

## SCHOOL PUTS NIKE UNIT THROUGH SIMULATED COMBAT TRAINING TEST

Redstone Arsenal, usually thought of only as a site for the development of missiles and rockets was the scene of realistic, combat training the other day when the Ordnance Guided Missile School put a Nike unit through an Army Training Test.

It was the first time the School, a separate activity located on this sprawling reservation, had put a unit through simulated combat training.

The 162nd Ordnance Detachment (Guided Missile Direct Support) (Nike) which will be deployed to the field to support a Nike missile battalion, emerged from the test with a rating of "Satisfactory" and did "as well as we had expected," according to Maj. Kenneth F. Searcy, commander of the School's Unit Training Center.

The test, designed to determine the adequacy and status of individual and unit training and to insure uniformity of training, actually consists of two parts—one the tactical phase; the other a technical phase devoted to testing the men on their specializations in the inspection, repair, maintenance and supply of the Nike.

The 162nd, commanded by Lt. Norman K. Shanahan, began its tactical phase early in the morning and finished late at night, all the while under constant harassment by an aggressor force from the 32nd Ordnance Detachment, commanded by Chief Warrant Officer Henry D. Arrott.

Training ammunition was used throughout the exercise—but it looked and sounded like the real thing.


The combat phase began with a motor convoy which was attacked by air after it had marched only a few miles. Five vehicles were estimated "destroyed" by bags of flour dropped from the low-flying plane.

After a maintenance halt the 162nd moved toward a bivouac area, but was delayed by a booby-trapped road block, several aggressor troops, and numerous land mines and anti-personnel mines which accounted for a handful of "casualties" in both equipment and personnel.

The booby-traps and mines work on the same principle as the genuine equipment, but contain a very small explosive charge and provide mostly a scare and a large puff of white smoke.

The unit dug into its area, ate its meals under combat conditions, and underwent several aggressor attacks, during both day and night.

Other units in the Unit Training Center will undergo the Test as it becomes necessary. It gives the troops the "feel" of actual combat and helps the commanders note weaknesses within their units.

## Co-op Plan Expanded Includes Mechanical Engineers From U-A

Arrangements have been made to expand the Redstone Arsenal and Ballistic Missile Agency Co-operative Education Plan to include Mechanical Engineering students from the University of Alabama. The first group is expected to report here in July, 1957.

Dean James R. Cudworth, College of Engineering, University of Alabama, announced that the co-operative plan was being organized to give Mechanical Engineering students the opportunity of gaining practical experience relating to their major studies.

The program operates by having students presently enrolled in college alternate between the college and an industry for six months periods. Students may participate from their entry in college through their Junior year. The Senior year at Alabama must be devoted to classwork only.

## OGMS to Unveil Nike-Hercules To Public on Armed Forces Day

### MEDARIS TO TALK TO OGMS GRADS

Maj. Gen. John B. Medaris will address the first Ordnance Staff Officer Guided Missile and Special Weapons graduating class tomorrow at the U. S. Army Ordnance Guided Missile School.

General Medaris, commanding general of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency, will be making his second commencement address at the School. He spoke upon the graduation of the 5,000th student last September.

The graduation will bring to a close 18 weeks of instruction in which 15 officers ranging from captains to a lieutenant colonel, "pioneered" in this new approach to officer training in the guided missile field.

The course brought together for the first time missiles and special weapons (nuclear and atomic materials). Graduates are prepared for important assignments such as executive officer, operations officer, operations officer, or commanding officer of missile battalions and groups, and staff officers of higher headquarters.

Instruction in the course was given with the presumption that the students had no previous guided missile or electronics training, thus making it possible for the Army to draw outstanding officers from other fields and give them the knowledge with which to supervise an Ordnance guided missile unit.

The Army's newest addition in the field of supersonic weapons will be unveiled here Armed Forces Day by the U. S. Army Ordnance Guided Missile School.

The School, which displayed the Dart and LaCrosse missiles to the public for the first time in February will score another first with the initial public showing of the Nike-Hercules, a long range anti-craft weapon.

The Hercules, an improved version of the NIKE-AJAX, will join the Ajax and Corporal missiles as part of the School's display of equipment in the downtown area of Huntsville, Saturday, May 18.

Army Ordnance will also display a Hercules at Andrews Air Force Base, Washington, D. C., on Armed Forces Day.

Known as the Nike-B during its development, the Hercules is capable of many times the destructive power of the Ajax, is more highly maneuverable, and travels at a higher velocity. It is capable of being equipped with nuclear components.

The Hercules is considerably longer and more than twice the diameter of the Ajax, which has guarded key cities and strategic areas around the nation for the past three years.

Modifications in existing equipment make it possible to integrate the Hercules into existing NIKE batteries, since both the Ajax and Hercules can be fired with the same basic equipment.

The Ordnance Guided Missile School, the Army's oldest service school devoted exclusively to guided missiles, is integrating the Hercules into its Anti-Aircraft Missile courses which previously were concerned only with the Ajax.

### ORDNANCE MARKS 145TH BIRTHDAY

The Army Ordnance Corps will complete 145 years of service on May 14.

These have been "145 years devoted to supplying the world's finest Army with the world's best weapons and Ordnance equipment," said Lt. Gen. E. L. Cummings, Chief of Ordnance, in a letter to all Ordnance personnel.

Ordnance also proudly serves the Navy, Marines, and Air Force, as well as allied nations, he said.

"Our record is a team record—for Army Ordnance is composed not only of our Ordnance military and civilian personnel, but also of the members of American science and industry," Gen. Cummings said.

"For the future, we pledge to continue providing the Army with unsurpassed firepower and mobility."

## BY POST ENGINEER EXTERMINATORS

### 'War' Is Declared on Groundhogs

Post Engineers are confident that Redstone Arsenal can get along next Spring without the services of that proverbial weather forecaster, the groundhog.

For two months now the Insect and Rodent Control Unit has been waging all-out warfare against this earth-burrowing creature in the igloo area in the sprawling southern part of the Arsenal.

The groundhogs have an unexplainable affinity for the earth mounded over these concrete storage buildings for rockets, shells, and explosives, called igloos. They never burrow in the level ground in that area. But after their attack, an igloo takes on the appearance of a sponge. As many as 20 openings have been found in one igloo.

Leon Towery of Post Engineers

has surmised that the intelligent groundhogs burrow in the igloos to avoid flooding of their subterranean living room by rain water, because the loose earth is softer, and because it affords them a lookout for approaching danger.

Mr. Towery says that one groundhog will perch atop an igloo as lookout. When danger approaches, he whistles a warning and dives for the nearest opening in the ground. "If you get between him and the hole, he will run over you getting in," Mr. Towery says.

The igloo area — thousands of acres — abounds with rabbits, possums, foxes, quail, crows — and groundhogs. The groundhogs were singled out for destruction by the otherwise nature-loving

engineers for three reasons:

1. To open burrows pose a hazard to personnel and livestock, according to the Arsenal Safety Office.

2. The groundhogs were damaging the waterproof membrane made of tar-soaked cloth over each igloo, letting dampness in.

3. Their trails were causing erosion.

The Insect and Rodent Control Unit, headed by J. L. York, chose as its weapon carbon monoxide. Mr. York fitted a hose to the exhaust of a jeep. The other end is shoved down the groundhog hole, and dirt packed around it. Then the jeep motor is started, with the choke pulled out slightly. Other openings to the burrow are (See 'WAR' on Page 2)

A two man crew treats an average of 94 burrows a day. There are almost 400 igloos in that area, and the crew has now started around the second time. They are finding few new openings, and the groundhog will soon disappear from the Arsenal scene.

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
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## Burns Is Top Speaker At Toastmaster Meet

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

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

# Hobby Shop Is Hub Of Varied Activities

Anything can happen at the Post Hobby Shop. Drag racers tune up their cars, men build boats, children learn to sketch, and sculptors practice their art.

The shop craft director is Robert Henson, who has been connected with the Hobby Shop since last August. It is one of the many Special Services activities, and is getting a good play, according to Mr. Henson.

One man and his wife didn't like letter writing. So, to get the news home once a week, they designed a coffee table with a tape recorder built in and are now working on a speaker cabinet. On the other end of the line, their parents play the tapes, erase them, talk for 15 minutes, mail them back and everybody is abreast of the news.

Last Saturday a sergeant launched the "Whatzit", a boat crafted at the Post Hobby Shop.

Another soldier designed a desk with his hi-fi cabinet built in so that his equipment fits into his house trailer.

The cost of materials in the small crafts shop is about 40 per cent less when purchased through the Hobby Shop.

The shop is open to all of the military and their dependents over sixteen. Younger children must be accompanied by their parents or a supervisor. During the Christmas season last year, the Girl Scouts were admitted to the leather-working and copper-hammering sections under the direction of Mrs. William R. Hahn and Mrs. Eugene B. Dares. The experiment was a happy one and the girls were able to make their own Christmas gifts.

Around Christmas season, the ceramics section also has proved

popular, although the potter's wheel is being used the year around by a few. One lieutenant and his wife even branched into sculpting larger than life-size heads of each other.

Equipment for gem cutting is on order.


Plastic models of cars and boats are being built, but the greatest interest lies in model airplane-making in this section. Plans are underway to hold an airplane contest next June. (The Hobby Shop is even considering a road race on the arsenal if enough interest is elicited by the enthusiasts in this field).

Classes in drawing and painting are held regularly.

The automotive shop has six bays with enough equipment to do a complete tune-up job on the family car and is partially self-supporting through the sale of spare parts. The sports car men also use it to check out before a race. Hand tools are checked out through a regular stock clerk, a practice also followed in the woodworking shop.

In the wood-working shop the basic materials are supplied by the individuals, but a few accessories such as glue, sandpaper, nails, screws, and other small items are stocked. Equipment for both metal and wood such as power saws and lathes are available for the "do-it-yourself" individuals.

The shop building number is 646. There is still room for expansion in equipment and people, and the craft director is planning with the heads of the Special Services Office, Capt. Frederick Davis and Lt. Donald Riggins, to make those plans reality.



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## ARMY ADOPTS NEW, LIGHTER RIFLE

Washington (AFPS) — Adoption of a lighter, test-proven, American-made rifle, the T-44, for combat troops rounds out the Army's modernized small arms weapons system.

The rifle, which replaces four current shoulder weapons, and the earlier adopted M-60 general purpose machine gun gives the new small arms system many advantages, according to the Army.

Although only limited numbers of the T-44 have been produced for test purposes, the Army plans to request appropriations in the FY 1959 budget to manufacture the rifle in quantity.

The T-44 has been tested since 1952 in competition with a similar new rifle produced by Fab-

rique Nationale, a Belgian munitions company. Both weapons were subjected to exhaustive tests under all conditions by troops in the Arctic, tropical and temperate zones.

Performance of both rifles was superior to that of the M-1, the Army said. Between the two the differences were "only marginal."

Major factors favoring the T-44, according to the Army, are that it is one pound lighter than either the M-1 or the European rifle, and is considered better suited for "American transition to both mass production and training" than the Belgian design.



They're not sure they have carried this 'good soldier' business too far, as '47' recalls. "In basic training, when one of us had KP, we used to take a half-a-day each; no one caught on and it made the duty easier."

The brothers are the sons of Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Stewart of Neshoba, Miss. Their father is a twin who also has the same first name as his brother.

If '47' or '55' were to have twin sons, would they follow the family tradition and give them the same name?

"Not on your life; that tradition has ended," they said in unison.

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**ATOMIC AGE BY-PRODUCT 'READS'  
RADIATION ABSORPTION AT GLANCE**

FORT MONMOUTH, N.J.— A simple, pocket-scale gadget resembling a fountain pen that gives an immediate reading of the amount of gamma radiation the body has absorbed has been perfected for the Army and Civil Defense.

This new device, which will replace the photographic badge dosimeter used formerly by military and civilian personnel at atomic and hydrogen bomb tests, has had exhaustive testing by the Signal Corps Engineering Laboratories here, at the Nevada Test Site, and at Eniwetok Atoll.

The "fountain pen dosimeter," as it is known in the Army weighs just under two ounces, is about four and a half inches long and one-half inch thick. Like its namesake or a clinical thermometer, it is worn clipped to the shirt pocket.

An easy-to-read scale ranging up to 600 roentgens reveals the total radiation the body has been exposed to over the time the dosimeter has been carried. A medically recognized dosage is about 25 roentgens; the first signs of

radiation sickness appear at around 100; and 50 percent of those exposed will die usually after absorption of 400 or more roentgens.

The new dosimeter is a sturdy device. Signal Corps tests here demonstrate that it works perfectly after being thrown 20 feet against a solid wall or dropped on a concrete floor. It operates also after immersion in water or at high altitudes, and is unaffected by the arctic cold or desert heat.

Its advantages over the photographic badge dosimeter, which deteriorates under normal heat and under long storage, is that it can be stored indefinitely and does not react to temperature changes.

In addition, after its original electric charge, the instrument can be used for years with infrequent recharge. The photographic emulsions in the old badge had to be replaced once they had been developed.

Once the dosimeter is charged, it can be read at any time. The user merely peers through a lens

**SEC. WILSON NOT TOSSING CORDINER RECOMMENDATIONS 'OVERBOARD'**

Washington (AFPS) — Secretary of Defense Charles E. Wilson says he does not intend to throw the Cordiner Committee recommendations "overboard."

Despite the fact that proposed pay legislation based on the study has failed to clear the Bureau of the Budget, he said he is trying to "understand the temper" of what can be done during this session of Congress.

Mr. Wilson conceded to newsmen at his latest press conference that he is not as optimistic about getting a pay bill enacted this year as he had been previously.

"How much we can do without increasing the budget is the question," he explained.

But, he said, "I am still working to see how much" of the Cordiner plan "can be implemented this year"—and how much can be introduced in 1958.

The Department of Defense is trying to "pinpoint" what should be done to solve all the manpower problems, he added.

Mr. Wilson said obviously the entire Cordiner proposal to revamp the military pay structure

could not be implemented without "seemingly" giving everyone in the service a wage increase, which would be considered inflationary.

The Director of the Budget made no recommendations in turning down new pay legislation, he said.

"That is not his department," Mr. Wilson declared.

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


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# At The Service Club

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
**NEW MEDICARE RULING ANNOUNCED FOR DEPENDENT PARENTS, IN-LAWS**

Washington (AFPS) — Dependent parents and parents-in-law who actually do not reside with members of the Armed Forces have been declared eligible for medical attention at service hospitals.

Prior to a recent interpretation of the Dependents' Medical Care Act, a dependent parent was required to live in the household of the service sponsor to receive treatment at government expense. Under the new ruling, according

to the Defense Department, if a serviceman or a retired member of the Armed Forces provides or maintains a place of residence for his dependent father or mother, regardless of its location they may receive medical care at service facilities.

The Defense Department emphasizes, however, that these dependents do not qualify for treatment in civilian hospitals or by civilian physicians under the Dependents' Medical Care Program.






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


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
