



## OGMS to Hold Open House on 4th Anniversary



**LONG WAY HOME**—It was the long way around by Dodd Road last week for Redstone Arsenal Headquarters Area workers when Gates 1 & 2 were closed to traffic and Patton Road lay under water at the Huntsville Creek bridge. Dodd and Patton Roads were raised as much as 3½ feet in June, 1952, yet Dodd was barely out of water when the Tennessee River crested at 572.9 feet above sea level Sat-

urday, February 2, the highest level in 30 years. Beneath the flood waters in the photo montage above are Gate 1 at upper left, Gate 2 at upper right, Patton Road at lower left, and normal traffic through these areas detouring along Dodd Road at lower right, after entering through Gates 5, 9, and 14. ## PUBLIC CAN MAKE MISSILE PICTURES

The Ordnance Guided Missile School, the Army's oldest official service school exclusively devoted to guided missile training, celebrates its fourth anniversary with open house ceremonies Sunday, February 17.

The general public is invited to attend ceremonies beginning at 1:30 p.m. and lasting until 4:00 p.m.

All unclassified missiles and equipment in use at the school will be on public display and frequent guided tours will take visitors through a classroom and laboratory building, shop building, and troop barracks.

Tours will end in the OGMS mess hall where coffee, cake and soft drinks will be served.

For one of the rare times on this security-minded installation the public will be permitted to carry personal cameras and photograph the missiles on display.

A continuous showing of a film on guided missiles will take place in the class and lab building where the tours originate.

## Incentive Awards Plan Saves Uncle Sam Money

During the calendar year 1956, the Incentive Awards Committee adopted 30% of all suggestions submitted and awarded \$7,280 in cash awards to civilian personnel at ABMA, RSA and OGMS.

The first year's tangible savings will exceed \$302,555.

Net savings on military suggestions will exceed \$3,718. Total net savings for the first year are estimated at \$306,273 plus the intangibles which cannot be measured.

This is the largest savings reported by the Incentive Awards Committee for both military and civilian suggestions. The \$7,280 in cash awards is also the largest amount reported at this installation.

The largest cash award for 1956

went to Billy Poe, an employee of Field Service Division. Mr. Poe's suggestion saved the government an estimated \$35,000 for which he received \$395.

The average cash award for an adopted suggestion is \$34. However, during the fourth quarter the average was \$40. The average (See INCENTIVE on Page 2)

## DR. M. J. ZUCROW TO ADDRESS ROCKET SOCIETY FEBRUARY 14

Dr. Maurice J. Zucrow will address the American Rocket Society at 8 p.m. Thursday, Feb. 14 in Rocket Auditorium. He will speak on "The Turbo-Jet Engine and its Development Problems as a Power Plant for Supersonic Flight."

Dr. Zucrow is Professor of Gas Turbines and Jet Propulsion at Purdue University, Lafayette, Ind. He is author of one of the most important and widely used textbooks in the field of jet propulsion, titled "Principles of Jet Propulsion and Gas Turbines." It was published in 1948.

Dr. Zucrow is on the editorial board of Jet Propulsion, the journal of American Rocket Society. In 1953 he received the Society's Pendray Award.

they will not be required to register or sign in. Guides will be posted at intersections to direct traffic towards parking areas. Once parked, visitors will be directed to the class and lab building where they will begin their tour of the school.

### New LaCrosse Can Be Seen

The world's first public display of the recently declassified LACROSSE guided missile will feature Sunday's fourth anniversary celebration at the Ordnance Guided Missile School.

The LACROSSE, a deadly accurate field artillery guided missile designed for close tactical support of ground troops in the field, will be one of four missiles on display for the general public. Other missiles to be displayed are the NIKE, AJAX, CORPORAL, and REDSTONE.

The LACROSSE, propelled in flight by a solid fuel rocket motor, is an all-weather guided missile capable of destroying enemy strong points in the field to supplement air or artillery attack.

Colonel Henry S. Newhall, Commandant of the school, has expressed a desire that, "As many people as possible attend our birthday celebration. I think it will be a valuable experience to be among the many who will participate in this first public showing of the LACROSSE guided missile. This will be a memorable event not only for the Ordnance Guided Missile School, but for the entire nation."

The Ordnance Guided Missile School was officially established February 16, 1953, though it had its beginning early in 1951 when the Ordnance Corps began planning its operation for training personnel in the field of guided missiles.

The first step was the formation of the Guided Missile Division of the Ordnance Training Command at Aberdeen Proving Ground, Maryland in 1951. In March 1952 the division was transferred to Redstone Arsenal to form the nucleus of the Provisional Redstone Arsenal School.

In 1953 the Department of the Army officially designated OGMS an Army Service School, separating it from Redstone Arsenal and placing it under the jurisdiction of the Chief of Ordnance.

The school, which graduated its 5,000th student this past August, has an average enrollment of 400 students and teaches 16 courses of instruction lasting in duration from two to 43 weeks. Missiles currently taught are the NIKE-AJAX, CORPORAL and REDSTONE, with a seven million dollar building program under way to provide for the soon-to-be-added NIKE - HERCULES, DART, SERGEANT and LACROSSE missiles.

The school, which graduated its 5,000th student this past August, has an average enrollment of 400 students and teaches 16 courses of instruction lasting in duration from two to 43 weeks. 

**'Man Still Supreme,' Col. Patterson Tells Legion Auxiliary**

Man remains the compelling weapon despite the advent of new weapons systems such as long-range missiles, Col. C. G. Patterson, chief of the Department of Army staff at the Army Ballistic Missile Agency, told the American Legion Auxiliary at a Statler Hotel meeting in Washington recently.

"The best missiles, the best weapons can be no better than the men who man them, your sons, husbands and brothers," Col. Patterson declared.

Pointing out that some 2,600

wars have been fought in the past 2,500 years, Col. Patterson recalled that new weapons have sometimes prompted dire predictions that defense is useless and that the means exist to start and end a war before an adversary recognizes that a state of war exists.

"To accept this philosophy unchallenged," he commented, "is to forget the lessons of history and forget that war is a human institution. While war may now be classified as total and aimed from the heart of one country to the heart of another, there is little doubt that the single factor which will continue to be the criterion is that man is the compelling weapon. The entire history of mankind has been a battle of offense versus defense, with neither remaining the dominant factor very long."

"We have the know how, the scientists, the engineers, the production facilities and the will to continue to enjoy our freedom. We cannot and must not plan to meet an adversary on a man to man basis. Since we believe that the state exists for the individual, rather than the individual for the state, we will never willingly sacrifice our young manhood in useless wars. To the maximum extent possible, we will expand machines and not men if we must fight."




