Hawk Missile Hunts Down Fastest Target Available In Successful Testing

ARGMA Built Weapon Fired Against Supersonic Drone at White Sands

The Army's Hawk Missile System was successfully demonstrated last week at White Sands Missile Range, New Mexico, against the fastest flying target available for test, a supersonic XQ-5 missile, the Department of the Army announced.

Instrumentation carried in lieu of a warhead indicated the intercept would have been successful.

The Hawk is a deadly accurate surface-to-air missile system, designed specifically to attack targets at extremely low altitudes.

The XQ-5 target missile was designed by Lockheed, and is powered by ram-jet engine capable of flying at several times the speed of sound.

The Hawk system was designed by the Raytheon Manufacturing Company of Bedford, Mass. under the cognizance of the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency.

Hawk is able to operate in the continental United States and also as a mobile air defense weapon with Army and Marine forces in the field. It can be transported over unimproved roads and by helicopter or cargo aircraft.

Last R&D Redstone Fired

FLIGHT TEST PROGRAM BEGAN FIVE YEARS AGO

An Army Redstone ballistic missile was launched Wednesday night from Cape Canaveral, Fla., the final missile in the research and development flight test program which began more than five years ago.

The "graduation" shot again confirmed the reliability of the current model of the Redstone, which is now fully operational and in the hands of troops.

Redstone is America's first entry in the field of large ballistic missiles. It was first launched Aug. 20, 1953. The Redstone has been on site with NATO Shield Forces in Europe since June, 1958, deployed by U. S. Army troops. Other Redstone battle groups are in training for deployment.

The Redstone was developed by the Army Ballistic Missile Agency, Army Ordnance Missile Command. It is produced by the Chrysler Corporation at the Michigan Ordnance Missile Plant near Detroit. Wednesday's missile, like all others launched in the past two years, was produced by Chrysler.

Wednesday's firing was the 34th successful launching in the past two years. Of the most recent 13 missiles launched, 12 were successful and one was partially successful.

In addition to its role as a key Army Weapon, the Redstone in modified form was used as the first stage of the launching vehicle which placed the Army Explorer satellites in orbit.

Redstone Due to Undergo Tactical Firing by Troops at White Sands

WHITE SANDS MISSILE RANGE, N. M.—Redstone, the Army's largest tactical ballistic missile, was unwrapped at White Sands Missile Range last week to undergo tactical type firings by troop units prior to deployment of Redstone missile units to defense positions overseas.

Research and development testing of the Redstone, under way at Cape Canaveral since August, 1953, has been concluded. The first overland tactical firing by Army troops took place at this Range June 2. The 40th Field Artillery Group (Redstone) is now deployed with NATO Shield Forces.

Organized Army units will be sent here for training and field firing of the Redstone. The Redstone program is scheduled to get under way here next year.

Transfer of the Redstone launchings from the Atlantic Missile Range, at Cape Canaveral, to this overland range was carried out because of better control conditions and optimum instrumentation afforded by an overland range.

In addition, the range offers troops the opportunity to use complete tactical equipment under tactical conditions. However, because of WSMR's 100-mile-long range limitation, launchings over the full range of the Redstone will continue at Cape Canaveral.

A surface-to-surface ballistic missile, Redstone is capable of delivering an atomic warhead over a range of about 200 miles. It is 62 feet long and weighs more than 22 tons when fueled. It extends and supplements the range and firepower of conventional artillery in the hands of combat troops.

Redstone was developed by the Army Ballistic Missile Agency, Huntsville, Ala. ABMA and WSMR are elements of Army Ordnance Missile Command.

A modified Redstone was the first stage of the history-making Jupiter C missile which thrust the Free World's Explorer satellites into orbit.

Planning for Redstone firings at WSMR began more than 18 months ago. Military and civilian personnel have been undergoing intensive schooling at the Army Ballistic Missile Agency and the Michigan Ordnance Missile Plant near Detroit, operated for the Army by Chrysler Corporation, where Redstones are produced. This training has been under the direction of the Missile Agency's Training Division.

The Field Support Division of the Missile Agency will coordinate the Redstone test firing program at WSMR through its mis-

tile Systems Evaluation Office, which now has a small liaison office here for this purpose.

As a coordinating agency, the Evaluation Office will be a central clearing house for equipment requirements, test requirements, allocation of equipment and materials, gathering of information as a result of firings, and evaluation of this information. The Office will support all agencies interested in the program including the Army Ballistic Missile Agency, White Sands Missile Range, Fort Sill, and the Continental Army Command.

A missile assembly building has been built for the Redstone activity here.

Also completed is a huge gantry crane, costing more than \$700,000, which will be used to service the telemetry and other instrumentation of the Redstone at the launching site here.

Attached to the Redstone Project are 46 Army uniformed personnel and 14 Army civilian personnel who will comprise the permanent White Sands Missile Range unit which will provide technical assistance to Army units arriving at WSMR for tactical firings. The personnel are attached to the Systems Test Division at Ordnance Mission.

The Redstone was the progenitor of the Jupiter, the Army's version of the Intermediate Range Ballistic Missile (IRBM), which has a range of 1,500 nautical miles. Chrysler Corporation is the prime contractor for Jupiter also. This system will be deployed by Air Force squadrons.

Redstone was named for the place of its development at Redstone Arsenal, Ala.

OGMS GRADUATES 'HIGH-BROW' CLASS; HALF STAY AS FACULTY

Two of the most highly educated classes in the history of the Ordnance Guided Missile School were graduated last week and half of the graduates were given staff and faculty assignments at the "Space Academy"—all who could be obtained under Army orders.

The 45 graduates, ranking from captains to warrant officers, had previously trained at 39 technical universities, ranging geographically from Berlin to California.

The student officers were almost evenly divided between courses in anti-aircraft and field artillery missiles and include two Canadians who are also being assigned to the Missile School's expanding faculty.

The graduates heard Lt. Col. Claude C. Young, Deputy Assistant Chief of Staff for Support

Operations of the Army Ordnance Missile Command Headquarters, emphasize the widening career opportunities for young officers in missile specialties.

"The shortage of commissioned officers in the Ordnance Corps today is critical and is most acute in the guided missile field," he declared.

"World-wide requirements for Ordnance Corps officers have passed 6,000 now and will be 7,000 by 1964. But by then the one-third ratio now engaged in missilery will increase to 45 per cent of all Ordnance officers," he said, pointing out that there are now less than 5,000 such officers on active duty.

One-fourth of the entire Army budget now goes for missiles, and this proportion will steadily increase, opening further career opportunities, he said.



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

Quarterly Insurance Payments Eyed by Hospitalization Unit

The AOMC-ABMA Hospitalization Committee has announced that in view of the apparent desire of a great majority of Blue Cross-Blue Shield members to pay insurance premiums quarterly rather than monthly, the company was contacted to determine the feasibility of such a move. It was the decision of the Committee that the change-over could be accomplished.

In order to coordinate this change-over, key representatives are provided the following information:

Newly hired employees who are covered by another hospitalization plan, and those who do not have coverage must wait until the beginning of the quarter to become members of the group. Employees transferring from Redstone Arsenal or the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency will be required to pay their premiums to their former collectors until the beginning of the quarter.

The delinquent grace period will remain 60 days, and it will be the responsibility of the member to send his three-month payment directly to the Birmingham office if he is unable to pay his insurance in the normal manner. Otherwise he will be dropped before the next quarterly billing.

The effective date of this change over will be Dec. 15, 1958. This means that the invoices received on that date will indicate that a three-month payment will be collected from each member, unless some are delinquent. Each member is urged to be up to date on payments on the Nov. 15th billing, so that he will not have to pay more than a three-month payment on Dec. 15th.

Mello Heads Project To Reduce Unemployment In Huntsville Area

A project to use electronic tabulating equipment at Redstone Arsenal in an attempt to help decrease unemployment in Huntsville is being headed by Robert F. Mello, Director of Civilian Personnel, Army Ordnance Missile Command.

Basic facts about jobless people are being recorded on punch cards. It is estimated that there are 3,000 unemployed in the community. Then the cards are to be fed into a tabulator and have in 20 minutes a description of the unemployed group from any of a number of points of view.

The jobless reports are being compiled from records of the Huntsville office of the Alabama Employment Service. The cards will be available for the use of C. V. Evans, head of the local employment office, and his staff.

The tabulating equipment is being supplied to the project by the International Business Machine Corp. The IBM equipment is provided without charge. Supervising the tabulating is Leonard Brockman, Chief, Program Development, Civilian Personnel Office, Redstone Arsenal.

Mello heads a six-man committee of the Society for Personnel Administration that undertook the project Sept. 16 as a study of human resources. "I believe we're going to come up with a new approach to handling unemployment information before we're through," Mello stated. "We are actually doing an engineering job on our work force."

Mello's committee was formed after Milton K. Cummings, Huntsville industrialist, urged an effort by the community to make sure that all of its members have a chance to earn a living and lead a worthwhile life.

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In 5-Year Development Program, Redstone 'Comes of Age'

* * *



FOR THE TROOPS — Today's Redstone, now ready for deployment with troop units throughout the world, is the result of five years development by Army scientists of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency.

The Redstone missile, whose "coming of age" was marked by the successful firing of the final research and development test missile Wednesday night, has been under development by the U. S. Army for five years.

Known as the Army's "Sunday Punch," the Redstone is a highly accurate, liquid propelled, surface-to-surface missile capable of transporting nuclear or conventional warheads against targets at ranges up to approximately 200 miles.

The Redstone fills the Army's need for mobility because the missile, its launching equipment and fuel, are transportable by truck convoy and airlift.

The missile was developed under the direction of Dr. Wernher von Braun, who heads the Development Operations Division at the Army Ballistic Missile Agency.

The first Redstone was launched on August 20, 1953. There have been 34 Redstones successfully fired in the past two years as part of the research and development program. The results of these firings gave Army missile, which will be deployed with troop units throughout the world.

The firings are also witness to an impressive list of "firsts" for the Army's missile programs.

Redstone was the first U. S. ballistic missile to successfully employ the inertial guidance system, a completely self-contained system which renders the missile immune to known types of counter measures.

It was the first large U. S. ballistic missile to be fired by troops, as members of the 40th Field Artillery Missile Group (Heavy) successfully fired it from the Atlantic Missile Range, Fla., on May 16, 1958.

A second troop firing by Detachment "B" of the 40th Group from the White Sands Missile Range, N. M., on June 2, 1958, was the first overland firing of the Redstone by troops.

These two troop firings marked the "graduation" of the 40th Field

Artillery Missile Group prior to deployment. When the group joined NATO Shield Forces in 1958, the Redstone became the first large U. S. ballistic missile to be deployed overseas.

In addition to its normal development program, the Redstone has served as a forerunner and contributor to the Army's Intermediate Range Ballistic Missile - Jupiter. Another series of firings for the Redstone is connected with its use as a test vehicle for Jupiter components.

A modified Redstone was main stage for a composite vehicle which on September 20, 1956, accomplished the first truly long range flight of a ballistic missile, speeding more than 3000 miles over the Atlantic Ocean. This vehicle was dubbed Jupiter C because of its role in the Jupiter development program.

It was this same composite missile which, on August 8, 1957, fired the first heat protected nose cone into space that was later recovered from the waters of the Atlantic.

However, the Jupiter-C is most famous for its role as launching vehicle for the free world's first earth satellite, Explorer I, hurled into orbit on Jan. 31, 1958. Subsequently two more satellites have been launched by the Jupiter -C, Explorers III and IV.

With the completion of research and development, the Redstone will undergo tactical troop firings prior to deployment of other missile units overseas. The majority of these firings will be conducted at White Sands Missile Range, an element of the Army Ordnance Missile Command. The tactical firing program is scheduled to begin early next year.

The Army Ballistic Missile Agency will serve as coordinator for this program. For this purpose the Agency has established a Missile Systems Evaluation Office as part of its Field Support Division, with a small liaison office at White Sands.

In addition, the Agency's Training Division has played an important role in preparing White Sands Missile Range personnel for their role in assisting with the firings.

Prime production contractor for the Redstone Missile is Chrysler Corporation. Chrysler has been producing Redstone missiles for the past two years.



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

Paul E. Teager Named 'Safety Supervisor'

Paul E. Teager, Foreman, Instrument Development Section, Test Laboratory, ABMA, has been selected "Safety Supervisor of the Week" because of the excellent record his section has maintained, it was announced by the RSA Safety Division.

The section is justly proud of its record of never having had a lost-time accident and its current 272 days accident-free experience with respect to minor first aid injuries. The accident experience board which Teager is holding in photo above is a daily reminder that safety vigilance is paying off.

"Our safety philosophy in the prevention of accidents is directed toward proper operation of machinery," said Teager. "We know that machines cannot think for themselves. Each time an operator starts a machine, he is subject to mistakes and mistakes result in injuries. Once a machine has been properly guarded, that hazard has been essentially eliminated. To properly guard against the human element, we must always be alert for faulty operating technique. I'm just the foreman here, no one person is responsible for our good record; we just work together for common benefit. We all try to be chips off the same block."

Because he is a good "all-round" employee and he has always been very safety conscious, William J. Cole, Equipment Installer-Repairer, of the Electrical Equipment Section, ABMA Guidance and Control Lab, has been recommended by his supervisors to be the "Safe Worker of the Week," the RSA Safety Division announced.

Cole is married and has two children, Karen, 3, and Cynthia, 1; they live at Tanner, seven miles south of Athens. He is a real hobbyist with water skiing, boating, and hi-fi heading the list. He especially enjoys building his own hi-fi systems.

Cole is a native of New York state, but came to Redstone Arsenal from Eglin Air Force Base, Fla. He is one of the oldest in length of service in the Electrical Equipment Section and is proud to say that he has not been involved in an accident of any serious kind.

Cole believes that safe performance of the job must be placed on the same level as doing the job itself. Naturally, with his water-skiing and boating hobbies, he must place off-the-job safety high in importance too.

Teager was born in Magdeburg, Germany, in 1894. He received his professional training at Magdeburg school for tool and die makers. In 1923 he came to the U. S. and was employed at many different jobs to raise enough money to supply himself with the necessary tools to begin his trade as a tool and die maker. He relates one of his most unforgettable experiences which occurred near the end of the day's work while working in a copper mine, "I wanted to fill the last ore car, so I climbed into the main ore chute which resulted in a severe rock slide and I almost lost my

life. This incident keeps me mindful that the easy way is often the hard way."

Teager came to Redstone Arsenal in 1952 after several years with A. O. Smith Corporation. He was promoted to a foreman in 1953. In 1957 he became foreman of the Instrument Development Section.

Mr. and Mrs. Teager, who reside at 1202 McClung St., S. E., Huntsville, have one son, Fred H. Teager, a graduate engineer now employed in Florida.
