### Key Civilian Scientists Holding Meet on Post

The 7th Annual Meeting of Army Key Civilian Scientists got underway Tuesday when 80 scientists and top military leaders from the Army's technical services arrived by plane at the Army Ordnance Missile Command airstrip.

Brig. Gen. J. M. Colby, Deputy Commander, AOMC, was on hand to welcome the group which is headed by Lt. Gen. Arthur G. Trudeau, Chief of Research and Development, Office of the Chief of Staff, Department of the Army, and Dr. William H. Martin, Director of Research and Development, Department of the Army.

The three-day meeting will provide military and scientific personnel an opportunity to exchange information in fields of interest related to the Army Research and Development Program. It will afford scientists an opportunity to meet and exchange ideas.

Dr. Gilford G. Quarles, Chief Scientist, AOMC, is project officer of the meeting whose participants include Dr. Harold C. Weber, Chief Scientific Adviser to the Army's Chief of R&D; Dr. Richard A. Weiss, Scientific Advisor, Research Division, Office of the Chief of Staff, Army; Brig. Gen. Theodore J. Conway, Office Chief of R&D; Dr. Nicholas E. Golvin, Chief Scientist, White Sands Proving Ground; Dr. Oswald H. Lange, Deputy Director of the Computation Laboratory, Army Ballistic Missile Agency; Dr. Ralph C. Swann, Technical Director, Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency, Dr. Ernst Stuhlinger, Director of Research Projects Laboratory, ABMA; Col. Matthew R. Collins, Jr., Chief of R&D, ARGMA and Dr. Eberhardt Rechtin, Jet Propulsion Laboratory.

This Seventh Annual Meeting of Army Civilian Scientists marks the first such meeting to be held at an Ordnance installation. Previous meetings were held at Ft. Benning, Ga.; Ft. Knox, Ky.; Ft. Bliss, Tex.; Ft. Belvoir, Va.; Ft. Eustis, Va.; and Ft. Huachuca, Ariz.

### First Belgian, French Students to Graduate From OGMS on Friday


The first classes of trained missile experts from Belgium and France will graduate Friday from the Ordnance Guided Missile School, bringing to five the number of North Atlantic Treaty Organization nations whose pioneer missile units have been schooled at the Redstone Arsenal "Space Academy."

Sixty officers and men of the Royal Belgian Air Force and the French Army and Air Force will receive their diplomas from Col. H. S. Newhall, Commandant of the Missile School.

They have been training for more than a year in the Nike-Ajax and Nike-Hercules anti-aircraft missiles now being deployed to bolster NATO defenses. There are 30 graduates from each nation.

The first missile units from Italy, Denmark, and Norway were graduated from the School during the Spring and Summer.

Still in training are other units from West Germany, Turkey, the Netherlands, and Greece.

### DRIVE NEARLY DOUBLES LAST YEAR'S AMOUNT

Post Campaign Ends on Schedule; Funds Still Come in

The 1958 Redstone Arsenal United Givers Fund campaign has been concluded on schedule with excellent participation by Arsenal and contractor personnel, netting a total of \$153,490, according to an announcement by Stuart H. Jones, Executive Chairman of the Redstone UGF drive.

In addition to the above figures reported at the close of business Friday, contractor contributions—prorated on a yearly basis—and contributions which were being tallied as the Redstone Rocket went to press, will bring the total to more than \$155,000 in contributions and pledges, Jones said.

This is almost twice the amount raised for the fund last year. Of this amount, \$145,000 has been collected or is being collected through the process of payroll deductions by some of the contractors.

Arsenal contribution totals were as follows: Army Ordnance Missile Command Headquarters, \$6,936; Army Ballistic Missile Agency, \$48,702; Army Rocket & Guided Missile Agency, \$36,619; Ordnance Guided Missile School, \$8,485; Redstone Arsenal, \$33,261; and Area Engineers, \$1,095.

Rohm & Haas contributions totaled \$4,701, and Thiokol totals were \$13,691.

Civilian contributions on post were \$138,490, and military contributions totaled \$14,000.

The Redstone UGF campaign was opened on September 15 and was officially closed on November 15.

There were 500 UGF solicitors and 100 monitors.

The theme of this year's campaign was 100 percent participation with "Fair Share" giving.

The achievement marked another "first" for Redstone Arsenal personnel who had been urged at the outset of the campaign by Maj. Gen. J. B. Medaris, AOMC (See DRIVE NEARLY, Page 2)

### Ceremony Mon. to Mark Transfer Of New Hq. Building to Command



is a constant menace. The erasure of geographic boundaries and the velocity of interaction of forces achieved by the guided missile can be perverted for destruction and conquest."

Surprise attack on the scale available to the missile-armed power is not an advantage to the NATO, he pointed out. "It is the weapon of the thief and the betrayer. The availability of such tremendous forces exposes man to temptation of the gravest sort. Expediency may overcome right unless we put forward a positive unified effort to advance morality and ethics among nations as well as among individuals."

On the other hand, the general said, "The conquest of time and space reinforces our desire to expose the dark corners of earth to light, knowledge, and understanding. The acceleration of scientific and engineering efforts, a basic requirement to create new instruments of power, will awaken even the most abject mentality to appreciate the nature and patterns of the Universe and promote an awareness of the existence of Power greater than man. This influence of advancing technology may well prove beneficial."

In his address, Gen. Medaris evaluated the tactical and strategic influence of missile power upon the balance of forces, and suggested the influence these modern weapons systems will have upon the organization and equipment of military forces.

Defining the characteristics of rockets, he stated that "rocket technology has achieved fantastic results, but I assure you that we are a long way from 'push-button' warfare."

Describing missiles in the U. S. arsenal of weapons, Gen. Medaris said the Army employs them to accomplish two of its vital missions: to assist in the defeat of enemy ground forces and to defend strategic and tactical targets against air or space attack.

Gen Medaris asked the NATO gathering, "How can we simultaneously inhibit those influences contrary to our high purposes and exploit those which will best serve them?" He suggested action in three areas—military, political, and ethical.

In the military area, he stated,

we must create and maintain adequate counter forces to prevent the use of powerfully destructive weapons by aggressors. "By universally demonstrating the logic of 'crime does not pay' we may persuade a potential enemy to abandon war as an instrument of international policy. By providing deterrents of sufficient power, sufficiently protected to assure swift and certain retaliation, we may accomplish the release of men from this unholy commitment and allow them opportunity to better things. But we cannot be influenced only by the ultimate peril; our assets must be able to deal effectively with any conceivable type of international crime. Extreme selectivity and an unending search for versatility should be given our choice of new military methods and weapons. Our concern is not the imposition of vengeance but the elimination of unprincipled and unprovoked assault as an instrument of aggression."

In the political area, the general continued, we should emphasize the positive forces inherent in the breakdown of ancient barriers. "We should at once insist upon the absolute freedom of outer space to prevent the erection of arbitrary limits by those who seek to control the wonders of creation. Earth satellites and other space vehicles should be employed to make the 'open space' policy effective. By this means, we can also expose the cesspools of human inequity and the purposes of power-hungry enemies of human progress to the light of world knowledge."

Lastly and most vital of all, Gen. Medaris concluded, "We must spur the development of ethical and spiritual stature to guarantee proper control of the immense energies at man's disposal."

The final battle is the age-old war between good and evil for the control of men's minds, he declared. "The voice of conscience must speak louder as power increases to bring men everywhere to a moral and spiritual regeneration. It is our solemn obligation to dedicate our resources to principle rather than to expedient, to the will of God rather than to the willfulness of men. Evil prevails only against the individual. When man unites his forces for good, nothing can deter him from the final victory."

Commanding General and Chairman of the post's UGF drive, to meet its pledge "to the halt, the blind, the sick, and the needy, willingly and promptly, just as it has met its pledges on time and in every case to the nation in the scientific and military fields."

## FORMATION OF LOCAL CHAPTER OF ASSN. OF U. S. ARMY EYED

Formation of a local chapter of the Association of the U.S. Army was discussed in Huntsville last week.







**War I Vet Reminisces**

**SMALL PAY, LONG HIKES AMONG MEMORIES OF O. B. SCHLOTTERBECK**

"We got 8 to 10 dollars a month and sometimes walked three miles to get a sandwich," reminisced O. B. Schlotterbeck of the Redstone Arsenal Photo Lab as he looked back to his days in France during World War I.

The Army Ordnance Missile Command gave special recognition to its World War I veterans in connection with the observance of Veterans Day last week.

Schlotterbeck is one of more than 120 World War I veterans employed with Redstone Arsenal, an element of the Command. He was working in a photo studio at Poplar Bluff, Mo., when called into service in January 1918 as part of the Air Service Branch,

Signal Corps, U. S. Army.

He completed three months training at Madison Barracks, New York, followed by two weeks at Baker Field, Rochester, N. Y. On August 1 he departed for France from Hoboken, N. J., arriving 12 days later, on August 13, at Brest as part of the 30th Photo Section.

"We unloaded lumber at Brest for the first two weeks," he recalled, "and then were assigned to the Second Air Service Training Base, Tours France, where I was an instructor in photography. We worked mainly with aerial photography-reconnaissance pictures and mosaic air maps."

November 11, 1918, Schlotterbeck assisted with the mapping of the continental borders of Europe.

"It was a tremendous task involving 20,000 negatives or more," he explained. "We worked day and night for several months."

On April 1, 1919, he left the Training Base for Bordeaux and shipment back to the United States. He sailed from Bordeaux on May 5 and was discharged from service shortly after his arrival home.

"I might have been a pilot," he pointed out, "but my certificate didn't come through until after the war."

Afer his discharge from the Army, Schlotterbeck returned to the studio at Poplar Bluff. He has remained in the photo business ever since.

"I was part owner of a studio at Cherokee, Ia., for 17 years, spent four years working for one of the largest photo companies in the country, and was in business for myself for three years at Montgomery, Ala.," he explained as he recounted his work over the past 39 years.

He worked with W. S. King at the time when King invented the process of reversal for motion picture film, making possible the production of home movie cameras. It was 1921 and Schlotterbeck was employed with the Sioux City, Ia., Tribune, where King was head photographer.

Schlotterbeck began doing photo work for the government in 1941 at Maxell Field, Ala., where he remained for five and a half years before establishing his own private business at Montgomery.

H joined the staff of the Redstone Arsenal Photo Lab in October 1951, and is now main lab supervisor, still photography unit.

Mr. and Mrs. Schlotterbeck reside at 1419 Pratt Ave., N. E. Huntsville. He is a member of the Huntsville Knights of Columbus.

Mrs. Schlotterbeck is the former Margaret A. Hobbs, daughter of Mrs. Lillian E. Hobbs of Cherokee, Ia.





**With Final R&D Firing**

**ATTENTION TURNS TO TRAINING OF TROOPS TO DEPLOY REDSTONE**

With the firing of the final research and development Redstone missile system early this month, full attention is now turned to the training of Army missile groups to deploy the weapon.

This training is a cooperative effort between the Army Artillery and Missile School, Ft. Sill, Okla., and the Army Ballistic Missile Agency, developer of the weapon system.

The 40th Field Artillery Missile Group (Heavy), first troop unit to be deployed with the Redstone missile, was the only group to be trained entirely at the ABMA. The 40th group has been serving with NATO Shield Forces in Europe since June.

All subsequent Field Artillery Missile Groups are being activated and trained at Ft. Sill, with the exception of the Ordnance Companies for each Group. These companies are activated and trained at ABMA.

The Ordnance Company with each Field Artillery Missile Group is responsible for maintaining the missile and its support equipment. This requires the highly specialized training available at ABMA under the direction of the Agency's Training Division.

Upon activation of an Ordnance Company, the men attended classes in the Redstone missile system at the Ordnance Guided Mis-

sile School. This instruction is followed up by "on the job" training, as the Company's maintenance personnel maintain the School's Redstone equipment for two months. During this period they work closely with the Field Support Division at ABMA becoming familiar with maintenance and defect reporting procedures.

Meanwhile the Company's supply personnel work closely with the Division's supply personnel in order to become completely familiar with the Ordnance supply system for the Redstone.

Upon completion of training, the maintenance personnel are required to pass a technical examination to establish the fact that they are ready to support troops deployed with the missile.

As the Ordnance Company completes its training, the remainder of the Group is activated at Ft. Sill. The Ordnance Company joins its Group prior to the beginning of unit training at the Field Artillery and Missile School. The Company provides Ordnance support throughout the training period, which is climaxed by a tactical firing in the field at White Sands Missile Range, N. M. The Missile Range is also an element of the Army Ordnance Missile Command.

Two Ordnance Companies, the 89th and the 91st, have completed training at ABMA and are now at Ft. Sill with their respective groups, the 209th Field Artillery Missile Group (Heavy), and the 46th Field Artillery Missile Group (Heavy).

The 23rd Ordnance Company, activated on October 17, is now in training at the Agency.

In addition to training Ordnance Companies, the ABMA Training Division maintains close liaison with Ft. Sill in providing technical information and assistance whenever required in connection with the Redstone training program.
