

THE ARMY'S NEW SERGEANT MISSILE, a 30-foot surface-to-surface weapon that will replace the Corporal missile, was unveiled last week. The new missile has a solid-propellant engine and a guidance system that can't be jammed. Officials, saying the Sergeant resembles its namesake in being reliable, versatile and tough, commented: "For the first time we have a big missile that can be quickly emplaced and fired by a very small crew under all conditions of weather and terrain."


Dr. Killian Visits ABMA For Tour and Conference

The Army Ballistic Missile Agency immediately sent an expedition including a tracked T-113, shown above, a MP sedan, and a weapons carrier. Saidla, who suffered a concussion in a fall on ice, was brought down the mountain and is reported in good condition in Huntsville Hospital. Participating in the rescue operation were, from left to right, Billy W. Carr of the Launching and Handling Laboratory at the Agency, who drove the weapons carrier; SFC James Silver of the Agency's Signal Office; Gordon Stevens, general foreman in the Launching and Handling Laboratory, who piloted the T-113; and M/Sgt Louis Sharnberg, Jr., of the Signal Office, who received the radio call for help. Carl DeNeen, extreme right, technical assistant to the director of the Launching and Handling Laboratory, handled development of the T-113 and made sure the vehicle was in top condition for the rescue operation. The vehicle had made a previous trip up the mountain carrying food and other supplies.

DEVELOPED UNDER RSA COGNIZANCE

Weapon Powered By Solid Propellant

The Army's new Sergeant missile, developed under technical supervision of Redstone Arsenal, was revealed to the public last week.

Announcement of the development of the Sergeant, a highly mobile surface-to-surface ballistic guided missile with the ability to resist enemy counter-measures, was made by the Department of the Army.

A solid propellant missile, the Sergeant was developed for the Army by the Jet Propulsion Laboratory, California Institute of Technology, Pasadena, Calif. The Sergeant will eventually replace the Corporal missile, it was announced.

The Redstone Arsenal office with specific responsibility for the Sergeant is the Surface-to-Surface Missile Branch, Projects Management Staff, Research and Development Division.

Project director for the Sergeant is Stanley Bernstein. Project engineers are Edmond D. Messer and Capt. Arthur Q. Woodard, Jr. Chief of the Surface-to-Surface Missile Branch is Albert H. Bryan, Jr. Chief of PMS is Dr. Martin Schilling; and Col. Matthew Collins heads the R&D Division.

Design engineering of the solid propellant rocket motor for the Sergeant missile was made by the Redstone Arsenal Division of Thiokol Chemical Corp. in conjunction with JPL. Thiokol loaded all Sergeant motors that have been tested, both for static testing at Redstone Arsenal and flight testing at White Sands Proving Ground, N. M.

Following is the fact sheet on the Sergeant which was released by the Department of the Army:

The Sergeant is the U. S. Army's newest ballistic guided missile. When placed in production, it will be the successor to the four-year-old Corporal and will incorporate improvements over the Corporal's power and accuracy.

The Sergeant possesses a high degree of reliability and accuracy which has been demonstrated in a series of flight tests under all operating conditions. It can deliver a nuclear blow far behind enemy lines and its highly accurate guidance system is invulnerable to any known means of enemy countermeasures.

REDSTONE'S 'MOST SEDENTARY GI' ENDS 7½-YEAR TOUR OF DUTY HERE

The Futurarmy's emphasis on missiles and mobility has finally had its effect on SFC Dick Coddington, Redstone's "oldest living inhabitant"—in length of service.

When Sgt. Coddington left for Germany last week, he ended a 7½ year tour of duty at Redstone Arsenal.

Even now this candidate for the title of the Army's most sedentary soldier is becoming no rolling stone. He was in Germany before his assignment here, and is returning to his wife's native land.

Sgt. Coddington entered service in Chicago on Jan. 29, 1946. Eight months later he was in Germany, where he remained for three years and 11 months.

It was at Passau during his first overseas stint that he met and married the former Miss Anne Lachauer. They now have two sons, Donald, age 7, and Carl, 4.

He became a photographer quite by accident. The Leica factory in Germany had resumed operations, but the output was

small. When the PX received its first lot of cameras, a drawing was held to determine the first buyer. You guessed it, and he bought a Leica III C.

From this accidental beginning, he became a better photographer than most people do by design. He studied photography seriously, and when the U. S. Army official photographer assigned to his unit was rotated, Sgt. Coddington stepped into his shoes.

It was as a photographer that he became best known at Redstone. The credit line, "Photo by SFC Dick Coddington" is sprinkled liberally through the files of The Redstone Rocket. Numerous portraits and missile pictures by Coddington are framed in different offices on the post.

Quiet and dignified, Coddington never became ruffled on an assignment, forgoing camera settings. His supervisors say he always returned to the photo lab with the picture on his film.

GEN. MEDARIS RECEIVES HONORARY DEGREE FROM ROLLINS COLLEGE, FLA.

Maj. Gen. J. B. Medaris, commanding general of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency, received an honorary Doctor of Science degree Monday from Rollins College, at Winter Park, Fla.

Conferring of degrees at the Mid-Winter Convocation concluded the observance of Founders' Week. The ceremony took place in Knowles Memorial Chapel.

At the presentation of the degree to General Medaris, Hugh F. McKean, President, Rollins College stated:

"John Bruce Medaris, soldier, gentleman, imaginative thinker, our Country is fortunate to produce men to meet each successive challenge to its prestige and security.

"Because you have played an important part in placing a United States of America satellite in an orbit around the earth, because you have the courage and eloquence to warn our people of the implications in man's penetrating space, because through your life you have demonstrated the dramatic possibilities of a free society and free people, I am proud, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the trustees of Rollins College, to confer upon you the degree of Doctor of Science and admit you to all its rights and privileges."

Others honored at today's ceremony included Roger M. Blough, Chairman of the Board, U. S. Steel Corp., receiving Doctor of Laws degree; Mohammed Ali, Ambassador from Pakistan, Doctor of Laws; Reverend Fred Hoskins, Secretary of the General Council of the Congregational Christian Church, Doctor of Humane Letters; and General Albert C. Wedneyer, U. S. Army, retired, who commanded US forces in China, World War II, Doctor of Laws.

Sunday Gen. Medaris delivered an address titled "The Challenge of Our Times."

"Youth and adult, there must be a revival of the spirit of challenge and a renewed understanding of the lesson of our forefathers, who deliberately sought out the opportunity to undertake difficult tasks, often for the sole but satisfying reward of personal satisfaction derived from overcoming obstacles," Gen. Medaris declared.

"True leadership can never be

attained by an individual unwilling to stand up and be counted on the basis of his own decisions and the results of those decisions. And this coming age will demand leadership in generous quantity."

He urged a return to mathematics, chemistry and physics in the upper grade school years, continued through high school, "to provide the foundation upon which it will be easy to build an adequate number of scientists and engineers."

"Our country is faced with a double challenge," he added, "to understand the science and technology of the age in order to further the cause of mankind, and to know God and His will in order that the power so achieved may be used to further the progress of man in His image."

Col. Newhall Commends Two Contractors' Field Service Representatives

Field service representatives of two contractors of the Army Ordnance Guided Missile School have been officially commended here by Col. H. S. Newhall, commandant, for their superior work in the School's Ballistic Missiles branch.

George A. Davies of the North American Aviation Corp. and James H. Northrup of Associated Aero Science Laboratories were singled out for praise by Col. Newhall in special letters handed to both men and forwarded to their superiors.

Davies was lauded for work done in assembling and correlating data on manufacturer's changes in the Redstone surface-to-surface missile system, for maintaining technical liaison with its manufacturers, Chrysler Corp., and for "ability to translate complex missile hardware into simple mechanical and visual training aids."

Northrup was cited for work after duty hours in training instructors and others responsible for conducting classes in maintenance and repair of the Redstone Missile.

The overall length of the Sergeant is approximately 30 feet.

The Sergeant utilizes a solid propellant rocket motor which provides better performance and storage capabilities than those provided by many other weapons systems. It employs improved propellants and materials which incorporate advanced design characteristics that meet the requirements of temperature, shock, and vibration environments to which a missile will be subjected both before and during flight.

A highly mobile weapon, the Sergeant can be quickly emplaced and fired by a very small crew under all conditions of weather and terrain. All system elements have been especially designed for portability and mobility and are transportable by standard Army vehicles. The use of solid propellant and the advanced techniques for guidance have minimized system maintenance requirements and correspondingly simplified ground handling procedures and equipment. In most tactical situations, solid-propellant motors, because they are convenient and easy to handle are particularly adaptable to field operations.

On the foundation of earlier experience with the Corporal, the Sergeant represents a completely new weapon system employing the latest technological achievements. It is to be America's first truly "second generation" surface to surface tactical missile.

The Sergeant was designed and developed for the Army by the Jet Propulsion Laboratory, which is operated by California Institute of Technology. It will be produced by the Sperry Gyroscope Company's Surface Armament Division at the Sperry Utah Engineering Laboratory, Salt Lake City, Utah.

Major sub-contractors in the Sergeant project include Thiokol Chemical Corporation, Trenton, N. J.; Bell Aircraft Corporation, Buffalo, N. Y.; Minneapolis-Honeywell Regulator Company, Minneapolis, Minn.; and Excelco Developments, Inc., Silver Creek, N. Y.



LAB CHANGES LOCATIONS—WITHOUT INTERRUPTING WORK

Moving Day at ABMA!

It seemed surprisingly easy for members of the Structures and Mechanics Laboratory of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency to leave their drawing board or desk after work on a Friday and report to a new building the next Monday morning, where everything was in place and operating. But it was a prodigious headache for those responsible for moving the enormous amounts of equipment and furniture without interrupting the vital development work on ballistic missiles and satellites.

Construction work was recently completed on the first section of a new \$5,280,000 Structures and Mechanics Laboratory building on Redstone Arsenal. The

move to the new building was under the direction of James L. Webb, chief of the Office Services Branch. For him, the planning took many months, although the shift itself was done in three week-ends.

Over 1,642 of heavy equipment and 3,500 pieces of smaller office equipment had to be transferred to the new offices — all without causing a delay in the work of 365 military and civilian employees who were moved.

Each of the 302 desks, 164 drafting tables, 474 file cabinets, 226 tables, 154 typewriters, and calculators and other machines was carefully labeled in advance and a spot marked in the new

building to show its position. Seventy-five moving men, including fork-lift operators, electricians, truck drivers, and 50 laborers worked over the weekend.

When the laboratory personnel arrived for work Monday morning they found the telephones had been connected and placed in operation on the proper desks. To do this required day and night work by 15 telephone men.

To add to the complications, it was necessary to have security guards on special duty in the area, since most of the files contained secret information. Five soldiers from the ABMA Intelligence and Security Office were on duty around the clock, in addition to the usual guard force.

Even with this job completed, the movers cannot relax — the worst is yet to come. Planning has begun for the movement of the research and development equipment, massive and often delicate, which will be transferred in the next few months when other sections of the building are completed.


Quality Control Society to Hear Official from GE

CHILLED TROOPS WIN RACE WITH ICE IN OFFSHORE SUPPLY TO RADAR SITES

FORT EUSTIS, Va. — Working around the clock in a race against Arctic ice, 1500 specially trained Transportation Corps soldiers from here broke last year's record by three weeks in an amphibious over-the-beach unloading operation to supply the remote northern Distant Early Warning (DEW Line) radar outposts. This as yet incomplete network would warn the western hemisphere in case of a transpolar air strike.

The troops operated along 2,000 miles of bleak coastline of northern Canada and Alaska to unload 25,000 measurement tons of general cargo and eight million gallons of petroleum.

Throughout the operation, ice lay only a few thousand yards offshore, a constant reminder that a change in wind could have brought it overnight to trap operations.

Ice reconnaissance planes and eight icebreakers assisted the 56-ship convoy as it moved to and from the operation locale. The nine unloading companies moved in to take advantage of beach sites as favorable ice conditions developed rather than according to a prearranged plan.

Sometimes a site had to be abandoned as ice halted the work, despite the generally successful efforts of Army landing craft to fend off the drifting "growlers" from the beach discharge points.

Summer air temperatures atop the continent were around freezing and stiff winds and splashing surf did not add to the comfort. A man could last only about four minutes if he fell into the below-freezing waters, but the operation was completed without the loss of a soldier.

Landing craft, amphibious trucks called DUKWS, and landing vehicles tracked (LVTs) were all used to carry the supplies from anchored "mother" ships onto the beaches. These lightering operations sometimes meant round-trip shuttle runs as long as 25 miles. At only a few sites was it possible for Navy ships to reach the beach. No docking facilities exist in the entire area.

Shallow coastline waters even made trouble for the 115-foot landing craft utility (LCUs) and at most sites it was necessary to use landing craft mechanized (LCMs). Even these could not always go all the way in shore. Then Army bulldozers built dirt ramps out to meet them.

Despite the Arctic locale, swamp lands were a problem when temperatures rose to thaw out the icy coast into a soggy terrain. The Army tracked amphib-

ians (LVT's) were then needed to move the cargo inland from the beach to the DEW Line supply points.

Such a sea lift is the only economical way to deliver bulk supplies to the scattered Arctic radar sites. This is the second year for this DEW Line support operation. Both years the job has been done by troops from Eustis, home of the Army's Transportation School.

'See—It Ain't Fun' Infantrymen Prove To Doubting Wives

IN THE FIELD, Germany — Army wives sometimes think that field training is like a "vacation in the country," where their menfolk thoroughly relax in the great outdoors.

To dispel such illusions, the 85th Regiment of the Tenth Infantry Division recently invited a group of wives to observe a field training exercise called "Company in the Attack."

Scanning the terrain through binoculars from a high hilltop,

the women heard an exposition of the friendly and enemy situation. First Lieutenant John H. Ebers of Kansas City, Kans., a battalion operations officer, filled in the orientation with an account of the intricacies involved in planning and executing an attack.

The drama began five minutes before H-hour with a sudden blast of mortars and artillery blazing into enemy positions. Bursts of machine gun fire strafed the attack zone as smoke rounds exploded and a brisk wind carried a perfect screen across to the objective.

The infantrymen raced across the line of departure. They were followed by tanks, adding their

fire to the crescendo of violence. The watchers saw the "wounded" being evacuated by the medics. The objective was declared secured.

Not until then were the awed wives taken for a ride in one of the tanks, whose route did not detour some rough terrain — "Wonderful, but I don't know how those tankers stand it."

One wife wrapped it up for all of them. "My husband and I have been in the Army 13 years and this is the first time I ever got to the field. I'm impressed."
