Combined Choruses Make Sweet Music

A memorable choral program was presented by the Huntsville High School Girls Glee Club and the Missilemen to end the 35th Armistice Day observance at Redstone Arsenal.

The program was presented in the Rocket Auditorium, where, following the first song, Brig. Gen. Thomas K. Vincent, the arsenal commander gave an Armistice Day address. He pointed out that 35 years after the war to end all wars, we have been entangled in two more, and admonished that everyone must work at keeping peace as hard as they do in trying to win wars.

The program opened with the combined choruses doing a traditional Austrian ballad arranged by William Schumann. The combined choruses worked under the direction of Pfc. Richard Boyer, Missilemen director. Miss Marjorie Townsend directed the Huntsville High Glee Club in their separate portion of the program.

The Huntsville group featured no soloists.

Three singers were featured by the Missilemen, Pfc. Howard Boehmer, Pfc. Woody Waesche, and guest soloist, Mrs. Elizabeth McClure.

The program ended on a note of patriotic music with a song of the aftermath of World War I, "Madame Jeanette," "America" from the Ernest Bloch opera, and "Battle Hymn of the Republic." The last song was magnificently presented with Barbara Grabensteder of Huntsville High School proving that she is an outstandingly sensitive accompanist.

The Missilemen did two groups of ballads with Pfc. David Freivol as accompanist.

Some of the numbers for both the combined and single choruses were done a capella, proving both the directors and the voices musically competent.

The program was arranged under the sponsorship of the Special Services officer, Capt. John J. Wattendorf, and his staff. Everyone on the program worked on their own time in order to get the show together for presentation.

Bradley Spends Day Visiting Redstone

Redstone was host last week to one of the Army's greatest military figures, General of the Army, Omar Bradley.

The former chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff spent the entire day Thursday gaining firsthand knowledge of arsenal activities and missions.

He arrived at 9 p.m. for briefing in the general's conference room, followed by a whirling tour of Plants Area 1. After lunch in the Mess Hall at 9330 TSU Gen. Bradley was taken on a tour of the Guidance and Control area.

The day was concluded with more briefings in Bldg. A-101.

Bradley is now with the Bulova Watch Company, which is engaged in research and development work connected with guided missiles.

He arrived in Huntsville by automobile Wednesday and left Friday.

NINE AWARDS GO TO RSA WORKERS

Suggestions Earn \$350 During Week

Checks totaling \$350 were awarded during the past week to civilian employes for their suggestions for the improvement of the arsenal. GMDD employes received six of the awards and one each went to the Post Engineer Division, Ammunition Division, and Operations Division of OML.

Robert J. Carmody of Fabrications Lab, OML, received awards totaling \$100 for two different suggestions; one concerning use of a shear plate for making small aluminum parts, and the other concerning the forming of flanges on small parts.

John A. Rist and James C. Helms of GMDD received \$60.00 each for a suggestion submitted by the two men for the use of a tool for bending thin wall tubing.

Forty-five dollars went to Melvin D. Bowman of Fabrications Lab for an idea for the use of a spanner wrench.

A suggestion was worth \$30 to Gordon W. England, T & E Division, GMDD, for an improved method for cleaning aluminum for welding.

Howard W. Langley of GM Lab, OML, received \$15 for a suggestion concerning the use of a holding fixture for honing.

The elimination of a safety hazard at the Water Treatment Plant was worth \$10 to Raymond A. Foster, Post Engineer Division.

Otis G. Gray of the Ammunition Division was awarded \$20 for a suggestion concerning the packing of shells in ammunition boxes.

Mrs. Geneva L. Cole of the Operations Research Division, OML, was awarded ten dollars for a suggestion concerning the elimination of routing slips.

Wanted—Furniture For Growing Offices


An appeal for unused office equipment was made by Harry B. Williamson, chief of Consolidated Supply, in a recent Staff Meeting.

In explaining the need for all types of office equipment, Williams said that expanding arsenal segments were unable to receive assistance from further procurement. Although Redstone has top priority on such equipment, Consolidated supply is still not able to replenish exhausted stocks.

The only solution, Williams said, is for every office on the arsenal to look around for surplus chairs, desks, tables, files, and any other office equipment.

If you only have one chair that you can spare, he said, turn it in to Supply so that it can be re-issued to a critical office.

"Fleet" to Invade Redstone Nov. 26

Redstone will be invaded by the United States Navy on Nov. 26, when a LSSL-35 (Landing Ship Support Light) anchors at the arsenal docks on the Tennessee River.

The boat, en route from Vicksburg, Miss., to Knoxville, will make a four-day stop here to conduct "underway training" for the local Naval Reserve Unit, Commander W. M. Hall said.

As host to the Navy, Redstone will open its doors to the visitors. PX passes will be issued the sailors, and they will be given club privileges during their stay.

Carrying a crew of about 25, the boat left Vicksburg on Nov. 2, after undergoing extensive renovation. The training stop here will be the fourth made along the way. Other stops were at Greenville, Miss., Memphis, and Sheffield. After leaving Huntsville, it will stop at Gunterville and Chattanooga before reaching Knoxville.

Two training trips for Huntsville reservists are planned on the LSSL-35 (formerly known as an LCD).

TRAFFIC CHANGES TO SPEED TRAVEL

New Regulations In Effect Here

New traffic regulations, aimed at speeding up the flow of vehicles coming on and leaving the arsenal, have been put into effect by the new Provost Marshal, Maj. Harvey Vance.

The changes concern lifting the speed limit, routing traffic through Plants Area No. 1, and establishing a Traffic Division.

The speed limit on the main arterial roads on the arsenal has been raised to conform with the Alabama state law, which is 60 MPH during the day and 50 MPH at night for automobiles. However a number of congested areas will have reduced speed limits, Maj. Vance said.

Plants Area No. 1 has been opened to through traffic during the hours between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. in an effort to speed-up outgoing traffic.

"I've noticed that at 5 p.m. traffic is still leaving the arsenal," the new Provost Marshal said. "We hope to reduce that time by half."

Members of the newly organized Traffic Division, wearing white gloves and caps and with green scarfs tucked inside OD jackets, have been stationed at busy intersections to direct traffic during the rush period after work hours.

In time, the Traffic Division will be equipped with white patrol cars, Maj. Vance said. There is already one such car operating on the arsenal. Soon, however, a number of the "White Angels" will be patrolling the roads over the arsenal.

"We need the cooperation of everyone in order to make the new program a success," Maj. Vance said.

"What we want to do is get people off the arsenal as quickly and safely as possible," he said.

Reports from personnel in Bldg. 781 and Field Service indicate that what the major wants is exactly what is happening. A number of persons have reported getting home ten or 15 minutes earlier than they did under the old traffic system.

RSA Accident Rate Reported by Safety

Progress is being made in the reduction of disabling accidents at Redstone, a report by Wilbur Albright, Safety Officer, showed.

Only four disabling accidents occurred during the month of October, Albright said. Of these, two were in Ammunition, one in Transportation, and one among military personnel.

The Safety Officer cited the Guided Missile Development Division as having an outstanding accident prevention record. On Nov. 7, GMDD completed two years without a disabling accident. During this time, over three million man-hours were worked in the division.

The totals of Redstone's accident rates since January of this year shows two above and two below the average for the Ordnance Corps.

The arsenal's motor vehicle accident rate is only .5, while the Ordnance rate is 1.3.

The civilian accident rate (civil service employes) for the arsenal is 3.1, slightly lower than the Ordnance rate of 3.4.

The military accident rate here is 10.6, compared to only 4.3 for Ordnance.

The non-civil service civilians accident rate at Redstone is 5.1 and the Ordnance average is 2.4.

Albright noted that 30 per cent of the accidents occurring in October resulted from improper lifting. Another 15 per cent resulted from not following procedures and other instructions.

NEED EXTRA CHRISTMAS CASH? HERE'S EASY WAY TO EARN IT

You have all read about the cash being paid for ideas on ways to improve the arsenal.

Maybe you have wondered what type of suggestion pays off, and what you can do to earn some extra money—suggestion-wise—now that the Christmas holidays are so close.

A look at past suggestions should give a hint as to the best kind of ideas to send to

the Efficiency Awards Committee.

A check of last year's suggestions and awards shows that the biggest money comes from ideas that can generally be classified under the heading of Tools, Jigs, and Fixtures. While suggestions of this type amounted to only a small percentage of the total number submitted they accounted for 25 per cent of the total paid for all suggestions.

Running a close second were ideas about Method Improvement, which accounted for about 23 per cent of the cash awards.

Many awards were paid for Modification, Design, and Improvement of Machinery. Other types of suggestions netting awards were for Building Changes, Improved Administrative Procedures, Elimination of Safety Hazards, and the Use of New Equipment.

Traffic Improvements, although amounting to a large percentage of the total number of suggestions received, received less than two per cent of awards money. Making a somewhat better showing were suggestions concerned with Transportation, Services Improvements, Welfare and Morale, and other miscellaneous ideas.

From this you can see that, while services and welfare ideas do pay off, it is harder to earn that extra money this way. The surest way to win is to send in ideas on improving your own job. You know your job better than anyone else, and as a result you are in a better position to see ways of improving it.





GEN. VINCENT TALKS ON ARMY WIFE'S ROLE BEFORE MEMBERS OF O. W. CLUB

"Duty, honor, country," was the leading keynote of Gen. Vincent's speech to the members of the Officers Wives Club Nov. 10 at the Officers Mess.

The commanding general covered all of the points on the Army wife's role, commenting that "A wife can make or break her husband's career, and she must make a good home under any circumstances which may arise.

An officer has to consider duty first, and when he must leave his home, Army wives have to adjust to the situation. "Patience makes women more beautiful," Gen. Vincent offered, as solace for separations and the fact that an officer cannot discuss his business with his wife.

"Don't be an added demand on

your husbands," was another bit of advice the general gave.

In discussing social obligations he explained that it is not necessary to repay in kind, but rather to make a gesture in keeping with the family's means and circumstances.

Gen Vincent reviewed some of the changes in the Army through the years, pointing out that now there is no apparent difference as to whether an officer is of the Regular Army or the Reserves.

Once the difference was quite distinct.

He continued his talk by giving hearty approval to wives working. "They furnish us with a valuable source of accomplished workers who are a real help to the Army."

The highest compliment a man in the Army can receive is to say, "He is a real soldier," the general said, "so the same applies to his wife. She should be a real wife."

"As an Army wife, keep from speaking ill of anyone. The unspoken word is your servant, the spoken word is your equal, and the written word is your master," was another well placed admonition the general made.

"The rewards of Army life come from the wide acquaintance, adventure of travel and new experiences, and a broadening of interests," Gen. Vincent concluded.



As for her type of singing, she is neither high-brow or low-brow, but a popular in-between. Her favorite singer is Jane Froman—which is a good indication of her own style singing.


