



Developed At Redstone-- LITTLE JOHN ROCKET UNVEILED

NEW DIGITAL STRAIN RECORDER IS BRAIN CHILD OF BROOKS

Every day brings new and startling developments in the progress of the nation's newest weapon — the guided missile — at the Army Ballistic Missile Agency in Huntsville, Ala.

Recently, when the demand rose for a faster, more efficient way to test the strain resulting from loads on the body of a missile as it travels through space at a terrific rate of speed, a conscientious, hard-working young man in the Measuring Unit of the Structures and Mechanics Laboratory came up with the answer—the automatic digital strain recorder.

The father of this remarkable machine is Tommy Brooks, a native of the City of Huntsville.

Mr. Brooks, who has been with the Measuring Unit of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency for three years, has spent many of his off-duty hours — hours he could have been sleeping — working on this problem.

The automatic digital strain recorder stands five feet tall and seven feet long. Its function is to tabulate the strain of various points on a missile structure while the structure is being put through a firing similarity test. It will perform with accuracy the duties of four men in one-tenth the time.

Strain as indicated by 200 strain gauges placed inside and outside the huge body is picked up and passed through lead wires to a master trunk which is connected to the recorder. When pressure is applied to the body—even the slightest pressure — if any specific point is weaker or "gives" more than any other part of the body, the strain gage recorder will convert this information into digital form which is then transferred to a tabulator where it is automatically recorded in duplicate for future study.

A strong body is essential if the missile is to travel at several times the speed of sound in atmospheres that have yet to be reached. That is why the scientists and near-scientists in the Army Ballistic Missile Agency work constantly to improve the metals, alloys and structural configuration of the missile body. It

Development of the Little John was started by Rocket Development Laboratories last February on a "crash program" basis. It was test fired in June, four months later.

Another weapon demonstrated at the Ordnance meeting was the "Dart" antitank missile which was developed by the Aerophysics Development Corp., Santa Barbara, Calif., under the direction of Redstone's Ordnance Missile Laboratories.

Little John is a 12½" rocket, about 12 feet long, packing the explosive power of heavy artillery. Designed to be transported by helicopter, the new weapon is to be used in Army light airborne operations.

Maj. Gen. H. N. Toftoy, Redstone commander, had high praise for the Redstone team which pushed Little John through the development and testing stages in record time.

"The Rocket Development Laboratories," he said, "have done an outstanding job in a remarkably short time. This latest addition to the nation's defense weapons should prove to be very important in the Army's new mobile 'fire brigade' concept in the air age."

Rocket Development Laboratories is a part of Ordnance Missile Laboratories, which is directed by Col. Miles B. Chatfield.

The crash program made it necessary for Redstone scientists and engineers to telescope the "drawing-board-to-flight" phase to a period of several months, instead of several years.

The Little John (318mm) was demonstrated at the Maryland installation in a driving rain-

storm, showing its all-weather capabilities.

This is the second "John" free-flight rocket developed at Redstone. The first, Honest John, is of a much larger caliber and is now in the hands of troops in this country and overseas.

The Dart, also shown for the first time, is a guided missile approximately five feet long with a configuration characterized by fins crossing its waistline. It was

designed to be employed by Infantry and Armored combat units.

Dart is propelled by a rocket motor containing smokeless propellant. The missile is sufficiently maneuverable to make it relatively safe from rifle, machine gun and antiaircraft fire.

Dart project director is E. C. Sanders, of Research and Development Division.




