Cumulative Injury Rate for RSA Down

The cumulative injury rate (number of disabling injuries per 1,000,000 man-hours) for all Redstone Arsenal employees—civil service, contractors, and concessionaries—during the period January through November of this year was 1.1, compared with a rate of 1.6 for the same period last year, it was announced by the Safety Office.

The cumulative injury rate for all RSA military personnel (number of disabling injuries per 100,000 man-days) was 4.2, compared to 3.9 for the 1954 period.

The cumulative vehicle accident rate (number of motor vehicle accidents per 100,000 miles driven) was 10, compared to 12 for the same period last year.

ARMY EDUCATION SURVEY ENDED

The Army Education Center at Redstone Arsenal wound up its semi-annual educational level survey on November 30.

The purpose of this survey is to establish, by checking the records of military personnel stationed on the Arsenal, the overall number of years of education attained by such personnel.

In June of this year the educational average stood at 13.12, a record high at that time; now in December the figure computed is 13.32, indicating a most healthy and gratifying rise among military personnel.

In the past year 48 military personnel have acquired high school GED certificates through the agency of the Army Education Center. Moreover, attendance at the University of Alabama Extension Center is at a record peak. Our personnel have acquired a total of 444 semester hours of college in their off-duty time. The enrollment to date is comprised of 59 EM and 8 Officers.

Post Christmas Party For Children Slated

The Post Christmas Party for the children of Arsenal military personnel will be held at 2 p. m. in the Rocket Auditorium.

Children up to and including the age of 12 will attend.

The Education Center offers military personnel on the Arsenal many opportunities to advance their education. Our soldiers and officers may enroll in USAFI correspondence courses, various university correspondence courses, participate in off-duty group study classes on post, enroll in the University of Alabama Extension Center, raise their educational level by taking high school and first-year college GED tests, and by studying textbooks from our USAFI library.

Due to the technical nature of many of the operations conducted at Redstone Arsenal, a large number of our personnel arrive on post with excellent educational backgrounds; however it is the mission of the Army Education Center to promote the educational level of all troops, and the survey results bear witness to what extent this mission is being fulfilled.

Army Bans Certain Information From Personnel Records

Washington (AFPS)—The Army has revised its security procedures to provide that anonymous and unsupported derogatory information about an individual will not be kept in his records.

A new regulation, AR 640-98 states that the following material will not be filed in an individual's record:

"Unreported or unacted upon adverse matter, other than counterintelligence information, which will prejudice the individual's reputation or future in the military service.

"Allegations which have been satisfactorily rebutted and/or have not resulted in elimination or disciplinary action."

Files which are the property of an army intelligence agency and which are referred to before taking any personnel actions on the individual concerned are not affected by the provisions.

The regulation directs, however, that only information that has a direct bearing on loyalty or national security should be placed in intelligence files that are consulted prior to taking personnel actions.

AR 640-98 also says that no adverse matter, with some exceptions, will be made part of an individual's personnel record with-

GEN. TOFTOY'S RANK PERMANENT

Promotion Allows Additional Five Years in Service

Brig. Gen. H. N. Toftoy, Arsenal Commander, has been selected for promotion to permanent rank of Brigadier General, according to an announcement from Washington.

Gen. Toftoy was promoted to temporary rank of Brigadier General in May, 1952.

Gen. Toftoy's promotion gives him the privilege of remaining in the service for an additional five years. Until his promotion he was slated for retirement next June.

Dr. Brown to Show Movies of Propellant Burning at Meeting

Dr. Louis M. Brown, of Rohm and Haas Company, will give a presentation in the Rocket Auditorium entitled, "Studies in Propellant Burning."

This meeting, sponsored by the Rocket Development Laboratory, will be held at 9 a. m. next Friday, 16 December.

Dr. Brown, a native of Oklahoma, received his B. S. degree in chemistry from the University of Oklahoma. He earned his Ph.D. degree from Iowa State College where he was research assistant at the Institute for Atomic Research.

In September 1953 he joined the technical staff of the Redstone Division of Rohm and Haas. Dr. Brown is now associated with the Propellant Research Group of the Chemistry Section.


out giving him an opportunity either to make a written reply to the information or decline in writing to make such a statement. This also was provided by the previous regulation, AR 600-195. However, a new safeguard now has been added.

Where it is decided that the individual has satisfactorily answered the adverse allegation and the charges are not considered serious enough to warrant disciplinary action, all references to the derogatory material will be removed from the record.

But various adverse official reports and investigations that normally would not be shown to an individual may be filed.

Policy on Excusing Civilian Employees To Vote Explained

The policy of the Commanding General in excusing arsenal civilian employees for voting and registration is stated below for information and guidance of all concerned:

"Employees who desire to vote at communities within commuting area of the arsenal, where they maintain voting residence, will be excused for such time as necessary, not to exceed two hours. Employees will not be excused to vote in areas outside of the commuting area if voting by absentee ballot is permitted. Where voting by absentee ballot is not permitted, employees may be excused for not to exceed eight hours. Excused absence for voting will be held

to a minimum, after taking into consideration the distance to be traveled and the opening and closing hours of the polls.

Employees will be excused for registration purposes where it is not possible for them to register on non-work days. Excused absence for registration normally will not exceed two hours and in no case will exceed eight hours.

Excused absence for voting and registration will not be granted in conjunction with any other type of leave on the same date."

Application for civilian voting leave must be made in advance on RSA Form 42 (Revised 1 October 1954). Previous editions of this form are not acceptable.

It is the policy of the Commanding General to authorize an absence, not to exceed 24 hours, to any person in the military service at this station for the purpose of voting in any general, special or


