






MISSILE MODEL READY FOR TESTING -- In the test section of the wind tunnel is a missile model ready to be tested for structural and aerodynamic efficiency.

Huge New 'Tri-sonic' Wind Tunnel Being Set Up By ABMA

The demand for bigger and better aerodynamic testing equipment at the Army Ballistic Missile Agency located at Redstone Arsenal has brought about the installation of additional wind tunnel facilities here which will be twice the size of the present tunnel.

The present operating wind tunnel has a test chamber of 7-inches-by-7-inches. Wind velocities of about 4,000 miles per hour can be reached in this tunnel if necessary.

The new tunnel will be what wind tunnel engineers term a "tri-sonic" wind tunnel, which means that wind velocities in the sub-sonic, trans-sonic, and super-sonic range can be obtained and will have a speed range of from zero to Mach 5 or 6. (Mach 1 is 760 miles per hour at sea level.)

It will have a 14-inch-by-14-inch test chamber which will be capable of testing missile models at sub-sonic, trans-sonic, and super-sonic speeds and will also have variable density which will allow closer simulation to flight conditions. (Variable density means that the tunnel will be capable of being run at different

pressure levels.)

Upon completion of this tri-sonic tunnel, much of the experimental aerodynamic work now being conducted at Aberdeen Proving Ground, Maryland; Arnold Engineering Development Center in Tullahoma, Tenn.; and Naval Ordnance Laboratories at Silver Springs, Maryland -- primarily in the sub-sonic, low

trans-sonic, and super-sonic regions--can be handled here.

Redstone's original wind tunnel was brought to this country from Peenemuende, Germany, where it was used in developing the V-2 rocket. A considerable number of the tests required by our guided missile scientists were performed in this tunnel. Redstone, however, (Continued on Back Page)

The paper for which he is being honored is titled: "The Heat Capacity Over the Range 15 Degrees to 315 Degrees K. The Heat of Fusion and Derived Thermodynamic Properties of Alpha and Beta Pinene."

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CAN YOU BELIEVE WHAT YOU HEAR? TESTS MAY TELL

FORT CHURCHILL, Canada — What effect, if any, do such weather variables as wind direction and velocity, temperature and humidity have on your ability to recognize sources of sound?

The U. S. Army wants to know; the ability to localize sounds is especially important to soldiers under conditions when they cannot see well—at night or when rain or snow is falling.


Here, 40 soldiers are participating in tests which may help give the answers to this question.

Each soldier is placed in front of a large number of loud speak-

ers which broadcasts common noises. He is asked to identify each noise and to indicate from which direction it came and is rated both as to accuracy of identification and reaction time.

This testing is being done here under arctic conditions and with soldiers in full cold-weather Army gear by a team from the Army Medical Research Laboratory at Fort Knox, Ky. Similar tests will be run there and at Yuma, Ariz.



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

quickly outgrew this tunnel and designed, fabricated, and installed the present 7-inch-by-7-inch tunnel.

The air used in these tunnels must be dried and cleaned before it can be used.

Fresh outside air is pumped through activated alumina, which is a drying and cleaning agent, before storage. In the 7-inch tunnel, this air is stored in two large steel tanks at atmospheric pressure. Then, during operation, this air is exhausted through the settling chamber which is equipped with turbulence-reducing screens before passing through the test section and into the vacuum tanks.

The new wind tunnel will use a high pressure supply of air (35,000 pounds per square inch) which has been cleaned and dried before storage.

This air is routed through the settling chamber where the pressure is reduced to the desired level, is heated, straightened, and its turbulence level reduced before passing through the test chamber.

Making missile models is not just a schoolboy's hobby. Our well-educated engineers design and make miniature models of missiles exactly to scale to be tested in these wind tunnels.

Engineers have found that they can save thousands of dollars in material and labor on experimental missiles by studying models.

As air is blown through the wind tunnel at terrific speeds project engineers watch instruments which show the model's behavior.

At the present time, these project engineers leave their desks and travel across the Arsenal to witness these tests, but sometime in the not-too-distant future these tests will be televised to their offices.

A complex arrangements of prisms, mirrors, and a still camera is used now to record the shock waves produced during each test. Complicated electronic equipment gathers other information, too—all by remote control.

Model data in voltage form is transmitted electrically from the test chamber to a recording ma-

chine which converts these voltages into digital form and records in seconds the results of the tests. These results are stored in an electrical "brain" and then transferred to an automatic typewriter which records the data on data sheets. At the same time, the information is recorded on punch cards which are immediately taken to the Computation Laboratory for final data reduction. Through these tests, engineers can predict the future performance of full-size missiles to an extremely close degree.

Each pound of weight added to the missile cuts down its flying efficiency; therefore, when tests are performed, structural effici-

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
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
