REORGANIZATION MOVE

R&DD, OML Made Separate Units

In a reorganizational move, Redstone Arsenal's combined Research and Development Division-Ordnance Missile Laboratories has been reconstituted into two separate organizations under the commanding general, it was announced last week.

The R&DD-OML organization has been under the direction of Col. Matthew Collins, who will continue as chief of the R&D Division.

The Ordnance Missile Labs will be under the direction of Col. Thomas E. Wood, who was transferred to Redstone several weeks ago from Brazil where he served on the Joint Brazil-United States Military Commission.

The Research and Development Division is responsible for one of Redstone's three national missions—carrying out the planning and supervising of the missile research and development work performed throughout the country, at other government installations and by many contractors in private industry and educational institutions.

Redstone's other national missions are in the broad areas of industrial procurement and field

service of Army missile systems. The Ordnance Missile Labs perform functions of more an "in-house" nature, its various segments conducting the research and development work which is carried out locally at Redstone.

A Redstone general order directs that "personnel, personnel spaces, equipment, and records presently authorized and assigned to the following elements of the former combined R&DD-OML organization will be transferred to the new separate OML organization: Program Control and Administration Office, Technical Feasibility Studies Offices, Operation Research Office, Technical Intelligence Office, Research Laboratory, Rocket Development Laboratory, and Air Defense Laboratory."

Contract Is Awarded, Bids Called for Work On ABMA Facilities

Lt. Col. R. O. Miller, Acting U. S. Army District Engineer at Mobile, Ala., has announced that the Corps of Engineers has awarded a contract for the construction of a photographic and video instrumentation laboratory and has advertised for bids for the construction of a nose cone assembly and check out facility, both for the Army Ballistic Missile Agency.

The award went to the Daniel Construction Co., of Birmingham, Ala., for a low bid price of \$441,115.25. The firm is expected to start work around the middle of March on the laboratory which will be a two-story building, approximately 240 by 50 feet, of concrete and masonry block construction. It will be steam heated and air conditioned.

STRAUSS DUE HERE TOMORROW

West German Defense Minister Franz Josef Strauss will arrive here Thursday for a brief visit at the Army Ballistic Missile Agency, Redstone Arsenal, and the Ordnance Guided Missile School.

Following conferences with top officials, the German cabinet officer is scheduled to leave here by air on Friday at 3 p.m.

Tentatively, his schedule calls for a visit to the Missile Test Center at Cape Canaveral, Fla., following the Huntsville visit.

Later in the week Strauss is to see the Army's Guided Missile School at Fort Bliss, Tex.

Among the places he has already visited during his tour of this country are the Lockheed and Douglas aircraft plants, Edwards Air Force Base, and the Naval Ordnance Laboratory at China Lake in California.

Contracts for Work Here Totaling \$2.8 Million Are Awarded

Col. Harold E. Bisbort, U. S. Army District Engineer at Mobile, Ala., has announced the award of two contracts totalling approximately \$2,800,000 for construction work at Redstone Arsenal.

A contract in the amount of \$2,721,588.34 was awarded to the Pearce and Gresham Co., of Decatur, Ala., for enlarging the guidance and control laboratory and shop for the Army Ballistic Missile Agency. The work will include the construction of one- and two-story extensions to existing laboratory and shop buildings, utility systems, a drainage system, roads and parking areas, walks, and security fencing.

A contract in the amount of \$93,091.50 was awarded to the Bush Building Co., of Nashville, Tenn., for the construction of a 250,000-gallon water storage reservoir and connecting utilities in the Ordnance Guided Missile School area to serve the school and also Capehart and other housing in the vicinity.

Work under both contracts is expected to get under way in about a week.

CLASSES ON HAWK MISSILE SLATED

Instructors will begin classes to teach key people from all over the United States as instructors in the use and upkeep of the Hawk missile beginning on April 1.

Classes, divided into four hours in the classroom and four hours in the newly-constructed missile park beside Bldg. 5671, will be conducted five days a week for nine weeks.

These cover five categories: (1) Illuminator C. W. Acquisition Radar Course; (2) Pulse Acquisition Radar Course; (3) Battery Control Center Course; (4) Missile Launcher and Electronic Course; and (5) Mechanical Systems.

According to Curtis Williams, chief of the National Training Branch, RSA Civilian Personnel Office, students may take more than one subject at a time. The initial group of instructors are field engineers from Raytheon Manufacturing Co.

Four classes are scheduled with approximately 80 students in each class. This would average 16 students to a classroom.

CIVIL DEFENSE: What Would YOU Do?

CONELRAD System for Alerting Populace Is Described

(Second article in a series concerning RSA emergency plans.)

Will you give a simple description of the effects of an atomic or thermonuclear explosion?

a. A good example is "Mike Shot" of "Operation Ivey" which took place at Eniwetok Atoll in the Pacific in November 1952:

The fireball measured 3/4 miles in diameter.

The crater at ground zero was 1 mile in diameter and 175 feet deep at the deepest point.

The radius of total destruction was 3 miles.

The radius of heavy to medium damage was 7 miles.

The radius of light damage was 10 miles.

After 12 minutes the cloud was nearly 20 miles high and 100 miles across.

b. Since the time of the above described test shot, it is most likely that more powerful thermonuclear devices have been developed.

c. Just like fire bombs and ordinary high explosives, thermonuclear weapons cause most of their death and damage by blast and heat.

* * *

What is meant by "ground zero"?

a. Ground zero is that theoretical spot on the ground which would represent the center of a ground burst or which would be

directly under the center of an air burst.

b. Distances out from ground zero are measured as "rings."

(1) The A-Ring is a central area around ground zero in which destruction is so complete that neither people nor buildings have much chance of surviving.

(2) The B-Ring is a larger belt of heavy damage around the A-Ring in which injury to people and destruction of buildings would be severe but not complete.

(3) The C-Ring is a still larger belt of lesser damage around the B-Ring in which injuries to people would range from moderate to light.

(4) The D-Ring is the area beyond the C-Ring in which damage would be light. However,

much of this area and all the country beyond which is downwind from the blast, can be affected by the fallout of radioactive particles. This fallout will be discussed at greater length in a later issue.

What does CONELRAD mean?

a. The word CONELRAD means "Plan for CONTROL of ELECTromagnetic RADIation." It is a system devised by the broadcasting industry and the Government, working together to bring you official information and civil defense instruction in times of emergency.

b. If you are listening to any radio or television set when the defense alert sounds, you will hear a message like this:

"This is a CONELRAD radio alert. Listen carefully. This station is now leaving the air. During the CONELRAD alert, there will be no FM or TV programs. The only program on the air will be on your standard radio at 640 or 1240 kilocycles, beginning after a short period of silence. Be patient. Tune the dial of your standard radio receiver to 640 or 1240."

c. CONELRAD will give you civil defense instructions and information that may mean the difference between life and death for you and your family.

What is meant by CBR Team?

a. CBR Team means a team of specialists trained to detect and (See CONELRAD on Page 2)

deal with Chemical, Biological, or Radiological contamination.

b. One of the CHEMICAL hazards is the possible release of stored toxic industrial chemicals, or of toxic products produced by fire or explosion, either accidentally or as the result of enemy bombing, or through sabotage. The advent of new and highly toxic chemical warfare agents and the greatly increased speed, carrying capacity and range of modern military aircraft, make chemical attack a serious threat. This team is trained to deal with such conditions.

c. Biological warfare (BW) is the intentional use of bacterial diseases or insects to cause death, disability or damage to man, animals, or plants in this country. Don't listen to propaganda or scare-talk about how germs can be used by an enemy to wipe out a city. If everybody knows the facts and if we all work together, we can keep up a strong defense against biological warfare. Here is what YOU can do:

- (1) Keep your personal health at a peak at all times.
- (2) Keep your family healthy.
- (3) Keep your house and yard CLEAN.

(4) Report promptly any signs of strange or unusual sickness to your family doctor.

(5) Cooperate fully with your Health Department, Civil Defense Officials and CBR Team.

d. Radiological hazards result from the explosion of an atomic or hydrogen bomb or other thermonuclear device. The intensity of radiation can be measured (in roentgens) by certain instruments which the Redstone Arsenal CBR Team is trained to use. They can tell from their instruments when it is safe to come out into the open or if a certain building or area or vehicle is too highly radioactive to be entered in safety. Plans are being made by the Huntsville Civil Defense Director to train and equip similar teams for use in the Huntsville-Madison County area.

The contract will call for the construction of a one-story masonry building, about 52 feet by 82 feet, with approximately one half of the area under a low roof and about one half under a high roof; a guard house approximately 10 feet square; water distribution, sanitary sewer, electrical distribution, and drainage systems; a service drive, parking area, and walks; and a chain link fence. THREE DAYS OF DELIBERATE MISERY WIND UP ARMY COURSE IN GERMANY

ASCHAFFENBURG, Germany — "If I am captured, I will continue to resist by all means available. I will make every effort to escape and aid others to escape. I will accept neither parole nor special favors from the enemy." One soldier who knows this paragraph of the Armed Forces Code of Conduct by heart is Specialist Third Class David J. Ducharme of (610½ Second St.) Webster, Ia., who learned it the hard way while attending the Fifth Corps' Escape and Evasion School in Germany. A member of a select group who completed the course with a perfect score, Ducharme best remembers a three day "pass" that took him through 72 hours of planned unpleasantness, an achievement not without personal discomfort. During the 72-hour training problem, the 20-year-old Tenth Infantry Division squad leader was given the task of making his way over a 60-mile course back

to the school. Without aid of any kind, Ducharme was required to keep at least half a mile from any main road or highway. He could not enter private homes, gasthauses (inns) or towns. This was a test of his ability to evade a group of Aggressors who were using scout dogs. "The first three days of the course," Ducharme recalls, "were spent in classroom instruction. On the third night we had a navigation problem. We had to locate small wooden stakes painted olive drab in complete darkness. And we could only use some pretty crude sketches to help us locate them. Then came the big march." During this 72-hour ordeal Ducharme battled near - blizzard weather on the 60-mile course. He completed 40 miles on the first two nights, successfully avoiding the searching patrols. There were check points set up

at several spots that had to be reached during night hours and border crossing situations where Ducharme received help from "underground" personnel. "I was only given three marks (about 75 cents) and these were to be used only in an emergency. My chow was great — one can




military specialty in both his reserve unit and on active duty.


Upon completion of the small arms repair course, Smith will begin studies here in the light artillery repair course. He will complete his Ordnance Corps training and his six months of active

'VOICE WITH A SMILE' IS JUST A MEMORY TO OVERSEA ARMY NOW

HEIDELBERG, Germany — The telephone operator is almost a ghost of the past as far as the United States Army in Germany is concerned.

A fully-automatic long-distance telephone system — still a dream in most parts of the United States — today serves almost every Army telephone user in Germany. In offices from Bremerhaven to Garmisch, from Kaiserslautern to Berlin, it's now possible to dial direct.

To call a military number in another city, one needs only to dial two sets of three or four-digit numbers — one to connect with the exchange there, and the other to get the desired number.

To reach Seventh Army headquarters in Stuttgart from Army headquarters here, for example, a caller dials 2741 and then the number. Within seconds, the call is through.

Only a fraction of the Army's thousands of daily calls need an operator. "Through switch" calls are made by an operator when automatic equipment fails or when automatic circuits are full. All international calls — from Heidelberg to Paris, for example — must be "booked" through an operator. And call on "red lines" — private lines usually serving general officers or strategic locations — need an operator.

Other operators are on hand to give information.

Yet at the Heidelberg exchange, serving more than 4,500 telephones at Army headquarters in Europe, only 36 German and nine WAC operators are needed to staff the exchange 'round the clock. The rest is entirely automatic.

Two unusual problems confronted planners of the system: how to set up a separate "civil" phone network for private use by Army personnel, and how to tie in the military system with "Deutsch Post," the national German telephone network.

But answers were found. Under international agreement, civil telephones were installed and operated by Deutsch Post, like any other German civilian phone. And

to call from a military number to either a civil or German number, it's necessary only to dial the prefix 99. Conversely, to reach a military number from a civil or German phone, one dials 88. It's that simple.

Signal Corps engineers have set up safeguards against using military phones for private long-distance calls. If a person in Heidelberg tries to dial a friend at a civil number in Berlin, he gets a busy signal and nothing more. And if he tries to go through the operator, he will be asked if it is official business. If not, the call won't be placed.

Key to the system is a series of hundreds of automatic "selectors", five of which are used for each call. One selector finds an open circuit as soon as the phone is raised from its cradle, and the other four — corresponding to the four-digit number being called — pinpoint the call to the desired phone.

But the most important fact to users of the direct-dial system is that with only six or eight flicks of a dial, they can speak to someone at the other end of Germany.


