

## Rule on Vehicle Taxes Is Reversed

The Attorney General of the State of Alabama in an opinion rendered under the date of 27 October 1955, reversed his position with respect to the liability of non-resident military personnel for payment of ad valorem taxes on their private vehicles when they elect to register and license said vehicles in the State of Alabama. The Attorney General now holds that "nonresident military personnel, owning private automobiles and living in Alabama (Continued on Back Page)

## TEAMWORK IS KEY TO SUCCESS IN MISSILE FIELD, AOA TOLD

America's tradition and heritage of teamwork will bring the United States ultimate success in the race to develop guided missiles, Dr. Wernher von Braun told members of the American Ordnance Association last week. Dr. von Braun, chief of the Guided Missile Development Division of Redstone Arsenal, spoke at the 26th annual meeting of the Birmingham Post of the American Ordnance Association, held at the Arsenal and in Huntsville. Representatives from three states—Alabama, Georgia, and Mississippi—attended. Dr. von Braun listed the four principal factors in teamwork as: (1) Decentralization and delegation of authority. (2) permanent and efficient communication from top to bottom levels. (3) Frankness, mutual confidence, and loyalty. (4) Natural, organic growth, rather than artificial or forced growth. Some people might think of a Russian collective farm as an example of teamwork. Dr. von Braun pointed out, but actually it is just the opposite because it involves none of the basic requisites of teamwork. The speaker compared the problems of present-day development of guided missiles to the early days of aircraft development. One of the biggest problems is the fact that no well-intrenched com-

ponent supply industry exists yet. "The general lack of experience which naturally prevails in a new field makes initial development an expensive process. But we must keep in mind that the real job is not to make the cheapest missile possible that will fly, but to defend American cities from destruction." Touching on space travel, Dr. von Braun—one of its leading advocates—stated that "the return trip to earth is the only thing that still requires initial development." Leaving the earth is largely only a matter of scaling up present operations and knowledge he added. Prior to Dr. von Braun's address, members of the ordnance group were taken on a three-hour tour of the Arsenal, where they witnessed a rocket firing demonstration. Organization of a Huntsville Chapter of the Birmingham Post AOA, was effected at an afternoon meeting, with the following officers elected: J. A. Muller, chairman; T. D. Johnson and W. A. Lewis, vice-chairmen; and Jeff Darwin, secretary-treasurer. The Birmingham Post also named new officers as follows: Col. William J. Rushton, president; A. B. Schwarzkopf, vice-president; Robert D. Cotten, treasurer; and Ralph E. Parker, secretary.

## Muscular Dystrophy Fund Campaign Begins


Victims of muscular dystrophy will look to Redstone Arsenal personnel for help these next three weeks. The annual drive to raise badly needed funds to fight the dread disease began on the annual yesterday. Heading the campaign will be Pat Pruitt, post fire chief, who serves as civilian chairman, and Maj. Arthur Pinkham, post signal officer, military chairman. "There is no specific goal set up for us at the arsenal," it was pointed out by LaSalle Richards, of Guided Missile Development

Division, who is president of the Madison County chapter of Muscular Dystrophy Association. "But we gave over \$3,100 to this worthy cause last year, and I certainly think we should do as much this year." Representatives will be named in each arsenal segment to receive donations from all who wish to help. At 4:30 this afternoon arsenal firemen will be at all gates distributing pamphlets with information about a disease which now afflicts over 200,000 Americans—most of them children.

## Safe-Driving Day Set

(Editor's note: The following article was submitted to The Rocket by the Arsenal Safety Office.) The old saying: "There's safety in numbers," more than ever applies to our present planning for S-D Day. December 1 has been designated Safe Driving Day by President Eisenhower's Committee on Traffic Safety. S-D Day, 1955, will include an intensive 10-day lead-up publicity and educational period before the December 1st zero hour and a 10-day follow-up campaign. The President's Committee for Traffic Safety has chosen this day as a test to see whether a comprehensive balanced program by local traffic authorities and safety organizations, coupled with the concerted effort of all drivers and pedestrians, can really make an accident-free day. Last year on S-D Day, the first of its kind in this country, there was a 15 per cent drop in the number of accidents. If that drop had continued throughout the full year, about 5,400 lives would have been

saved. On Alabama's highways last S-D Day not a single traffic fatality was reported, yet the Alabama State Safety Director predicts that three persons each day will die on Alabama highways between now and the first of the year if the present trend continues. It seems that our problem is not speed, power or traffic, but MAN! Selfishness, anger, carelessness, neglect and pride are the causes of death on our highways. Accidents, injuries and fatalities are the results. The Redstone Safety Office feels that the application of the modern Golden Rule, "Drive Unto Others as You Would Have Them Drive Unto You", could very easily be the key to a successful S-D (stop-death) Program. The Safety Office will distribute promotional material to arsenal supervisors with the hopes of increasing individual awareness and to enlist an active participation on the part of all Arsenal employees.

## Letter From a Father

(Editor's note: The following letter was submitted to the Rocket by the Arsenal Safety Office. The letter was originally written to the Elmira (N.Y.) Advertiser, which observed, "If any driver can resist its appeal, he has no business with a driver's license.")

Dear Driver:

A few weeks ago, I saw a little girl struck by a car as she tried to cross the street. I saw a father race toward her and hold her to him as she struggled in the agony of death. I saw all the plans that had been made for dashed and I saw the look of despair that came over his face. I could only offer a prayer that such a thing might never happen again.

Today, my daughter, who is six years old, started off to school. Her cocker spaniel, whose name is Scoot, watched her leave and whined his belief in the folly of education.

Tonight we talked about school. She told me about the girl who sits in front of her, a girl with yellow curls, and about the boy across the aisle who makes faces; about the teacher who has eyes in the back of her head; about the trees in the school yard and the big girl who does not believe in Santa Claus.

We talked about a lot of things—tremendously vital and unimportant things.

Now, as this is written, she is sound asleep with her doll "Paddy" in her arms.

When her doll gets broken or her finger gets cut or her head gets bumped, I can fix them. But when she starts across the street—then, Mr. Driver, she is in your hands.

Much as I wish I could, it's not possible for me to be with her all the time. I have to work to pay for her home, her clothes, her education.

So, Mr. Driver, please help me to look out for her. Please drive carefully. Please drive slowly past schools and at intersections. And please remember that sometimes children run from behind parked cars.

Please don't run over my little girl.

The Boston is the first combat ship which fires supersonic anti-aircraft guided missiles.

The Navy said that the Boston, sixth navy ship to bear that name, will chiefly fire the Terrier, a needle-nosed anti-aircraft missile.

The 12-year old Boston has undergone a drastic face lifting in the conversion. One of her stacks and the after eight-inch gun turret were removed to accommodate the new weapons.

She is the first of two guided missile cruisers being converted by the New York Shipbuilding Corp. Camden, N. J. Her sister ship, the Canberra, is scheduled to join the fleet next spring.

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
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## New Year's Dance Party Slated at Officers Open Mess

Eddie Stephens and his Orchestra, made famous by many club, college and fraternity dates in and around Birmingham, will provide the music for dancing and general merrymaking.


The dance will be semi-formal, and all club members are invited to bring as many non-member guests with them as they please to help bring the New Year in.

It is not considered fully able to meet present safety standards, it will therefore be used only in the event of an emergency.

The Army will maintain the Theodore Terminal on an inactive, standby station for mobilization purposes.



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

nice even six. The latest is for Hq. Det's second round championship team in the summer softball league. This team went undefeated against very strong opposition through eight consecutive games before dropping one.




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

**Warren Addressed Radio Engineers**

Dr. Thomas B. Warren, project engineer at Federal Telecommunications Laboratories, addressed the Huntsville Section of the Institute of Radio Engineers on 15 November at the Fifth Avenue Grade School.

Dr. Warren discussed "Microstrip" and the characteristics of various Microstrip components, which include waveguide or coaxial transducers, directional couplers, crystal mixers, attenuators, filters, a wideband noise source, etc. The application of Microstrip to the design of complete systems such as, microwave receivers will be discussed, and examples such as "S" band, "C" band and "X" band will be shown.

Dr. Warren received his BS degree in electrical engineering at the University of Maryland in 1948. In 1949, he received the MS degree at Stanford University. In 1951, he joined the Stanford Research Laboratory where he worked on multi-resonant and non-linear circuitry. This work was submitted as a thesis for a Ph.D. degree, which he received in 1953. Dr. Warren joined the Federal Telecommunications Laboratories in August 1953 as a project engineer. Since that time he has contributed to the development of strip line transmission systems.

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
