SYMPOSIUM ON JUPITER SET THURS.

Meeting to Acquaint ABMA Echelons With Program

A Jupiter Symposium will be held at the Rocket Auditorium, Bldg. 7120, on Thursday (21 Aug.) to acquaint all Army Ballistic Missile Agency echelons with all aspects of the Jupiter program.

Brig. Gen. J. A. Barclay, Commander of ABMA, will open the Symposium with an address scheduled for 8:30 a.m. The program for the Symposium will be concluded at 4:30 p.m.

Topics to be discussed during the day will include the organization of the Jupiter Squadron and Operational Concept, the Training Program, Deployment Program, and Logistic Management Organization.

Jupiter will be fielded by the U. S. Air Force.

Canadian Officer Tops in First Lacrosse Class

Capt. Gordon N. Brent of the Royal Canadian Army Engineers was the honor student of the first officer class to complete training in the new Lacrosse field artillery rocket at the Ordnance Guided Missile School, Col. H. S. Newhall, Commandant, has announced.

Capt. Brent, of Kerwood, Ontario, was singled out for special commendation by Col. Newhall at graduation exercises held Friday in the Redstone Arsenal Post Theater.

The class, made up of two Canadians and 11 Americans heard one of the manufacturers of the powerful new missile describe its potential as a deadly and accurate addition to the Army's missile systems. It is launched from a light truck that can master almost any terrain.

Frederick M. Seidell, chief of training for the Martin Company's missile division at Orlando, Fla., was the principal speaker and presented the Canadian honor student with a scale model of the Lacrosse.

The Canadians are studying the new system under the mutual defense provisions of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

The colonel, who replaces Col. Leonard M. Orman, came to Patrick AFB in July from Fort Sam Houston, San Antonio, Texas, where he served for four years as Fourth U.S. Army Ordnance Officer.

A native of Barnesville, Ga., he is a graduate of the U. S. Military Academy, Class of 1931. In 1937 he received his Master's degree in Engineering from Massachusetts Institute of Technology in Cambridge.

Two Bloodmobile Visits in Week Net 668 Pints

Arsenal personnel responded to the regularly scheduled visit of the Red Cross Bloodmobile Aug. 11 by donating 427 pints of blood. This remarkable contribution was made just six days after 225 pints had been donated in answer to an emergency call for 150 pints.

The Arsenal spirit was reflected in several incidents, three of which are worth mentioning. One: Lt. Col. Charles A. Michaels brought his 10-year-old son along to watch his dad give a pint of blood. "Col. Mike" explained that the boy should get the idea early of HOW it was done — he already knew WHY.

Kingfisher Target Missile Is Hit by Talos

WHITE SANDS MISSILE RANGE, N. M. — The Army's new Kingfisher target missile, slashing across this New Mexico test center at supersonic speed, last week was successfully intercepted by the Talos guided missile.

It was the nation's first publicized firing of an anti-aircraft weapon against the new target missile which matches the speed of any known tactical aircraft in the world.

The Kingfisher, designed and built by the Lockheed Missile Systems Division, is equipped with a firing error indicator to record automatically either hits or miss-

distance and path-angle off the interceptor weapon.

It also carries a unique target augmentation device which enables it to simulate a wide variety of missiles and aircraft. The Kingfisher thus can measure the accuracy and effectiveness of advanced weapons now being developed.

Pitted against the Talos Defense Unit, undergoing tests by the Army at White Sands Missile Range, the Kingfisher was launched in its mission Aug. 12 from a B-50 high above the missile range. Shortly after launch, the Talos Defense Unit search system and

tracking radar picked up the supersonic target as it flashed through the thin air of the upper atmosphere in an attempt to penetrate the down-range defense system.

Radar data on altitude, speed, and course of the fast-moving target was fed into a computer in the fire control station, which set up an intercept trajectory for the Talos missile.

Hunched over a radar screen, the fire control officer intently watched the blip of the "hostile" attacker as it swept toward the computed intercept point.

With the push of a single but-

ton, he set the automatic firing sequence into motion. The Talos Defense Unit was now interconnected to equipment which continued to track the target, launch the missile, and guide it to the kill. In a truly tactical situation, the control officer would have selected the type of warhead to be used — high explosive or nuclear.

The Lockheed firing error indicator in the target transmitted to a ground receiving station the information that the missile had struck a vital spot. The classified but brief interval from launch to

intercept emphasized the need for a swift, reliable defense system to combat the high-flying supersonic aircraft represented by the new Kingfisher.

The Kingfisher, which Lockheed is building under a recent \$7.5 million Army contract, is 38 feet long and has a wingspan of 10 feet. It weighs more than 7600 pounds and is 29 inches in diameter.

It is recoverable by parachute and nose spike to allow reflight of the same bird time and again, saving hundreds of thousands of defense dollars.

A visit to the Bloodmobile Canteen revealed some more interesting figures. To gain the 668 pints of blood, the Canteen workers, headed by Mrs. Grace Foxworthy, brewed and poured 20 gallons of coffee, handed out 1,000 cookies, and distributed 480 half-pint cartons of milk, contributed, delivered, and iced by Meadow Gold.





Harold B. Carpenter, president of the Redstone Federal Credit Union, has announced the signing of a contract with John Hancock Life Insurance Co. for coverage of the members' Borrower's and Life Savings insurance. The new contract becomes effective on Sept. 1, 1958.

E. Claude Sanders, local insurance agent represented John Hancock Life Insurance Co. in the transaction.

It is anticipated that the change in insurance carriers will result in a substantial expense reduction to the Credit Union, Carpenter stated. The contract culminated as a result of study and interest toward achieving the best services possible by the most efficient and economical means, he

added. Insurance coverages are paid by the Credit Union on an approximate \$4,000,000 monthly. The insurance pays off loans for totally and permanently disabled members as well as the death benefit.

Life Savings insurance provides coverage equal to the savings on deposit up to \$2,000, within prescribed age limits. It is earned simply by having savings on deposit. This benefit is in addition to the annual dividend.

Details of coverage benefits will be announced in a mailing to members of the Credit Union.

Workshop on General Semantics Scheduled

Developing the ability to put on paper whatever image one is thinking of or looking at, is the purpose of a group workshop being started at the home of Bob Ross, Arsenal employe, 1606 Greenwyche Road, Montdale, at 8 p.m. Tuesday, Aug. 26.

"The techniques used in this workshop were developed from a study of the disciplines of general semantics, which is a study of the human factors involved in human communication and particularly of the processes of abstraction and verbalization. These techniques are a non-verbal codification of the processes of visual abstraction and serve to make them conscious and useable as tools. Professor Harry Holtzman of the Design Department of Brooklyn College is the originator of the techniques which he taught for several years at Seminars of the Institute for General Semantics," said Ross.

"People who have never had any art training usually do as well or better at this than many trained people because they do not have any arbitrary standards to deal with. The results of this workshop are not intended to be 'artistic' and any resemblance to art will be purely coincidental, though not unusual. People who are convinced that they cannot 'draw' are also invited because this is not a 'drawing' class, Ross







EMERGENCY HOSPITAL ON DISPLAY

State-Wide Civil Defense Meeting Scheduled for Huntsville Aug. 28

A state-wide Civil Defense meeting will be held in Huntsville on Thursday, Aug. 28, in the ballroom of the Russel Erskine Hotel. It was announced by Ransom Crawford, Director-Coordinator, Huntsville-Madison County

Civil Defense Corps. The Huntsville meeting is being promoted by the Alabama Department of Civil Defense, in cooperation with the Huntsville-Madison County Civil Defense Corps. Huntsville Mayor R. B.

Searcy and State Civil Defense Director Pitt Tyson Maner have extended an invitation to attend to all mayors and other city officials, probate judges, county commissioners and other county officials, and Civil Defense directors, coordinators, and other personnel throughout Alabama. A Civil Defense display of a 200-bed Civil Defense Emergency Hospital, which went on exhibit Tuesday at the Raymond S. Jones Armory in Huntsville, will be available for inspection by all persons attending the meeting. The exhibit will be set up through Aug. 29, and is open to the public. Redstone Arsenal personnel are urged by Crawford to see the display.

Specialists in various Civil Service Defense Corps survival services will present lectures and demonstrations at the state meeting. These will include specialists in the fields of welfare, communications, public information, attack warning, engineering, and police work. Joining with Alabama authorities in planning the meeting are officials of Region III of the Office of Defense and Civilian Mobilization, with headquarters at Thomasville, Ga. This office is an arm of the Federal government under which all Civil Defense programs are coordinated throughout the U. S. Dr. William J. McAnally, Medical Officer of the Region III Of-

fice, is expected to participate in the program at the meeting. Paul R. Blunson, Civil Defense Executive, Alabama Civil Defense Department, Montgomery, is also expected to take part. As part of the Emergency Hospital exhibit at the Armory, specialists are stationed at various points to explain the set-up to visitors. Ninety-two beds of the 200-bed hospital, plus the electrical power unit, will be ready to function. Seven of these Emergency Hospitals, with all essential equipment, are now stored in Alabama, Crawford pointed out, one each at Citronelle, Luverne, Camden, Hamilton, Alexander City, Altoona, Hartselle, and Hamilton.

Private First-Grade Class Set for Children Of Military Personnel

A private first-grade class for children of military personnel at Redstone Arsenal will be opened Sept. 2, it was announced by Mrs. P. L. Horne, Jr., who is organizing the class and will be its teacher.

The class is being established primarily to meet the needs of children who are not eligible to enter public school this fall on account of age requirements. Mrs. Horne stated. However, the class will not be limited solely to those in that category.

To enroll in the private school, a child must be six years old on or before Nov. 15. Public school requirements are that the child be six on or before Oct. 1.

Between 25 and 30 pupils are expected to comprise the Redstone class. Location of the classroom has not been definitely determined, but will be announced shortly. Hours will be from 8 a.m. to 1:30 p.m.

The class will be operated in accordance with rules and regulations of the State of Alabama, Mrs. Horne said, and is being set up "with the full cooperation" of Dr. Raymond Christian, Huntsville Superintendent of Schools.

A school fee of \$17 a month will be charged for each child.

The teacher, Mrs. Horne, is certified by the Alabama Department of Education, and has taught first grade at the West Huntsville Elementary School for the past two years. She holds a B.S. degree from the University of Kentucky, majoring in the fields of elementary education, secondary education, physical education, and music. She is the wife of Maj. Horne of the Ordnance Guided Missile School.

ARMY ADVISORS BUILD FITNESS IN HILLY HIRES

SEOUL, Korea — Two or three times a week staff officers of the headquarters, U. S. Army Advisory Group to the Republic of Korea, take a fast hike up the 2 1/2 mile road to the top of Munsan Hill.

They don't do it for the panoramic view of Seoul (which is nevertheless appreciated), but because it is part of a continuous physical conditioning program. Leading proponent of the program is Major General Willis S. Matthews, a long-time infantry officer who is now KMAC chief.


