The parade and ceremony will take place on the Redstone Arsenal parade grounds. It will be open to the public.

Commanders of the Reserve and National Guard Units in Huntsville, city and county officials, and representatives of business and industry have been invited.

In the event of inclement weather, the ceremony will be held in the Post Theater. Accommodations would be limited.

The missile group is the first Army unit now in training under the guidance of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency to operate the Redstone Ballistic Missile system in the field.

For this occasion entrance to the Arsenal for the public will be via Gate 1, reached by the Memorial Parkway.

Two OGMS Soldiers Suffer Injuries in Traffic Accidents

Two Ordnance Guided Missile School soldiers are in the Post Infirmary as a result of traffic accidents during the past week.

Pvt. Carl S. Murdock, of Dallas, Texas, suffered a broken back contusions, and an injured arm when he was struck from behind by a hit-and-run driver while walking along the edge of Jordan Lane Friday night. He is on the hospital's "seriously ill" list, but his condition was termed "satisfactory" at Rocket press time.

Sfc. Evan D. Arnold of Bothell, Wash., suffered a crushed chest and fractured ankle in an automobile collision last Wednesday. He also is on the "seriously ill" list, but his condition was called "fair" at press time.

Murdock told investigators he was hit from behind at about 8:05 p.m. Friday, and knocked from the road. He said he did not see the vehicle.

Three witnesses to the incident, one of whom carried the injured soldier to the Redstone hospital, could not offer definite descriptions of the car or its driver.

The provost marshal is investigating.

FLANAGAN HEADS CIVILIAN TRAINING FOR REDSTONE

Electronic System Coordinating Firing Of Army Missiles

WASHINGTON — The Missile Master, the Army's electronic system for controlling and coordinating the fire of Army Nike antiaircraft batteries guarding key U. S. cities, will also coordinate the Hawk, recently developed low altitude air defense missile.

The Hawk is capable of destroying attacker's flying at low altitudes and will complement the defense against high-level attacks provided by the Nike system. Missile Master is a vital support system for the two missiles and other Army advanced weapons as they become available, giving the nation all-altitude defense against aerial attack.

The Missile Master collects information on the location of aircraft and their identity, present it on electronic displays, and distributes this data to the missile firing batteries.

Each battery receives a continuous flow of fresh information on all aircraft approaching or within the defense area, and on cooperating batteries' activities. Thus each battery commander is provided all the information needed to make proper target selections.

Operators observe the activities of all batteries in the system and are able to direct a specific fire unit to a particular target, or prevent firing on friendly planes.

The second commemorative set of stamps issued by the U. S. was the Trans-Mississippi Expo-

sition Issue of 1898. This set was issued to honor the Trans-Mississippi Exposition held in Omaha, Nebraska from June 1 to November 1, 1898. The set included the 1c, 2c, 4c, 5c, 8c, 10c, 50c, \$1.00, and \$2.00.

These stamps are picturesque but not particularly colorful. Few varieties are known. Mint copies today catalogue from \$1.50 for the 1c to \$110.00 for the \$2.00 and good copies sell for just about catalogue value. Used copies run from 20c to \$75.00 and retail prices are just about equal to the catalogue prices.

POOLING OF NATIONAL GUARD TANKS, ARTILLERY SAVES \$181,922 IN YEAR

HEADQUARTERS 3RD UNITED STATES ARMY, Fort McPherson, Ga. — A system of pooling National Guard tanks and heavy artillery in the Southern states is saving taxpayers \$181,922 this year, according to a re-

port made to Third U. S. Army Headquarters.

ment for summer training at Ft. Stewart, Ga.



Army's First Test With Guided 'Fish' Netted No Result

FORT TOTTEN, N. Y. — The Army tested a guided missile to guard New York City's harbor back in 1880. It was a real guided missile, too, this "Sims Electrical Fish Torpedo."

Based on the principle of the by then crudely developed torpedo, the missile was 28 feet long, 18 inches in diameter, carried a 200-pound war-head, weighed 3200 pounds, and was powered by an electric dynamo.

It attained a speed of 11.29 knots at its usual depth of five feet under the water and had steel blades affixed allowing it to penetrate minor obstacles. Detonation was not on impact but was under the control of its operator.

The "fish" could be fired from ship or shore by the operator, who followed its path by observing a signal flag waving from the missile. Control was maintain-

ed through a current-carrying cable which extended with the missile for the length of its mile-long run.

At the time of its development steam-powered warships posed a formidable threat to New York Harbor. To supplement the Army's coast artillery defenses against sea-based attacks, a call went out for an anti-ship weapon.

First the Army tried mines but they were inadequate. In the event one or two were detonated the ensuing gap would permit passage of a ship. Experts felt the mobile torpedo was the answer. But they proved equally ineffective, having a tendency at that time to exhaust their fuel before reaching their target.

Inventor Winfield S. Sims thought that he had the answer with his "fish". Under the supervision of Brevet Brigadier General Henry S. Abbott, post commander of Fort Totten's predecessor, then known as the Fort at Willett's Point, the "fish" underwent many test firings over a period of two years.

The project was eventually dropped, and New York was never attacked from the sea. However the missile tradition has continued at Fort Totten, which is now headquarters for all Army Nike guided missile units in northeastern United States.



CLASSES BEGUN TO TRAIN ARTILLERY SPECIALISTS IN MISSILE OPERATION

Classes were begun here recently to train U. S. Army personnel as artillery specialists in the operation of the Redstone missile. The first course of instruction was opened by Brig. Gen. J. A. Barclay, deputy commander of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency.

Training is conducted by the Field Artillery Instructional Detachment (Redstone), under the command of Lt. Col. Richard G. McEwan. The Detachment is a part of the Ft. Sill, Okla., Artillery and Guided Missile School, but is attached to ABMA for administration. Redstone Arsenal has been chosen as the site of training because of the availability of Redstone missiles and of the launching and handling equipment.

A total of 22 military instructors has been assigned to present the Artillery course.

The initial class is composed of nine officers ranging in rank from lieutenant to lieutenant colonel, who will attend five weeks' training.

Regular classes for enlisted personnel will begin Sept. 30. After the period of instruction here, the students will return to Ft.

Sill for further training.



RED CROSS OFFICE ON POST GAVE SERVICES TO 222 IN THREE MONTHS

The Red Cross office on the Arsenal gave services to 222 persons during the months of June, July, and August.

These services included counseling, personal and family problems, communications, emergency reporting, loans and referrals. Twenty-two servicemen received loans amounting to \$970, and one grant was made, for \$30.00. Other requests for Red Cross assistance for families living in town were referred to the local chapter of the American Red Cross.

Communication services have been and are available through the 3,800 Red Cross chapters and the overseas offices of the Red Cross. An average of 50 messages was handled by the Arsenal office per month. This service is available day and night.

The volunteer program has shown rapid growth on the Arsenal. Gray Ladies, Staff Aides, Nurses Aides, volunteer nurses, and other volunteers were organized for work under the leadership and guidance of Mrs. R. N. Flint, chairman of volunteers; Mrs. M. H. Clark, Gray Lady chairman; Mrs. R. R. Daniels, vice-chairman of the Gray Lady Service; and Mrs. J. H. Goe-wey, chairman of the Staff Aides. The new class of Gray Ladies trained under Mrs. Clark's and Mrs. Flint's supervision will receive their caps and certificates soon.

Mrs. L. W. Hall replaced Mrs. Flint as chairman of volunteers in June. She advises that a class of staff aides will be trained in the early Fall, to replace those who have been transferred to other places. The Gray Ladies serve in the hospital under the supervision of the chief nurse, and in the Bloodmobile; the staff aides have assisted in the Bloodmobile visits and in the Red Cross office; volunteer nurses assist in the Bloodmobile program.

Mrs. Hall advises that Mrs. Clark, Mrs. Daniels, Mrs. Goe-wey, Mrs. J. T. Newman (chairman of the volunteer nurses), and Mrs. J. G. McNeil (co-chairman to Mrs. Hall) will serve in the capacity of leaders for the different Red Cross Volunteer Services.

A total of 140 volunteers gave 1,020 hours to volunteer services in Red Cross during the three months reported. Five servicemen received Senior Life Saving and Water Safety Certificates; 53 Girl Scouts received Red Cross swimming certificates; 23 persons received First Aid certificates.

Two Bloodmobile visits were made during this period, 376 pints of blood were donated in June and 576 pints in August. Both of these visits broke the records for all-time high. The blood program on the Arsenal is directed by Maj. Russell A. Bergmann, his staff of officers, enlisted men, and clerical workers, assisted by coordinators from both civilian and military personnel and volunteers

from the Arsenal and Huntsville. The donors include military and civilian personnel of Redstone Arsenal. Publicity was done by Lt. Col. J. G. McNeil, chairman for the Blood program publicity.

The recent Hurricane Audrey caused a major disaster in Louisiana and Mississippi. Families of some of the Redstone personnel were in the effected areas. One transportation loan was made to

enable a serviceman to go home to see about his family when all means of communications were destroyed and he was unable to contact his family. A donation of \$164.44 from Redstone Arsenal was sent to assist in relieving the suffering caused by this disaster. Of this amount, \$142.44 was donated by the Catholic and the Protestant Chapel Funds.
