

Shinkle Promoted to Brigadier General

DEPUTY RSA CHIEF GETS STAR

Col. John G. Shinkle, deputy commander of Redstone Arsenal was promoted to brigadier general Friday afternoon in a ceremony in the office of the Chief of Ordnance.

Gen. Shinkle has been at Redstone Arsenal since June 4. For the previous two years he was in the office of the Chief of Ordnance, Research and Development Division in Washington where he served as executive officer.

He is a graduate of the U.S. Military Academy. His parents are Gen. and Mrs. E. M. Shinkle, who live in retirement in San Francisco.

Gen. Shinkle received his commission as a second lieutenant in Artillery in 1933. He served four years in California and Hawaii. Then he enrolled in the ordnance school at Massachusetts Institute of Technology. He has been with Ordnance since 1937. The general also attended a year-long ordnance school at Aberdeen Proving Ground, Md. He remained there for a four-year tour of duty.

During World War II he was assigned to the China Theatre. After the war he became a member of the Marshall Mission to China.

Gen. Shinkle served as chief of the San Francisco Ordnance District 1947 to 1950. Following this assignment he went to Brazil for 18 months. Gen. Shinkle also served 2½ years at White Sands Proving Grounds, and was transferred from there to the Pentagon.

There are four general officers at Redstone. They are Maj. Gen. John B. Medaris, commander of Army Ballistics Missile Agency; Brig. Gen. H. N. Toftoy, Redstone Arsenal commander; Brig. Gen. John A. Barclay, deputy commander of ABMA; and Gen. Shinkle.

ABMA AIRSTRIP CONTROL SYSTEM PUT INTO EFFECT

A light plane "riding a beam" — the first sent out from the recently erected air transportation control tower at the Army Ballistic Missile Agency airstrip — last week skimmed down and cut a gaily fluttering ribbon strung across the runway, to officially activate the new area control system.

All air traffic in the Huntsville area will be controlled by the new system during instrument weather. Control of Huntsville Airport traffic will be on a temporary basis, until the port gets its own system installed next January.

The runway ribbon-cutting was part of an activation ceremony at the ABMA airstrip, attended by Arsenal and Huntsville officials, which included speeches by Maj.

Major Guy M. Marks recently assumed the duties of Exchange Officer succeeding Capt. John J. Wattendorf.



Mr. Brown, a native of Wellesley, Mass., earned his B. S. Degree in mechanical engineering from Brown University in Providence, R. I. He joined the General Electric Company in 1949 and was assigned to the Lynn River Works at Lynn, Massachusetts until 1952 where he was primarily involved in the development and testing of jet engine components and his last assignment there was as Section Engineer in charge of component development and testing.

In 1952 Mr. Brown moved to Cincinnati, Ohio, when he was transferred to the Aircraft Nuclear Propulsion Project where he was put in charge of engine design. Later he was reassigned to Aircraft Gas Turbine Development Department where he did project engineering work on advanced jet engines serving as Manager of Test and Evaluation.

Since 1954 Mr. Brown has been concerned with the marketing of rocket engines and is now manager of rocket engine sales.

AT ARSENAL

\$1½ Million Worth Of Construction Set

Approximately one and one-half million dollars worth of contracts were awarded last week by the Army Engineers at Mobile, for construction work at Redstone Arsenal. Colonel Harold E. Bisbort, District Engineer, in announcing the awards said that the work is in connection with the multi-million dollar expansion program at the installation.

Two contracts were awarded the Pearce and Gresham Company of Decatur, Ala. One of the contracts, in the amount of \$176,109.00, is for the construction of a basic hydraulic and electric shop. The shop building will have a floor area of 10,300 square feet and will be of concrete-block construction. It will be equipped with plumbing, air-conditioning, heating, and interior electrical systems. The other contract, in the amount of \$461,557.37, is for making additions and alterations to five existing buildings at the Arsenal which house the Post Engineers shops. The work includes constructing three fill-in units to connect Buildings Nos. 731 and 715 and Buildings Nos. 778, 779 and 780.

The third contract was awarded to the Valley Construction Company of Columbus, Ga., in the amount of \$241,747.00, for the construction of a post chapel and religious educational facilities. The building will be of concrete block construction and will include a chapel, chaplain study rooms, a choir room, a nursery,

HAL McINTYRE BAND COMING FOR BIG DANCE HERE

Hal McIntyre and his Orchestra one of America's best-known and best-loved dance bands, is coming to Redstone Arsenal Saturday night to play at the first "Famous Bands Night" sponsored by the Officers Open Mess.

The dance, open to officers and their guests, will be held from 9-11 in one of the Ordnance Guided Missile School's new shop buildings located behind OGMS Headquarters. Tickets are \$1.50 per person and are available in all divisions on the arsenal.

The program, which has been arranged by the Surface to Surface Missile Division of OGMS, will feature McIntyre and his Orchestra, vocalist Jeanne McManus, and a vocal group known as the McIntots.

The Orchestra, which comes to Redstone following an appearance at the Steel Pier in Atlantic City, has played such famous landmarks as the Paramount, Hotel Commodore, and Glen Island Casino in New York, the Aragon Ballroom, Oriental Theatre, and Hotel Sherman in Chicago, Frank Dailey's Meadowbrook in New Jersey, and the Palladium in Hollywood.

A protege of Glenn Miller and Benny Goodman, McIntyre began his big time career with Goodman in 1936. He joined Miller in 1938, and in 1941 stepped out on his own with an opening date at the Glen Island Casino, known as "The Cradle of Name Bands."

From there it was a short step to stardom. He has since cut records on the MGM, RCA Victor, and Decca labels, and made four feature length musicals for Columbia movie studios. He has played at the President's Birthday Ball for the late F.D.R. and Mrs. Roosevelt, and is one of the few leaders of major ranking to have gone overseas for USO to entertain GI's at the front.

One of the foremost college prom favorites, McIntyre's Orchestra was recently voted among the nation's top dance bands in a Downbeat Magazine poll.

HAND-PICKED CIVILIAN, MILITARY POLICE PROTECT ABMA SECRETS

Smith, "B" Company, Civilian Police, are representative of a group of chosen men who are guarding the secrets of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency. This special group is known as the Security Guard Detachment of ABMA and consists of outstanding Military and Civilian Police hand-picked for this important job.

These two men are well qualified for the role of special protector because of their outstanding military service during World

War II. Nielson went to war with the 3rd Infantry Division in 1942 and fought in practically every phase of the European conflict. Some of the honors he received are the Silver Star, Bronze Star, Purple Heart with two clusters, French Croix de-Guerre, with palm, French Pourrage, the Presidential Citation, Combat Infantry Badge, ETO ribbon with eight battle stars and one arrowhead for initial landing in Africa, National Defense Service medal, American Theatre of Operations ribbon, Victory ribbon, Soldier's Medal, and the Occupation of Germany ribbon. Besides this large display of ribbons, he also

owns the distinction of being a body-guard for General Eisenhower and his staff when the general was in Paris as NATO Commander.

Nielson returned to the States in 1951, and in January of 1956 he was picked with eight other men from a group at Ft. Benning, Ga., to serve in the ABMA Security Guard Detachment.

Smith was also picked from a large group to serve in this capacity. He came to Redstone in 1952 as a civilian guard and evidently proved exceptional because this past January he and 30 other guards donned the big impressive badges of the Security Police.

During World War II Smith served with the 5th Infantry Division in Europe from 1943 to 1945. His medals include: the Silver Star, Bronze Star, Purple Heart with cluster, Good Conduct Medal, European Theatre of Operations ribbon with five combat stars, the Victory Medal, Combat Infantry Medal, Presidential Citation, and Belgian Pourrage.

After the war he returned to his home in Athens, and attended the Decatur Trade School. He worked as an electrician before coming to Redstone.

Nielson is a native of Seattle, Wash.







ARSENAL EMPLOYEES HELPING STAGE STATE SEMI-PRO BASEBALL TOURNEY

Final arrangements for the 21st annual Alabama Championship Semi-Pro Baseball Tournament were completed Saturday, and action is set to begin Friday night at Huntsville Park in Huntsville. Sixteen teams are entered in this tourney of state-wide interest, which is being held in Huntsville for the second consecutive year under the sponsorship of the Huntsville Jaycees.

Top teams in the week-long event include three local ballclubs, the Boosters (won 3, lost 0), Parkers (3-13), and Alabama Shoe (9-6). The Boosters now include most of the personnel from the 1955 champion hip Parkers. The winner of the tourney will

face the Georgia champs late this month for the right to compete in the national NBC tournament next month in Wichita.

Other leading entries include Gadsden Bellevue (18-3), Attalla Pipe & Foundry (16-3), Florence (16-3), Jasper Vets (15-3), Florence Central (13-7), and Anniston General Electric (7-4).

After a single opening game on Friday, teams will play ten games on Saturday and seven on Sunday, eliminating the first six teams; after Tuesday's play, only four teams will remain in the running. The championship game is slated for Thursday night, barring any rain. Two parks will be used to speed up the long double-

elimination tournament.

Scouts from nearly all major league clubs will be on hand. Over ten gold trophies will be awarded to players and teams, along with the \$1000 first prize, guaranteed by the Huntsville Jaycees.

Special events in connection with the big week in Huntsville include a state-wide baseball queen contest on Friday and Saturday, an all-day Bar-B-Q at each ballpark on Saturday, attendance prizes every two games, and the awarding of an all-expense-paid trip for two to the first two games of the World Series to a lucky advance-sale ticket holder.

Admission is only 50 cents, except for the final game, which will be 75 cents. All Jaycees are currently selling advance tickets.





ARSENAL KINDERGARTEN TEACHER LEAVES RECORD OF SERVICE HERE

Mrs. T. H. Ebbert, Redstone Arsenal's post kindergarten teacher, left here recently to join her husband in St. Johns, Newfoundland. Lt. Col. and Mrs. Ebbert came to Redstone Arsenal in January, 1953, when Colonel Ebbert was assigned as chief of the Redstone Dept.

Shortly after their arrival, Gen. T. K. Vincent, then commanding general of Redstone, decided to do something for the children here and put out a call for help.

Mrs. Ebbert was among the first to volunteer her services. She organized, first, the Girls' Club from which grew Redstone's Girl Scout and Brownie troops and kindergarten and pre-school classes. Later she was instrumental in forming the Youth Club and the Boy Scout and Cub Scout troop.

Mrs. Ebbert's enthusiasm was catching and soon others at Redstone joined her in organizing various activities for both children and adults.

She served as vice president during her first year as a member of the Officers Wives Club here, and chairman of the special projects committee the second year. While serving on the special projects committee, Mrs. Ebbert planned and conducted the International Luncheon.

In 1952 she became a charter member of the Chapel Guild and the Garden Club and held office in both.

Her heart lay with the children, however, and she devoted most of her time to them. Her own two children having practically 'grown up' left Mrs. Ebbert with time on her hands (Jon is 14 and Gael is 8) and she spent that time planning educational programs and fund-raising events for children's activities. The most successful of these events was Las Vegas night.

In the kindergarten and pre-school classes under her supervision, the children learned much about Army life. Visual education

taught them the things they should know about the things they would see and hear discussed in their every-day lives.

During the school year they studied fire prevention, transportation, first aid, telephone communication, and various other subjects of common interest.

They toured the facilities which were the subject of their study at the time such as the fire station and were allowed to climb and examine the fire engine; the maintenance shop for locomotive where they blew the train whistle and took a thorough look inside and outside the engine; a registered nurse from the Post hospital demonstrated how first aid is given; they toured the exchange of-

fice of signal and met the switch-board operators; the Post Engineer took them on a tour of the various shops under his supervision where they learned the meaning of such words as carpenter, tool and die, and plumbing.

The graduates of Mrs. Ebbert's classes become top-notch first graders. They know how to read, write, and spell quite well. Acts of courtesy and good sportsmanship have been stressed in answering the telephone, eating, and playing.

While Mrs. Ebbert was busy with these activities, Colonel Ebbert spent much of his spare time helping the children also. He was instrumental in forming the Boy Scout troop on Redstone Arsenal and became one of their most active leaders.

Mrs. Ebbert, a graduate of Oregon State College in Corvallis, is also a member of Alpha Delta Pi sorority and the Eastern Star lodge.
