 If you heard such a warning this minute, what would YOU do? This is the first of a series of articles in *The Rocket* designed to give you the answers — don't miss a single one! Your family should read them too.

**What are the AIR RAID WARNING SIGNALS?**  
 a. "YELLOW WARNING" means ATTACK BY HOSTILE AIRCRAFT IS PROBABLE. It is a steady blast of three minutes duration by sirens, horns, or whis-

les. Civil Defense calls this the "Alert Signal."  
 b. "RED WARNING" means ATTACK BY HOSTILE AIRCRAFT is imminent. It is a wailing tone or series of short blasts of three minutes duration sounded by sirens, horns, or whistles. Civil Defense calls this the "Take Cover Signal."  
 c. "WHITE SIGNAL" means ALL CLEAR. It is a series of three steady one-minute blasts by sirens, horns, or whistles, interrupted by silent periods of two min-

utes each. Civil Defense calls this the "All Clear Signal."

**If I hear a YELLOW or RED air raid warning, what should I do?**  
 a. Certain key military and civilian personnel of ABMA, OGMS, and RSA have specific duties to be performed immediately. They know what to do and when to do it.  
 b. All others will take action as follows:

### Weapon System Project Office for Jupiter Set Up by Air Force at Inglewood, Calif.

#### LIAISON OFFICE SET AT ABMA

Gen. E. W. Rawlings, commander, Air Materiel Command, Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Ohio, has announced that a weapon system project office has been established for the Jupiter missile.

This office will monitor the Air Force's responsibility for co-operation with the Army in bringing the Jupiter missile into our country's operational inventory as early as possible.

The Jupiter weapon project office is located in Inglewood, California, with the Air Force Ballistic Missile Division and is headed by the Chief of the Air Materiel Command, Ballistic Missile Office, Brig Gen. Ben I. Funk.

Gen. Rawlings further announced that a Jupiter Liaison office has been established at the Army Ballistic Missile Agency.

This office will provide USAF assistance to the Army Ballistic Missile Agency and serve as a liaison between all Air Force organizations and the Army Ballistic Missile Agency.

Each Air Force weapon is assigned to one of the Air Force's eight air materiel areas for management of its logistic support. The AMC air materiel area at Mobile, Ala., has been designated.

### Decatur Firm Is Low Bidder for Work on Missile Agency Lab

Apparent low bidder for the construction of an addition to the Guidance and Control Laboratory at the Army Ballistic Missile Agency was the Pearce and Gresham Co. of Decatur, Ala., with a bid of \$2,721,588.34, according to an announcement by the U. S. Army Corps of Engineer District at Mobile.

Bid openings for the construction of a Technical Photo and Video Instrumentation Laboratory at ABMA were also released with the apparent low bid of \$441,115.05 being submitted by the Daniels Construction Co. of Birmingham.

The new addition to the Guidance and Control Laboratory will provide additional laboratory space for personnel who perform research and development of guidance, control, telemetering, and missile tracking instruments for ABMA. The second lowest bidder on the addition to the laboratory was the J. A. Jones Construction Co. with a bid of \$2,729,340.23 for construction of the single story, concrete frame building with electrical power supply and other special utilities to meet the stringent requirements of

### OGMS V-2 Isn't Due For Firing

They're not planning to launch the German V-2 Rocket which stands near the Headquarters Building of the Ordnance Guided Missile School. Its rocket motors have long been silent. The metal framework which has been built around the rocket in the past few days is not a gantry tower—it's just a painter's scaffolding.



### Gen. Toftoy Reported 'Progressing Very Well' At Walter Reed Hospital

Maj. Gen. H. N. Toftoy, Redstone Arsenal commander, was reported at Rocket press time yesterday as "progressing very well" at Walter Reed Army Hospital, in Washington, D. C.

After talking with doctors at Walter Reed, Lt. Col. Hensley S. Johnson, post surgeon, said that "The general's pneumonia is clearing up well, he isn't coughing so much, and is not running any fever."

"Continuing clinical observations will be made before Gen. Toftoy leaves the hospital," Col. Johnson added, "and these should be completed by the latter part of next week." Gen. Toftoy entered Walter Reed February 28 for a complete medical checkup; at that time he was also reported as having virus pneumonia of the left lung.

### DEVELOPED UNDER REDSTONE DIRECTION

### Army Ordnance 'Loki' Used for Research Work

The Army Ordnance "Loki," a solid propellant rocket, has recently been making valuable contributions to science in the realm of upper atmospheric exploration.


Three dozen of the rockets were fired last fall in an expedition to the Antarctic by Dr. James A. Van Allen, chairman of the Department of Physics at the State University of Iowa.

Dr. Van Allen developed a technique of firing the Loki from a balloon at an altitude of approximately 14 miles. He rechristened the rocket "Rockoon." The original Loki was developed by Jet Propulsion Laboratory under the direction of Redstone Arsenal.

These point soundings "at the edge of outer space" had as their main purpose the measurement of cosmic radiation. The instruments in the Rockoon flights were similar to the main experiment in the Army Explorer satellite. Dr. Van Allen also designed the satellite cosmic radiation experiment.

Rockoon flights, however, gathered data in an area completely untouched before. The Explorer is orbiting in a band covering up

(1) If you are **on duty** at the time you hear an air raid signal, **REMAIN AT YOUR NORMAL DUTY STATION** until you receive official instructions through normal supervisory channels. If you act on your own or as a result of rumors you may be exposing yourself and OTHERS to greater danger. You can be certain that the most competent individuals on the installation are in control of the situation and will issue instructions to you just as soon as pertinent facts can be evaluated. Modern warfare is extremely complex, and the Arsenal Emergency Commander will consider many factors before deciding what action will provide the best chances for your survival.

(2) If you are **OFF DUTY** at the time a defense emergency occurs, tune your radio to your local radio station or to channels 640 or 1240 and listen for instructions. If there are no radio instructions to the contrary, return to your normal duty station at the time of your next normal tour of duty.

**Will all personnel be evacuated from Redstone Arsenal automatically when a YELLOW or RED air raid warning is sounded?**

a. NO — evacuation is NOT automatic. Evacuation will be undertaken ONLY upon orders from the Arsenal Emergency Commander. He will first consider the comparative risks involved in view of probable time available.

b. The warning time may vary considerably. If enemy bombers are picked up on the radar screens of our warning network, there should be from one to two hours time lapse before the bombers could reach this area.

c. It is conceivable that an enemy could launch an attack against this area from submarines or by means of intercontinental ballistic missiles in which case

the warning time would be too short in which to attempt an evacuation. In this case your chances for survival would be much greater if you sought the most effective shelter until told by proper officials that it is safe to come out.

**Why do you use the term "shelter" instead of "cover" as is often heard on the radio?**

a. "Shelter" as distinguished from "cover" is used to mean construction which is sufficient to afford substantial protection to persons within it, from blast, thermal effects and initial and residual radiation.

b. "Cover" refers to structures which will offer protection from radioactive fallout, beyond the range of the other effects.

c. In other words, those in or very near a recognized target area, should seek **shelter** in masonry buildings since they may be exposed to blast and heat. At greater distances you must take **cover** from radioactive fallout. Even a frame building affords fair cover from fallout.

**How will we know when to leave our shelter?**

Redstone Arsenal has a highly trained and well equipped monitoring team. They will let you know when it is safe to leave your shelter. This will be discussed more fully in a later issue.

**If evacuation of Redstone Arsenal is ordered, what should I do?**

**FOLLOW INSTRUCTIONS.** You do not have to remember anything else. The Provost Marshal will be in charge of evacuation and his guards and military police will tell you what to do. He has prepared an evacuation map of the Arsenal and specific plans for the rapid evacuation of all persons not assigned to essential emergency posts. Watch for the evacuation map to be posted on your bulletin board together with other pertinent information.

to 35 degrees north and south of the Equator. The Antarctic Rockoon launchings, then, supplement information being gained from the satellite.

An earlier expedition last Summer, one of five Van Allen has conducted, produced data from near the opposite pole, off Greenland.

On the southern trip, the Rockoons were fired from the Navy's icebreaker "Glacier."

The rockets were floated by balloon to an altitude of 75,000 feet, above much of the dense atmosphere. They were then fired to about 80 miles, Van Allen said. A three man firing team was required.

The Rockoon shots are the first known to have been made near the South Pole. The Soviet icebreaker "Ob" planned a series of firings there during the current season, but there has been no report from that proposed expedition. The Rockoon shots, completed Nov. 8, extended south to a point 100 miles east of Cape Adare. They began off Florida on Sept. 26.

Cosmic rays and "soft" radiation observed in the Antarctic were comparable to those detected by Dr. Van Allen's group last Summer in the Arctic. The program is part of the American effort during the International Geophysical Year.



**FAVORITE RECIPES**

From Mrs. Holger N. Toftoy.  
**1-2-3-4 Punch.**

1 qt. can pineapple juice (chilled), 1 qt. cold tea (medium strength), 1 qt. ginger-ale and 1 qt. lime sherbert.

Combine first two ingredients. Add ginger-ale and sherbert just before serving. Fresh mint for decoration.

**Dutch Apple Cake**

1 cut sifted all-purpose flour, 1 1/2 t. baking powder, 1/2 t. salt, 4 T granulated sugar, 1/4c shortening, 1 egg, 1/4c milk, 3-4c pared, cored, sliced tart apples, 1/2t cinnamon, 1/4t nutmeg, 3 T melted butter.

Sift together flour, baking powder and 2T of sugar. Cut in shortening until mixture is like coarse corn meal. Stir in egg and milk with a fork. Spread in greased cake-pan. Arrange apples in parallel rows on top with pointed edge down. Sprinkle with cinnamon, nutmeg, 2T sugar and melted butter.

Bake in a hot oven 400 F. for 40 minutes. Serve warm.

**Blueberry Cobbler**

Butter (size of egg), 1/2 cup sugar, cream together. Add alternately 1 cup flour and 2t baking powder. 1/2 cup milk.

Spread batter on 8 by 10 inch pan. Add two cups berries. Dot with butter. Add 1/2 cup sugar, 1/2 cup water or juice. Bake 25 minutes at 375 F. Serve with cream. If fresh berries are used add sugar accordingly.

1 lb. shrimp and 1 pint batter (1-3 c. cracker-meal, 2-3 c. flour,

1 egg) Batter is made from crackers rolled to a fine powder. 1 part cracker powder to 2 parts flour. 1 egg folded in. Milk and water to make a thick batter. Use 1 button of garlic rubbed around skillet. Fry in deep fat. Serve with tartar sauce.





It was a cold, blustery day in January 1946. Newspapers had started the day with nothing much to work with in headlines. It was just a run-of-the-mill news day.

The bulletin flashed out over the nation's teletypes. Editors stared in amazement at the news item that started: "The US Army has successfully bounced radio signals off the moon."

The entire world devoured the news and tried to comprehend its meaning. It seemed incredible, fantastic, unbelievable. This was truly an event to capture the imagination of the most earth-bound human.

Today this same news is commonplace. The Army's new radio transmitter Space Sentry recently bounced signals off the moon every other day for a period of two weeks.

Amateur radio operators throughout the Western Hemisphere picked up these returning signals and used them to calibrate satellite tracking instruments.

The signals assured that all far-flung listening posts would be tuned to precisely the same frequency.

Transmissions of the signal tests were conducted at Ft. Monmouth, N. J., home of the Army Signal Corps.

As man moves into the space age our Armed Forces continue to play a major role in scientific advancement.

**Traveling Display Shows Moon-View Of Army Satellite**

WASHINGTON—An opportunity to get a moon's-eye view of the earth and its encircling American satellite — the Army's Explorer — will be given the American public starting this week in Miami, Fla., as an Army display begins a tour of the country.

Designed to inform viewers of the role the Army played in the

development and successful launching of the first American satellite, the exhibit will be shown in Miami through March 14 and in Tampa March 17 through 23, after which it will start a swing to the northwest.

In a series of graphics centered around an actual model-in-motion of the Explorer circling the earth in apogee and perigee, the display explains the information-gathering aspects of Explorer.

Also in the display is a life-size model of the Explorer, complete from nose to antennas, a scale model of the Jupiter-C used in the launching, and a three-dimensional black-light cutaway of the satellite.

From Tampa the Army plans initially to send the exhibit, which has already been on display in Washington, to Pittsburgh, Cleveland, Detroit, Chicago, Milwaukee, Minneapolis-St. Paul, Kansas City, St. Louis, Cincinnati and Louisville.

**ROK Soldiers Go Electronic' to Get Necessary English**

TAEGU, Korea — "Electronic" English as taught to the Republic of Korea Army students at The Adjutant General School here is successfully solving the teacher shortage.

Faced with the immediate and continuous requirement for interpreter-translators who can speak English, the ROK Army sought help through the U. S. Army Advisory Group, Korea (KMAG).

Sufficient competent teachers were impossible to find, so KMAG installed "electronic" teachers in the classrooms.

Dual track tape recorders are the answer. The heart of this teaching method is a binaural

headset, through which the student can listen with one ear to the correct English while with the other he hears the playback of his own attempts at emulation.

First the student plays the lesson over and over until pronunciation, inflection and rhythm are etched on his brain. He is also following written copy so that he

is seeing as well as hearing the words.

Then, still listening to "teacher," he speaks the words into his own microphone connected with a tape recorder. The playback comparison is his acid test of success.

It's proved a quick method of cramming English to the high

school level. And "teacher" requires little upkeep — just electricity and a shelf-niche for night-ly repose where there is heat and dryness.

**Chemists Hear Talk By Reynolds Official**

The monthly meeting of the Alabama Chapter of the American Institute of Chemists was held Feb. 27 at Holmes Street Methodist Church in Huntsville. The topic for the evening was "What Management Expects of the Technical Man." The speaker, Austin Branscomb, is chief of the Analytical and Carbon Sections of the Lister Hill Plant of Reynolds Aluminum.

Branscomb stated that management starts very early to evaluate technical employees for future administrative duties. This evaluation process lasts for a period of 10-15 years. After this the man has either become a member of management or is passed over as unsuitable for these positions.

Points judged of greatest importance compiled from a recent survey of companies large and small were:

1. Continuation of education by reading widely and taking an active part in community technical and social organizations.
2. Development of abilities to make wise, accurate and responsible decisions.
3. Development of optimism tempered by common sense and scientific methods resulting in a flow of useful and practical ideas.
4. Cultivation of leadership talents; ability to meet people, to write and speak effectively.



**Army Nike Units Show Increasing Efficiency in Year**

**COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo.**—Army Nike battalions guarding U. S. cities from air attack are doing so with markedly increasing efficiency and killing accuracy, results of the 1957 competition for the Commander's Missile Battalion Trophy of the Army Air Defense Command show.

The current champion — the 433rd AAA Battalion of Seattle—only emerged after a see-saw competition that forced it to earn 11,283 out of a possible 12,000 points, and to hit 11 target drones in 12 engagements.

Three other battalions also scored 11 out of 12 hits, whereas the 1956 champion won its preeminence with but 10 hits, and an overall point score of 9,400.


The score is not determined on "kills" alone, but on efficiency and effectiveness of all operations of the battalion during its annual firing at Red Canyon Range in New Mexico, when the soldiers

have their only opportunity to actually trigger the Nike-Ajax surface-to-air missile.

Other "11-for-12" battalions were the 75th of Andrews Air Force Base, Md., second place winner; the 751st of Coventry, R. I., and the 551st of Van Nuys, Calif. The third place winner, the 514th Battalion of Quincy, Mass., won its standing on points.



## 'Explorers' Rank High In Conquest of Space

New York (AFPS) — Did you know that Explorer, the name of the first American satellite, was chosen by President Eisenhower from a list of suggestions submitted by the Army?

But this was not the first US Explorer to search out the secrets of the heavens and bring back valuable information to scientists.

Back in 1934 Explorer I, a huge balloon inflated with hydrogen, rose above the Black Hills of South Dakota to a height of 60,613 feet. It was manned by three officers in a joint Army Air Corps - National Geographic effort to study the top of the earth's atmosphere.

On Armistice Day, 1935, Explorer II carried Army Captains Albert W. Stevens and Orvil A. Anderson to a new record height of 72,395 feet.

For an hour and 40 minutes they soared more than 13 miles above the earth, while millions of Americans huddled about radios, listening to the observations of the two men.

Explorer II carried a ton of scientific equipment and added greatly to our store of knowledge of cosmic rays, high altitude ozone, light, chemical and electrical conditions, and radio transmission from space.

This record stood for 21 years, until airmen in 1956 and 1957 exceeded it in newer manned balloons and rocket planes.

Still another manned balloon, Explorer III, will attempt an even more daring experiment. Two Air Force parachutists plan to take the new balloon 90,000 feet or higher and jump, to test the survival of flyers forced to eject from rocket planes.
