

BIDS FOR LEASING RSA LAND ASKED

11,376 Acres Offered for Farm, Grazing Purposes

Invitations for bids have been issued by the Army Engineers at Mobile for leasing approximately 11,376 acres of land at Redstone Arsenal for agricultural, haying and grazing purposes.

Colonel Harold E. Bisbort, district engineer, said that the property to be leased is divided into 22 units, ranging in size from 72 acres to 3500 acres.

Four of the units are less than 200 acres, eleven are between 200-500 acres, and seven are over 500 acres.

Anyone interested in leasing any or all of the units may secure further information or arrange for an inspection by contacting the Resident Engineer, Corps of Engineers, Redstone Arsenal, Huntsville, Ala., between the hours of 7:30 a.m. and 4 p.m. until Oct. 14, 1955.

All bids must be in the District Office of the Corps of Engineers on Grant Street in Mobile not later than 2 p.m. on Oct. 18, 1955, at which time a public bid opening will be held.

RSA INJURY RATE SHOWS DECREASE

Redstone Arsenal's cumulative injury rate (number of disabling injuries per 1,000,000 man-hours) for the period January-through-September, 1955, was 1.0, it was announced by the Safety Office. The figure for the same period last year was slightly higher, 1.6.

The above injury rates are for all RSA employees—civil service, contractors, and concessionaires.

The cumulative injury rate (based on number of disabling injuries per 100,000 man-days) for all RSA military personnel was 4.1, compared with last year's 3.5.

The cumulative vehicle accident rate (number of motor vehicle accidents per 100,000 miles driven) was 1.0, compared with last year's .2.



Roth, Raithel Will Discuss 'Redstone' Seminar Speakers

Redstone Arsenal's own "Redstone Missile," will be the topic for the next Friday, bi-weekly seminar sponsored by the Rocket Development Laboratory. The guest speakers will be Ludwig Roth, assistant chief of the Guided Missile Development Division, and Dr. Wilhelm Raithel, chief of the Structure and Mechanics Br., GMDD.

The meeting will be classified secret and will be held at 0900 hours, 14 October, in the Rocket Auditorium. This will be a particularly fine opportunity to hear a summary of development work now being carried out by the Guided Missile Development Division. Both Roth and Raithel are particularly well qualified to present the over-all view of the Redstone Missile project having played important roles in the phases of planning, development, and supervision.

Mr. Roth first entered the guided missile field when he became Chief Project Engineer in 1939 at the Missile Development Center in Peenemunde. His activities included supervision of much of the development work on the A9 glider rocket, the "Wasserfall" anti-aircraft rocket, and the A-10-A9 two-stage transcontinental mis-

ELECTRONIC MICROSCOPES SHOW THINGS THAT ALMOST AREN'T THERE

Looking through one of Redstone Arsenal's fantastically powerful electronic microscopes, you can see things that "almost aren't even there."

For example, the unusual instrument—which uses an electron beam instead of light waves—would magnify a human hair to the size of a giant redwood tree. It would make a blood corpuscle appear like a sofa pillow. And it would magnify a dime to more than a mile in diameter.

Another dramatic illustration of its extreme sensitivity is the fact that, generally speaking, the amount of material under study should weigh less than 1/500,000 of a pound.

The electron microscope is proving invaluable in any field where the magnification of the regular optical microscope is simply not enough. It serves a variety of purposes in research at this Army Ordnance rocket and guided missile development center.

Somewhere between 2,000 and 3,000 diameters, the usefulness of the best optical microscopes ends. But magnification with the electronic microscope is variable in steps from 1,000 up to 20,000 diameters, with useful photographic

enlargements on up to 100,00 diameters. Thus, objects whose very existence could previously only be surmised become visible to the naked eye.

Devices like the two at Redstone Arsenal are at work in many industrial laboratories over the country solving the everyday problem of quality control, product improvement, and development of new products.

They have opened new avenues of research in the fields of chemistry, metallurgy, medicine, bacteriology, and biology.

An ordinary microscope uses glass for its lens, of course. But the electronic one has coils of electric wire. The current is varied in order to focus and to obtain different degrees of enlargement. In the old-fashioned microscope, light rays hit the glass lens and are bent to produce magnification. This new-fangled one uses instead of light rays, a beam of electrons (minute negatively charged particles produced in the instrument by a hot wire filament).

In addition to being a microscope, the electronic gadget can be utilized as a sort of "camera" to obtain "fingerprints" of various materials under study. Each material produces a unique pattern when electrons pass through it and strike a TV-like fluorescent screen. Therefore, the electronic microscope is very helpful in identifying minute amounts of matter.

As in its inner workings, the new-type microscope is considerably different from its older

Personnel Recruitment Temporarily Limited

Following is a message from Brig. Gen. H. N. Toftoy, Arsenal commander, on the subject of Temporary Limitation on Personnel Recruitment:

1. Redstone Arsenal as a whole is now in excess of authorized personnel spaces. In order to bring employment in line with authorized spaces, and at the same time to prevent any formal reduction in force, it is necessary to impose a temporary limitation on further personnel recruitment. Therefore, the following procedure will be followed until further notice.

a. All requests for personnel now in the Civilian Personnel Division, except those for which firm commitments have been made by the Civilian Personnel Division, will be returned to the respective divisions and offices.

b. Future requests for new employees, replacements, and intrarsenal transfers, will be submitted only in those instances in which the need is real and critical, and operations will be substantially impaired unless the employee(s) is obtained.

c. Each request which meets this test will be submitted on Form 52 to the Arsenal Comptroller (not to Civilian Personnel Division), and will be accompanied with a memorandum signed by the division or office chief, setting forth specifically wherein the need is real and critical and

to what extent operations will be impaired unless the request is honored.

d. The Comptroller will review and appraise such requests and make recommendations to the Commanding General, or his designated representative, concerning their approval or disapproval.

e. Based upon the data submitted, a decision will be made and those requests which are approved will be forwarded by the Comptroller to Civilian Personnel Division for necessary recruitment action. Requests which are disapproved will be returned to the submitting organization.

2. When employment has been brought in line with authorized personnel spaces, this procedure will be formally superseded, and the Arsenal will revert to normal recruitment procedures.



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
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
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
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
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Ted Violet Winner In Football Contest

A ROUND-UP OF RSA SPORTS NEWS

As you can tell by a full story elsewhere in this issue, the information that we gave you last week about Jed Black's proposed Miami fight was correct. All details were ironed out, and Black fights the semi-final tomorrow night.

Redstone's post gridders were written up in the Army Times issue of October 1, and, with a bit more luck than in the 7-7 Charleston tie, the Rockets could be bound for a national Army rating.

The game with Eglin AFB this Saturday in Florida will be pretty much of a toss-up from all indications. The Rockets then return home for a game sponsored by the Huntsville Quarterbacks on October 22. Redstone's opponent will be the Tennessee Tech "B" team, which last year bowed to the locals, 20-6. Whether the game will be played in Huntsville or at Linton Field has not yet been decided.

As chief designer of the Army's development group in Fort Bliss and later at Redstone Arsenal, Mr. Roth prepared the overall layout of the Hermes 2 and Redstone missiles. He obtained his aeronautical engineering training at the Technical Institute in Darmstadt where he received his MS degree.

Mr. Roth's experience also includes: development of high efficiency soaring planes, founding of the aircraft engineering school at Darmstadt, problems of stress analysis and design of special aircraft.

Dr. Rathiell also entered the guided missile field when he joined the Peenemunde group in 1940. He obtained both his master and doctorate at the Technical Institute in Darmstadt. In 1947 he continued his guided missile research at Fort Bliss. Since 1950 he has been associated with the Guided Missile Development Division as Chief of the Structures and Mechanics Laboratory. Dr. Rathiell has been supervising research and development in guided missiles for 15 years.

(Continued From Page 1) counterpart in exterior appearance, too—standing slightly taller than a six-foot man, two feet wide, and three-and-a-half-feet deep. And instead of a few simple gears and knobs, it requires an instrument panel like that of a small airplane.

Industrial Accounting Offices in New Site

On October 1 the General Accounting Office completed its move from Building A-101 to Building 827, the Cost Accounting and Machine Records branches having moved on September 17.

An important development in the accounting area is the completion of plans to mechanize the cost accounting activities at an early date. The Arsenal's change-over to the Army Industrial Fund system resulted in an increased need for certain types of report—particularly those now produced by the Cost Accounting Branch which are designed to serve management as an effective control tool.

Attempting to meet this demand with limited personnel and a manual accounting system has been an almost impossible undertaking with considerable overtime having become necessary among the personnel compiling the reports. As a result, electric accounting machines designed especially for cost accounting activities have been procured, and the dry run of the new system is planned to begin in the Machine Records Branch within the month.

It is expected that with mechanization of these accounting activities, cost reports will be more timely, and it will be possible to prepare additional reports which will furnish better planning data for all arsenal agencies. In addition, it is anticipated that the change-over to a mechanized system of accounting will result in dollar savings both in manhours and in overtime.




