Finish Four-Year Training Course



The treasurer's report showed that the total assets in the Credit Union are now \$792,755.70 and the outstanding loans total \$718,308.84.



ARMY EMERGENCY RELIEF DRIVE SET

Capt. Schoenman Heads Campaign

The Army Emergency Relief Drive for 1956 will be conducted during June. Captain Harry P. Schoenman, Jr., chairman for the local drive, has selected a representative from each major organization and they met earlier this month to formulate plans to insure the success of one of the most important drives of the year.

Army Emergency Relief was organized in 1942 for the purpose of rendering emergency financial assistance to members of the Army and their dependents. AER is the Army's own organization, and its rapid growth and expansion can best be shown by a comparison of the volume of assistance rendered since 1950. In 1955, \$4,578,742 was disbursed for assistance as compared to \$3,648,005 in 1954; \$2,258,796 in 1953; \$1,662,187 in 1952; \$1,196,905 in 1951; and \$690,130 in 1950. Captain Robert H. Winter, Redstone Arsenal AER Officer, has reported that Redstone Arsenal personnel received in excess of \$8,500 in loans during 1955.

AER is recognized as an important troop morale and welfare factor. It operates wherever the Army is stationed.

To enable all Redstone personnel to participate in the AER drive, two benefit baseball games have been scheduled. The Redstone Arsenal Rockets will play the Ft. Jackson Eagles on the 13th and 14th of June. Tickets go on sale 29 May at 50 cents each and will be good either night. All segments of the Arsenal will be issued tickets and it is estimated that all sections will do their part in the sale of tickets. All proceeds will go to the Army Emergency Relief Fund.

Unit Commanders will accept contributions for the AER Drive from members of their units at any time during June.

The U. S. Civil Service Board of Examiners has amended Announcement No. 5-35-4(52) for the position of clerk to close tomorrow.

All applications must be filed by the close of business May 23. Any not postmarked by that date will be rejected.

This is the examination for mail and file, personnel, statistical, property and supply, purchasing and procurement, traffic and transportation, and editorial and information clerks. The grades are GS-3 (\$3175 per year) and GS-4 (\$3415).

Registration Set For Math Course

Dean A. B. Moore, Dean of Graduate School, University of Alabama has announced that registration for the graduate class of Mathematics 147, Introduction to Mathematical Statistics, will be held Friday, June 1, at Bldg. T-152 at 4:30 p.m. The first meeting of this class is scheduled for Monday and Wednesday from 4:30 to 6:30. Classes thereafter will be on Monday and Wednesday from 4:30 to 6:30 until August 17.

This course includes probability, frequent distributions, elementary sampling theory, correlation and regression, testing of hypothesis and design of experiments. The prerequisite is Mathematics 49 or equivalent.

The textbook will be P. G. Helol, Introduction to Mathematical Statistics, Revised Edition, 1954. This is a 3 semester hour course.

The instructor of the course will be Dr. B. M. Seelbinder, Assistant Professor of Mathematics, University of Alabama.

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
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

\$600 IN INCENTIVE AWARDS GIVEN; SAVINGS \$16,990

Redstoners have received an additional \$600 in cash awards and have increased the savings to the Government an additional \$16,990.

O. L. Bobo, Redstone Depot, received three checks totaling \$180. Mr. Bobo's suggestion which saved a total of \$5,550 concern a conveyor for use at the dunnage yard, an improvement in stenciling methods, and a new method

for loading palletized ammunition. A second employee in the Depot, Leslie Hudson, received \$35 for suggesting a buffer for use when cleaning non-precision parts in the reclaiming process. This suggestion will save over \$700.

Ed Michael, Industrial Division, has won another award. This time, he suggested the reorganization of a job which saves over \$1,175 and won a \$55 award.

Carl Laney, Consolidated Supply, received a supplementary

award of \$60 for his suggestion concerning shipments of dry ice. Several months ago, Mr. Loney received an initial award of \$115 based on an estimated savings of \$3,535. His suggestion was held open for the remaining part of the year to determine the actual savings. The total savings realized by this suggestion is \$5,392, which earned Laney a total of \$175.

Radford Miller, Adjutant Division, earned \$30 for suggesting an improvement to the Kodagraph machine in Reproduction Branch. This suggestion will save \$550.

Rocket Development Division has two winning suggestions. Mr. Arthur Davis saved \$830 by suggesting the use of hanger bands to hold the HVAR motor onto the ballistic track. This suggestion

warranted an award of \$45. Mitchell G. Linney earned \$155 for suggesting a procedure for sealing the CEC Recorder. This suggestion saved the government over \$5,000.

Army Ballistic Missile Agency has one winner this month. E.M. Jennings received \$40 for an improvement he suggested when he was with OML. This suggestion saved \$1,475.

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
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
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Gen. Taylor:

FAST AIRBORNE MOBILITY NEEDED BY ARMY IN WAR

Washington (AP)—Rapid mobility for the Army under atomic battlefield conditions demands fixed-wing planes and helicopters, Chief of Staff Maxwell D. Taylor has declared.

In an address before the National Fliers Club here, Gen. Taylor told new men "these vehicles do for us in the air what trucks do for us on the ground."

He said the infantry, artillery, transportation and medical corps all need airborne mobility to accomplish their mission, particularly on the atomic battlefield which will be characterized by a great dispersion of units.

Stressing that the Army is not competing with the Air Force, Gen. Taylor said there is considerable misunderstanding about army aviation and its objectives.

He said the Army must borrow strategic mobility from the Air Force and Navy for long moves but "the kind of mobility we are seeking by our own means is that which results from improved organic vehicles, both surface and air."

The four-star general also told the new men that the Army's major development effort today is in the missile field. He declared the Nike I can operate effectively against any aircraft now in existence, "regardless of height or speed."

He pointed out that another missile in the ground-to-air family, the Nike B, which is now being developed, anticipates the appearance of even higher performance aircraft.

"I would emphasize that the Nike is not a single weapon, but a family of weapons in which the new evolves naturally from the experience gained from the old," he added.

In addition to exchanges at posts and bases throughout the United States, the Army and Air Force Exchange Service consist of a New York headquarters and five regional offices. In addition, a liaison office is maintained in Washington as well as a purchasing branch in San Francisco. The regional offices are located in Baltimore, Md.; Atlanta, Ga.; Chicago, Ill.; San Antonio, Tex.; and San Francisco, Calif.

branch, Civilian Personnel Office, RSA, Bldg. T-152 not later than 8 June 1956.

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
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INDUSTRIAL DIVISION

Soldiers Schooled To be Instructors For German Army

HEIDELBERG — Seven U. S. Army combat and three technical service teams began a thirty-day preparation program prior to reporting to German Military installations where they will assist in training the German Army.

A total of 431 instructors—selected from units throughout the U. S. Army, Europe—will take part in the program. All will be members of the German Training Assistance Group which will help teach German Army instructor personnel how to use and maintain American equipment provided under the American Mutual Defense Assistance Program.

The pre-training period will be devoted to organization of instruction, drawing administrative equipment, preparation of lesson plans, and detailed scheduling of classes, and rehearsal of individual instruction.

The largest group of instructors will train with the Second Armored Division—a total of 105. Combat Command A will be host

to 37 for armor instruction while Combat Command B will support 35 for armored infantry and 33 for armored reconnaissance training.

The Ninth Infantry Division will be the parental unit for 76—54 for infantry and 22 for anti-tank training. Fifty will train at the 36th Field Artillery Group and 56 at the 34th Antiaircraft Artillery Brigade. The U. S. Army, Europe, Engineer School at Murmansk will provide support to 41 while 50 will train at the Signal School at Ansbach and 53 to train at the Ordnance School at Fussen.

Following the month long preparation, the GTAG instructors will be assigned to German garrisons at the following places:

Munsterlager — armor and armored infantry; Bremen — armored reconnaissance, and anti-tank; Idar-Oberstein—field artillery; Hammelburg — infantry; Munich—engineers; Southhofen—signal and ordnance; Rendsburg—antiaircraft artillery.

Assignment of 431 instructors to work with the German Army will bring 456 of the total number of American assigned to German Training groups.

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
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
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FORT MONMOUTH, N. J. — "Slanguage," Army style is being taught 100 Allied students from 20 different countries who are attending the U.S. Army Signal School here, under the Mutual Defense Assistance Program. "No sweat," Would you explain that again?" said a troubled Royal Thailand Army officer. "No sweat" means no trouble at all, he was told. "Your in hot water." "That means you're in trouble?"

a Korean Army sergeant asked quizzically. "What's a 'flap'?" A flap is a state of tension: somebody had better do something because far-reaching commitments are at stake, or because influential people want something done, it was explained. "Hubba hubba," has me confused," said one Brazilian major. A Japanese captain set him straight with a few hand curving-indicating gestures that mean the same thing the world over. All the students at the school

have a working knowledge of English but wage a continual battle against American slang and colloquialisms. To assist them, the school has set up this extra-curricular training course to give them an opportunity to decode these mysteries. "Little stress is placed on grammatical form," said Dr. Joseph Frank, Chief of the Instructor Training Branch here. "The emphasis is on correct pronunciation, enunciation, and understanding." The phase of instruction the

students enjoy most, according to the doctor, is the free discussion which takes up 30 minutes at the beginning of each session. Here they discuss what they have learned about America and American life; they are quick to pounce on any errors their fellow students may make. Films and recordings are used freely as training aids in the course. The students also present playlets on such subjects as "How to buy in a store," "Going on a bus-ride," "Ordering in a restaurant," and "Giving directions." All the material used must be

suitable for the background of the students and must not in any way be offensive to their varying social customs.

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
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
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
