Construction of 316 Capehart Units Set

Work Will Get Underway This Week

The construction of additional Capehart housing for 316 military families at the Army Ordnance Missile Command is expected to get underway this week.

A contract for the \$5,214,000 construction job was signed Thursday in Birmingham between the U. S. Army District Engineer, who will supervise the construction for the Army, and Jupiter Homes, Inc., a corporation sponsored by the Daniel Construction Co. of Birmingham, which will build the homes.

The closing between the contractor, the Corps of Engineers, the federal Housing Administration, and other interested parties cleared the way for multi-million dollar housing construction to begin with seven days.

The new housing will consist of 58 individual homes for field grade officers, 80 individual houses for company grade officers, and 178 duplex units for enlisted personnel. Officer housing will be located north of Goss Road, just east of present Capehart Housing. Housing for enlisted personnel will be located south of Goss Road east of present Wherry housing.

The housing units will have exteriors of brick veneer with wood siding variations. Roofs will be composed of asphalt strip shingles on wood roof decking. (See CONSTRUCTION on Page 2)

FRENCH LIAISON OFFICER ASSIGNED

The French government has assigned a full-time liaison officer to the U. S. Army Ordnance Guided Missile School here to handle administrative and other matters affecting 20 French Army and Air Force students now enrolled in classes. Col. H. S. Newhall, commandant, announced this week.

Lt. Charles-Louis de Rochechouart, 23, of Paris, has been named to the position. He is stationed in the Surface-to-Air Missile Division of the school where all the French students are now in training.

The French delegation is scheduled to be almost doubled by November when the first detachment completes courses in the Division and moves to the Unit Training Center to be formed into a tactical missile maintenance unit.

Lt. de Rochechouart received his Bachelor of Science degree in the class of 1957 at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. He has served with the French forces in Treves, Germany, and at the French Cavalry School at Saumur.

225 Pints of Blood

Donated in Emergency

Call by Red Cross Here

Redstone military and civilian personnel met an emergency call from the Red Cross for 150 pints of blood on 4 August in "true Arsenal spirit" —by donating 225 pints, according to J. G. McNeil, Post Bloodmobile publicity chairman.

Word was received from the Birmingham Blood Center that its bloodbank was at its lowest over a six-year period and that the demand was at the highest for the same period. There was no time for planning. The Arsenal Post Commander released the lower floor of the Old Officers Club for the day; Maj. Jesse A. Garner, Arsenal Bloodbank Coordinator, organized his recruiters for donors; Mrs. Marty Jean, Chairwoman of the Red Cross Volunteer Workers, gathered up her co-workers, and business was the word.

Evidence of Arsenal personnel to meet the emergency was obvious by the large group at the door at 8:30 a.m., one half-hour before scheduled opening time. Doctors, nurses, and volunteer workers also felt the urge for speed and, at the appointed opening hour, all of the beds were full of donors, filling bottles of the life-saving blood.

Miss Corrie Knight, Arsenal Red Cross Director, expressed her appreciation in stating, "It was extremely gratifying to see the response from donors and workers alike. The staff of doctors and nurses from the Center was deeply appreciative of spirit and efficient manner in which the work was carried on. And we all are thankful to Col. O'Keefe, the Arsenal Post Commander, for the use of the air-conditioned Officers Club."

Personal Calls Delay Phone Traffic, Post Signal Office Warns

The Post Signal Office has admonished all post personnel that Arsenal telephone traffic — particularly official long-distance calls — is being unduly delayed because of local off-post calls of personal nature by Arsenal personnel.

The Signal Office warned that the problem is so serious that if these personal calls are not curtailed in future to matters of emergency or extremely important personal interest, the off-post dialing privilege may be withdrawn.

Attention is invited to RSA Circular 105-2, dated 31 Jan. 1958, regarding control of phone traffic, the Signal Office added.

PROCEDURES IN DETERMINING PAY OF WAGE BOARD WORKERS REVISED

The Army and Air Force have announced important revisions in the procedures used to determine the pay of wage board (blue collar) employees.

The following advance information is furnished for the guidance of all employees concerned and for Administration Officers. No additional information is available in the Personnel Offices of AOMC. Details will be published in the near future.

The approved changes will be effected on a locality basis as revised wage schedules reflecting adjustments in prevailing rates are issued and will commence during the period of October-December 1958. It is expected that changes will be installed in all localities within a 15-month pe-

riod. No employe will suffer a reduction in pay because of installation of the revised procedures.

The changes concern principally the pay grade structure, the number of step rates for each grade and the rules for application of step rates, and the timing of wage surveys and wage adjustments.

The revised pay grade structure, earlier announced, establishes 10 pay grades for regular non-supervisors and working leaders in place of the 28 grades currently in effect. The following table shows generally the relationship between current and revised grades, although certain jobs may be reevaluated at the time the plan is installed.

The new consolidated grade structure has been designed to improve job rate alignment and to facilitate the assignment of jobs to grades.

The revised step rate plan will provide three steps in place of the four now used for regular non-supervisors and working leaders. The five per cent increments between steps will continue. Under the new arrangements employees will normally be hired at the first step and will advance to the second step after 26 weeks of satisfactory service and conduct.

Advancement to step three will require 78 weeks of satisfactory service and conduct in step two. Most advancement provisions contained in the present four step rate plan will be discontinued. In place of this feature installations will be urged to make maximum use of the sustained


... superior performance cash awards program. The approved revisions will make the number of step rates and within-grade advancement rules of Army and Air Force uniform with those of most other government agencies.

The new step rate and within-grade advancement plan also apply to special lithographic and printing schedules and to hopper dredge schedules. The present four-step rate plan will continue to apply to regular supervisory schedules pending further study of industry methods for compensating supervisor. No change is contemplated in the plan for paying laundry employees.

Difficulties in the methods used by Army and Air Force to fix the pay of regular working leaders will be paid from separate schedules which provide a differential of ten percent above the pay of the workers led.

Two OGMS Units Move Into New Buildings

It's moving time at the Ordnance Guided Missile School. The Surface-to-Surface Missile Division and the Officers Training Division are moving their men and missiles into five newly completed buildings which are a part of the six million dollar expansion program at the elaborate missile training center. All the buildings are located just north of the School Headquarters.

Col. H. S. Newhall, Missile School commandant, said the buildings were financed and constructed as a part of the 1953 Fiscal Year construction program at OGMS, and will eventually be used for training in some missiles which are still in the development stage. He said such long-range planning stresses the importance the Army is placing upon its guided missile program.

The moving activities started last Friday and will continue through this week. The Surface-to-Surface Missile Division Headquarters and the Lacrosse training facilities will occupy Bldg. 3303, just north of the

present Surface-to-Air Division Headquarters. Bldg. 3305 will be occupied by the Division Officers and the Guided Branch of the Officers Training Division, and the Ground Guidance Branch of the Corporal missile system. Bldg. 3306, a laboratory training facility, will provide new space for training in the maintenance, mechanical, and internal guidance branches of the

Corporal, and will also house the Corporal Branch officers.

The Hawk missile training facilities will occupy Bldg. 3308, Bldg. 3308, utilized temporarily by the Army Ballistic Missile Agency for storage purposes, will be used by OGMS as the Hawk training program is expanded.

Still programmed for construction is another class and laboratory facility for training in the Sergeant missile.

Col. Newhall said the new buildings will be officially dedicated in ceremonies scheduled later this year.

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ONE OF CENTRAL FIGURES IN NOSE CONE RECOVERIES IS 'SAM' HUSTON

One of the central figures in the U.S. Army's highly successful nose cone recovery program is Myron E. Huston, whose adventurous presteps have brought him from World War I to the space age.

Known as "Sam" to fellow employees at the Army Ballistic Missile Agency, Huston is project engineer and project supervisor for the Agency's recovery program. In his capacity he coordinates Army efforts with industries and other services contributing to the project.

They include Cook Research Laboratories at Morton Grove, Ill., division of Cook Electric Co., which designed the recovery gear in cooperation with the Agency's project Supervisors Office staff, and the U. S. Navy and Air Force, who provide support during actual recovery operations.

Huston is assisted by Rodolfo Barraza, who has been associated with Army Missile programs for nearly ten years, first at Ft. Bliss, Texas, and since 1950 at Redstone Arsenal. Barraza, whose experience is largely in the area of guidance and control, became assistant for the recovery program in May, 1953. He attended the New Mexico State University.

The first successful recovery was accomplished August 8, 1957, when a scale model nose cone carried by a Jupiter-C rocket was retrieved from the Atlantic Ocean. Subsequently two full-size Jupiter nose cones have been recovered, one on May 18, 1958 and a second on July 17, 1958.

Three successful recoveries in three attempts demonstrate that the Army has solved the re-entry problem by developing a nose cone which gives adequate aerodynamic heating protection to a missile warhead. The recoveries are also significant as proof that it is possible to provide adequate protection to manned vehicles returning to earth from flights in space.

Huston began his career more than 45 years ago when he left

home in Gault, Mo., at the age of 16 and joined the Navy. During World War I he commanded Naval gun crews aboard the oil tanker U.S.S. William Rockefeller, which was sunk by a German U-Boat in the North Sea on May 18, 1918. The following year he returned to the North Sea with the Mine Sweeper Fleet as an assistant repair officer on the U.S.S. Black Hawk, and witnessed the scuttling of the surrendered German Fleet in Scapa Flow harbor. He was awarded the Navy Cross Nov. 11, 1920.

After the war Huston spent 18 months as director of the Naval Optical School, Washington, D.C. He returned to civilian life in 1922 and went into private business. For the following 13 years he was owner and general manager of an automobile-machine shop in Washington, D.C. He continued his education through extension and correspondence schools studying business administration, civil law, and mechanical engineering. In 1940 he joined the staff of

the National Archives, Washington, D.C., as a mechanical design engineer. He designed and developed sound recording equipment and motion picture optical process printers for the Archives, the National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics, and the Naval Photographic Center.

He turned to the field of camouflage in 1943, spending the next three years with the Camouflage Design Unit of the Intelligence Service, Office of Strategic Services. This was followed by a year as design engineer with the State Department and five years as instrumentation design engineer for the National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics. During his service with NACA he designed the smallest, self-powered 35-mm movie camera in existence with a capacity for 100 feet of film.

Huston joined the Army missile team at Redstone Arsenal in 1952, taking charge of instrumentation and wiring assembly for the Redstone missile. Late in 1954 he undertook his first work on preliminary recovery projects and in June, 1956, assumed supervision of the Army Ballistic Agency's recovery program for Structures and Mechanics Laboratory.

Huston is a member of the American Ordnance Association, the American Rocket Society, the Rocket City Astronomical Association, the Veterans of Foreign Wars, Masons, Elks, and the Iona Club of Washington, D.C.

In addition to the Navy Cross he holds the Mexican Campaign Medal, 1913-17; the World War I Victory Medal with Silver Star and two Bronze Stars; the Missouri War Medal, World War I; Good Conduct Medals, 1913-22; and the O.S.S. Medal, World War II.

He and his wife, the former Myrtle E. Price of Abingdon, Va., reside in Huntsville and Washington, D.C. Huston has two daughters by a previous marriage, Mrs. Mary Alys Hoskins and Mrs. Martha Isabel Stancill, who reside in the metropolitan Washington, D.C. area.

He is the son of George C. Huston who now resides at 410 West E St., Ontario, Cal.

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


On behalf of the men and women of the Army, I extend congratulations to the members of the Artillery on the 183rd anniversary of its establishment.



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



Thiokol Reports Net Sales of \$32,278,284 For 6-Month Period

First six months 1953 net sales for Thiokol Chemical Corp. were \$32,278,284 as compared to \$25,667,737 for first six months of 1952. Net income for this period was \$865,756 in 1953 against \$338,493 in 1952. Earnings per share dropped from 63¢ in 1952 to 63¢ in 1953 due to increase in shares of capital stock outstanding.

Figures for both six-month periods include those of Reaction Motors which was merged into Thiokol Chemical Corp. as of May 1, 1953, and National Electronics Laboratories, Inc., a wholly owned subsidiary. Results of operations of Hunter-Bristol Division, acquired March 10, 1953, have been included for the period subsequent to that date.

Sales under government contracts for the six-month period ending June 30, 1953, showed an increase of 24% over the corresponding period for 1952 and Chemical Division sales increased 28%.

Thiokol's Redstone Division, employing more than 1,500 people, concentrates on the research and development of solid propellant rocket motors.
