Re-Badging Procedure Described

The procedure to be used in re-badging of all Redstone Arsenal employees who perform duties in Army Ballistic Missile Agency areas is described below by Lt. Col. Arthur J. Hogan, Provost Marshal:

ABMA is a Class II installation and Redstone Arsenal is presently providing support to that installation. In order to provide such support, certain Redstone Arsenal employees will require entrance privileges to ABMA's Restricted Areas.

The following is the procedure set forth by ABMA for the control of visits to ABMA by Redstone Arsenal employees.

CONTROL OF ENTRY—VISITS TO ABMA BY RSA EMPLOYEES

The control of visits by RSA employees who are engaged in logistical support activities to ABMA will be handled as follows:

1. RSA employees whose duties require repeated visits to ABMA or require them to spend at least 50% of their working time within ABMA areas will be issued a permanent type ABMA special

VIRGINIA POLYTECHNIC INSTITUTE PARTICIPATING IN CO-OP PROGRAM

Auto Corp. Contracts To Develop Missile Launched From Ship

Washington (AP)—The Chrysler Corp. has announced it has been named "prime contractor" for the development of ballistic-type intermediate range guided missiles to be launched from navy ships.

The project is the Navy's phase of the Redstone missile program at Huntsville, Ala.

The range of this missile, according to specifications, is 1,500 miles.

Since October 1952, Chrysler has been the prime contractor of the Redstone for the Army.

In its new role Chrysler will be charged with engineering, development and production of weapons systems, including the elements needed to launch the pro-







(Continued From Page One) will immediately notify the Officer of the Guard who would provide escort from the gate to the scene of the emergency and back to the gate. Upon termination of emergency, escort would submit report to Visitor Control Office, ABMA, to include: Type of emergency, building or location in which emergency occurred, names of emergency visitors, and time and date of entry and departure of visitors."

3. In order to provide for the issuance of ABMA badges to those RSA employes whose duties require repeated visits to ABMA areas, it is requested that this office be furnished a report on personnel employed by your Agency who are eligible under the provisions outlined in this paragraph for the issuance of a permanent type ABMA special visitor badge. This report must be in triplicate and contain the following information:

- a. Name of division.
- b. Name of employe (last, first and middle initial).
- c. Whether civilian or military.
- d. Army serial number, if military, or badge number.
- e. Job title.
- f. Main area within ABMA where individual will be working.
- g. Other areas within ABMA where individual will have to have access to accomplish his mission.
