950 Arsenal Indefinite Employees Will Benefit Under New Ruling

Public Law 380 recently passed by the 84th Congress, which will be effective 10 November 1955, will benefit approximately 950 arsenal employees.

There are approximately that number of employees serving under Indefinite Appointments who have not been able to get Career or Career-Conditional Appointments because they are either not within reach for appointment from established Civil Service registers or suitable registers nor examinations have been available to them since 23 January of this year when the new appointment system went into effect.

When the new law becomes effective most of them who are on registers, but not within reach for appointment will be eligible for

non-competitive conversion to Career or Career-Conditional Appointment.

Those who have not had an opportunity to get on the Civil Service registers for the positions they occupy will be allowed to take a non-competitive examination given by the Civil Service Commission. If they pass the examination they may be given Career or Career-Conditional Appointments depending upon their length of service.

Conversion actions under the new law will not be automatic. The employees will have to make application for conversion and be recommended by their supervisor and the appointing authority before getting their appointments

changed.

Operating instructions from the Office of the Secretary of Army and the forms to be used in effecting conversion actions are not expected to be received at the arsenal until 1 November 1955.

Employees are asked to please not call the Civilian Personnel Office regarding their benefits under this new law. Just as soon as complete instructions and the forms are received each employee concerned will receive an individual notice telling him what he must do in order to qualify under the new law. They will have until 10 November 1956 to meet the necessary requirements for eligibility under the program.

Reproduction Branch Now in Building 781

Reproduction Branch is now located in Building 781, having moved to the new location from the former site in the ground floor of Building 111.

The new location provides about twice as much space, according to John Tyson, Reproduction Branch chief—13,000 square feet as compared with 6,700. More space and a central location were cited as reasons for the move.

Reproduction is now situated with two of its "biggest customers" — Industrial Division and Field Service—in the same building, on either side.

Reproduction Branch's move was accomplished for the most part over a weekend, and operations were never shut down. Fifty civilians and one military make up Reproduction Branch personnel.



GOAL \$17,897; LEADERS NAMED

Redstone Arsenal will kick off its 1955 Community Chest drive with a meeting of campaign workers at 10 a.m. Wednesday, Oct. 19, in Rocket Auditorium.

Brig. Gen. H. N. Toftoy, Arsenal commander, is tentatively scheduled to address the group.

Redstone's Red Feather Appeal goal has been set at \$17,897. The total goal for Madison County is \$83,171.81.

Directing the Arsenal's participation in the appeal will be Kermit Day, comptroller, who will serve as RSA civilian chairman; Maj. Jack Carstarphen, staff and project officer, Field Service, military chairman; Hermann Weidner, of GMDD, civilian co-chairman, and Capt. H. M. Thomas, OGMS secretary, military co-chairman.

"We've got a very big job to do," Major Carstarphen said following the RSA committee's first meeting. "And we're going to do it."

A goal will be set for each Arsenal segment and drive workers will be selected by division chiefs, Major Carstarphen announced. Progress of the appeal will be stated each day in the Arsenal's Daily Bulletin.

The Community Chest provides a portion of operating funds for nine Madison County agencies — Madison County Crippled Children's Service, Virginia McCormick Memorial Association (West Huntsville YMCA), Church Street Community Center, United Jewish Appeal, Central YMCA, Salvation Army, Grace Center, Girl Scouts, and Boy Scouts.

The appeal officially opens on Oct. 20 and will continue through Nov. 17.



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



Ruling Given on GI's Purchase of Car Tags

In view of the provision of Section 514 of the Soldiers' and Sailors' Civil Relief Act, military personnel temporarily residing in the state of Alabama, but domiciled elsewhere, may not be required to purchase Alabama motor vehicle license plates. Such personnel have the option of purchasing license plates from the state where they are domiciled or purchasing Alabama license plates, according to the Post Judge Advocate.

The Attorney General of Alabama in a recent opinion has interpreted the Soldiers' and Sailors' Civil Relief Act to require military personnel to elect to purchase Alabama license plates to pay ad valorem property taxes on their automobiles.
