

Recent traffic surveys show the Goss Rd.-Gate 11 section of Patton Rd. to be the arsenal's most heavily roadway with 2,000 cars using the road during a normal workday. Patton Rd. carries about 900 vehicles.

The construction work is being done by Post Engineer forces.

## Blood Bank Nets 182 Pints Here

The final count on Blood for Defense donated at Redstone Sept. 19 is 182 pints, according to an announcement by Lt.-Col. Thomas G. Harton, arsenal coordinating officer for the Red Cross Bloodmobile visit.

### The Donors

The report shows that 137 civilians participated with the greater per cent coming from the Post Engineer and National Procurement Division personnel. Both enlisted men and officers made up of the 45 military donors.

### 200 Volunteers

Capt. Marvin W. Shaw, who scheduled the operation visits, and was in charge of transportation, states that 200 persons volunteered, but there were 18 rejects.

The next Bloodmobile trip to Redstone is presently slated for December with regular trips planned every 60 days thereafter.

## Mail Xmas Packs Overseas Soon!

WASHINGTON (AFPS) — Christmas parcels for members of the Armed Forces overseas should be mailed between Oct. 15 and Nov. 15, the Department of Defense advises.

Boxes headed overseas must be of double-faced corrugated cardboard, strong wood, metal, or fiberboard. Each box should be securely tied with strong cord, and loose flaps should be sealed with gummed tape. Unless completely packed and tightly filled, boxes may be crushed.

Air parcel post packages up to two pounds in weight should be mailed not later than Nov. 25. The Department of Defense says that no assurance can be given that air parcel post mailed, after that date can be air-lifted to overseas areas or that delivery prior to Christmas will be made.

Matches and lighter fluid are banned from all parcels in addition to articles normally prohibited in the mails.

## Dry Arsenal Skies Characterize Sept.

## Radar Scanning Is Important Role In Air's Defense

Washington (AFPS)—Radar is playing a leading role in the air defense of the U. S. As a member of a defense team made up of observation posts, filter centers, fighter-interceptor units and Army antiaircraft groups, radar helps keep America alert against attack by enemy aircraft.

### Accurate Sight

Serving as our "watchdog of the sky," our electronic eye can see further and more accurately than human eyes.

It detects and tracks all aircraft within reach of its beams and passes along its findings to ground-controlled interceptor stations.

When trained radar observers pick up unidentified aircraft on their screens, interceptor aircraft immediately "scramble" to identify or destroy the craft.

### Fighter Guide

In addition to tracking and detecting, radar acts as a guide for interceptors, showing them the position of their objective. This enables our fighters to keep in touch with their objectives from the minute they are airborne.

Although radar plays a big part in our air defense program, it has one main drawback. It depends on a line-of-sight beam, which does not follow the earth's curvature but tends to go straight into space at the horizon line, making it possible for aircraft to come in at low altitudes out of range of the beam.

## Third Army Scrap Nets \$1,200,000

WASHINGTON (ANF) — How effective cost consciousness is can easily be seen when the report is read that the Third Army area has already saved \$1,200,000 by good use of scrap metal, waste paper, garbage, rags, and other usually considered waste items.

Scrap metal has been the most profitable income source, with more than 12,000 tons being sold to civilian buyers.

Edible waste from Army garbage cans brought about \$200,000 from civilian stock-raisers.

What the savings means is easy to translate. \$1,200,000 is enough to buy 201 two and one-half ton cargo trucks, or 28 light tanks, or to ration 200,000 soldiers for five days.

## Home Payments Cut By New VA Order

WASHINGTON (AFPS) — Smaller down payment requirements by veterans purchasing new homes have been announced by the Veterans Administration. The reductions came about with government suspension of Regulation X, which had imposed emergency restrictions in down payments and years-to-pay for new private housing.

Under the new ruling veterans will not have to pay any down payment on homes costing \$7,000 or less; only \$500 for homes in the \$10,000 class.

Biggest cutbacks occurred in the \$15-20,000 category. Down payments in this class have been sliced between \$1,800 and \$4,380.

## Future Occupants Notified 18 Wherry Units Are Open

The first 18 units of the 120-unit Wherry housing project on Goss Rd. are being occupied this week.

Notices began going to the applicants with highest priority for the two-bedroom multiple unit apartments Friday, shortly after Sfc. J. M. Walden, billeting sergeant, received FHA notice that the first units had been accepted for use.

The project is being constructed by V. and M. Homes, Inc. of Memphis under provisions of an emergency military housing bill sponsored by Sen. Wherry. The contract was for \$945,720.

Rentals of the military housing will range from \$83.10 to \$63.10, depending on style of housing, less utilities.

The modern designed brick veneer units on concrete slabs, are being built in single, duplex and multiple units. The units are either two or three-bedroom apartments.

Construction of the homes began in March. They are located on a 26 acre plot near Bldg. 111. In addition to the living quarters, a playground and central laundry house will be constructed.

The homes are under the management of the builders, however, occupants will be certified to the rental operators by the arsenal's billeting office.

Heinz Ludwig Scharnowski, 42, German-born Redstone scientist, died Sept. 20 following a heart attack which occurred while he was playing tennis at the Big Spring park courts in Huntsville. He is the first fatality among the German-born group who came to Redstone in November, 1950 from Fort Bliss, Texas.


Funeral services were held Sept. 23 at the Laughlin Service chapel with the Rev. George Hart officiating. The body was taken to Schenectady, N.Y. for burial where the family has relatives.

Surviving are the widow, Mrs. Dorothea Schulz Scharnowski, one daughter, Regina, 3, and one son, Reinhard, 7, who reside at 1401 S. Oak St., Huntsville, and one brother and three sisters all of Germany.

The pallbearers were Werner K. Rosiniski, Erich Kaschig, Hans Fischel, Hermann Weidner, Herbert Gundel, Martin Schilling, Rudy Beichel, and Werner Seiber.

Scharnowski was an electrical engineer, and was to be chief of instrumentation for the special test facilities in the Guided Missile Development Group. He had been engaged in work on instrumentation for test stand projects for the past ten years and came to the United States in 1945.

On their return from Schenectady, Mrs. Scharnowski and children plan to reside at their home in Huntsville.

## Contest At RSA And In Schools

Deadline Is Oct. 8, Send 25 Words Or Less To The Fire Marshal

Huntsville school children and children of Redstone Arsenal personnel have until Oct. 8 to win one of 14 prizes in a Fire Prevention slogan contest being sponsored by the arsenal fire marshal.

The contest is being coordinated through the city schools by Dr. H. D. Nelson, superintendent of schools. Capt. J. H. Delaney, fire marshal says.

### Deadline Oct. 8

Fire Prevention week begins Oct. 5 and will run through Oct. 11. Slogans for the contest will be turned into Capt. Delaney at Redstone by Oct. 8, and the winners will be announced Oct. 11.

Prizes will be awarded for the best slogans submitted in four age groups by white students in Huntsville schools, and four for the best slogans written by negro students. In addition, children of arsenal personnel will also have a chance at six other prizes.

### Bicycles Sponsored

The Civilian Welfare Council is sponsoring a bicycle for the best slogan written by the son of Redstone personnel, and one for the best slogan written by the daughter of Redstone personnel. Four other prizes similar to the school awards will also be made.

The age groups are: eight years or under; 8-12, 13-15, and 16 through high school.

The slogans should be 25 words or less, and should deal with fire prevention and fire safety.

Slogans written in the schools will be sent to Capt. Delaney through the school system; others must be sent to the Fire Marshal at Redstone Arsenal, Huntsville, Ala.

### Post Party

In addition to the slogan contest, children living on the post will be feted with an ice cream and cake party Saturday morning at the Service Club.

### Safety Demonstrations

During the week, fire trucks decked with fire prevention slogans will be stationed at critical traffic points on the arsenal to remind arsenal employees of fire safety. Demonstration teams will also show fire fighting techniques and give tips on fire prevention at a series of meetings during the week.

(This is the sixth in a series of articles dealing with the nation's top Defense Leaders.)

Admiral William Morrow Fechteler was elevated to the nation's highest naval command, Chief of Naval Operations, when death suddenly struck Admiral Forrest P. Sherman in August 1951.

### Admiral's Son

The son of a rear admiral, Adm. Fechteler was born in San Rafael, Calif., and attended Western High School, Washington D. C., before his appointment to the U. S. Naval Academy in 1912.

Graduated from Annapolis in 1916, his first sea assignment was on board the battleship USS Pennsylvania.

### Other Sea Duty

Following this duty he was assigned to the USS Barney and later to the Naval Academy as regimental officer. Adm. Fechteler also served aboard the USS Isabel, USS Ghirk, USS California, USS West Virginia, USS Perry and USS Indianapolis.

In August 1943 he assumed command of the USS Indiana in the Pacific. The famous battleship acted in support of carriers striking at Marcus Island and later took part in campaigns in the Gilbert Islands, New Hebrides and Marshall Islands.

### Wings Medal

As commander, Amphibious Group Eight, Adm. Fechteler landed an assault force on Los Negros, Admiralty Islands, in Feb. 1944. He also participated in the Battle for Leyte (Lingayen Operations) in Jan. 1945.

For service as attack group commander in the Southwest Pacific Area he was awarded the Distinguished Service Medal.

As assistant chief of Naval Personnel later in 1945, Adm. Fechteler was awarded the Legion of Merit for outstanding services. After serving as deputy chief of Naval Operations (Personnel) he was designated commander in chief, Atlantic and U. S. Atlantic Fleet in Feb. 1950.



## Slow Check Start - Off Means K - Vets Need 2 - Months School Money

WASHINGTON (AFPS) — Veterans who are planning to go to school under the K-Vet Bill have been advised by the Veterans Administration to take along enough money of their own to tide them over for about two months.

There are two reasons for the delay:

(1) Under the law, education and training allowances can not be paid until sometime after a veteran actually completes each month of training.

(2) The law also requires that both the veteran and his school or training establishment submit a certification to the VA—after the end of the month—in which the veteran actually was enrolled in training.

Because of these factors, and the time required to compute the allowance each veteran is entitled to, veterans should allow for two months on their own before they may expect their first check from the government.

Subsequently, checks will be issued regularly each month, as long as the veteran remains in training and his certification is in order.

## Military Service Losses Claims Limited \$2,500

WASHINGTON (AFPS) — An amendment to the Military Personnel Claims Act of 1945 recently enacted by the 82nd Congress sets a limitation of \$2,500 which can be claimed for personal property damaged, lost, destroyed, captured or abandoned incident to military service.

The amendment also provides for the payment of claims to survivors of personnel when loss was concurrent with death. In addition it extends the statute of limitation from one year to two years.

Claims must be presented in writing within two years after they accrue, or within one year after July 3, 1952, the date of enactment of the amendment.

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

## Mutual Aid Is Set For Arsenal, City Fire Departments

Redstone Arsenal and Huntsville fire fighting forces can now officially assist each other in the event of major fires according to a mutual assistance contract approved by Third Army authorities.

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

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

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## More Sketches Of China Leaders

(This is the seventh in a series of articles from the Army Information Digest condensed from the book, "Red China's FIGHTING Hordes," by Lt. Col. Robert B. Rigg, AFPS.)

The following short characterizations are intended to give the reader a better understanding of the military leaders of Red China today.

**Su Yu** — Reds' military darling of daring, has a reputation for producing troops out of his hat, and achieves the maximum combat effectiveness with a given number of men.

### Lucky Gambler

He is a chance taker who has been lucky in his gambling. An ardent exponent of the value of propaganda, Su Yu can be labeled a trouble shooter. Some day in all probability he will try to plant his feet on the shores of Taiwan.

### Mobile Gentleman

Nieh Jung-chen. Looks and acts like a gentleman with impressive calm, unaffected manners. He is an exponent of mobility and gives way to attack in order to swing around to outflank and attack the enemy's rear.

Jung-chen has a reputation for elusiveness and daring. He currently commands the "palace guards"—the troops stationed around Peking and forming of the Fifth Field Army of the Chinese Communist Forces.

### Tough-Minded

Chou Pao-chung is battle scarred inside and out. Outwardly he is smiling and affable, but his life has been so hard he ranks as a peer among those whose military stock-in-trade is toughness.

His will to win has been strengthened by lengthy guerilla struggles against long odds. He managed to survive near the close of World War II by eating grass.

Chou Pao-chung has no formal education, but he is tactically wise and adroit. He has a great contempt for fixed defenses.

Although a pure nationalist, he has indicated concealed favoritism toward America. He does not believe the Chinese should prostitute themselves to the Soviets.

"Warlord" Chen Yi is a gangster type, both in appearance and

## New Guard Units, Can Be Formed As Active's Turn

WASHINGTON (ANF)—For the first time in history, Congress has authorized individual states to form counterparts of National Guard units called to active military service and retained for more than two years.

States whose National Guard units were federalized now are permitted to re-organize similar units at home armories to protect life and property and preserve peace and order.

### Same Names

The counterparts will have the same designation as the units retained in federal service. Their individual identities will be distinguished by the initials "NGUS"—(National Guard of the United States). Known as "carrier" units, they will inherit the history, colors and insignia of their present units.

Retention of National Guard designations and colors in active service for up to five years, while technically the same units reorganize at home armories, provides a means of meeting both the Army's need for additional active duty units and the state's need for internal security forces. The home units also will provide a place for returning Guardsmen and recruits.

### Five-Year Limit

Permission to retain National Guard unit designations and equipment, exclusive of personnel, in active federal service for a maximum period of five consecutive

years was granted the president by Congress under Public Law 461. The law applies only to unit designations and not to the National Guardsmen called to active duty with them. Individual Guardsmen still are eligible for release from active duty upon completion of 24 months service.

### Reduced Strength

National Guard counterpart units will be organized, in general, only at the parent unit's former home station. This action will take place when the parent unit has completed 24 months of active service. Initially, these units will have an authorized strength of 50 per cent officer and 25 per cent enlisted strength of the retained unit.

### Absorb Returnees

The substitute units will be authorized individual arms and equipment and limited organization equipment.

These units eventually will be consolidated with their parent units retained in the federal service when the latter are released to state control.

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
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
