## 'Royal Treatment' Set For Top Post Soldiers

The Huntsville Chamber of Commerce and the Russel Erskine Hotel have initiated a program to pay tribute to the post's top soldiers.

In addition to the royal treatment that the Soldier of the Month will receive on the post, he and his family will be invited to spend a three-day weekend at the Russel Erskine. Rooms, meals, and room service will be contributed by Jimmie Taylor, manager of the Russel Erskine.

For this same weekend, local automobile dealers will furnish the lucky soldier with a car, for which gasoline will be freely supplied. Local merchants will shower the soldier and his family

with gift certificates.

A Soldier of the Quarter will be selected from one of the three soldiers of the month, and he, his wife, and children will be provided free rooms, meals, and spending money for three days at one of the best hotels in the major city or resort of his choice within a 200-mile radius of Huntsville. Again, he will be supplied with a car, gasoline, and gift certificates by Huntsville merchants.

On the post, the soldier of the month receives a check for \$25, is relieved of all fatigue duties such as kitchen police for 30 days, and lives for a month in the privacy of "The Honor Room" in Bldg. 680. This room is resplendent with carpets, curtains, overstuffed chairs, reading lamps, desk, fan, and poster bed with inner-spring mattress.

## CWO Stensby Receives Silver Star Medal

A stranger-than-fiction war story which began in the Philippines in 1942 ended Saturday at the Ordnance Guided Missile School with the presentation of the Silver Star to Chief Warrant Officer John L. Stensby.

Stensby, a native of Milwaukee, Wis., and a veteran of 18 years Army service, received his decoration for gallantry in action during a Japanese bombing attack at Mariveles, Jan. 29, 1942.

Then a technical sergeant, Stensby, though suffering severe head wounds, organized available personnel and isolated a fire caused by incendiary bombs which had struck an ammunition dump.

With ammunition exploding throughout the area, and with the area still under attack by Japanese bombers, Stensby and his companions risked their lives and saved most of the vitally needed ammunition, as well as a considerable portion of Mariveles.

He was presented his decoration in a ceremony under combat conditions in the jungle. But, since the medal itself was not available, he received only a certificate confirming the award.

Shortly afterwards the Philippines fell to the Japanese and, though Stensby managed to escape to Corregidor, all records of

## CEREMONY SET AT AOA MEET

### Missile Display Is Also Scheduled

The dedication of Vincent Hall and one of the world's largest displays of guided missiles will highlight the three-day meeting of the American Ordnance Association's Guided Missile Branch here 11-13 June.

The building dedication, in memory of the late Brig. Gen. Thomas K. Vincent, first commanding general of Redstone Arsenal, and the missile display will be held at the Ordnance Guided Missile School the afternoon of June 12.

Lt. Gen. Emerson L. Cummings, Chief of Ordnance, and Frank H. Higgins, Assistant Secretary of the Army, will attend both the dedication and display.

Bldg. 683, a new class and laboratory building housing the School's Surface to Air Missile Division, will become Vincent Hall. Col. Henry S. Newhall, commandant of OGMS, will deliver the main address and unveil the plaque dedicating the building.

Following the dedication, guests will be conducted through the building where they will view demonstrations of both the track and acquisition radars used in the Nike missile system, and a film and commentary on the Sergeant missile.

Located on an asphalt hardstand behind Vincent Hall will be displays of the Redstone, Corporal, Nike-Ajax, Nike-Hercules, Little John, Honest John, Lacrosse, and Dart missiles. Classified displays of both the Hawk and Talos missiles will be located in a shop building on the other side of the hardstand.

In conjunction with the missile displays will be a five-minute commentary and a two-minute film on each missile.

Members of AOA are expected to arrive at OGMS at 2:20 p.m. The dedication of Vincent Hall will take place between 2:40 and 3, following which viewing of missile displays will continue until 4:30.

Gen. Vincent, who commanded Redstone between 1952 and 1954, was born in Dayton, Ohio, on October 3, 1895. He died at his home in Virginia on Sept. 9, 1956. Following his retirement from the Army in 1954 he became the director of the Technical Division and Committees for the American Ordnance Association in Washington.

## AOA CONFERENCE HERE NEXT WEEK

### 150 Due to Discuss Missile Development

More than 150 top representatives of the three services, Department of Defense, and private industry will attend the American Ordnance Association's three-day meeting on guided missiles here, June 11-13.

The theme for the classified conference of the guided missile branch of the AOA's rocket and guided missile division is "Design Efficiency and Production Economy."

Frank H. Higgins will be the guest speaker at a joint banquet with the Huntsville chapter, AOA, to be held at the Officers' Club Wednesday night, June 12. Mr. Higgins, a frequent visitor to the Arsenal, has been Assistant Secretary of the Army for Logistics and Research and Development since 1954.

Mr. Higgins has held vital executive positions in private industrial firms, and served as a colonel in the Army from 1942 to 1945. He was awarded the Legion of Merit for his accomplishments while serving as assistant to the Chief of Ordnance during World War II.

Conferees include Maj. Gen. Emerson L. Cummings, Chief of Ordnance; Rear Admiral John E. Clark, Director, Guided Missile Division, USN; and Leo Codd, editor of the AOA Magazine.







(Continued From Page 1) his decoration were either lost or destroyed. And, his personal records suffered the same fate when he was captured upon the fall of Corregidor.

After spending three years in Japanese prison camps and suffering numerous beatings, tortures, and what became known during the Korean conflict as "brainwashing," Stensby was repatriated at the end of the War in 1945.

He later discovered there was no record of his Silver Star—the men in his unit were either dead, missing, or unidentified. And so, the matter was pretty much forgotten about until last year while Stensby was serving at Fort Mon-

mouth, N. J.

On a liaison trip to Washington, D. C., for the Signal Corps Electronic Laboratory, Stensby discovered a Col. William H. Masello working in the office of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. It suddenly came to Stensby that Col. Masello (then Capt. Masello) had been one of his commanders in the Philippines. They were both surprised to find the other still alive.

From there on it was easy. Stensby wrote the Adjutant General and referred to Col. Masello. The award and citation were forwarded shortly after Stensby was transferred to the Signal Corps Electronic Training Detachment here at the Ordnance Guided Missile School.

The period between Stensby's heroism at Mariveles and his repatriation in 1945 is a story in itself.

Stensby, Chief of the Communications Section, Battery E, 60th Coast Artillery Anti-Aircraft Regiment, had been sent to the front with instructions to destroy American equipment in case the Japanese broke through the lines.

By the time he and his men, including stragglers picked up along the way, had returned to Mariveles, his unit had evacuated and Japanese were advancing on all sides. After two hours of trying, he managed to tap a telephone line and contact Corregidor. He found that the Bataan Peninsula he and his men were on had fallen to the Japanese the day before.

His party of 40 managed to head through the jungle to the coast, find an abandoned Navy craft and get to Corregidor under heavy shelling by the Japanese.

On Corregidor he found his unit, which had taken over Bat-

tery Way, a 12 inch mortar gun battery. Battery Way was the last to cease firing when Corregidor fell to the Japanese.

Stensby was taken prisoner on May 6, 1942 and later moved to Cabanatuan Prison Camp in Luzon. On his birthday, Sept. 20, 1942, he was moved to Formosa where he and other prisoners hauled rocks in the river beds. He was taken to Yokohama Prison Camp on Thanksgiving Day, 1942, to work in the Yokohama Shipyards, and was moved to Sendai Prison Camp to work in the coal mines when the Air Force bombed out Yokohama in 1945.

He and his companions, through sabotage, managed to decommission an aircraft carrier and disable a destroyer while working in the shipyards.

He was repatriated about one month after the War ended. After eating nothing by three bowls of rice a day throughout his imprisonment, he weighed less than 100 pounds upon his release.

Currently an instructor in the Surface-to-Air Missile Division of OGMS, Stensby has served overseas in Panama, continental Europe and England, Japan and Okinawa since his release in 1945.

He is married to the former Irene Mark, daughter of Mrs. Selma Mark of Bessemer, Mich. The couple has three children, Ginger, age 10, John, age eight, and James, age six, and lives at 412 Green Acres, Huntsville.







## Management Classes Offered on Arsenal By U. of Alabama

Two courses in management are being offered here by the University of Alabama this summer, according to announcement made by Dean Paul Garner of the School of Commerce and Business Administration at the University.

A graduate course entitled Industrial Organization (Mgt. 215) will include, among some 15 topics of study, Background of Organization and Scientific Management, Principles of Authority, Responsibility, and Accountability, Process of Delegation of Authority, Span of Control, Development of Coordination and Control, Development of Operations Research and its Applications. Study in this course is open to qualified graduates interested in the master's degree and to other graduates who meet University prerequisites for the course. It will be taught at Redstone Arsenal as part of the Graduate Study Program.

A second course, Motion and Time Study (Mgt. 112) is a general course in fundamentals of operation analysis, motion economy, micro-motion, time study, job standards, fatigue and industrial efficiency. Persons meeting University requirements may take this course for credit. This class

will be taught at the University Center as part of the regular program and is open to qualified persons in business and industry in this area.

Charles R. Scott, Jr., associate professor of Management at the University is coming to Huntsville to teach these courses. Mr. Scott is a native of New Jersey and was educated at Cornell. He has been connected with the University of Alabama since 1949. Currently he is serving as president of the Alabama Chapter of the Society for the Advancement of Management. He is also a member of the Academy of Management and the Southern Economics Association, and is president of the University unit of A.E.A.

Registration will be held June 13-14 at the University Center. Classes will begin Monday, June 17, and continue until August 27. Management 251, Industrial Organization, will meet at Bldg. T-152 from 5:30 to 7:30, Mondays and Wednesdays.

Management 112, Motion and Time Study, will meet at the University Center in Butler High School from 8 to 10, Mondays and Wednesdays.

Further information concerning these courses may be obtained from University Center offices, JE 6-1596 or Bldg. T-152 on the Arsenal, ext. 2448.





## Toastmasters Clubs Increasing Rapidly In Armed Forces

A rapidly growing movement in the armed forces is the formation of Toastmasters Club. There are now approximately 225 in the services, out of a total of 2,500 in the U. S. and overseas.

The Air Force leads with 135 clubs, while Navy has approximately 50, and the Marines and Army have about 20 each.

These pleasant inexpensive

clubs provide enjoyable off-duty activities for members. The organization on an armed forces installation is simple. Only 20 members are needed. The maximum desirable number is 50 so that everyone has a chance to speak.

The initiation fee and annual dues are set by each club. Generally the initiation fee is from \$3 to \$10, with monthly dues \$1. This modest cost makes it possible for inexpensive speech-leadership training.

With this investment each member receives a manual which illustrates 12 important phases of public speaking and provides a suggested outline to be followed in giving a speech on each phase.
