Gen. Barclay Joins Staff of ABMA

WAS PICATINNY ARSENAL CHIEF

Brig. Gen John A. Barclay, former commanding general of Picatinny Arsenal, Dover, N. J., has joined the staff of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency as deputy commander today.

The general who started as a second lieutenant in the Field Artillery, joined the Ordnance Corps in 1934.

He received his commission in the Army after graduation from the United States Military Academy. His graduate education includes the Officers Ordnance School at Watertown Arsenal and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology where he received a master of science degree. He also attended the Advanced Ordnance School at Aberdeen Proving Gd., the Armed Forces Staff College at Norfolk, Va., and the National War College.

His first assignments were in Texas. During World War II, he was called into the office of the chief of Ordnance from an assignment in the Canal Zone. In 1942-'43, he was chief of the Spare Parts supply for the chief of Ordnance, stationed in Detroit.

In 1945 he went to China as the assistant chief of staff for logistics on the Army Advisory Group to Nationalist China. He came back to Aberdeen Proving Ground, Md., and then was called into the chief of Ordnance's office as the executive officer for the Research and Development Division where he remained until he was assigned as commanding officer of Picatinny in July, 1954.

General Barclay was awarded the Legion of Merit for his work as Theater Ordnance officer in China; a Commendation Ribbon while on duty at Rock Island Arsenal as chief of the supply branch; a second Commendation Ribbon while G-4 for the Army Advisory Group to China; the Order of Yung Hui by the Chinese Nationalist Government; and the Neck Order of Poa Ting, also a Chinese Nationalist award.

General and Mrs. Barclay, the former Miss Gwendolyn Monagin, have two sons, John A. Jr., and Douglas H.

Col. Smith Named Head Of Training for OGMS

Lieutenant Colonel Hobart V. Smith has assumed duties as Director of Training for the Ordnance Guided Missile School.

Colonel Smith comes to OGMS by way of White Sands Proving Ground, New Mexico, where he most recently served as Inspector General, after holding positions as commanding officer of the 269th Ordnance Battalion and Headquarters Commandant.

Colonel Smith entered the service as an enlisted man in 1941 and was commissioned a 2nd Lt. after completing OCS at Aberdeen Proving Ground in 1942.

Following a year during which he instructed in the Ordnance School at Aberdeen, Colonel Smith was assigned to the China-Burma-India Theater where he served as a maintenance liaison officer with the Chinese Army and as the staff Ordnance officer

for Headquarters, 3rd Chinese Group Command.

Colonel Smith was discharged in April 1946 and taught at Citrus Junior College, Glendora, California prior to returning to active duty in 1948, when he was assigned as Director of Training for the Ordnance Automotive School, Atlanta, Ga.

Tours as Assistant Corps Ordnance Officer for 7th Corps and as Chief of Maintenance Operations, Karlsfeld Ordnance Depot, Munich, Germany, preceded Colonel Smith's assignment to White Sands. He was promoted to his present grade in Germany in 1953.

Colonel Smith, the son of Mrs. Millicent D. Smith and the late Mr. Smith of 718 Downing Street, Richardson, Texas, is a graduate of Pasadena High School, Pasadena, California, and Occidental

DR. STUHLINGER WILL ADDRESS ROCKET SOCIETY

Dr. Ernst Stuhlinger, Chief of the Research Projects Office, Army Ballistic Missile Agency, will speak before members and guests of the Alabama Section, American Rocket Society, on the subject, "Interplanetary Travel With Nuclear Powered Space Ships." The meeting will be held at the Huntsville High School auditorium next Thursday evening, May 3, at 8 p.m. The public is invited.

Dr. Stuhlinger was born in Niederrimbach, South Germany, in 1913. He attended school and the University at Tübingen, Germany. In 1936, he graduated with a paper on the ionization of cosmic rays.

From 1936 on, he was an assistant to Professor Hans Geiger at the Institute of Technology in Berlin, where he worked on the development of the Geiger counter, on cosmic rays, and on nuclear physics.

From 1939 on, he was a member of the German Atomic Energy Team under Prof. Heisenberg in 1943. Dr. Stuhlinger joined the Guided Missile Development Group at Peenemuende, Germany, many.

Early in 1946, he came to the United States under an Army contract to continue guided missile development work. He spent 4 1/2 years in Fort Bliss, Texas, and since 1950 has been associated with Redstone Arsenal where, until his most recent appointment, he was head of the Technical Feasibility Studies Office, Ordnance Missile Laboratories.

Arsenal-wide Red Cross Campaign Nets \$5,826

The combined Redstone Arsenal-Army Ballistic Missile Agency-Ordnance Guided Missile School Red Cross fund drive this year netted a total of \$5,826.65, committee chairmen have reported.

Plans Underway for Arsenal's Part in Armed Forces Day Events

Armed Forces Day was established in 1950 by the Secretary of Defense, with approval of the President, to give official recognition to a single public presentation by the Armed Forces of the United States in lieu of different dates previously observed by individual

Designation of a single occasion for a joint report to the people on the Nation's defense program was in line with creation of the Department of Defense by Congress. Thus, Armed Forces Day was intended to symbolize unification and afford an annual opportunity to demonstrate the close working

Arsenal Jaycees Seen As Parent Chapter if Moon Is 'Organized'

If the Chamber of Commerce ever goes "Interplanetary" and strats organizing on the moon, a space-minded bunch of "rocket-hot" Huntsville Jaycees who work at Redstone Arsenal will likely comprise the parent chapter.

Approximately one hundred out of the entire Huntsville membership of 130 are presently employed at Redstone.

Since so many "Rocket City" Jaycees toil at Redstone—in jobs ranging widely from administrative to scientific—it's only natural that the futuristic flavor of rocketry should have rubbed off on many of their projects. For example, the Huntsville Promotion Committee recently printed up and sold 35,000 color postcards depicting one of the Arsenal-developed guided missiles—the sleek and deadly anti-aircraft NIKE A colorful float designed in the shape of the Arsenal's big "HONEST JOHN" rocket won second place for the Huntsville chapter in the national conven-

tion parade at Atlanta last year. Since the whole field of rockets and guided missile is still, relatively, in its infancy, many of the Arsenal-employed Jaycees are actually "old veterans" at their trades, even though they still lack years of retiring to "exhausted rooster" status. As larger and more complex missile are conceived, these talented young men will be among the real leaders in this highly challenging art of the future.

Jaycees work at Redstone in numerous occupations, such as those of physicists, mathematicians, chemists, administrators, lawyers, personnel experts, management specialists, and all kinds of engineering including electronic, aeronautical, mechanical, industrial, chemical, etc.

Space prohibits mention by name of but a representative few among the 100 Jaycees who perform vital tasks for our nation's defense—and important civic duties in spare hours via their local Junior Chamber. For example, there's Jim Cleary, who's president of the Huntsville chapter and who draws up government contracts for literally millions of dollars each year as chief of the Contracts Branch of the Redstone Legal office. Jim also worked on intricate legal problems concerning the immigration and naturalization of part of the former 100 Germans who developed the dread V-2 during World War II,

and now are members of the U.S. missile teams at the Arsenal.

One of these ex-Germans, a personable "live wire" named Walter Wiesman, was elected president of the local chapter a couple of years back, and now serves as national JCI chairman. Walt is a special assistant to Dr. Wernher von Braun, chief of the Development Operations Division of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency.

Dave Newby, the chapter's external vice-president, is chief of the Test and Evaluation Branch of the Rocket Development Laboratories. Bob Lakebrink, internal "veep," is an instructor in the Ordnance Guided Missile School, specializing in the CORPORAL missile. Frank Gardiner, past president, is chief process engineer for Thiokol Chemical Corporation.

On the non-scientific side, there are such Jaycees as Capt. Tom Hooten, who is Post Judge Advocate, and Webb White, a former Rhodes scholar who now works in the Civilian Personnel Office.

Most of the Arsenal Jaycees are civil service employes, but also among the membership are five soldiers, ranging in rank from private to captain.



Washington (AFPS)—The new \$15 million Department of Defense Military Personnel Records Center to safeguard the service jackets of some 35 million veterans has been opened in St. Louis, Mo.

Operated by the army adjutant general, the ultra-modern six-story structure, with over a million square feet of floor space, is one of the 20 largest buildings in the world.

Employing 2,000 civilians and 36 military personnel, the center

houses, in separate sections, the military and medical records of former members of the Army, Navy, Marine Corps and Air Force.

Services the center provides include furnishing original documents to the Veterans Administration in support of claims, verifying active service to establish social security benefits, replacing lost discharge certificates and checking awards and decorations due former servicemen.

Among the devices to increase

efficiency in the huge fireproof structure, which has five acres of windows, are a mechanical mail conveyor system connecting all floors, flexible lighting, which can be regulated to meet changing requirements, and a window washing rig with an electrically driven cage which travels around the building on rails.

The Army has about 3,400 pieces of floating equipment such as tugs, barges, and cranes.

During World War II, the Army had many interests related to maritime transportation. Twenty-eight Army Divisions participated in 42 amphibious landings.

Three and a half years ago the Army supply system stocked a million and a half different line items. Today that number has been reduced to less than one million, of which 640,000 are spare parts.

Some 40 percent of the Army's million and a half soldiers and civilians are serving abroad.

Since June 1953, the U.S. Army has disposed of \$4,000,000,000 (B) worth of excess and surplus stocks, based on acquisition value.

The U.S. Army is set on a program of elimination of excess stockage in the Far East Command. There is almost no such property left in Alaska.

From the first, the Armed Forces Day observance has been devoted to emphasis upon the basic concept that our national security and freedom depend upon the power which comes from American teamwork and national unity. The 1950 slogan was "Teamed for Defense." In 1951, the observance featured "Defenders of Freedom." In 1952, the theme was "Unity-Strength-Freedom." The 1953 program emphasized the fact that the Armed Forces of the United States represent "Power for Peace," a slogan so descriptive of our national effort that it was retained as the most appropriate for the 1954, 1955, and 1956 observances.

Arsenal exhibits in display on the square downtown for the day will include a Corporal Missile, provided by the Ordnance Guided Missile School; two Honest John Rockets, one provided by the Rocket Development Lab and Industrial Division, and the other by Redstone Depot and the Research and Development Division; A Rocket Development Lab display consisting of a small rocket fired along a wire; and various displays sponsored by the Post Engineer, Chaplain, Thiokol, Signal Division, Provost Marshal.

One of the Honest John Rockets will pull out from its space on the square to join the big parade slated to start at 10:30 a.m.

Approximately 1,000 troops—from OGMA, ABMA, 9330 TU, the MP's and the local National Guard (along with color guards from the various veterans organizations)—are expected to march in the parade.

The local National Guard band—plus two others to be announced later—will provide marching music.

A firm commitment for a speaker for the day has not been obtained yet. However, an announcement is expected shortly on this. The Speakers Committee is contacting prominent military leaders throughout the country as possible speakers here.

The main address of the day will be presented at 11 a.m. near the square.

A luncheon honoring the speaker, local dignitaries, and Armed Forces Day Committee members will be held at 12:30 p.m. at the Huntsville Country Club.

Arsenal speakers have been arranged to appear in the following cities in connection with Armed Forces Day: Atlanta, Chattanooga, Nashville, and Anniston.

Arsenal exhibits will be displayed in Birmingham, Nashville, Cincinnati, and Washington.

Open house will be held by the local Naval Reserve and National Guard Units.
