### ARSENAL GRIDDERS PLAY 'DAVID' AGAINST SERVICE FOOTBALL GIANTS

A David among service football's Goliaths, the Redstone Arsenal Rockets keep flinging stones season after season—and laying low a goodly number of gridiron giants.

Drawing its football talent from only slightly over a thousand troops stationed here, the Arsenal squad annually goes against the country's top teams such as, for instance, Ft. Benning, Ga.—which has more than 50,000.

Admittedly playing "out of our league"—the way head coach Major Ed Long phrases it—the Rockets last year won six, dropped four, and tied one.

"Installations our size don't usually even have post football teams," Major Long explains. "That's the main reason we have to schedule over our heads. But we like to play the rough ones, anyway. It's more fun, and naturally it means more to the boys when we show well."

Despite numerical shortcomings the Arsenal probably provides more than its share of good ath-

letes, the coach points out. That's chiefly because most of these unusual troops are right out of colleges, where many of them took part in various sports at some level.

Major Long lists another factor: perhaps the Rockets put a little more "zip" into their after-duty hours football because of the type Army jobs they have here.

Virtually none of them do manual work during duty, as on most ordinary posts. Instead, these part-time grididders spend their days at scientific or technical projects in the missile center's numerous laboratories and offices. "When the day's over, they're just rarin' to get out in the fresh air" (Continued on Back Page)

### GENS. MAGRUDER, CUMMINGS, WESTPHALINGER, HORRIDGE HERE

Lt. Gen. Carter B. Magruder, deputy chief of Staff for Logistics, is reviewing the activities at Redstone Arsenal today and tomorrow.

With Gen. Magruder are Maj. Gen. Emerson L. Cummings, Chief of Ordnance, Brig. Gen. Henry R. Westphalinger, Chief of Procurement in Gen. Magruder's office, and Brig. Gen. Joseph H. Horrridge, commanding general of the Ordnance Training Command. Louis Grabensteder, executive assistant, was scheduled to deliver a briefing on the overall program at the arsenal.

The national mission coordination briefings were divided between Brig. Gen. H. N. Toftoy, arsenal commander, and Chauncey Huth, chief of Mission Planning and Coordination.

The Army Industrial Fund and Funding Management is to be presented by Kermit Day, Comptroller.

Col. Miles B. Chatfield, chief, and Dr. Martin Schilling, deputy chief of the Research and Development Division were slated for discussions of the national mission programming in the Research and Development field.


The national missions of Field Service and the Industrial Division will be discussed by the two chiefs, Col. Paul Elias and Col. Merlin L. DeGuire. Col. E. J. Sweeney will explain the program for spare parts. He is deputy chief of the Industrial Division.

The two special arsenal missions will be covered by John H. Hyer, chief of the Ammunition Division, and Col. T. H. Ebbert, chief of Redstone Depot.

Also on the agenda are tours of the guided missile maintenance procedure shop, the Redstone Depot, an ammunition line and the static test stand.

Before touring the guided missile facilities, there will be a presentation of the guided missile development division program.

Then, a tour of the assembly shop and the guidance and control

### Cumulative Injury Rate for Arsenal Jan.-Aug. Is 1.2

The cumulative injury rate (the number of disabling injuries per 1,000,000 man-hours) for all Arsenal employees (civil service, contractors, and concessionaires) for the period January through August, 1955, was 1.2, it has been announced by the Safety Office. The figure for the same period last year was 1.3.

The rate for all RSA military personnel was 3.8, compared with last year's 4.0.

The cumulative vehicle accident rate (number of motor vehicle accidents per 100,000 miles driven) was 1.0, compared to 2 in 1954.



If anyone thinks that they see a billy goat running around in MS No. 2, they had better be sure it isn't George Slate. I am not telling who is responsible for that

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
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**Kinney Is Promoted To First Lieutenant**





## REDSTONE OPENS FOOTBALL SEASON AGAINST FORT BENNING SATURDAY

The Redstone Arsenal Rockets, attempting to gain national recognition for the first time, will open its tough football schedule Saturday against Fort Benning's Infantry School team. Game time is 2 p.m.; place is Linton Field.

Fort Benning, one of the Third Army's largest posts, this year has only two football squads. The school team is considered the better ball club.

Redstone is wrapping up final drills this week. The new edition of the Rockets will feature many former college players, fair speed in the backfield, and a defensive line averaging about 200 pounds.

Heading the contingent are Bart Massey, former Texas Tech tackle and Glen Wasz, another tackle from Notre Dame. Also in the line will be center Jim Bohlmann, who performed for Valparaiso, and Elwood Satterfeall, a guard from LaCrosse State. Other college players who will probably see some action are John McCrea, an end from Allegheny; Charlie Wilbourne, Alabama freshman quarterback; and Rich MacNamara, halfback on last year's Notre Dame frosh squad.

Backfield positions are about three deep. The starting lineup tentatively lists John Schillo at quarterback, Elbert Williams at left-half, Jim Harbison at right-half, and Wayne Woodlee at full-back. Woodlee was on last year's Redstone team, and will leave the Army after about two games; he will split his playing time with replacements Frank Garoppo and Willie Croft. The team will operate from a straight T-formation.

Redstone's coaches have indicated that the first game will be a good ball game, but will also be against one of the toughest teams

**THE POST LIBRARY**

Effective Oct. 1, 1955 the Post Library circulation policy will be as follows:

1. The Post Library is open to the military and their dependents.
2. Dependents over 16 years of age may register. They must be able to supply all data required.
3. Books may be withdrawn for

a period of two weeks. All books may be renewed. Renewals are taken by telephone.

4. All magazines are circulated, with the exception of the latest issue.
5. Borrowers may request any book held on reserve for them.
6. No fines for overdue books may be charged.
7. Borrowers who keep books

overdue for two weeks may not make withdrawals for four weeks. No exceptions allowed.

8. No withdrawals may be made if there is an overdue against the borrower's card. All books of dependents are on one card (the military).

The only change in policy from that now followed is in regard to overdue books.

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
