



NOSE CONE MAIL DELIVERED—The first "rocket mail" to be carried by the JUPITER Intermediate Range Ballistic Missile in a tactical warhead was presented recently to Wilber M. VIPs IN PENTAGON GET 'ROCKET MAIL'

Secretary Brucker; Gen. Taylor Receive Letters By JUPITER

Two letters carried in the full-scale nose cone of the Jupiter Intermediate Range Ballistic Missile, recovered after its flight of approximately 1,500 miles through outer space, have been presented to Secretary of the Army Wilber Brucker and General Maxwell D. Taylor, Army Chief of Staff.

The letters, signed by Dr. Kurt H. Debus, were forwarded to the recipients by Maj. Gen. J. B. Medaris, Commanding General, Army Ordnance Missile Command.

This was the second "rocket mail" carried by a long-range Army rocket. The first was a letter sent to Gen. Medaris by Dr. Debus in a model nose cone carried by a Jupiter C rocket Aug. 8, 1957.

Dr. Debus is the director of the Missile Firing Laboratory, Army Ballistic Missile Agency, at Cape Canaveral, Fla. (See VIPs on Page 2)

Italian AF Grads Hear Ambassador

The Italian Ambassador to the United States was the principal speaker Monday, at historic graduation ceremonies at the U.S. Army Ordnance Guided Missile School as 60 officers and men of the Italian Air Force became the first Europeans to complete training here under the North Atlantic Treaty Organization's missile defense program.

The Italians have been trained in the maintenance and use of the Nike-Ajax and Nike-Hercules surface-to-air missiles.

Gen. Hinrichs Heads Board

Ordnance Session Held At AOMC

The U. S. Army Ordnance Board, a top-level planning group including 12 general officers, held its quarterly meeting last week at the Army Ordnance Missile Command, Redstone Arsenal.

Maj. Gen. J. H. Hinrichs, Chief of Ordnance, heads the Board which meets at different Army installations throughout the country. This was the first session to be held at Redstone. Thirty-eight visitors attended, including a staff of military and civilian consultants.

Host for the meeting was Maj. Gen. J. B. Medaris, AOMC Commanding General.

The Board was concerned with discussion of Ordnance doctrines and policies on an over-all basis, not just the Army missile program, during its one-day conference at the Arsenal.

An orientation tour of research and development facilities at Redstone was also scheduled.

'OPERATION FARMSIDE' DIRECTOR TO TALK AT ROCKET SOCIETY MEET

"4,000 Miles into Outer Space" will be the topic of a talk tomorrow by Herbert L. Karsch, director of "Operation Farmside." The meeting sponsored by the Alabama Section of the American Rocket Society will be held at 8 p.m. at the Huntsville Ordnance Building.

Karsch is head of Field Test Operations and director of "Operation Farmside" for Aeronutronic Systems, Inc., a subsidiary of Ford Motor Co.

"Operation Farmside" was the Air Force operation in which a rocket was launched from a huge balloon 100,000 feet above the earth.

The rocket, using four "Recruit" engines as the first stage, one "Recruit" as the second stage, four "Arrow" engines as the third stage, and one "Arrow" as the fourth stage, attained an altitude of one to four thousand miles.

The Recruit engines were developed by Thiokol Chemical Corporation - Redstone Division.

In his talk to the Huntsville group, Karsch will discuss "Operation Farmside," and will cover the program objectives, the vehicle's description, its flight dynamics, and field operations. He will also present solutions to data gathering problems at extreme altitudes (See FARMSIDE on Page 3)

Still concealed in the cone when it was flown back from San Juan, Puerto Rico, the letters were undamaged by their historic flight hundreds of miles above the earth's surface. In its descent the nose cone reached a velocity of

Thiokol's Redstone Division Reaches New High In Employment

Figures released last week show that Thiokol Chemical Corporation's Redstone Division reached a new high in employment as of May 21st. On that date the Redstone Division had 1,329 employees, with approximately 18% of the 69 new employees added during May being specially trained technical people.

Highest previous employment total for Thiokol's Redstone Division was 1,309 during the Summer of 1957. Thiokol officials said that plans call for the employment of 115 additional people, primarily technical personnel, in order to fill presently foreseeable requirements.

This will bring the personnel complement to approximately 1,450 employees exclusive of the approximately 40 Summer engineering trainees expected June 3rd.

Total employment figures for other Thiokol divisions exclusive of the Redstone Division was 3,851 as of April 30th. These were distributed between the corporation's Utah, Longhorne, Elkton, Moss Point, Trenton, Hunter-Bristol, Reaction Motors, and National Electronics Divisions.







Four additional classes are scheduled for the Hawk Key Personnel courses to meet necessary personnel requirements, and Class II starts 4 June 1958.

Hawk is a surface-to-air anti-aircraft missile, designed to intercept fast, low-flying aircraft. Missiles are remotely fired from a fully trainable three - missile launcher. The Hawk system is designed for use in the Field Army as well as in the continental United States defense. The U.S. Marine Corps will utilize the mobile version of the Hawk system.







STRAC DESIGNED FOR MOBILITY

The Army has announced the organization of its Strategic Army Corps, a force specially-tailored to deal with limited wars and to move promptly to potential trouble spots anywhere in the world. The Strategic Army Corps, or STRAC, is presently composed of the Headquarters XVIII Airborne Corps at Fort Bragg, North Carolina; 101st Airborne Division at Fort Campbell, Kentucky; 82D Airborne Division at Fort Bragg, North Carolina; 4th Infantry Division at Fort Lewis, Washington; 1st Infantry Division at Fort Riley, Kansas and supporting units. These units, based upon the Army's world-wide commitments are subject to change. 4. "STRAC is the Army's mobile combat ready force designed to meet the initial requirements of limited war or to provide initial reinforcements in a general war. STRAC's mission is to be operationally ready on a moment's notice — hence its adopted slogan: 'skilled, tough, ready around the clock.' Its effectiveness and speed of move-

ment are dependent upon the availability of adequate air and sea lift. 5. "To test the mobility and operational readiness of STRAC, the Army, in conjunction with its sister services, will conduct a series of field exercises during fiscal year 1959.

6. "In November 1958, exercise dark cloud will be conducted by the 101st Airborne Division at Fort Campbell, Ky., to provide combined unit training for an Airborne Division in all phases of airborne operations, employment of atomic weapons and improve its operational readiness. Employing 17,000 men, the exercise will be similar to exercise eagle wing held in April 1958.

7. "Joint exercise Rocky Shoals, an Army-Navy amphibious exercise, will be conducted by elements of the 4th Infantry Division from November 2 to 11 on the West Coast in the vicinity of San Simeon, California.

8. "Exercise Banyon tree during January 1959 will provide air movement of one battle group of 1,600 men from the 82D Airborne Division to Panama. In addition to the training in reinforcement of the Caribbean Command, the battle group will participate in a jungle warfare exercise dur-

ing its 10-day stay in Panama.

9. "In January-February, 1959, one battle group of 1,600 men from the 101st Airborne Division will be airlifted by the U. S. Air Force to Alaska to participate in exercise Caribou Creek, an exercise emphasizing arctic tactics and techniques.

10. "In STRATC-Ex to be conducted in February, 1959, an advance command and communications group from STRAC will be airlifted to Europe to improve its readiness for deployment and demonstrate the capability of the Army to react promptly to an emergency.

11. "Exercise Dry Hills in May 1959 will provide combined unit training for the 4th Infantry Division and test its operational readiness. The exercise will include its operational readiness.

The exercise will include an airlift of one battle group from Fort Lewis to the Yakima maneuver area, Washington.

12. "Headquarters Continental Army Command at Fort Monroe, Virginia is charged with supervising and coordinating the training of the member units of STRAC.

13. "The Strategic Army Corps is that element of the Army which is maintained in the Continental United States to meet or reinforce any initial emergency requirements throughout the world. It is an austere force, to be augmented as required to meet specific situations.

14. "In an emergency, elements of STRAC would be deployed to meet contingency requirements. New units would be designated to STRAC and reserve component units mobilized to reconstitute the Strategic Army Force so as to maintain adequate readiness for general war and to meet the requirements for any additional



AFTER YEARS OF PREPARATION, RESPONSIBILITY FOR EXPLORERS WAS IN LAP OF MISSILE FIRING LAB

(Editor's Note: This is another in a series of articles dealing with the laboratories of the Army Ballistic Agency—and the people who make them click.)

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — When all the years of planning and weeks of rocket fabrication had been completed, the responsibility for success of the Explorer satellite launchings fell upon the Missile Firing Laboratory of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency.

At its head is Dr. Kurt H. Debus, who has fired hundreds of ballistic missiles. Assisting Dr. Debus was his deputy, Dr. Hans Gruene, who likewise gained his initial rocket experience in Germany.

Two other former German rocketeers, Albert Zeiler and Karl Sandler, played key roles in the preparations for and the actual launchings of the Jupiter C rockets. They supervised the work of 16 key personnel.

One of them is Robert E. Gorman, deputy chief, Mechanical Engineering and Ground Handling Group, a graduate of Kansas State College, who resides at 604 Tanglewood Lane Eau Gallie, Fla. His group was responsible for unloading the missiles from aircraft at the Missile Test Center, checking out power-plant and propulsion systems, transporting, and erecting the missile at the launching pad, final preparations, and fueling.

John C. Miller, chief Missile Handling and Propellants Section, of 6022 Lake Underhill Rd., Orlando, Fla., supervised the handling of Jupiter C during checkout operations and fueling the missile with exact quantities of propellants required for launching. He is a graduate of Norwich University, Northfield, Vt.

The chief of the Assembly and Test Section, Thomas D. Pantolino, graduate of Mississippi State College, who lives at 7411 Neiton Way, Orlando, Fla., supervised the checkout of propulsion and pneumatic systems and missile assembly in the Army's hangar prior to erection.

During the preparation and launching phases, James K. Davidson, chief, Special Instrumentation Section, was responsible for the program device and step switch system to originate commands during flight to tilt the vehicle and also to tilt the upper stages into the proper altitude. He is a graduate of Mississippi State and lives at Bell Terrace, Whispering Hills, Titusville, Fla.

Facilities ground support was the responsibility of James H. Deese of 207 N. Oak Street, Melbourne, Fla., chief, Project Engineering Section. He attended

Georgia Tech and the U. S. Naval Academy.

His personnel established layout and design of physical structures plant for the assembly and launch, including design and direction of fabrication of missile service structures, high pressure gas supply system, liquid oxygen transfer trailers and assembly line bridge cranes.

Richard P. Dodd, chief, Electrical Engineering Design Section, directed the preparation of missile batteries, the maintenance and installation of missile test ground power supplies, and operation and maintenance system at the Army's blockhouse and hangar.

A graduate of Auburn, he lives at 113 Alachua Lane, Cocoa Beach, Fla.

The chief, Firing Section, Andrew J. Pickett of 1509 Hillside Court, Eau Gallie, Fla., was responsible for checkout of the Jupiter C powerplant and ground equipment on the launching pad and final preparation of the rocket for launch. He is a graduate of the University of Alabama.

Grady F. Williams, chief, Measuring Section, of 1112 Broadmoor, Dr., Cocoa, Fla., supervised personnel who performed rigid calibration tests of all on-missile measuring devices to assure accurate telemetered data for pre-flight test and actual flight performance evaluation.

His section designed and fabricated measuring stations and also provided instrumentation support in the Blockhouse during launch activities where accurate presentation of functional measurements necessary for firing was obtained.

Williams is an Auburn alumnus.

Pre-launch checks and calibrations of the control system in the Jupiter C were the responsibility of Carl A. Whiteside, university of Tennessee graduate, who lives at 1048 Bellefonte Ave., Cocoa, Fla. He operated the Control Panel in the Blockhouse during the firing. He is Control Section chief.

James R. White, chief, Range Instrumentation Section, planned and coordinated plans for acquiring velocity and position data after launching. He planned and operated a device which predicted apex time and other devices which confirmed the satellite orbit.

A graduate of Mississippi State College, he lives at Cocoa Beach, Fla.

The Radio Frequency and Telemetry Section, of which James E. Rorex is chief, set up and assisted in the operation of equipment used in conjunction with apex determination and giving the firing command for second stage

ignition. It also prepared and checked out the command system which provided a radio signal to ignite the stage. Also, a new type radar beacon which added the apex determination was installed and checked out.

The Telemeter Ground Station Unit, under the direction of Rorex, recorded data and made evaluations which assisted in an early determination of orbit by the Explorer. Rorex is a graduate of the University of Alabama. He lives at 141 Valencia Rd., Rockledge, Fla.

During preparation and launching of the Explorers, Milton Chambers, as chief, Gyro and Stabilizer Section, supervised the checkout of the gyro pilot, and alignment of the missile in vertical and azimuth. He is a graduate of the University of Florida and lives at 122 W. Osceola Lane, Cocoa Beach, Fla.

Isom A. Rigell, chief, Electrical Network Section, a Georgia Tech alumnus and resident of Titusville, Fla., supervised the following functions: set up testing and launching consoles and auxiliary equipment to provide recorders for monitoring the operation of automatic circuitry during tests and launching. In cooperation with other Lab sections, his personnel prepared test procedures to check out complete missile systems and evaluate the results.

His Section also prepared missile and ground automatic networks for flight. Regell particip-

ated in direction of the Blockhouse crew on countdown operations involving electrical networks.

Test Coordinator Robert E. Moser, Jr., graduate of Vanderbilt University and resident of Eau Gallie, Fla., coordinated activities of the Electrical Engineering and Guidance and Control Group. He coordinated and directed all Lab activities during the launch countdown.

Data acquisition and evaluation was the responsibility of a section supervised by Charles A. Thoman of 138 E. Suwanee Lane, Cocoa Beach, Fla., a registered electrical engineer.

Thoman supervised pre-flight evaluation of all measurements the post-flight, quick evaluation of critical functions to assure missile attitude when the Jupiter C second stage was ignited. He established liftoff, cutoff and stage ignition times.





ITALIAN AF CLASSES COMPLETE TRAINING AT OGMS 'SPACE AGE' U.

Sixty officers and enlisted men of the Italian Air Force, who will become West European "missile pioneers," have worked with the finest equipment and have been taught by the most capable instructors during their period of training at the U.S. Army Ordnance Guided Missile School.

Periods of instruction have ranged up to one year for these representatives of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization. The first group of Italian officers came to this "University of the Space Age" in June of 1957. The 12 Italian officers who graduated Monday will become supervisors of the Italian missile units to be formed on Italian soil under an agreement with the American government.

The Italian enlisted men have undergone extensive training in the inspection, repair, and maintenance of the NIKE-Ajax and NIKE-Hercules guided missile systems. These missiles will serve as a constant guard against attack by enemies of the NATO alliance.

The NIKE-Ajax missile is a supersonic anti-aircraft guided missile designed to follow and destroy the enemy target regardless of evasive action. Its development started in 1945 and constant improvements have made it an extremely effective weapon in the Army's arsenal. The NIKE provides far greater protection than was previously possible with the more limited range of conventional anti-aircraft guns.

The NIKE-HERCULES is an improvement over the smaller NIKE-Ajax and will soon become operational in the field with our missile units. It is capable of carrying an atomic warhead that can destroy an entire fleet of enemy bombers. Its range and maneuverability are far greater

AOMC Newsmen Get Award for Superior Work


Joe Jones and Don Worrell of the Army Ordnance Missile Command's Public Information Office were recipients of cash awards recently for outstanding duty performance.

Thereafter, classes from other NATO countries will be graduated in the order of their arrival at OGMS. Nations now represented at the unusual missile educational center are Belgium, Canada, Denmark, France, West Germany,

Great Britain, Italy, Netherlands, Norway, and Turkey.

By the end of 1958, the first classes from Denmark, Norway, Belgium, France, and West Germany will have finished their courses.

An interesting aspect of both the U.S. and NATO training programs is the mixture of the various branches of the military services. The Danes, French, and Norwegians are Army officers and men; the Belgians, Germans, and Italians are from the Air Forces of their respective nations. Classes from the U.S. Army, Navy, Air Force, and Marine Corps also study at the Ordnance Guided Missile School.


Vacation Classes For Bible School Announced Here






