**Army Is Offering Ranger, Airborne Courses to ROTC**

FORT MONROE, Va. — Army ROTC graduates now on six month's active duty are now being offered the opportunity to volunteer for airborne or ranger training.

These new lieutenants, most of them June graduates from among 700 colleges and universities, must complete 15 week's training in their basic arms branch before beginning the airborne or ranger courses at Fort Benning, Ga.

Only those will be selected for the volunteer courses who are physically qualified and who can, within six months, complete the branch basic courses (usually infantry, armor or artillery), the volunteer course and the required travel and leave.

Ranger training lasts approximately eight weeks. The airborne course, now five weeks long, is due to be shortened soon. With tight scheduling, it would be possible for a volunteer to complete both the airborne and ranger training during the six months, U. S. Continental Army Command headquarters here points out.

Since June, 1954, all Regular Army second lieutenants commissioned the combat arms and direct combat-support branches have been required to take

either the ranger or airborne courses. By offering these courses to ROTC second lieutenants, the move to develop a rugged, well-rounded corps of young officers is extended to future Reservists.

It costs \$6273 a year to maintain one American soldier, but the U. S. pays out only \$539 to maintain one soldier of the NATO allies.







**FAST CAMERA SHUTTER DEVELOPED UNDER ARMY ORDNANCE CONTRACT**

Development under an Army contract of a camera shutter so fast it makes possible the taking of photographs at the rate of one exposure in five billionths of a second, was announced by the Department of the Army recently.

The new shutter, which is expected to prove important as an Army research tool, is the product of Electro-Optical Systems, Inc., of Pasadena, California. It should be especially valuable in helping to solve problems of a scientific nature in the study of high-speed shock waves, explosives and explosions, and certain nuclear reactions.

The secret of the new, fast shutter is in a hermetically sealed, large aperture, wide angle cell which has no moving parts. This cell contains a chemical which has the capability of being "pulsed" electronically. The molecules of this chemical will not permit passage of light in "closed shutter" condition, but an electrical impulse will realign them to permit transmission of the image to make the picture. With further refinements of the technique in-

volved, it is hoped that a camera may be designed capable of making pictures with an exposure time of only a fraction of a billionth of a second.

The camera will be used in research at the Samuel Felman Ammunition Laboratories at the Army's Picatinny Arsenal, Dover, N. J., for which it was developed under an Army Ordnance contract.

## ARMY'S NEW MOBILE SIGNAL CENTERS ARE A COMMUNICATION MAN'S DREAM

HEIDELBERG, Germany —The Army has a "new look" in field signal communications.

An entirely new communications center which is large enough to serve a field army headquarters and yet is highly mobile was unveiled recently when one of the "signal centers on wheels" was delivered here to the headquarters of U. S. Army, Europe, where the project originated. Another center went to the second top Army in Europe—that of the battle-ready Seventh Army.

A signalman's dream, the center is installed in a fleet of 29 vans and trucks specifically engineered to provide modern signal facilities to large tactical headquarters.

Keynote of the units is mobility, necessary in warfare in which a single atomic missile could destroy or cripple an entire headquarters. Whereas in World War II and Korea some 250 men and many hours or even days were needed to relocate a communica-

tion center, the job can now be done with fewer personnel and in considerably less time.

When necessary the vans and trucks can be loaded into giant air transports and flown out. When a river must be forded, the water-tight vans can be towed across.

The vans provide ultra-high-frequency radio communications, telephone and teletype facilities, cryptographic and teleconference equipment, and high frequency radio transmitting and receiving equipment.

## Army Helps Train Civilian Dentists For Disaster Role

### GI'S RISK LIVES IN ENDLESS JOB OF CLEARING EUROPE OF DUD BOMBS

MIESAU, Germany — Eleven years after VE day the Army is still uncovering and disposing of dangerous dud bombs in Europe. It's a risky job with no end in sight.

This summer, for example, a 250-pound American bomb was partly exposed by a tractor at work in an area of the Rhine Ordnance Barracks. Members of the Seventh Army's 20th Explosive Ordnance Detachment here were ordered into action on a Sunday morning. The unit was on

its usual 24-hour alert.

First Lieutenant Paul E. Garber of Kinderhook, Ill., the 20th's commanding officer, and two technicians hurried to the site. They thoroughly studied the dud's position before going to work. The bomb was buried 15 feet deep after its wartime fall from an airplane.

They dug cautiously to bare the entire bomb. Barber fingered the fuze. Slowly he eased the fuze

from its deadly nest. Not until the touchy trigger was made harmless did the three soldiers haul the bomb to a safer area for explosion.

Sometimes bombs, mines, grenades or shells are unearthed by German farmers working their fields. If it can be accomplished safely, a charge may be obtained to explode the dud on the spot. But when discovered in highly populated areas, the dud must be defuzed slowly and removed to a remote area for detonation.

"The smaller the item, the more dangerous it is," Garber says with the wisdom of ten years experience behind him. "Nobody's going to get careless

with a giant — and we've had some that weighed 500 pounds. But a little dud can make a person overconfident. We can't afford to be careless."

Bomb disposal work requires high intelligence, weeks of training at a stateside school, and an extra ration of intestinal stamina. Each man is a volunteer, and receives hazardous duty pay.

"Not many people are very interested in doing this sort of work," Specialist Second Class Henry R. Prest of (815B N. 6th Ave.) Yakima, Wash., explains succinctly. His story of his narrowest brush with high-explosive disaster indicates why.

Prest was removing a time-fuze

from a training dud on the Seventh Army range.

"The loudest noise I've ever heard was when that thing started ticking. It was like an explosion in my ears. At a time like that you don't think—you just act. I hit it with my wrench.

"It stopped!"

When Prest dismantled the fuze, a six-second count remained on the timer.

"I was scared," he admits. "Call it fear, call it healthy respect, call it anything you want. When a man stops having it, it's time to stop handling high explosives."






