### REDSTONE CHIEF GETS 2ND STAR

General H. N. Toftoy, commanding general of Redstone Arsenal, has been promoted to major general it was announced by the Adjutant General on Sept. 20.

Gen. Toftoy came to Redstone Arsenal as a colonel in May, 1952, and received his first star as a brigadier general on November 1 of the same year. At that time, he was the director of the Ordnance Missile Laboratories.

He became commander of Redstone Arsenal, the Army Ordnance rocket and guided missile center, on Sept. 1, 1954.

Gen. Toftoy has been associated continuously with the Ordnance guided missile program since its inception. He became interested in rocketry during World War II and is credited with personally fighting for and obtaining support required to keep the program from dying on several occasions during the pioneering years. His long experience in the guided missile field has earned him the title throughout the Army of "Mr. Missile."

In 1952, Major General Simon, while Chief of Research and Development Division, Office, Chief of Ordnance, introduced the then Colonel Toftoy at a Congressional Subcommittee hearing with this statement:

"Colonel Toftoy was brought back from the European Theater at the beginning of the guided missile program. The whole Army guided missile program has been under his immediate supervision from its inception up to now.

"He is the man who worked on it when we were running on a shoe-string and he is the one who went through building up a place like White Sands and gathered together the odds and ends picked up at Albuquerque and elsewhere to get the proving ground started.

"Colonel Toftoy won't be with you again because his term is running out and we will be issuing orders in the next two months transferring him some place else. But here is a man who has done the work — Colonel Toftoy."

It was under the direction of General Toftoy that the Nike and Corporal guided missile systems were developed and the record 250-mile high rocket flight was successfully executed at White Sands Proving Ground, New Mexico, in 1949. He was also responsible for the development of the Redstone missile and a number of post-war rocket weapons including the super bazooka and the large Honest John rocket.

During World War II he recommended bringing to this country the German scientists and engineers who developed the V-2 rocket on Peenemuende, and later was charged with the task of selecting and bringing to this country and employing 130 of these German missile experts.

General Toftoy was born October 31, 1902 in Marsilles, Illi-

ois. He attended the University of Wisconsin for two years, then entered the United States Military Academy where he was graduated in 1926 as a second lieutenant. He is a graduate of the Command and General Staff College, the Coast Artillery School, and the Army-Navy Staff College. General Toftoy taught five years at West Point, 1930-35.

Among the decorations he has been awarded are the Legion of Merit, the Bronze Star, and the French Croix de Guerre with Palm. He has been awarded the honorary Doctor of Laws degree by Athens College.

General Toftoy is married to the former Miss Hazel Schweikert of Port Chester, New York. They have two children: Mrs. George K. Williams of Huntsville, and Cadet Charles N. Toftoy of the United States Military Academy.

use. A bas relief plaque of the head of a man and woman hangs over the deventport on an adjoining wall.

Mrs. Mary Vezzoli pointed to the wall opposite. "That's the kind of art work I do," she said. In a large frame is a needlepoint 15th Century Caravel, plowing through a calm sea with the bow spray curling before the prow. To a sailor's eye, the lazy clouds would probably suggest a sudden squall. Mrs. Vezzoli also covered the dining room chair seats with petit point which entails many finer needle stitches and finer yarn than the needlepoint work on the sailing ship scene.

"We stored a lot of the colonel's work at his sister's," the colonel's wife said. "It's very fragile and we move around so much we're afraid of breaking things."

Asked how a career in sculpture starts, Col. Vezzoli said that a friend of his father's was a professional sculptor. He helped him as a child of about nine. Since then, the colonel has used sculpture as an avocation.

"I considered studying art at Alfred University," the colonel said. "But I decided you either have it or you don't. So I majored in physics which was harder for me." While obtaining his bachelor of science degree at Alfred.

### ARMY INCENTIVE AWARDS PROGRAM SAVES OVER \$18,000,000 IN YEAR

Estimated savings of more than \$18,000,000 will result from suggestions submitted by civilian and military personnel during Fiscal Year 1956, the Department of the Army has announced.

Recommendations adopted which are expected to save approximately \$18,064,673 resulted from the Department of the Army suggestion program which urges employes to submit suggestions for improved efficiency and economy.

A total of 71,741 recommendations were received from civilian and military personnel and only 1,000 of these were suggestions made by civilians and 12,344 offered by military personnel were received at installations in this country and abroad.

Army civilian employes re-

ceived a total of \$293,823 for their ideas, all of which are screened by committees at various installations. The law does not authorize cash awards for suggestions submitted by military personnel.

The largest cash award made during the Fiscal Year 1956 was presented to Walter A. T. Appenbrink, 1940 Spring Avenue, Granite City, Illinois, Army Supply Control Office, St. Louis, Missouri. He received \$1,125 for suggestions for elimination of a Department of Army term and in addition, received in detail new information on the subject. As a result, the Government will save \$500,000.

Nearly 1,000 more suggestions were received during the Fiscal Year 1955 than for the previous year, despite a decrease in strength.



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

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

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

(Editor's note: Reprinted below is a section of Army Regulations No. 525-30, published 28 Aug. 1956, dealing with the subject of Army Missiles.)

**ARMY MISSILES**

1. Purpose. These regulations establish basic Army policy for the integration of guided and rocket missiles into the Army weapons system.

2. General Policy. Armed forces have a primary requirement and responsibility for surface-launched missiles employed in support of combat incident to operations on land and in the executive of the air defense mission assigned to the Army. Such missiles are not merely specialized items of equipment; they have broad and general application to land warfare. All surface-launched missiles which meet Army operational requirements will be developed and integrated into Army forces, as a natural transition from present types of conventional artillery. Army missiles are those ballistic and non-ballistic surface-to-surface missiles, and surface-to-air missiles designed to destroy predetermined targets. All Army personnel must acquire a sound understanding of missiles and their application to ground combat operations. Commanders will exploit the capabilities of missiles in training, planning, and operations.

3. Concepts of employment. a. The objectives of combat incident to operations on land are to destroy the war-making effectiveness of enemy forces and to seize and control enemy land areas, installations, and populations. Army forces obtain these objectives by maneuver and firepower against enemy troops, materiel, and installations. The use of atomic weapons in land combat will force greater dispersion of ground forces. The combat zone will be wide and deep; clearly defined lines between battle areas and rear areas cannot be expected. Army units must be organized for combat and equipped, to provide improved air defense, increased mobility, and fire support of greater range and effectiveness. The ground commander must be capable of delivering atomic weapons from missiles in a wide variation of ranges and yields.

b. The effectiveness of Army operations is directly related to the range, reliability, and lethality of its close and interdictionary firepower. Army missiles with extended range and atomic firepower provide a substantial improvement in ground combat effectiveness. The Army in executing its assigned antiair function provides surface-to-air missile units for the air defense of the continental United States, and of United States overseas bases and forces.

c. To insure effective response to the air defense and fire support requirements of Army force commanders, Army missile units are employed in general consonance with the accepted principles of artillery fire support as modified by the special characteristics of the missile units. The artillery commander at each echelon is responsible to his immediate Army force commander for command and control and for basic recommendations concerning the employment of Army missile units.

4. Requirements for Army missiles. a. In order to fulfill their assigned roles and missions, all services have requirements for missiles integral to their weapons systems. In support of its requirements, the Army has developed and placed in general operational use ballistic and nonballistic surface-to-surface missiles, free rockets, and surface-to-air missiles. The Army has acquired developmental, training, and operational experience on which to base the development and employment of improved surface-launched missile systems which conform to Army requirements and missions. Surface-to-surface and surface-to-air units have been organized under approved tables of organization and equipment, have been trained, and have been assigned operational missions in the active Army.

b. The Army's SURFACE-TO-SURFACE MISSILE requirements include —

(1) SHORT RANGE. Assault or demolition guided missiles to be used against armor and fortifications.

(2) MEDIUM-RANGE. Missiles to supplement and extend the range of firepower of artillery cannon, to provide close or inter-

mediate support of deep penetrations or airheads, from protected and widely dispersed rear areas; and of delivering accurate fire on distant targets which are capable of affecting the execution of the Army's combat mission.

c. The Army's SURFACE-TO-AIR missile requirements include land based antiair missiles for defense against high, medium, or low altitude aircraft, drones, or artillery missiles. Surface-to-air missiles should also have a surface-to-surface role when feasible.

5. Command responsibilities. The Commanding General, Continental Army Command, is re-

sponsible for the development of training programs and tactical doctrine for Army missile units. The Commanding General, Army Antiaircraft Command, commands all surface-to-air missile units now deployed in defense of the continental United States, and is responsible for developing and coordinating plans for the employment of these units in implementing the continental air defense mission. The Chief of Research and Development, Department of the Army, has the mission of research and development on a priority basis to attain increased Army missile capabilities.



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
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
