Occupancy of New AOMC Headquarters Building Set to Start

Occupancy of the Army Ordnance Missile Command's new headquarters building at Redstone Arsenal is scheduled to start Nov. 17.

The Commanding General's office and AOMC staff offices on the second and third floors of the three-story structure (Bldg. 4505), will be occupied on that date, while Dec. 1 is the target date for final movement by other Missile Command personnel.

864TH IS SAC PIONEERING UNIT

Will Be One of First To Be Combat Ready

The Strategic Air Command's 864th Strategic Missile Squadron, now in training at Redstone Arsenal, will be one of SAC's first missile units to become combat operational. It will be deployed to an advance base overseas.

The Jupiter IRBM is a liquid-propelled ballistic missile capable of delivering its nuclear warhead at supersonic speeds against targets 1500 miles away. The men of the 864th are being trained (See 864TH on Page 3)

New IBM 705 Machine Demonstrated For Redstone Chief

A demonstration of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency Computation Laboratory's new IBM 705 electronic computer was held recently for the Redstone Arsenal Commander, Col. Keith T. O'Keefe. Observing the computer jobs demonstrated were Col. John G. Zierdt, Army Ordnance Missile Command Chief of Staff; Lt. Col. J. N. Jean, Secretary to the AOMC General Staff; and Lt. Col. G. C. Hess, S-1 for RSA.

The group was introduced to the facility by William Fortenberry, Coordinator of Commercial Applications. Dr. Helmut Hoelzer, Computation Laboratory Director, presented a brief talk on the functions of the laboratory and the role of the IBM 705 computer in handling the Command's business.

Richard Harrison and Paul McDonald, International Business Machines Corporation representatives, then explained the computer's operation to the group and demonstrated an example of its memory and processing ability.

Following the IBM demonstration, two business problems developed by RSA personnel were placed on the computer by Jerry Dean, Matt Blue, and Raymond Reed, programming and operational employees of General Elec- (See NEW IBM on Page 3)

ARGMA Completes Its Part of UGF Campaign

Leads Post Drive; Virtually 100 Pct. Participation Gained

The Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency completed its 1958 Redstone United Givers Fund drive last week with 100 percent military participation and 99.5 civilian participation, it was announced by Stuart H. Jones, Executive Chairman of the UGF campaign.

ARGMA, which is commanded by Brig. Gen. J. G. Shinkle, is leading in the percent participation figures which show that 84.1 of the personnel at Redstone Arsenal have contributed to UGF so far.

It is anticipated that at least half of the Huntsville-Madison County UGF goal of \$250,000 will come from the Redstone UGF drive.

Some 2,905 of the 2,929 civilian personnel at ARGMA have made contributions. All of the 144 military personnel have contributed.

Canadian Army to Get Lacrosse

The U. S. Army's Lacrosse guided missile will soon become part of the armament of the Canadian Army as well, it was announced by the U. S. Army Ordnance Missile Command.

Maj. John E. Caryl, Canadian Army Liaison Officer at Redstone Arsenal, site of AOMC headquarters, said Canadian Prime Minister John Diefenbaker has announced that Canada will es-

tablish a battery of Lacrosse missiles.

The Lacrosse, one of the most accurate and efficient of the surface-to-surface missile family, was developed under cognizance of the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency.

A contingent of Canadian soldiers recently finished training in Ordnance maintenance concepts (See CANADIAN on Page 12)



pleted and by Nov. 17 it is anticipated that most of the furniture will be in place.

Col. C. F. Nooncaster, AOMC Assistant Chief of Staff for Operations, is in charge of the move, assisted by Capt. Bartol F. Stone, Enoch Sparks, Richard Walker, and John L. Wommack.

Capt. Stone is Assistant to the Chief, Technical Materials and Equipment Branch, ABMA; Sparks is General Supply Officer for Logistics Division in Support Operations, AOMC; Walker is Chief of Supply, AOMC; and Wommack is Assistant Chief of the Storage Branch, Consolidated Supply Division, Redstone Arsenal.

The new headquarters, costing

approximately \$1,330,000, is being built by Daniel Construction Co., of Birmingham. It is white with interior walls of mint green. The floor is covered with alternate blocks of green and brown asphalt tile. Baseboards are ceramic tile. Ceilings of the new building are of acoustical tile with recessed fluorescent lighting. The building is steam heated and air conditioned.


At present, there is no cafeteria, but excavation for one was started two weeks ago. It will be located some 30 feet south of the office building and connect with a corridor.

J. A. Jones Construction Co. of Atlanta has the \$199,000 contract. Expected date of completion is May 15, 1959.

tric Corporation. The jobs that normally take several people many days to prepare manually were computed and printed on high speed printers in a few minutes.

Other guests were Howard Holland from the Comptroller's Office, OCO; Louis Graberster, Civilian Assistant to the Chief of Staff, AOMC; William McComber, AOMC Control Office; and John Hedeon, James France, Robert Weyandt, and Raymond Kline from the ADPS staff of Redstone Arsenal.

Two other groups from RSA also toured the laboratory. Officials of the Civilian Personnel Division, Provost Marshal, Quartermaster, Finance and Accounting, and Depot Operations were afforded their first look at the new computer.

Large-scale business computers are to handle routine, high-volume data processing for many business operations now performed manually or on slower machines. Problems concerning logistics have been processed on electronic equipment for some time and have proven so successful that rapid expansion is planned.

at Redstone to maintain and operate the giant, cigar-shaped missile, its powerful engine, and the complex electronic systems which control all phases of its flight and impact on target.

Commander of the 864th is Col. William C. Erlenbusch, a soft-spoken, mild-mannered officer who clearly intends that his squadron be thoroughly professional in the missile field. He has insisted from the beginning that every man, regardless of primary duty, take at least a few basic courses in missile maintenance and operation.

"We're a missile squadron," he says, "and I think all of us should know something of missiles and be able to talk about them to each other and to civilians. Even those of us not directly working with missiles will be able to do a better job if we are familiar with our weapon and its operation." Col. Erlenbusch himself has been connected with missiles since June 1956 when he was transferred from SAC to the Air Force Ballistic Missile Division at Inglewood, Calif.

Training is tough at Redstone and many of the men find it necessary to put in extra hours in the classroom, but no one has failed a single course yet; in fact, half of the men are averaging grades of 90 and above.

The squadron goes to school in two shifts, the first beginning at 7 a.m. and the second ending at midnight. A majority of the men are required to take several of the 21 different courses on the Jupiter. Studies range from a one-day munitions orientation course to a seven-months-long program which is required to teach an already-skilled technician the fine points of analyzing various missile systems.

Most of the men volunteered to enter the missile field, and all were chosen on the basis of past training and skills which could be converted quickly and easily to missile maintenance and operation.

"They're top men," Col. Erlenbusch says. "They were carefully screened for selection as missilemen, and the quality of their work here has proved each an expert

in his field."

When the squadron goes into overseas operation, it will be equipped with 15 missiles, each capable of wiping out a large target complex. Eventually, all will be maintained in the vertical upright on a launching pad and ready for immediate firing. Each

Three tables of canasta were played last week with Mrs. Joachim Severino, high, and Mrs. E. R. Coogan, low.

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
Tom Stramiello, speaking on "Vocal Variety," was selected the best speaker of the evening at the Redstone Toastmasters meeting of Oct. 21.







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
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

REDSTONE ARSENAL FLYING CLUB

Post's Part-Time Pleasure Pilots Developing Busy Organization

Redstone's squadron of part-time pleasure pilots is developing into a busy organization of amateur aviators. It's called the Redstone Arsenal Flying Club.

Recently, with only two flyable planes in its fleet, the rolls of the organization were closed to new applicants, in order that the demand for flight time could be met. Now, with four planes flying, a fifth reserved for airframe and engine training on the ground, and a sixth on its way, RAFC President Sion Bass has issued an invitation to interested pilots and potential pilots to submit membership applications.

Organized late last year to promote flying interest and ability among the arsenal's military and civilian personnel, the club began its active life with two planes, a low-wing four-place Navion and a 125-horsepower Super Cub.

During the Winter the group purchased a Cub for maintenance training. The recent addition of two 90-horsepower trainers has expanded the club's facilities to a point that it feels able to accommodate several additional members.

In line with its announced purpose of developing pilots within the Army, the club has worked out a program designed to bring flight training within the reach of all interested Arsenal personnel.

Qualified club members have volunteered their time to instruct on the ground and in the air. A ground school rivaled only at first-class aviation academies is operated with personal instruction and visual aids. CAA-licensed instructors are available to give flight training during the initial phases of a student's education.

To match the interest of club members in fostering the spirit of aviation among its personnel, the Arsenal has made available surplus liaison aircraft to the club without initial cost to the organization.

These two factors — skilled volunteer instructors and aircraft — combine to make available the finest possible aviation training at the lowest possible cost to the trainee.

To further its training program, the club has developed a special "package plan." The plan offers new members complete training leading to a private pilot's license at a fixed fee.

Included in the package is a complete ground course in such necessary subjects as navigation, weather, CAA regulations, and theory of flight. Also covered are 40 hours of flight time, and 17 hours of airborne instruction. The initiation fee and club dues for the first six months of membership are also included in the cost of the package.

But for all its accent on the training of new pilots, the club hasn't neglected the experienced pilot in its plans.

The Navion, the Super Cub, and the soon-to-arrive Cessna 195 satisfy the desires of the most particular advanced pilot.

No "pea-patch" plane, the Navion handles four hefty adults and plenty of baggage at a cruising speed of 135 miles per hour. The Super Cub is equipped with flaps, an electric starter, and 125

horses. The Navion is equipped for instrument instruction, as will be the 300-horsepower five-place Cessna when it arrives.

Hourly costs of using club aircraft run just about half the usual fee — and planes can be taken out for weekend or holiday hops by advance reservation. Members often make flights to

Folrida's beaches, to big-city shopping facilities, or home to visit the folks.

Some of the brightest lights of both aeronautics and astronautics are club members. Included among card-holding aviation enthusiasts as honorary members are Gens. J. B. Medaris, J. G. Shinkle, and J. A. Barclay. Dr. Wernher von Braun is a charter member and an avid pilot. Club Vice-President Robert Lusser took top honors in six international air races prior to World War II.

The club is headed by Sion Bass, president, and by Vice-President Lusser. Secretary is Lt. Rein Ise, and treasurer is Lt.

Barry Allan. Homer Wilson serves as member-at-large. Capt. James Breece is operations officer, and Jay Salmanson occupies the post of maintenance officer. George Leinbough heads the flight safety committee. Any of the club's officers may be contacted by applicants for membership.

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



(Continued from Page 1) connected with the Lacrosse at the Ordnance Guided Missile School. Maj. Caryn stated. Additional Canadian troops are expected to receive training at OGMS in the near future.

Selected Canadian soldiers have also been training in operation of the Lacrosse at Ft. Sill, Okla., and Ft. Bliss, Texas.

Prime Minister Diefenbaker's announcement stated that one-half of the Canadian battery of 220 men will be deployed with the Canadian Brigade in Germany and the remainder at the Canadian Artillery School in Canada. Mr. Diefenbaker said the Canadian Army had carefully studied surface-to-surface missiles in light of Canada's new tactical concept of deployment of forces, and that the Lacrosse appeared to be the most suitable system for the Army's needs. He said that as part of the modernization of the Canadian Army there was a requirement for a ground missile system with greater fire power and longer range than now available with conventional weapons.

The Prime Minister announced that the missile battery comprised four launching devices, associated fire-control equipment, and 12 missiles. These will be procured at an estimated initial cost of \$1,198,000, he said, adding that procurement of such a battery would also involve a recurring annual cost of \$360,000, attributed chiefly to the cost of additional missiles to replace those used in training.

The Lacrosse is a general support field artillery guided missile for use in close tactical support of ground troops. It is an all-weather weapon capable of carrying highly effective area type warheads, including nuclear, and sufficiently accurate for destroying strongly fortified pin-point targets. It can replace or supplement conventional artillery. The propulsion system used by the Lacrosse is a solid propellant rocket motor. The system includes the missile, a launcher mounted on a standard Army truck, and other guidance equipment.
