Ordnance Industrial Conference Due Here

McELROY, PARTY DUE HERE FRIDAY

The incoming Secretary of Defense, Neil H. McElroy, is scheduled to arrive here Friday for an inspection tour of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency and Redstone Arsenal. He will depart Saturday morning.

Accompanying Mr. McElroy will be Murray Snyder, Assistant Secretary for Public Affairs; Brig. Gen. Carey Randall, USMC, military assistant to Secretary of Defense Charles E. Wilson; and Oliver Gale, special assistant to Mr. McElroy.

The group will be joined here by Secretary of the Army Wilber M. Brucker and Gen. Lyman L. Lemnitzer, Army Vice Chief of Staff. Other Army members of the party will include Dr. William H. Martin, Director of Research and Development, and Lt. Gen. James M. Gavin, Chief of Research and Development.

SEVEN COLLEGES SERVICING ABMA

Seven colleges and universities are furnishing educational services to the Army Ballistic Missile Agency under contract arrangements.

Two of the programs are at the undergraduate level. Athens College and Alabama A&M College at Huntsville provide evening school courses in physics and mathematics for selected Missile Agency employees.

Graduate level technical seminars for individuals requiring the additional training in complex missile development programs are conducted by Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Pennsylvania State University, and the University of Michigan. Ohio State University conducts a random symposium on the graduate level, for which key employees are picked.

The University of Alabama supplies an accredited graduate study program at Huntsville, plus undergraduate courses in the sciences at the Huntsville Center.

Top industrial procurement officials from the Ordnance Corps' districts and commands will attend a semi-annual Ordnance Industrial Conference at Redstone Arsenal next week.

The meeting will begin Tuesday morning and end Thursday noon.

Among those in attendance will be the Hon. Frank H. Higgins, Assistant Secretary of the Army, and Lt. Gen. E. L. Cummings, Chief of Army Ordnance. A large number of general officers from OCO and the various commands will also attend.

This is the first such meeting ever held at Redstone. As far as is known locally, it will also be the first time this twice-yearly meeting has been held at an arsenal.

The group will be welcomed Tuesday morning by Brig. Gen. J. G. Shinkle, who will be acting post commander in the absence of Maj. Gen. H. N. Toftoy.

Mr. Higgins will conduct a panel on procurement in the Army.

Moderator of the three-day session will be Brig. Gen. Francis J. McMorrow, Assistant Chief of Ordnance for Industrial. Local coordinator of the meeting is Maj. W. N. Lingenfelter, RSA Industrial Division.

The agenda will include tours of Redstone Arsenal and the Army Ballistic Missile Agency, plus a demonstration by the 217th Field Artillery Missile Battalion (Redstone). Two main social affairs, a dinner Tuesday night and a social hour—buffet Wednesday night, will be held at the Officers Club.

WORKERS WILL MEET TO LAUNCH POST CAMPAIGN

The "blast-off" for the Arsenal's second annual United Givers Fund drive will be held in Rocket Auditorium at 10 a.m. Monday, Oct. 14, according to C. W. Huth, chairman of the executive committee.









WORK SIMPLIFICATION MAKES ITS CONTRIBUTION TO AN ECONOMY MINDED GOVERNMENT — Top photo shows recent Redstone Arsenal Methods Improvement Class 35 which was composed of 12 apprentices representing various organizational elements of Redstone Arsenal and the Army Ballistic Missile Agency. The improvements brought about by members of Methods Improvement Class 35 will result in an estimated first year benefit to the government of \$15,000. 

ABMA PERSONNEL CHIEF TALKS ON SCHOOL PROBLEMS

Two major problems confront the public school system, according to Robert F. Mello, personnel chief of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency at Huntsville.

Speaking to the Morgan County Teachers Association in Hartsville last week, Mello emphasized the importance of student motivation and increasing the supply of competent teachers.

"Motivation," he said, "should begin at the lowest level in grade school where children start their formative years and begin to think about what they want to do."

He urged more interest directed towards basic sciences: physics, mathematics, chemistry, and biology. Mello suggested the child's imagination should be stimulated and that he should be counseled to seek challenging work for which he is best suited.

"We who are parents do not relinquish our responsibility when our children go to school," he commented. "We must participate in every way possible and provide motivation in the home."

Citing 1956 statistics on school


and college enrollment, Mello said the total of 41,000,000 students faces a shortage of 120,000 teachers "to say nothing of classrooms and equipment."

In 10 years, he added, there will be 100 percent increase in college enrollment, pointing up an urgent need for even more teachers at all levels.

Mello said higher salaries in industry and government are leading teachers away from schools.

"We can't afford not to provide the same incentive that took them away," he declared. "One way is more money for salaries and equipment, possibly spending less for imposing buildings and more for equipment, salaries, and needed facilities."

He urged public interest in schools, citing parent and teacher associations as an excellent med-

The heroism of a Madison County soldier during the Korea War was recognized here last week with a posthumous award of a Bronze Star Medal.

Benjamin Josey of Pleva, Ala., received the Bronze Star for the combat action of his son, Private First Class James E. Josey.

Maj. Gen. H. N. Toftoy, Redstone commander, presented the medal in the company of the soldier's immediate family and several friends. The elder Josey works as a carpenter for one of the contractors at Redstone Arsenal.

PFC Josey earned the medal for heroism in Korea in September, 1952. As he was proceeding up "Old Baldy" hill, he and his small group were pinned down by en-

emy mortar fire directed on the communication trench which they were using. This prevented any advance or evacuation of the wounded.







SCIENCE TEACHERS VISIT ARSENAL; TO STIR INTEREST AMONG STUDENTS

Ten science teachers who visited this Army missile installation last week will spend the remainder of the current school year attempting to interest more U. S. youth in scientific careers.

The 10 men talked at length with some of the foremost personalities in the world of rocketry. Beginning this week, they will spend the nine-month school term visiting high schools in 38 states. This is a joint effort of the Atomic Energy Commission and the National Science Foundation.

At the Arsenal, the teachers toured various labs and test ranges where some of the nation's latest and most effective defense weapons have been produced.

They spent more than two hours talking with two leading rocket scientists: Dr. Werner von Braun, director of Development Operations at the Army Ballistic Missile Agency, and Dr. Martin Schilling, chief of the Projects Management Staff at Redstone Arsenal.

Object of the trip here was for the visitors to see firsthand some of the remarkable achievements of science in the weapons field, and to learn directly of the increasing demand for scientific and professional personnel in government and industry.

The teachers are on one-year leaves of absence from their respective high schools. They have spent the past three months working at Oak Ridge, Tenn. They were accompanied to Huntsville by J. E. Bowles of the Institute of Nuclear Studies, who is coordi-

nator of the program.

Bowles said the men will visit as many as possible of the 3,300 high schools which have invited them this year. This is the second such effort, the program having been originated last year.

The teachers are: Ernest Stafford, Stockton, Calif.; Jack Jines, Whittier, Calif.; John Newey, of North Highland, Calif.; Harold Pluimer, Renville, Minn.; Tom Ritzinger, Rice Lake, Wis.; Irvin Hoffart, York, Neb.; John Hindman, Casa Grand, Ariz.; Kenneth Jackman, Pottstown, Pa.; William Sanford, Painted Post, N. Y.; and Donald Mayes, Mill Hall, Pa.

SEA OTTER CENSUS NEW TRAINING AID FOR ARMY FLIERS

FORT ORD, Calif. — Counting elusive sea otters off the California coast serves a dual purpose for members of the air section here. It assists scientists of the Hopkins Marine Station and California Fish and Game Commission in gaining valuable data concerning the rare mammals and simultaneously affords Army pilots training in observation and reconnaissance.

For the past seven months the pilots have flown Dr. Richard A. Booleotian of the Marine Station up and down the coast on his otter-counting expeditions, a task he once performed on foot, a difficult mission since the once-numerous animals have shunned the coast after being slaughtered almost to the point of extinction.

Inspections of nearby waters are performed by helicopters, while distant shores call for the use of long-range airplanes. Utilizing these methods, Doctor Booleotian and his Army co-workers have covered more than two-thirds of the California coast in the study.

Expeditions in search of the otter have given the Army pilots valuable opportunities to learn local terrain features and to practice finding elusive objects, lessons that will better prepare them for such combat missions as spotting targets for artillery and guided missiles and adjusting fire of these weapons.
