LOWERY HEADS NEW DIVISION

Named Chief of Budget & Analysis

The former Comptroller of Pittsburgh Ordnance District is now the Chief of a new division at Redstone Arsenal.

He is Robert C. Lowery who grew up in Wooster, Ohio, attended the College of Wooster and earned his Bachelor of Science degree in business administration, "cum laude" at the Ohio State University. Later he obtained a master's degree from the same school.

At Redstone he is the chief of the newly formed Budget and Analysis Division. This division is to have technical staff supervision of arsenal budgetary planning, coordination and control. Theoretical Physics Added to Grad Study

Dr. A. B. Moore, Dean of Graduate School, University of Alabama has announced that Physics 102, Introduction to Theoretical Physics, will be taught as a part of the Redstone Graduate Program this summer. This course includes classical thermodynamics and statistical mechanics, kinetic theory, electrostatics, magnetostatics, DC and AC Circuit theory and electromagnetic wave theory.

Registration for this class will be held Monday, June 4 at the Civilian Training Office, Building 152 at 4 p.m. The class will meet each Tuesday and Thursday thereafter from 4:30 to 6:30 p.m. This Physics course carries three semester hours credit. Prerequisite is Differential Equations and some work in Vector Analysis. Dr. Lloyd W. Walters, Physicist in Research Division of O.M.L., will teach this course. Dr. Walters received his Bachelor's degree from St. Olaf College and his Ph. D. from John Hopkins. Dr. Walters has taught Physics at John Hopkins, Goucher College, and the University of Maryland, prior to coming to Redstone in 1954.

Contract Awarded For Arsenal Work

Army Engineers at Mobile, Alabama, have announced the award of a contract in the amount of \$111,131.45 to the Huntsville firm of Ashburn & Gray, Contractors, for the construction of a missile and component test road facility at Redstone Arsenal.

Lt. Colonel Robert S. Kramer, Assistant District Engineer at Mobile, explained that the contract calls for building a 4,880-foot long road divided into sections, each section being of a different type of construction, so that tests can be made to determine the physical condition of missiles and components after having been transported on automotive equipment over various types of roads. It also calls for the construction of a small concrete masonry office building.

Engineers expect the contractor to commence work early in June.

SIX ANNOUNCEMENTS, AMENDMENTS FOR EXAMINATIONS ARE PUBLISHED

Six announcements or amendments to announcements for competitive examinations were published by the U.S. Civil Service Examiners Board last week.

An amendment to announcement number 5-35-3(53) for refrigeration and air conditioning mechanics at WB-16 (\$2.25 per hour) gives applicants until Thursday, May 31, to file. No applications will be accepted unless presented or postmarked by that date.

The same applies to announcement number 5-35-13(54) for training instructors in electronics, propellants and explosives, skilled trades and technical fields. The grades range from GS-5 at \$3670 per year through GS-11 at \$6390 per year.

Amendment 1 to announcement number 5-35-5(56) supersedes announcement number 5-35-11(54). Persons who attained eligibility under that examination should apply under this new examination number for guided missile electronic equipment specialist positions. The pay ranges from \$3670 through \$4525.

Another amendment covers guided missile inspectors at grade GS-8, GS-9 paying from \$4970 through \$5440 per year. This affects the physical requirements. People who need glasses or hear with a hearing aid may apply but those who have lost an arm, hand, leg or foot should not apply because this would be a hazard to the individual and disqualify him for the position.

Announcement number 5-35-20(56) covers clerks at grades GS-1 (\$2690 per year) through GS-3 (\$3175 per year). Persons who attained eligibility under announcement number 5-35-4(52) should reapply for this examination in order to receive consideration. This announcement supersedes the earlier one.

And announcement number 5-35-21(56) covers welders a WB-16 grades which pay \$2.25 per hour. This announcement supersedes similar registers established under announcement number 5-35-10(55). Individuals should reapp-






SOLDIERS OF U.S. ARMORED UNIT MAKE GERMAN YOUTH 'CAGE' HAPPY

MANNHEIM, Germany — The good old American game of basketball has taken hold among young Germans in this city where the native football is "fussball" reigned so long without competition.

Thanks to the Second Armored Division, and particularly to the men of the 41st Armored Infantry Battalion, the basketball craze has been spread.

United States Army support began last year. It takes the form of providing equipment, explaining the game's rules, paying some of the bills and playing it for German youth audiences.

Introduction to the sport in schools here, a spontaneous gesture by the battalion, met with the usual number of problems. There were shortages of basketballs, courts, nets, hoops, money and other requirements.

The five local German schools "adopted" by the soldier-companies had their standard football field but little else for sport and recreation.

The armor men started their international relation movement from scratch, literally. They scratched around for lumber, old pipe and welding apparatus. Eventually they came up with everything. Even the missing basketballs turned up at the right moment.

Unit company commanders visited the German schools concerned to discuss the aims and problems with coaches, interpreters and directors.

Obtaining qualified interpreters to explain the game and its rules took time but finally was accom-

plished.

A large number of Mannheim school teachers met at Coleman Barracks for their introduction to the game, and to study its value as a student participation sport.

To show German students how the game should be played, the youngsters were brought periodically to Coleman Barracks to witness company level games.

German girls as well as boys showed keen interest in the game. Bicycle trips to game sites be-

tween the school teams are common, and considerable parental interest is now shown. Practice sessions were and still are conducted, usually Saturday afternoons, with the soldiers helping on their own time.

The strong German supporter to this Army aid is Hans Babies of this city, publisher of an international basketball magazine. He lectures frequently to Germans on the sport.

Several hundred German youngsters are now engaged in this sport which has become a top activity in the five schools which make up the Army-sponsored league.



GOVERNMENT SERVICE SAID MAJOR VOCATIONAL FOR NAT. PROGRESS

Government service is a "major vocation" of crucial importance to our national life, John W. Macy, Jr., executive director of the Civil Service Commission, told sessions of the American Personnel and Guidance Association at their spring conference in Washington, D.C.

Speaking on behalf of the na-

tion's largest employer — the Federal Government, with a work force of more than two million persons, requiring new hires of around 300,000 employees every year — Mr. Macy called upon the counselors to foster a better public appreciation of national needs and a better understanding of the career service.

To meet personnel needs more

urgent than ever in terms of our national progress and world leadership, Mr. Macy declared, "high-powered, last-minute recruitment programs are essential, but they can achieve maximum results only if they are directed to people who, throughout their formative years, have learned something about the Government as an employer."

"Education in the problems of modern Government and its career opportunities must make progress along with the progress that is being made by the Government in building a strong career service and matching the career benefits of progressive private employers," he added.

CALIF. LEADS IN NUMBER OF FEDERAL WORKERS

California continued to lead all areas in the country in the number of Federal employees at the end of 1955, according to new Civil Service Commission figures.

On December 31, 1955, California with approximately 230,300 employees was slightly ahead of metropolitan Washington, D.C., with 227,465. The number for California is substantially the same as the 230,200 recorded last September 30.

Employment in the Washington area, which includes nearby counties and towns in Maryland and Virginia, declined during the three months. Small declines also were registered in New York, Pennsylvania and Illinois and a small gain in Texas.

New York State was still third, with 185,300; Pennsylvania fourth, with 134,000; Texas fifth, with 112,100; and Illinois sixth, with 100,100.

Federal figures for other states ranged from Vermont's, New Hampshire's, and Delaware's 3,200 each to Ohio's 94,300.

Federal workers are paid according to the difficulty of their jobs, their responsibilities, and the qualifications required. This was not always the case. A law passed in 1864 allowed a salary of only \$600 a year to women in positions for which men were paid up to \$1,800.

Almost all (95%) Federal civilian employees are paid according to one of three plans — the Classification Act system, the wage-board plan, or the postal pay system.



SECRETS NOT TO BE GIVEN AWAY



Secrets connected with our national defense must not be given away on a silver platter. Failure to handle classified information properly, poor physical protection from classified material, and indiscreet talk are the three major violations. These failures, singly or in combination, are of utmost seriousness.

The reasons for classifying military information are simple. They are to:

1. Preserve the advantages gained in the development of weapons, and
2. Protect the defense plans of the United States.

These reasons are of such great importance that the Government imposes heavy penalties on those who disregard them.

The task of safeguarding classified information is the responsibility of all persons who have been entrusted with it. These are people who have been granted security clearances after a painstaking investigation has established the fact that they are reliable and trustworthy.

People entrusted with classified information must deny access to all unauthorized persons; they must restrict access to those authorized persons who have a "need to know"; and they must follow faithfully prescribed procedures for handling classified information.

If these rules are followed, our secrets will not be given away.






