## Arsenal Girl Ferrying Airplane 3,200 Miles to Missionary

A Redstone Arsenal employe who flies for fun is ferrying a tiny airplane 3,200 miles to a Baptist missionary in British Guiana—and doing her Christmas shopping along the way, in the free ports of the Caribbean Islands. Miss Jan Warrick, an attractive red-head who works as a film librarian in OML's Photo Lab, is serving as co-pilot and navigator for her pilot friend, Mrs. Evelyn Bryan of Jefferson City, Tenn., aboard the single-engine Piper Tri-Pacer in which the two women left this weekend bound for the city of Georgetown in the South American coastal colony. Depending on weather condi-

tions and length of stopovers enroute, they expect to deliver the aircraft—which belongs to the Southern Baptist Missionary Association—between Dec. 7 and 9 to the Rev. John Oliver, a flying missionary who will use it to reach his native congregations deep in the jungles of Brazil.

On her return trip—"island hopping" back via commercial airline—Miss Warrick hopes to pick up a lot of Christmas shopping bargains in the several Caribbean free ports enroute where there are no import taxes to pay and the rate of currency exchange is about \$1.65 for each American

dollar. "I'm making this flight for the heck of it, the fun, the experience, and to see some of the world," laughed Miss Warrick before taking off in the "midget" craft—a former four-seater which has been converted to two so as to install an auxiliary gas tank in the extra space, thus giving it a 66-gallon fuel load instead of the normal 36. The plane can now stay aloft for nine hours without refueling. It cruises at 120 to 130 miles per hour, at 8,000 feet altitude.

### GEN. TAYLOR IS WELCOMED HERE

Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor, Army Chief of Staff, visited Redstone Arsenal yesterday.

General Taylor and his party arrived at the arsenal by air Monday morning and departed that afternoon.

Brig. Gen. H. N. Toftoy and key staff members welcomed the group.

General Taylor helped organize the 82nd Infantry into the 82nd Airborne Division during World War II and went to Europe with them, taking part in the Sicilian and Italian campaigns. Later he became commander of the 101st Airborne and led the invasions on Normandy and Holland.


In Jan. 1953, he became commander of the Eighth Army in Korea taking over from Gen. James A. Van Fleet and in April 1955 became the Commanding General, Far East Command. On June 30, he was appointed Army Chief of Staff. He has also served as the commandant of the U. S. Military Academy at West Point where, early in his career, he was a professor of Romance languages.

General Taylor was commissioned in the Corps of Engineers when he graduated from USMA in 1922. In 1927 he sailed for Paris, France to prepare himself to teach at the Academy. In 1932 he transferred to the Field Artillery School at Ft. Sill, Okla., and then transferred again to the Command and General Staff School for a two-year course.

Following graduation, he went to Japan as a student of the Japanese language.

He has held key administrative positions. In 1949 he became Chief of Staff of the European Command Headquarters at Heidelberg, Germany, and later that year became U. S. Commander of Berlin.

Before the Korea assignment, he was Assistant Chief of Staff for Operations at Army Department Headquarters in Washington.

## 'Long Hard Road' Through Law School Really IS for Sergeant

It's a "long, hard road" through law school, as any struggling student will testify.

It's even longer and harder for M/Sgt. Earl Ziegler.

This ambitious Redstone Arsenal GI drives the winding 214 miles from Huntsville to Birmingham and back alone five nights a week to attend his classes in legal lore at the Birmingham Law School.

Sgt. Ziegler has been going—and coming—at this rate during the past two years he's been stationed here. So far, he has driven over 62,000 miles.

"I can draw you a diagram of every curve on State Highway 38—and it's got plenty," he laughs. The eight-mile stretch north of the little town of Pinson is generally conceded to be one of the "zig-zaggingest" in the state. A new, and straighter, section will be finished by next Spring—but Sgt. Ziegler expects to get his diploma in May.

The commuting law scholar leaves for his distant classroom at 4:30 each afternoon, directly from his military job in the Inspector General's office at the Arsenal. He doesn't get back home to his wife (who used to be a lawyer's secretary) and five-year-old son "Butchie" until 11:30 that night. The drive takes about two hours each way.

Sgt. Ziegler wards off monotony and drowsiness on his lonely nightly trip by reciting law cases to himself.

The soldier-student, who's had a leaning towards the law ever since the tender age of nine, has been in the Army for 12 years, enlisting from his native state of

Washington. He signed up for another six-year hitch on Thanksgiving Day.

His goal is gaining a legal education? There's always the possi-

bility he might later go into Judge Advocate work during his military career, although he isn't specifically aiming at that. Another

### SUSPENSION OF TRAINING, HOLIDAY LEAVE POLICIES ARE EXPLAINED

Unless the international situation then existing precludes, military training at this installation will be suspended from 1630 hours, 16 December 1955 through 0730 hours, 3 January 1956.

During the period of suspended training, unit commanders will insure that minimum operational requirements are met. This includes all requirements of current operational plans.

Within the limitations of paragraph 2 above commanders will make every effort to insure that all personnel who are eligible and who desire leave will be permitted to spend either the Christmas or New Year's holiday period, or both, at home.

All individuals who are granted leave will be informed that their leave is subject to an emergency recall. In the event of such recall, it will be the responsibility of each individual on leave to report back to his unit as quickly as possible.

The Commandant, Ordnance Guided Missile School, is authorized to publish a separate leave policy for military personnel of 9352nd TU and 9615th TU.

Troop Commanders of this installation will take the following action:

a. Inform departing personnel traveling by privately owned vehicles that it is the express desire of the Commanding General that travel be restricted to 0600 hours through 1800 hours each day to insure maximum safety over the Holiday period. Copy of this directive will be posted on the Bulletin Board until the expiration date of this memorandum.

b. Submit questionnaires on Holiday Leave Traffic Christmas-

New Year 1955-1956 Report in accordance with Circular 55-10, dated 7 November 1955 to the Post Transportation Officer.

The Transportation Officer of this installation will consolidate the reports received from the Troop Commanders and forward the final Holiday Leave Traffic, Christmas-New Year 1955-1956 report to Chief of Transportation, Washington 25, D. C., ATTENTION: TPD-N, no later than 7 December 1955.

Maintain personnel in the Passenger Traffic Section (telephones 2718, 3002 and 3355) of the Transportation Division for the purpose of assisting military personnel on furlough travel requests. Information such as time tables, schedules, and cost of travel will be made readily available at the earliest practicable date.

The Finance Officer of this installation will make arrangements for partial payment of military personnel on 16 December 1955. Cash partial pay will be available to all officers and enlisted personnel on 16 December 1955. On 31 December 1955, the remaining pay due officer and enlisted personnel will be paid by check. The issuance of checks to all military personnel will preclude crediting on the payroll and another supplemental payroll on 10 January 1956. For personnel who will not be physically present on 31 December 1955 to receive their pay, the Unit Class A agent will pick up applicable checks from the Finance Officer and pay personnel upon their return from leave. Checks normally mailed by the Finance Officer to a bank, etc., will be mailed as usual.

mile flight from Jefferson City, Tenn., to Georgetown, British Guiana, will be over water. First leg of the female fliers' journey is a non-stop hop to Miami, Fla., where they're to confer with the Brazilian consul regarding regulations for bringing the plane into his country, and also to pick up life rafts and "Mae West" life jackets.

After leaving Miami, stopovers are scheduled at Key West, Fla.; Havana, Cuba; Camaguey, Cuba; Port-au-Prince, Haiti; Ciudad Trujillo, Dominican Republic; San Juan, Puerto Rico; St. Thomas, in the Virgin Islands; St. Edwards Island (a Dutch colony); Guadeloupe and Grenada in the Windward and Leeward Islands group; Trinidad; and, finally, the destination, Georgetown, British Guiana.

Miss Warrick, who makes her home in Decatur, has been asked to keep an official record of the entire flight—regarding such data as airplane performance, airport conditions, weather, gas consumption, etc.—for the Airplane Owners and Pilots Association of America, a national organization which will later make the information available as an aid to future pilots taking the same route.

She is also shooting a 16 mm. color movie covering the whole trip at the request of the Ninety-Niners, an international group of over 1,200 women pilots. Miss Warrick, who's been flying since 1947 and has her own plane, or-




