

Gen. Toftoy Spurs Campaign

RENEWED EFFORTS TO MEET POST UGF CAMPAIGN GOAL ARE URGED

Renewed efforts by United Givers Fund workers and Arsenal employees to reach the post's \$94,000 quota were urged by Maj. Gen. H. N. Toftoy, honorary drive chairman, at a meeting of Redstone Arsenal's solicitors and team captains in the Rocket Auditorium last Thursday.

Gen. Toftoy praised several offices in which employees were 100 per cent contributors, with gifts averaging more than \$15 per person. But he expressed disappointment and concern over contributions reported from other offices which averaged less than three dollars per giver.

"These dollar givers are reverting to the habit of giving one dollar to 15 drives, such as we had before the beginning of the United Givers Fund last year," he said. "If they gave \$15 for one drive, which covers the annual budgets of the agencies represented, we would go way over our goal." The 17 agencies are all worthy of support, he said.

"The United Givers Fund was not forced on the Arsenal," Gen. Toftoy said. "On the contrary, we were instrumental in securing it. Definite goals according to the budgets of participating agencies were set up. We have decided responsibilities to discharge toward the community, and need to raise our sights to meet our established quota."

Gen. Toftoy explained that, by Presidential order, later on envelopes will be distributed for voluntary contributions to agencies not included in the UGF drive.

The Arsenal is a permanent installation, Gen. Toftoy said, and will expand as its missions and tasks increase in weapons development. There should be no feeling of job insecurity to hamper giving, he said.

C. W. Huth, chairman of the drive's executive committee, announced that the closing date of the drive would be extended to Dec. 5 to reach the goal of \$94,000.

"By redoubling our efforts, we are confident that our goal will be reached," Huth said.

UGF REACHES \$73,000 MARK

Contributions passed the \$73,000 mark Monday afternoon in the Arsenal's United Givers Fund campaign.

This figure is just \$2,000 short of the total collected last year, but \$21,000 under this year's quota of \$94,000.

Col. Drewry Urges Teaching Ideals of American Way of Life

"To understand what freedom really is, a person must be taught the ideals and principles of the American way of life," Lt. Col. Guy H. Drewry, Jr., told the Risson School parents meeting last Friday night.

The occasion marked the observance of Nat'l Education Week. Col. Drewry's topic was: "Educated People Move Freedom Forward."

"Unless a citizen has a thorough knowledge of how precious and worthy of preservation are the inalienable rights of men as set down by our forefathers in the Constitution, he will merely accept them as most do the water we drink, only missed when there is no more," Col. Drewry commented.

"Our children must understand what they will lose if their inherited freedom to worship as they desire, their freedom of speech, right of assembly and petition, and right to a jury trial are destroyed. Only such understanding and knowledge will make them educated adults who will move freedom forward to new horizons and new heights."

Col. Drewry heads the Special Projects Office of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency.

125 AT THIOKOL LAID OFF; HOURS OF OTHERS CUT

One hundred and twenty-five non-professional employees of the Redstone Arsenal Division of the Thiokol Chemical Corporation will be laid off this week, due to "a temporary reduction of the company's scope of operations," Thiokol officials said Friday.

Also, some 865 non-professional workers — out of the total of 1,272 persons presently employed by the Arsenal contractor firm — will soon be placed on a four-day work week instead of the normal five-day period.

Both the lay-offs and the reduction in working hours are expected by the company to be "of a temporary nature, lasting only between 30 and 90 days, pending the scheduling of new projects which are expected to be activated in the near future."

The moves were forced because "the termination of work on certain projects ahead of schedule has left a gap in operations pending activation of new projects," officials explained. The largest of Redstone's on-post contractors, Thiokol carries out research and development work on solid propellants for missiles.

Neither of the changes will affect engineering and professional employees, applying solely to plant operation personnel. These are employees who are paid on a per-hour basis rather than a per-annum basis.

Nearly all of the 125 persons laid off were hired during this year. "We hope that all of these people can and will be called back, in their order of seniority, within the next one to three months," company officials said.

The lay-off notices, received Friday, are effective as of Nov. 22. The reduction in working hours becomes effective Nov. 25.

270 CAPEHART HOUSING UNITS ACCEPTED HERE

The Government last week officially accepted 270 units of family housing which have been constructed at Redstone Arsenal under the Capehart Housing Law.

Medaris Urges Broad New Scientific Approach

A broad course of action for the U. S. in the "space age" was proposed Monday by Maj. Gen. J. B. Medaris, commander of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency.

Gen. Medaris proposed the following program during an address in Detroit, Mich., to the Economic Club of Detroit:

1. Establish a central rocket development program "reaching to the stars."

2. Unmanned and manned space vehicles would be derived from this program and would offer "new concepts of peaceful as well as military power."

3. Find new ways to deal with problems requiring years for solution because such programs cannot move at maximum speed if there are barricades.

4. Integrate scientific exploration, peaceful exploitation, and military achievements into one overall program.

Reporting that progress has been achieved in "specific projects of immediate military significance," Gen. Medaris added that "whether that progress is enough, no one knows."

The Missile Agency is engaged in weaponization of the Redstone Ballistic Missile System, the Army's newest and largest weapon. It is also developing the Jupiter Intermediate Range Ballistic Missile. Recently it was directed to prepare for launching of an earth satellite.

Gen. Medaris asserted this country is behind "on the road to the further reaches of foreseeable scientific and technical capability."

"We have perhaps not read aright the signs and portents of psychotechnological warfare. We have the brains and the ability to go down that road at the fastest pace our resources will permit. We cannot produce maximum results without full continuity of effort against far-reaching objectives with the supporting research necessary to provide the means for additional giant steps."

He urged support on a continuing basis with long-range time scales and unlimited objectives "for those who have proven their capability by tangible accomplishments."

"If we acknowledge our mistakes, learn our lessons, and harden our resolve," he continued, "we certainly need not say we

MELLO URGES GIVING OPPORTUNITY FOR U. S. SCIENTISTS OF TOMORROW

"The scientist and engineer of tomorrow is in school today—it is up to us to see that he has the opportunity to be the very best," declared Robert M. Mello, personnel director of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency, in a talk to the Business and Professional Women's Club last week.

Speaking on the topic, "Career Advancement in Our Changing World," Mello emphasized the need for basic instruction at the earliest practicable age in mathematics, sciences, and foreign languages.

Referring to the scientific talent now working on Army rocket and missile programs at his Agency and Redstone Arsenal, Mello commented that "this wealth of talent must be nurtured, it must grow, it must be augmented and maintained at its high level of competence."

"The only way we can do this," he added, "is by adding new talent to the staff to replace those

who are leaving, as well as to add something to the available talent so that scientific advances in the various fields can take place and benefit all of us."

Mello listed four phases in career development: the decision phase, the academic phase, the experience phase, and the practice phase.

Citing the numbers of children who never realize their ambition to become scientists or engineers, Mello said this sometimes happens because "educational guidance fails to complement the career desires of the student; subjects are not available, and the wrong subjects are selected."

He declared that of every 10 high school pupils with capacities for engineering or scientific careers, only two graduate from college.

Inspiration should be provided in the home, he went on, as well (See MELLO on Page 3)

Dr. Killian Named To New Science Post

Washington (AFPS)—Dr. James R. Killian Jr., head of Massachusetts Institute of Technology, has been named by President Eisenhower to spearhead the US military missile development program.

The appointment of one of the country's leading scientists to the newly created post as his Special Asst. for Science and Technology was announced Nov. 7 by the President in the first of a series of nationwide radio and TV addresses on our defense posture and national security.

Mr. Eisenhower also revealed to the public a US breakthrough on one of the stiffest scientific challenges in producing ballistic missiles—the development of a successful nose cone.

"One difficult obstacle on the way to producing a useful long-range weapon," the President said, "is that of bringing a missile back from outer space without its burning up like a meteor, because of friction with the earth's atmosphere."

"Our scientists and engineers have solved that problem," he declared, as an intact nose cone about 32 inches long which actually had been returned from hundreds of miles in space was flashed on TV screens from his White House office.

Dr. Killian, president of MIT at Cambridge, Mass., since 1949, will be aided by a staff of scientists and a strong advisory group (See DR. KILLIAN on Page 3)

Eye-Witness Stories of Jupiter-C Nose Cone Recovery Told

Eye-witness accounts of the recovery of a Jupiter-C nose cone, exhibited to the American people for the first time by President Eisenhower recently, were made public last week.

Six civilian observers, representing the Army Ballistic Missile Agency, were aboard U. S. Navy ships for the purpose of witnessing the recovery operations. Sharks were in the vicinity, but proved more of a nuisance than a hazard.

The model cone was developed in support of the Jupiter Intermediate Range Ballistic Missile program being carried on by the Mis-

sile Agency, commanded by Maj. Gen. J. B. Medaris.

Success of the project demonstrated a means by which the warhead of the IRBM can be protected against the aerodynamic heating encountered when an object returns to earth's atmosphere from outer space. Without protection, the object would disintegrate.

One observer, Harry I. Thayer, of the Structures and Mechanics Laboratory in the Agency, described his experience while on the USS Peterson, 30 miles from the predicted impact point.

"I was standing on the left

bridge deck protrusion," he said, "and the nose cone appeared in the heavens a little outside the left fantail of the ship. It was at a height comparable to the moon at that hour. The cone was brilliant yellow to white hot in color and its contour was perfectly described with the nose foremost. It appeared to be dropping vertically."

The Peterson immediately turned toward the impact area at full speed. Thayer added: "We sighted the plane circling toward the floating nose cone after turning towards it and we soon sighted the smoke flares. A small light

on the balloon attached to the cone was also seen.

"Two divers, one officer and one seaman, very quickly manned their small rubber life raft and within half an hour the divers had secured the metal buoy cable. They also secured another line to the nose cone cable. There were a number of sharks in the area. Two were near the nose cone and raft during the hour the men stayed with the cone.

"One large shark just swam around close while the smaller one butted the cone a couple of times and the life raft once, for which he received a swat with a

well-directed paddle. Walkie-talkie radio gave excellent communication between the USS Peterson and the men in the raft.

"The USS Escape picked up the nose cone very efficiently and without incident. I transferred to the Escape to examine the prize and assist in measuring and packing."

R. J. Nuber, chief of the aerodynamics unit in the Missile Agency, was aboard the USS Crow. He saw a "highly illuminated object as it re-entered the atmosphere for a period of 11 seconds."

Nuber described it as "40 to 50 (See NOSE CONE on Page 2)

(Continued From Page 1) times brighter than a first magnitude star. It glowed white and appeared to increase in size."

Hugh S. McCullough, assistant recovery project engineer, who was on the communications ship, the USS Snowden, said the incandescent cone was observed by all ships including Snowden although the latter was about 120 nautical miles away. The Snowden's captain lured 20 to 25 sharks with mullet in order to give his crew rifle practice at the sharks' expense.

L. A. Soileau, stationed on the recovery ship, USS Escape, "sighted a shooting star-like streak almost directly overhead and moving at terrific velocity. A yellowish-white streak and a slight burst of blue and white color were observed."

According to Soileau, 90 minutes after the aircraft sighted the unit in the ocean, the USS Peterson had secured it with a buoy. Julian S. Hamilton of the launching and Handling Laboratory, described what he saw as a "bright meteorite" which emitted two flashes, a bluish glow and a yellowish white glow.

The other ABMA observers were E. C. Deuel, aboard the USS Huse, and E. M. Richert, on the USS Escape.

The cone was equipped with a recovery package which ejected a parachute and balloon to brake the impact when the object struck the water. Likewise, the cone fired small bombs to provide an audible signal for the Navy's waiting ships. Shark repellent was also ejected from the recovery package.

Under the Capehart plan, rental allowances of military personnel occupying quarters are applied toward the amortization of the FHA mortgage.



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

have lost a war."

The Army commander declared that "Sputniks, Muttniks, and Manniks" would develop naturally out of a long-range development program in rocketry. He warned that "he who controls outer space can dominate the whole" and said that each step toward that control becomes a powerful influence on mankind.

Discussing the exploitation of outer space vehicles, he declared the Redstone and Jupiter missile programs have maintained or exceeded time schedules. They provide reassurance, he said, of the

capability of Army scientists and technicians to move into new and advanced technologies as fast as resources allow.

He referred to satellites and space ships in these terms:

"The all-seeing eye, the weapons platform in space, the worldwide communications relay stations far out and untroubled, the perfect weather forecast, and finally the unfolding knowledge of the universe beyond the stars will have a powerful influence on human progress or human degradation.

"All of these will be the fruits of the tree if the trunk is strong and if its growth is not limited by the stops and starts of changing objectives. To reach parity, let alone achieve supremacy, and thus be able to sit in with a strong hand on the side of freedom, we must find new ways to deal with problems that require years rather than months for solution."

He paid tribute to U. S. leadership in industry and production and the utilization of machine power. He raised these questions in conclusion:

"Do we understand and dominate our machines, or have they gone beyond us because we do not understand them nor their significance?"

"Will we be limited by our imagination and determination long before we have reached the yet unseen limits of our science and technology?"

of outstanding experts particularly in the task of expediting missile weapons development by the Armed Forces.

President Eisenhower said Dr. Killian will make sure that our best talent and the full necessary resources are applied to "certain high-priority, top-secret items" that for security reasons he could not enumerate.

Defense Secretary Neil H. McElroy also has been directed, the President said, to give the Asst. to the Secretary of Defense for Guided Missiles, William M. Holaday, "all the authority that the secretary himself possesses in this field", so that no administrative or inter-service block can occur.

"The Secretary of Defense and I have agreed that any new missile or related program hereafter originated will, wherever practicable, be put under a single manager and administered without regard to the separate service," the President added.

Military scientific problems are not strange to Dr. Killian. He now heads the Army's advisory panel of scientists. He also was chairman of a government committee that recommended to the President absolute priorities for the United States' intercontinental ballistic missile and a medium-range missile to be launched from submarines.


"The greatest thing we can do is to take a personal interest in our youth and help them through their formative years to make the right decision and then see that they have an opportunity to fulfill their desire."


RSA Pistol Team Wins All Matches in Last Season Shoot

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




