

CG Retirement Program Includes Concert, Review

Finance Officer, Provost Marshal Retire Same Date

Redstone is losing not only a commanding general through retirement on Aug. 31, but also the finance officer, Lt. Col. Olin T. Hinkley, and the provost marshal, Maj. Harvey C. Vance.

Col. Hinkley has more than 26 years of continuous Army service to his credit, and Maj. Vance has more than 28. Both men have made definite plans for their careers following retirement.

Col. Hinkley will move to Piedmont, Ala., his wife's hometown, where he will open an African violet shop in the near future. The Hinkleys own a home in Piedmont.

Maj. Vance will enter the University of Houston (Tex.) to major in Philosophy and Religion. He and Mrs. Vance, the former Miss Mary Louise Hinton of Lumberton, Miss., have purchased a home at 3825 Palm St., University Woods, Houston. Mrs. Vance will head the Acquisitions Department in the library at the University of Houston.

Col. Hinkley came to Redstone last April from the Finance Center at Indianapolis, Ind., where he was chief of Settlements Division and Retired Pay Division.

He is originally from southern Illinois. Most of his Army service, except for overseas assignments, has been spent in the Southeast. He attended school at the University high school and at Southern Illinois University in Carbondale. His hometown is Ashley, Ill., near Carbondale.

His stations in this area include Ft. Benning, Ft. Barrancas, Ft. McPherson, Ft. Oglethorpe, Ft. Campbell and Ft. Knox. Other than these places in the U. S., he was assigned to Ft. Benjamin Harrison, Ind., and the St. Louis Administration Center.

Among the decorations he is entitled to wear are: the Legion of Merit for meritorious service in the Central Disbursing Office in London, 1943-45; the Bronze Star for valor in Korea in 1950-51; the Commendation Ribbon awarded for his service while in the Office of the Fiscal Director, Frankfurt, Germany, 1945-46; the Korean Presidential Unit Citation and the Good Conduct Medal.

Maj. Vance entered service at Ft. Oglethorpe, Ga. After three years there, he was sent on ROTC duty at Oklahoma Military Academy, Claremore, Oklahoma, from 1930 to 1942. He became a second lieutenant in the Cavalry in December, 1942, and transferred to the Military Police Corps at Camp Atterbury, Ind., in December, 1944.

In 1946, Maj. Vance went to the Philippines to stay until 1948.

"Band of Angels" To Be at Arsenal From Ft. Campbell

The 11th Airborne Band, dubbed Band of the Angels, will be at Redstone Arsenal next Friday and Saturday to give a concert at Linton Field on Friday night and present the marches for the formal parade and review Saturday morning.

The Band of Angels is under the direction of Chief Warrant Officer Carroll H. Druish.

It was formed at Maro Bay, New Guinea under the guidance of CWO John Berdlund in October, 1944.

Twenty-two of the bandmen make regular parachute jumps every 90 days. All of them spend fifty per cent of their time on military duties in the field and classroom and the rest in rehearsal and other activities that involve band work.

Their repertoire ranges from military marches to catchy swing.

Events to Cimax 37 Years Service By Gen. Vincent

The first event of the retirement ceremonies in honor of General Vincent will be a band concert at 8 p.m. Friday at Linton Field. The 50-man 11th Airborne Division band from Fort Campbell, Ky., will give the concert.

Other activities, including a ceremonial review Saturday, have been planned to honor General Vincent, whose retirement becomes effective Aug. 31.

Maj. Harvey Vance and Lt. Col. Olin T. Hinkley will also retire from the Army on that date. They will take part in the ceremonies here. Maj. Vance is provost marshal and Col. Hinkley is finance officer.

About 1000 Redstone troops will march in the ceremonial review at 10 a.m. Saturday at the Post Parade Ground, just south of Headquarters, Bldg. A-101.

Special invitations to the two events have been sent to members of the Army Advisory Committee and other Huntsville citizens. The public is cordially invited to the concert and review.

The seven units which will march in the review will be under the command of Col. Miles Chatfield, director of OML. Capt. Harry Schoenman will command troops from the Troop Command and Maj. Raymond Hansotte will command troops from OGMS Troop Division.

The 11th Airborne Band will open the ceremony by playing "Sound Off." Then, while playing a march, the band will parade.

Following this, the band will play the General's March while the troops, in mass formation, present arms and a gun salute is rendered. The general will then inspect the troops.

Capt. W. R. Becker will read the orders retiring Gen. Vincent and he will read a short survey of the general's career. The final activity will be when the troops pass in review.

Gen. Vincent, age 58, has been in command at Redstone since June, 1952, when he arrived here from Aberdeen Proving Ground, where he commanded the Ordnance Training Command.

He has about 37 years service in the Army. He has been in the Ordnance Corps since 1920. After his retirement from the Army, Gen. Vincent will go with the American Ordnance Association.



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NAVY FLIERS OFF CHINA TOLD TO 'BE QUICK ON THE TRIGGER'

Washington (AFPS) — U. S. Navy planes, under orders to "be quick on the trigger" if attacked, continued to patrol the waters off Communist China's Hainan Island after shooting down two Chinese fighters.

The Communist planes had fired on three U.S. planes that were searching for survivors of a British airliner shot down by Red aircraft. The U.S. planes were operating from two Seventh Fleet carriers rushed to the area to aid in the hunt.

After the Chinese fighters had been shot down, ADM Robert B. Carney, USN, Chief of Naval Operations, ordered the two 27,000 ton carriers, the Hornet and the Philippine Sea, to remain in the area and continue searching until "all possibilities of locating survivors have been exhausted."

Three Americans were among the nine passengers feared lost in the attack on the British airliner. Communist China admitted that its patrol planes had shot down the commercial airliner. They said it had been mistaken

for a National Chinese plane.

In the clash between the U. S. and Red aircraft, which took place outside the 12-mile territorial limits of Hainan, all five of the planes were propeller-driven.

Two Communists LA-7s, low-wing, single-seat fighters, reported to be among the Reds' fastest propeller-driven aircraft, opened fire on two Navy Douglas AD Skyraiders and an F4U Corsair. The carrier-based planes returned the fire, shooting down both Chinese attackers.

The American pilots also reported that a Chinese gunboat had opened fire on them during the battle, but they did not return the fire. There were no U.S. casualties.

ADM Felix B. Stump, USN, Commander of the Pacific Fleet, said the Navy planes have "standard instructions to be quick on the trigger" if attacked.

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

V & W STORAGE BRANCH

It was stated in the beginning of this corner of The Rocket that it was the purpose of this writer to present to its readers a brief biographical sketch of some of the workers in the field who have helped in a very material way to make this branch of the service effective. Therefore, in this issue of our paper Mr. James G. Watson gets a free ride on the Merry-Go-Round.

The subject of this sketch was born in Moulton, Alabama, which is in Lawrence County on June 12, 1918. He grew up on his father's farm, attended the public schools of Lawrence County and finished the 8th grade in Hillsboro High School. He worked on the farm with his father until 1937 when he went to work in a CCC Camp in Huntsville for about a year. From here he was transferred to Holly Springs, Miss., where he put up about another year with the CCC boys.

After the above work, he returned to his father's farm where he worked until March 4, 1942 when he was accepted for military service in the U.S. Army. Mr. Watson received his basic training in Camp Chaffee, Ark. He saw active service in the Pacific Theater of war and took part in the battles of Tinian and Saipan. He was honorably discharged Feb. 3, 1945. It was in this year that he first came to Redstone and hired in as a checker for Property. He has been at Redstone since that time.

His next promotion came when he was reclassified as Foreman of munition Handlers under the supervision of Mr. E. L. Merritt. He has since remained with this branch of service and is now General Foreman, WBS-10-4, over all areas in the field. There is a saying among workers out in the field when referring to a supervisor that he is a "Wheel." That word "Wheel" is an excellent illustration. If a wheel functions at all, there must be perfect coordination. Perhaps it would be a little more accurate to classify Mr. Watson as a part of the "Wheel." If we considered only his stature, we might say that he was just a small cog of the wheel; but, when we consider that his responsibility is to coordinate operations throughout all areas, we would say that he is one of the spokes of the big wheel. SOCKS — Black, replacing the present tan.


NECKTIES — Black, replacing

The visor will be plain black leather for EM, WO's and company grade officers, but with embroidered gold nylon or rayon oak leaves for field grade officers and embroidered gold bullion oak leaves for general officers. All cap bands will be plain green except for general officers, who will have embroidered gold bullion oak leaves.

GARRISON (Overseas) CAPS— Army Green with all personnel wearing a cord edge braid of matching green in place of the present distinctive braids and branch colored pipings.

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
