## LYNCH COMPLETES SECURITY COURSE

James C. Lynch, chief of the Intelligence Office, is back at Redstone Arsenal after completing a three-week course covering Orientation of Industrial Security at the Army's security headquarters, Ft. Holobird, Md.

The course covered the indoctrination of the principles used for industrial security by Department of Defense contractors.

During the latter instruction, Lynch said, the class was given actual combination locks, allowed to change the combinations and then put the original back on the lock. This and fingerprinting are a part of the indoctrination for the Counter-Intelligence Corpsmen.

Security in atomic plants was also highlighted in the course.

The lectures included some of the work of the National Security Agency and was climaxed by a tour of the Glenn L. Martin plant in Baltimore to pinpoint security in practice.

### PLANS PUSHED FOR 'ARSENAL DAY'

Plans are going ahead full-speed in preparation for the Arsenal's "big day" during Huntsville's forthcoming Sesquicentennial — Redstone Arsenal Day, Wednesday, Sept. 14.

Maximum cooperation in staging the Sesqui event has been urged by General Toftoy.

A full day's activities will feature displays on the courthouse square from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., the main address of the day by a top speaker at a joint civic club luncheon at noon at the Russel Erskine Hotel, a mammoth parade downtown beginning at 2 p.m., a concert by the famed Third Army

Band at 7 p.m. at Big Spring Park, and the historical pageant, "Into This Valley," 8:15 p.m. also at Big Spring Park.

As a guest of honor for Redstone Arsenal Day, the Arsenal will welcome Lt. Gen. Thomas F. Hickey, Third Army commander.

General Hickey and other dignitaries will ride in the lead of the parade, followed by the Third Army band, some 500 Arsenal troops, the MP jeeps, the Honest John rocket, another marching band to be announced later. School troops numbering approxi-

The Army Chemical Corps has announced development of a radiation detector, no larger than a package of cigarettes, which is expected to replace the film badge. Unlike the latter, the detector, known as a tactical radiation dosimeter, can be used repeatedly and no processing is needed. Liquids in five tubes change colors when a dangerous amount of radiation is present in the individual wearing the dosimeter.


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

mately 500, decorated cars bearing the Arsenal's nine Sesqui queen candidates, members of the Arsenal's five "Brothers of the Brush" chapters — the Thiokol "Wooly Boogers," the "Shaggy Satellites," the "Fab Lab Fuzies," the "Squirrel Hill" chapter, and the "Twickenham Settlers"— plus high school marching bands, civic club floats and other units, and a float carrying the Sesquicentennial Queen and her court.

Displays at the courthouse square will include a Corporal missile, an Honest John Rocket, and an Ammunition Division exhibit.

Ammunition Division officials reported that their display would be the most complete ever staged by them, featuring items of ammunition produced at Redstone Arsenal. Among them will be samples of high-explosive bursting charges; 88 mm. mortar shells (illuminating and white phosphorous), with diagram of working parts and cutaway of actual shell; 105 mm. howitzer colored smoke, illuminating, and white phosphorous shells and cutaways; 4.2 inch mortar white phosphorous shells; 3.5 inch rockets and cutaways; demolition charges; and a 35-minute Arsenal-produced sound movie entitled "Assembly of 3.5 Inch Rocket," which was filmed on location at the Arsenal's Line 6, showing the actual assembly operations performed here to prepare a rocket for shipment to the troops.

The movie was made by OML's Photo Lab, and narration is by Fred Digesu, of GMDD. The film will be shown continuously during the exhibit downtown in a 20-by-12-foot plywood booth covered with tarpaulin. Ammunition Division personnel will be on hand to explain the display and answer questions from spectators.

A complete cycle of rocket testing procedures will be demonstrated by the Test and Evaluation Branch of Rocket Development Division.

First, a tiny "Small Fry" rocket, developed at Redstone Arsenal, will be subjected to environmental tests.

These will consist of a "drop" test which duplicates the harsh knocks a rocket might receive on the battlefield before it is actually fired, a mud bath, and a good "swim" in a water tank.

After undergoing these grueling tests the rocket will actually be fired on a special demonstration range. At this point the flight testing equipment takes over and determines what effects the previous tests had on the rocket's accuracy.

The flight test equipment consists of a set of induction coils which measures the velocity of the rocket in flight, a battery of four cameras, and a special target which helps to make exact measurements of the rocket's accuracy.

The four cameras operate simultaneously, but each has a different purpose. A Fastax camera measures the speed of the rocket. A Bowen-Knapp records its flight path, a high-speed ballistic-synchro camera documents the rate of spin of the rocket, while a movie camera covers the rocket's impact on the target.

The demonstration will be staged and explained by George Travers, Dale Soulek, and John Gresham, all test engineers from the T&E Branch, RDD.

Aiding the engineers will be an electronic sequence timer which actually starts each piece of equipment at the right split-second.


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

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
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# SPORTS

## FOLLOWIN' THRU

A ROUND-UP OF RSA SPORTS NEWS

This seems to be the interim between summer and fall sports. Looking back over the calendar, track, golf, tennis, swimming, and summer bowling have all been wrapped up. Softball came to a halt during the past week, with Camp Gordon taking the Third Army title in a major upset over Fort Benning. Baseball is grinding to a stop, as Redstone Arsenal and nine other ball clubs are this week fighting it out at the Third Army tourney at Benning. Volleyball, football, boxing, basketball, and winter bowling haven't gotten underway.

This is the time of year that sports writers go out on limbs over various football prospects and spend four months getting the limbs sawed off. Since we can not resist doing the same, here are our picks, guaranteed to make a maximum number of people think we're crazy. From East to West:

Yale and Cornell will again fight out the Ivy league champ-

ionship; nod goes to Yale, loaded with backfield talent. Massachusetts will beat out perennially strong Rhode Island in the Yankee Conference. Army, Navy, and Boston U. are leading Eastern independents.

In the Midwest, Michigan and Ohio State will run into each other on the last day of the season, a game that might determine the Big Ten champ. Don't count out Purdue, as the Boilermaker's schedule doesn't include either Michigan or OSU, and they might back into the title by playing more conference games. We like Michigan. Miami will run off with the Mid-American crown, Western Reserve should wrap up the new President's Conference, and, against the advice of other experts, we'll pick Heidelberg to repeat in the Ohio Conference. Notre Dame, Pitt, and Cincinnati are the leading independents, as usual.

Maryland will beat out Duke for the Atlantic Coast honors, with West Virginia facing no great trouble in taking its third straight Southern title.

In the Southeast, we like (and this should put you in hysterics) Mississippi. The Rebels have the same chance as Purdue in that they don't face either Georgia Tech or Auburn, both of whom have tougher slates. Miami is the biggest independent, maybe even big enough to knock off Georgia Tech and Notre Dame this year.

Rice will whip Texas, badly shaken up last year, for the Southwestern Conference champ-

ionship, and Texas Tech will again top the Border Conference, beating out tough Arizona and revitalized Hardin-Simmons that picked up Sammy Baugh as head coach. Trinity, last year's only unbeaten-untied Texas team, will repeat in the Gulf Coast league, SW Texas State will take the Lone Star, and Howard Payne is favored in the Texas Conference.

Oklahoma, although on NCAA probation, will clobber Colorado, and the teams will finish one-two in the Big Seven. Houston is our pick in the Missouri Valley, and South Dakota State, with the entire league having great losses, gets the pick in the North Central.

With Denver's entire coaching staff moved to Dartmouth, Utah will nose out Wyoming in the Skyline; just don't bet money on it, though. Montana State looks big in the Rocky Mountain circuit.

On the coast, UCLA and Southern California will assure that a Los Angeles team will take top honors. We'll stick with UCLA. San Francisco State and Fresno State should cop the Far Western and California conferences, respectively. College of the Pacific is the lone big-time independent, but has a terrific schedule.

Having picked 22 conference winners, we'll now head back to Tuscaloosa.

### Gordon Surprises Softball Champions

Camp Gordon last week fought back to win five straight games, including two over the previously unbeaten and defending champion Fort Benning team, and walked away with the Third Army softball championship. The double victory over Benning climaxed a week-long double - elimination tournament at the Atlanta General Depot that saw twelve other entries beaten.

Gordon, beaten on the third day of competition, 1-0, by Fort Jackson, needed victories over Camp Stewart and semi-finalists Fort McClellan and Jackson, to get even a crack at unbeaten Benning. Benning had easily rolled to the finals in the winners bracket.
