## AIR CONDITIONERS AND HEATERS BOTH WORK OVERTIME IN ALABAMA

Newcomers from far corners who come to Redstone to reside, naturally ask as one of their first questions, "And what kind of weather do you have here?"

When we give an evasive, yet more or less correct answer, we say, "Well, every year is different."

The Post Engineer keeps a record in order to determine the fuel and refrigeration needs on the arsenal.

In case you have forgotten already, the hottest day in 1953 was on June 9 with a high of 105 degrees. The coldest on December 18 with ten degrees.

May 3, 1953 was the wettest day when we had 4.31 inches of rain.

The records for Madison County kept for a period covering as long as 37 years show that during that time, the hottest day we had was in a July when the mercury hit 111. The coldest was ten below zero which has happened in both February and March.

The temperature hit the highest average in July, and the lowest in January.

The prevailing winds are from the South eight months out of the year. The rest of the time we have a North wind except in February when it is usually from the Southwest.

The highest humidity occurs in the morning, and goes down as the temperature goes up. In summer, the heat starts getting what is technically termed "intolerable" about 10 a.m. Anyone who has

### University Center, Alabama A. & M. Slated for Visit

Dr. O. C. Carmichael, president of the University of Alabama, will visit Redstone Feb. 18, it was announced by Vance Thornton, general chairman of the committee on arrangements.

The nationally known educator will be welcomed by Gen. Vincent and other Redstone officials. He will also visit Alabama A & M and the University Center while in Huntsville.

Ed Brown, assistant director of the University News Bureau, will accompany Dr. Carmichael on his brief tour of the arsenal which will include visits to Rohm & Haas, Thiokol, and other points of interest.

The University president will be guest of honor at a banquet to be held at the Russel Erskine Hotel the same night, Thornton said. Many persons from Redstone are expected to attend.

A native of Alabama, Dr. Carmichael has been active in the field of education for over 40 years. Born in Goodwater in 1891, he took his AB and MA at the University of Alabama.

In 1917 he was a Rhodes Scholar at Oxford University, England, where he received a B. Sc. and a diploma on anthropology.

After working for several years in Alabama high schools, he became assistant to president of Alabama College, at Montevallo. He was made president in 1926 and served in that capacity until becoming chancellor of Vanderbilt in 1937.

From 1946 until he returned to Alabama he was president of the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching and executive associate of the Carnegie Corporation.

During 1948-53 he was also the chairman of the board of trustees of the New York State University System.

At present, one of his sons, Oliver Cromwell, Jr., is dean of students at Vanderbilt.

Among the numerous groups and committees with which Dr. Carmichael has been associated are the following: President's Commission on Higher Education, 1946-48; Advisory Committee, War Manpower Commission and War Production Board; Phi Beta Kappa, member of Senate, 1940-46; and Advisory Committee, Southern Research Institute, 1945-to present.

## DISCIPLINE BOARD MEETS AT ARSENAL

### State Officials Attend Session

Health officials and provost marshals from all over North Alabama were at Redstone recently for the monthly meeting of the North Alabama District Armed Forces Disciplinary Control Board.

During the meeting in the War Room, Bldg. A-101, the board, which works with local, county, and state officials for the protection of military personnel, rescinded an "off-limits" ban placed on the Kildare Apartments more than a year ago.

The owner and operator of the Huntsville apartment building, E. J. Smith, was placed on six months "on-limits" probation on the recommendation of Maj. Harvey Vance, Redstone provost marshal. At the end of that period, if no complaints have been received, the apartment building will be unconditionally placed "on-limits."

The nine-man disciplinary control board has the authority to place businesses, night clubs, restaurants, apartments, and other types of facilities "off-limits" to military personnel.

The Kildare Apartments were placed "off-limits" after an incident between the owner, Smith, and two enlisted men who were staying there at the time.

The board meets monthly to hear reports from provost marshals of the area, which extends south as far as Craig Air Force Base, on such matters as general disease rates among troops, the number of persons absent without leave, and other matters coming under the general term of disciplinary control.

Local officials, including Sheriff Cecil Sanderson, Solicitor Glenn Manning, Police Chief Grover Pylant, and Highway Patrol Sgt. W. R. Jones, were present at the meeting.

Provost marshals who compose the board are: Maj. Paul M. Koerner, president from Ft. McClellan; Maj. Vance; Maj. R. M. Herrick and Maj. R. J. Wade, both from Maxwell Field; Capt. Ancel St. John, Anniston Ordnance Depot; Maj. Albert J. Cordani, Craig AFB; Maj. R. R. Arvidson, Alabama Military District, Birmingham; and Lt. J. M. Russell, Guinther AFB. The medical member of the board is Maj. R. G. Carlson, from the U. S. Army hospital at Ft. McClellan.

Maj. Vance, in presenting his report to the board, praised the local officials for the fine cooperation with Redstone authorities.

Alabama Health Dept. officials who attended the meeting are: Dawson T. Kilcrease, Montgomery; Dr. W. H. Y. Smith, Montgomery; Dr. Otis F. Gay, Madison County Health Dept.; and Dr. Earl J. McCart, Anniston.

Also in attendance were Capt. C. T. Barret, of the Decatur district of the State Highway Dept., and Capt. F. A. Warrick, recorder for the Southeastern Armed Forces Disciplinary Control Board.

# The Machine, the Man---and KP Duty



**DOUBLE DUTY**—Pfc. Walter Brunner is one of the brainy soldiers doing an important job at Redstone. Until recently, he was the only man here who could operate the highly complex Reeves Electronic Analog Computer. But like any other G.I., the young New Yorker had to pull KP when his name came up, much to the distress of scientists and mathematicians waiting to have data solved.

When Pfc. Walter Brunner came to Redstone Arsenal there was a \$187,000 machine on hand that nobody knew how to operate.

In fact, no one at this rocket and guided missile center, where hundreds of top scientists, mathematicians, and physicists are engaged in important research and development work, knew how to assemble and connect the complicated Reeves Electronic Analog Computer.

Until Pfc. Brunner (who was only a private then) came along, the machine had not even been uncrated.

Fortunately the 24-year-old soldier had worked for the Reeves Company when he was a civilian. He did this after getting a Master's degree in mathematics from

New York University. Brunner was given a three months training course in how to operate the computer before being turned loose on his first problem by the company.

The machine is designed to solve differential equations and thereby to stimulate the physical situations described by the equations.

At Redstone, the computer is often put to use stimulating the trajectories of rockets in flight. This cuts down the number of actual flight tests that are needed and saves the government thousands of dollars.

Many months before Brunner ever heard of Redstone Arsenal, the official of the Computations Lab here decided that an analog computer would be a valuable and time-saving addition to the modern equipment already on hand.

The initial cost of almost \$200,000 would be off-set by the time and expenses that the machine would save the government. A contract to supply the computer was made with the Reeves Company and, at the same time, Civilian Personnel started looking around for an operator who could be hired.

At about this time, a government freeze on hiring new employees went into effect. Personnel was stopped cold from hiring an operator for the computer, but the machine was delivered anyway, because the contract was binding on the government.

Four months later, much to the relief of everyone, Brunner showed up. It took him about two weeks to uncrate the equipment and get it working.

Born in Prague, Czechoslovakia, Brunner came to this country when he was 11 years old—after living for a while in Switzerland and Mexico.

While in Switzerland he became a young but ardent skiing enthusiast, and he is planning on spending his next furlough in the Swiss Alps.

Brunner is only one of many brainy G. I.'s now serving at Red-

stone Arsenal. There are others with Master's degrees and Ph. D.s from leading Universities of America.

And like other G.I.s, when Brunner's turn for KP comes, he puts aside the data and equations he is solving on the computer and dons fatigue clothes for a stint at washing pots and pans.

Until recently, the analog computer sat idle when Brunner was pulling KP or on some other detail. Now, however, he has trained Pvt. Bill Mancuso, an electronics engineer, and a civilian mathematician, Chester Hopkins, to take over at these times.

And when Pfc. Brunner gets out of the Army next November, there will be someone on hand to operate the Reeves Electronic Analog Computer.

## Toftoy Is Author Of Mag Article





# ROCKETS WIN TWO NET GAMES AGAINST ATHENS AND SEWART

 The rampaging Redstone basketball team won two games over past week. Playing improved the Rockets defeated Athens 85-69 and Sewart Air Force Base 48-39.

Redstone, freeze the ball despite the pressing defensive play on the part of Sewart.



PVT. HATFIELD GIVES LOWDOWN ON REASON FOR McCOY FEUD

Mohringen, Germany (AFPS)—Pvt. Raymond Hatfield cleared up a few details of his family's famous feud with the McCoy clan the other day.

Pvt. Hatfield, a direct descendant of "Divil Ance" Hatfield, is a member of Hq. Co., 2nd Armored Cavalry here — an outfit which traces its ancestry back to the Second Dragoons established by President Jackson in 1836.

According to legend, the feud started in 1880 when Jonce Hatfield—son of Divil Ance—moonlight-requisitioned Rosanna, the flower of the McCoy clan, without the customary parental approval.

But that's not the truth, says Pvt. Hatfield. He ought to know. His grandfather was the last fighting survivor of the West Virginia-Kentucky feud.

Actually, he relates, the trouble started a couple of weeks earlier. The McCoy's were accused of barbecuing a Hatfield hog that had been happily rooting for beech nuts near the McCoy still.

The bullets flew thick and fast, but there was much consternation when, during the height of the battle, the hog turned up red-

eyed and staggering.

The hog, it seems, had taken off down the valley to hunt wolves after tipping over a barrel of the McCoy's mash. It was this supposed violation of the mountain code, not the stealing of lovely Rosanna that started the fightin' and feudin'.

Pvt. Hatfield doesn't smoke, chew or drink anything deadlier than "sprudel wasser," but he's pretty deadly with the M-1, sub-machinegun and carbine.

"Doesn't hurt to keep up to date on shootin' irons," he says. "The McCoy's have left our part of the country for good—but you never know."

In accord with General Vincent's recent emphasis on fire prevention, personnel of the Redstone Depot received instructions from the Redstone Arsenal Fire Department recently.

The demonstration was to familiarize all employees with the use and purpose of ordinary fire fighting tools available in each building.

Since big fires always get their start in life from small beginnings, emphasis is placed on careful inspection to remove potential causes of spontaneous ignition. Smoking is carefully regulated so as to minimize the possibility of accidental fires.

Of particular importance is the timely use of a suitable fire extinguisher. Many people feel that a fire extinguisher will mysteriously "put out anything", even the cat. To date we have tried everything else on the local skunks — nope, not the proper equipment, but a fomite extinguisher just might—hm-m-m.

Weekly, short, meetings are held by each Depot foreman to discuss practical Depot problems related to fire prevention and safety, including any recently discovered unsafe conditions and their remedy.
