## GRADUATE STUDY COURSES OFFERED

### Aimed To Improve Employee Competence

A Graduate Study Program, conducted by the University of Alabama at Redstone Arsenal, will be launched in the near future, announced Dr. O. C. Carmichael, President of the University of Alabama, and Brig. Gen. H. N. Toftoy, arsenal commander.

Under the terms of the contract signed, the University will provide accredited courses of study on the graduate level leading to a Master's Degree.

"The aim of the arsenal and University's program is to maintain and improve upon the level of competence of employees in the technical, scientific and managerial fields," the announcement said.

"Through the improvement of its employees, the arsenal will advance more rapidly in basic and applied research in the fields of rocket and guided missiles."

Courses will be offered to both Redstone Arsenal employees and resident contractor employees. The fields in which courses will be conducted include mathematics, physics, chemistry, engineering and management. All classes will be held after working hours.

Twenty-four semester hours, plus a thesis, will be required for a Master's Degree. Twelve hours may be obtained at Redstone Arsenal and the remaining twelve hours may be obtained on the campus at the University during one full summer.


The thesis may be written at Redstone or any other place where reliable data is available.

The courses offered will be taught on the arsenal at places to be designated.

Dr. A. B. Moore, Dean of the Graduate School of the University, said that the Graduate Study Program will be conducted under the direction of the University Extension Division, headed by Dr. J. R. Morton. Local administration will be conducted by Philip Mason, Director of the University Center located in Huntsville, Ala.

Louis Grabensteder, Executive Assistant, Redstone Arsenal, said that Stuart H. Jones, Redstone Arsenal Civilian Personnel Officer, and Frank R. Royal, Civilian Training Director, will assist the University in carrying out the Program.

Meetings are being held in Rocket Auditorium to plan courses. Yesterday employees interested in mathematics, physics, astronomy, and chemistry met to plan a course of study. Today all those interested in engineering courses may meet at 9 a.m., and those interested in management courses may meet at 1 p.m.

## Propellant Research Is Dr. Shuey's Topic

Dr. Henry M. Shuey, Head of the Ballistics Section at Rohm & Haas Company, Redstone Division, will speak on "Propellant Research in the United Kingdom" at the next seminar sponsored by the Rocket Development Laboratory. The meeting will be held in the Rocket Auditorium next Friday, Oct. 28, at 9 a.m.

Dr. Henry M. Shuey is a native of Kentucky. He obtained his BS degree from Centenary College, and was a teaching assistant during his last year there. His MS and PhD degrees in physical chemistry were earned at the University of Wisconsin. Upon completing his education, he joined the staff of the Explosives Laboratory in Pittsburgh. Then in 1947 he became a member of the rocket research staff with the Redstone Division of Rohm and Haas Company.

His fields of specialization are: propellants and explosives; heat capacities of organic vapors; polymolecularity of nitrocellulose; and rocket interior ballistics.

## Reserve Officers Study Intelligence

The Intelligence Branch opened as a satellite class of the Gadsden Army Reserve School on October 4 in Bldg. 189 at Redstone Arsenal.

The purpose of the Intelligence Course is to train reserve officers in the duties of the battalion S-2, regimental S-2, and division G-2. The course will cover a three year period and the first year study will include 18 hours of combat tactics on such subjects as organization of the army, principles of attack, principles of defense; 22 hours on Military intelligence and 8 hours on communications. This class room study will be followed by 15 days of summer field training each year, during which the class lessons are applied to practical field problems.

## REPORT SHOWS RSA PERSONNEL SUGGESTING MANY NEW METHODS


A long time ago, man had only one tool—his hands. He used his hands to capture and kill his food, defend his home from his enemies and, when necessary, to kill his enemy. It is an obvious fact that the man with the strongest hands was usually the survivor. As time passed, man learned that by taking a flat stone and attaching it to a strong stick he had a tool which would give him the advantage over his enemies as well as a means for slaying his food. With the passing of time and with creative thinking, man improved the first tool and developed new ones. Thinking in terms of improvements is the basic factor which is responsible for our modern living, tools, jigs, fixtures, methods and procedures. Thinking, developing, and putting our thoughts into the practice have resulted in the modern civilization which the man of today is privileged to enjoy.

The progress reports made by the staff of the Incentive Awards Committee prove that the men

and women at Redstone Arsenal are constantly striving and creating new ideas in order to improve operations. Since the last newspaper report was made, \$1,165 in awards has been made for suggestions which have saved the government \$24,177.

Post Engineer Division led the Arsenal with \$5,248 in savings and \$500 in awards. Eddie Prince and William Hood submitted a group suggestion regarding an improved procedure for utilization of material to be salvaged. This suggestion saved the government \$10,248 and resulted in an award of \$140 each. A second suggestion from Post Engineer Division was also a partnership suggestion which recommended a redesign of the control valves on fan turbines. This suggestion saved \$3,000 and won Frank Falkenberg and Howard Maples each \$65. An award of \$25 was paid to Don Leach who has saved the government \$500 a year by suggesting a method for clearing typewriter on the job site. A savings of \$1,500 won Aron Jones \$65 for suggesting the relocation of a condensate pump.

The employees of Guided Missile Development Division are runner-up with a savings of \$3,784 and awards totaling \$255. Robert Parvin suggested a pipe turning machine which won an award of \$90. Charles Chambers suggested the use of a pressure sensitive tape which will hold small piece

of metal for precision machining and received an award of \$70. Twenty dollars was awarded to Richard Mears who suggested a system of electric plugs for 'dummy boxes'. Leland A. Sanders suggested an improvement on a shunt cable assembly for the resistance welder and received a \$20 award.

A suggestion concerning a holding device for theodolites or transit tripods won \$15 for Donald McPherson. Awards in the amount of \$10 each were presented to Herman Clark, Mureale E. Morrell, James Brewer and Gordon P. Blaylock.

Transportation Division employees saved \$2,036 and won \$135 in awards. William M. Taylor leads this group by winning \$75 for a suggestion concerning the modification of the rear axle housing vents on 1 1/2 ton trucks. Carlton Stapler's wheel remover and installer won \$25 and Bennie C. Ivey's improved procedure in repairing flat tires on special handling equipment won \$15. Ten dollar awards were made to Grady Hall and Ferrell Clark, both of Headquarters Motor Pool.

Ammunition Division employees sliced \$1,570 off the operation cost at Redstone by submitting their suggestions and winning \$85. Lorene Tuck saved \$1,000 and won \$50 for an improved method of cleaning burster tubes. Clifford Smith saved \$325 and won \$20 for suggesting a mirror which improved inspection methods. A \$15 award with a savings of \$245 resulted with Dewey Walden's suggestion for a special bit for cutting holes in rubber.

Rocket Development Division, Purchasing and Contracting Division, Consolidated Supply Division, and OML Administrative & Management employees contributed \$1,539 in savings and won \$190. Walter Stockton, RDD, suggested a new design and an improved method for handling the Bowen Knapp Camera Cases. This resulted with a savings in labor as well as a very substantial safety improvement. Mr. Stockton was awarded \$65. Awards of \$15 went to Spiro Greenwood and Charles E. Boley also of RDD. James Hopkins of Consolidated Supply received \$10 for redesign of work area in respect to daily postings. Thomas E. Widemann, Photo Lab, improved the method of printing classified points. This improvement saved the government \$977 and won an award of \$50. Mrs. Dora C. Test received \$10 for an improvement in the Officers Roster. There were two improvements in safety, health and welfare of employes in Purchasing and Contracting Division. For these improvements, Mrs. Mary G. Huth received \$15 and Miss Robbie Hagler received \$10.

A special award was made to Pvt. John Dodds of the 291 MP Company. Pvt. Dodd made a suggestion which improved safety conditions at Wherry Housing. Since the regulations do not provide for cash awards to the military, Pvt. Dodd received a Letter of Commendation and a three-day pass

**WAC Veteran Is Third Generation Army Sergeant**

FORT McCLELLAN, Ala.—The Army's no "home away from home" 1st Sergeant First Class Anita C. Flannery of the Women's Army Corps Center here; she's known no home but the Army.

She is the granddaughter and daughter of Regular Army sergeant. Moreover, the 12-year veteran of the WAC is widow, mother, mother-in-law, sister-in-law and aunt of military men. And with seven grandchildren ranging in age from one to 14 years, she anticipates a day when she'll be grandmother to a roster of servicemen and women.

Sergeant Flannery was the widow of an Air Corps lieutenant when she enlisted in the WAC in 1942. Her son, Major James E. Flannery, had been called to active duty and her daughter had married an Air Corps officer. Enlisting was a natural gesture for a woman whose family had been wearing U. S. Army uniforms since the Civil War.

Her maternal grandfather Samuel Clingensmith of Pennsylvania, first sergeant in the U. S. Cavalry, came into the Army at that

time and stayed on to serve in the Indian Wars. Her mother, who was born at Fort D. A. Russell, Wyo., tells many a tale of how she lived in tents, slept on buffalo robes, and went to school and rode with Indian children during those days.

Sergeant Flannery's mother met the man who was to be her husband, Sergeant Clement G. Coleworthy, Quartermaster Corps, at Fort Brown, Tex. However, their romance was interrupted when her father and the husband-to-be went off to the Spanish-American War. After the fighting ended, the young couple married and went to Cuba to live.

There Sergeant Flannery was born—on an Army post, of course. As child, young woman, Air Corps wife and WAC, she hasn't been far from a military installation since.





**AVIATION JOINS THE ARMY TEAM**

WASHINGTON—Aviation has become the fourth member of the U. S. Army's hard-hitting infantry-artillery-armor team.

Army aviation began in 1942 in a 65-horsepower engine, two-place commercial Piper Cub that had been given an OD paint job and expanded paryl windows for im-

proved visibility. This frail little craft, which became known to the Army as the L-4, had only an air speed indicator, a non-sensitive altimeter and a magnetic compass to help its pilot through the skies. It had no navigational radio, no speed, no rate of climb, no load capacity.

It was, in effect, an elevated artillery observation post, to be used only in emergencies when no other form of observation was possible. Flights were to be over gun positions at approximately 500 feet and for the duration of time that would be required for

one artillery adjustment—an estimated maximum time of seven minutes.

This was a concept soon destroyed by pilot initiative—and necessity. Missions were measured in hours instead of minutes and emergency observation gradually gave way to surveillance. Individual battalions found they were relying on air observation as their primary means of artillery adjustment.

The Army's organic aviation — integration of modern equipment into an established system, a change of pace rather than a change in tactics — was born in that dependence.

Today this same battle-proven concept of Army aviation holds, but not alone for artillery units. The other combat arms — armor and infantry — and four of the technical corps—engineers, medical, transportation and signal — have their own organic aircraft according to their own peculiar needs.

In place of the one little cub, the Army now has four airplanes: a two-place observation plane, two cargo and personnel transport planes with 1,000 and 3,000 pound load capacities, and a six-place courier plane.

Just as fixed-wing aircraft earned its place in the Army unit during World War II, helicopters earned their "wings" in Korea. Today, the Army has a family of six helicopters: two, two-place reconnaissance types, two cargo and personnel carriers with one and a half-ton load capacity; and two utility 'copters with three ton and five-ton capacity, respectively.

Why this emphasis upon aircraft?

The answer is implicit in the new, atom-forged battle plans for a war of mobility. On the battlefield of the future, operations will be dispersed, the combat zone will be deeper and operations will be much more fluid than past commanders could have visualized.

In the battle zone, air transportation—in quick response to the will of the commander — will have the capacity to transport reserves and supplies to critical points and make their influence felt more speedily and more decisively.

However the aircraft are deployed — wire-laying, bridge-employment, supply or re-supply medical evacuation, smoke laying, reconnaissance, troop movement,
