



Congressional Subcommittee Visits

A Congressional Subcommittee headed by Rep. Chet Holifield (D-Calif.) arrived Sunday for a two-day visit to the Army Ordnance Missile Command for briefings on the Army's missile program and a tour of Redstone Arsenal facilities.

Chairman of the Military Operations Subcommittee, Rep. Holifield was greeted by Maj. Gen. J. B. Medaris, Commanding General of the Missile Command, at the AOMC airstrip.

Eight other congressmen, members of the sub-committee staff, and several Department of the Army representatives heard briefings by Gen. Medaris and Dr. Werner von Braun, Director of Development Operations for the Army Ballistic Missile Agency, and other officials.

Presentations to the congressional sub-committee covered

management of the Army missile programs, industrial participation, and the Army support of the national space program.

Congressmen attending were R. Walter Riehlman, (R-N.Y.); Perkins Bass, (R-N.H.); Joe Holt, (R-Calif.); G. P. Miller, (D-Calif.); Erwin Mitchell, (D-Calif.); William K. Van Pelt, (R-Wis.); J. Edward Roush, (D-Ind.) and B. F. Sisk, (D-Calif.) Sen. Clair Engle (D-Calif.) was also present.

The Representatives toured the Fabrication Laboratory, witnessed a demonstration of the Jupiter IRBM by the 864th Strategic Missile Squadron, toured the Guidance and Control Laboratory, and witnessed a static test firing of a Jupiter engine at the ABMA Test Area.

Sub-committee staff members attending the two-day sessions were: Herbert Roback, staff director; Earl Morgan, J. T. Carlson, and J. Thomas Conway. Maj.

Gen. Clarence J. Hauch, Assistant to the Secretary of Defense was in attendance.

AOMC SPONSORS MISSILE MEASUREMENT SHIP, MARINER

BALTIMORE, Md.—More than 150 military and civilian scientists Thursday previewed the completely refurbished missile measurement ship, S. S. Mariner, before she sailed from here for her lonely vigil in the South Atlantic Friday.

Equipped from stem to stern with the most advanced radar and other electronic and optical apparatus, the missile research ship is a veritable "floating laboratory" for tracking and checking the performance of experimental ballistic missiles during their trajectories.

While the vessel's expected itinerary is not being announced in detail, it can be said that her voyage will be far off the regular sea lanes, and that the elaborate new equipment aboard will provide the most precise data yet collected at sea to complement ground-station missile measurements at missile test range points.

The project is sponsored by the Advanced Research Projects Agency, Washington, D. C., and the U. S. Army Ordnance Missile Command, Huntsville, Ala.

ARGMA Gives Contract To Thiokol for NASA; Work on XM-33 Motor

The Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency last week awarded for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration a contract to Thiokol Chemical Corporation in the amount of \$2,383,173.

The contract is for research, development, and delivery of an unannounced number of improved, high-performance XM-33 solid propellant rocket motors.

Work on the motors will be done at Thiokol's Redstone Division.

The XM-33 was developed by Thiokol for use in the first stage of the Navy's Polaris Test Vehicle and variations of the motor have been used in a number of other test programs.

Among the solid propellant motors Thiokol has developed are those for the Lacrosse, Sergeant, Nike-Hercules Sustainer, Recruit, Falcon, Matador Booster, Lockheed-USAF Reentry Test Vehicle, and Operation Farside. Current motors under development by

29 Air Force Bases Represented by Group Studying Jupiter Here

ABMA Birthday Events Are Set

DEMONSTRATIONS AND DISPLAYS DUE FOR OPEN HOUSE CELEBRATION

HUNTSVILLE, Ala. — A full schedule of events is being planned for the Open House Celebration Feb. 7 which will mark the third anniversary of the formation of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency.

All ABMA employees, their families, and the general public will be invited to attend, it was announced by Brig. Gen. J. A. Barclay, ABMA Commander. The Open House will last from 9:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m.

A static test firing of the giant Jupiter Intermediate Range Ballistic Missile will highlight the numerous demonstrations and displays to be staged throughout the Missile Agency to inform the public of the vastness and complexity of ABMA operations.

The Jupiter firing will be held at 11 a.m. Open House visitors will be able to view the firing from a well-marked vantage point known as "Artley's Bluff" just outside the test area. Bus transportation will be provided from the front of Bldg. 4488 to the test area, about a quarter of a mile away. The buses will be running continuously beginning about an hour before the firing. Visitors are advised to depart for the test area by bus as early as conveniently possible, in order to facilitate orderly movement of the large crowd which is expected and to assure that no one will miss the firing in the "last-minute rush."

In all the demonstrations and displays, particular emphasis will be placed on the accomplishments of ABMA during the past year and the Agency's role in the nation's space exploration program. Following is a list of events

OGMS GRADUATES TURKISH CLASS

Assistant Secretary Of Army Is Speaker

The first missile classes of the Army and Navy of Turkey were graduated from the Ordnance Guided Missile School here Friday in a colorful international ceremony presided over by the Assistant Secretary of the Army, and a high-ranking representative of the Turkish embassy.

Frank H. Higgins, Assistant Secretary of the Army for Logistics, made the principal address to the pioneer Turkish missilemen at the exercises in the Redstone Arsenal Theater, and at the same time, made the first public announcement of the arrival of a second Turkish missile battalion (See GRADUATES on Page 2)

TACTICAL JUPITER FIRED AT CAPE

A tactical Jupiter IRBM was fired last Wednesday from the Atlantic Missile Range at Cape Canaveral, Fla.

The Jupiter launched Wednesday was produced at the Army's Michigan Ordnance Missile Plant near Detroit, Mich., operated by Chrysler Corporation for the Army Ordnance Missile Command. Chrysler is the prime contractor for the Jupiter System, developed by the Army Ballistic Missile Agency.

The principal objectives of the launching were tests of the inertial guidance system, propulsions, and warhead and fuzing systems.

Previous firings of the Jupiter have demonstrated the near pinpoint accuracy of the all-inertial guidance system. In earlier firings, the Jupiter warheads have (See TACTICAL on Page 2)

Federal Joint Crusade and National Voluntary Health Agencies Drive on

The Third Annual Federal Crusade and the campaign for National Voluntary Health Agencies are scheduled to get underway at Redstone Arsenal on Feb. 1.

Civilian and military personnel of the Army Ordnance Missile Command and its agencies will have the opportunity to contribute to both campaigns during a six-week period.

America's Missile and Surface Radar Department at Moorestown, N. J., has designed and installed the radar and other electronic equipment aboard the vessel. RCA also operates the ship's complement of electronic equipment.

Many of RCA's electronic operations personnel are recruited from the RCA Service Company, which is also responsible for missile tracking telemetry at the Atlantic Missile Range at Cape Canaveral, Fla.

Information obtained by the scientific staff of the missile measurements ship will be shared by all branches of the armed services. Improved equipment will enlarge the scope of information obtained in the study of ballistic missile flight.

The scientific staff will continue its precision observation and data collection of the characteristics of a missile performance from its ascent to remote altitudes in space, through all levels of the Earth's atmosphere, to the final plunge to earth or sea.

The ship refitting operation was performed by the Maryland Shipbuilding and Dry Dock Company, Baltimore, acting as subcontractor to RCA. J. J. Henry of New York and Philadelphia is the naval architect. The Barnes Engineering Co., of Stamford, Conn., is prime contractor in charge of the design and operation of non-radar measuring projects.

The Navy provided precision computing equipment to compensate for the ship's roll, thus making possible accurate radar measurements at sea.

Valuable information on missile firings from the Atlantic Missile Range will be contributed by the Air Force. Agencies participating in the planning and direction of this comprehensive missile and satellite measurement project include the Advanced Research Projects Agency of the Department of Defense, and the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency of the Army Ordnance Missile Command.

impacted within the presurveyed target area in the Atlantic Ocean. Jupiter has a range capability of 1500 nautical miles.

The powerful liquid engine was developed and is produced by the Rocketdyne Division of North American Aviation, Canoga Park, Calif.

The ballistic shell of Wednesday's Jupiter was of final production design. The nose cone was the full-scale tactical version protected against aerodynamic heating upon reentry.

The Army also continued "Operation Gaslight" in connection with the firing. In this operation infrared and photographic measurements are taken of the vehicle as it reenters the Earth's atmosphere. A ship stationed near the impact area recorded radiation, shock waves and aerodynamic data as the Jupiter returned from outer space.

The 864th Strategic Missile Squadron (Jupiter) of the U.S. Air Force is in final stages of training at Redstone Arsenal with the Jupiter preparatory to deployment.

Forewords for Combat Readiness

FOCAL POINT OF ARMY EFFORTS IS THE GROUND COMBAT SOLDIER

This is the second in a series of messages bearing upon our primary job in the United States Continental Army Command—combat readiness.

As with any job, our work will go forward faster if workers know WHY as well as what to do. That is the aim of your commander's orientation talks. That is the aim of FOREWORDS.

The focal point of all our efforts is the ground combat soldier. Organizing, equipping, training, sustaining and supporting him so that he can perform his indispensable role in combat IS the Army role.

This role is equally significant in any kind of war—hot or cold. It is just as important in general war as it is in limited war. For our nation to entertain any notion to the contrary would be dangerous.

The danger could be social as well as military.

More than any other category of personnel in the Armed Forces, the ground combat soldier comes from the general populace. He is the private citizen under arms—the clenched fist of his people.

It is by no idle chance in the history of mankind that the course of democracy parallels the importance accorded the ground combat soldier in the military forces of nations. It is no exaggeration to say that the basic freedoms we now enjoy are closely related to his ascending importance on the battlefield since the Battle of Crecy. Nor is it an exaggeration, in my opinion, to say that the preservation of these freedoms will continue to be oriented by his place in the sun.

Only when men from all of the people are willing and ready to fight and die for freedom does freedom have meaning for them. Only then does democracy thrive. That is the inexorable lesson of history.

Beguiled by the mechanical marvels of an age, it is easy for

people to forget the true character of the ground combat soldier's role in war. When free men have been so beguiled in the past, they have slipped back into vassalage. For the ability of the ground combat soldier to play his part in the social scheme of things depends upon the part he is given in the military scheme of things.

It will be a sorry day for all mankind in this supersonic nuclear age of ours should the ground combat soldier ever be deprived of his rightful place in the hearts and minds and military forces of his people.

In our efforts to avert this danger, a ONE ARMY attitude must pervade all ranks. The ground combat soldier is not a Guardsman, nor a Regular, nor a Reservist, nor a Selectee. He is simply the American fighting man on the ONE ARMY Team. I appeal to every member of the team—civilian and military—to give his cause the enthusiastic support merited by its vital importance to our country.

at OGMS. Turkey thus becomes the first NATO nation to send a second delegation to the Missile School.

Higgins flew here Thursday from Washington and was accompanied by Col. Mueyyet Erdinc, technical attache of the Turkish embassy, who presented diplomas to the 34 graduates.

The party was received at the Arsenal airfield by Col. H. S. Newhall, Missile School Commandant, and was accorded full military and diplomatic honors, including a reception by senior officers of other North Atlantic Treaty Organization countries currently attending the school.

Turkey is the ninth allied nation whose pioneer missile students have been trained in the Nike-Ajax and Nike-Hercules anti-aircraft missiles at the "Space Academy" during the past two years.

Preceding them were students from Belgium, Canada, Denmark, France, Germany, Great Britain, Italy, and Norway. Still in school are other units from The Netherlands, Greece, and Nationalist China.

4707, visitors will be able to see a number of Jupiter IRBM's in various stages of fabrication and assembly in the huge shops.

A tour of ABMA's Computation Lab is also scheduled. As a demonstration for visitors, employees of the lab will actually compute a simulated space probe trajectory, utilizing the lab's maze of computing equipment.

Aeroballistics Lab's wind tunnel (in Bldg. 4732) will also be open to the public for a continuous demonstration.

A realistic Jupiter countdown and mock preparation for launch will be staged for the public by members of the Air Force's 864th Strategic Missile Squadron, now in training at Redstone Arsenal. This demonstration, lasting about 30 minutes, will be held twice during the day, once at 9:30 a.m. and again at 2 p.m. These will be the first public demonstrations of this nature. Visitors will be carried to the demonstrations, at ABMA's Systems Support equipment Laboratory area, by buses leaving from in front of Bldg. 4488.

A display of the Army's space probe upper stage "hardware," the Juno II, will be set up all day in front of Bldg. 4488. As an added attraction, Army photographers from the Signal Corps will take Polaroid snapshots of visitors standing in front of the Juno II—and hand out complimentary prints one minute later.

A full-scale replica of the Explorer I satellite will also be displayed alongside Juno II.

A tour of ABMA headquarters, Bl. 4488, will feature technical displays (in Room A-100) from Aeroballistics Lab, Structures and Mechanics Lab, Guidance and Control Lab.

A Signal Corps display will also be set up in the lobby, including continuous movies, teletype monitoring equipment, a weather facsimile machine receiving weather maps, and a terminal of a direct circuit with the Post MARS station. At the latter, visitors may file brief messages for transmission to friends located throughout the Free World.



Redstone Federal Credit Union Votes 5 per Dividend for 1958

The membership of the Redstone Federal Credit Union last week accepted a recommendation of the Board of Directors and voted a 5 percent dividend on 1958 shareholdings.

In its election of officials, the members elected Col. John G. Zierdt to the Board of Directors and re-elected C. R. Byerline, L. D. Craig, J. D. Stephenson, and C. G. Babcock.

Elected to the Credit Committee were: Delbert S. Spears and Ralph Dalton. Marvin T. Morning and Currun Humphrey were elected to the Supervisory Committee.

New Credit Union officers will be elected by the Board of Directors at a meeting tonight.

President Harold B. Carpenter reviewed progress made during the past year and reported that streamlined procedures, improvements in office facilities, and acquisition of new equipment aided considerably in effecting increased efficiency thereby providing a greater service to members.

He said many of these improvements were required in order to accommodate the record 2,705 membership gain and the asset increase of \$1,204,237. The Board reviewed during 1958 and effected a change in the Borrower's and Life Savings insurance carrier, which is expected to result in a considerable expense reduction.

He stated that a major effort was concerted toward controlling and reducing the delinquent loans. While outstanding loans increased nearly one million dol-

lars, delinquency actually reduced by \$6,825. Carpenter stated that additional reserves were provided beyond the minimum requirements in order to better safeguard and provide for stability of the Credit Union.

Carl A. Haaker, chairman of the Supervisory Committee, reviewed the work of the committee during 1958 and reported employment of an auditor and CPA to assist in the performance of duties. He reported a 100% verification of members' accounts during 1958 and related that a high degree of accuracy exists in maintenance of Credit Union accounts.

Delbert Spears presented a report of the Credit Committee. He stated that the expansion of the loan department in the latter part of 1957 aided the committee in handling the volume of loan activity. During 1958, the committee approved loans totaling \$3,925,936. He stated that a consolidation of debts for many applicants aided in improvement of their financial condition and that this means was used in many instances rather than extension of debts.

Treasurer C. G. Babcock stated that acquisition of new equipment during 1958 has afforded an asset gain transcending its monetary value and that "the Redstone Federal Credit Union now has the atmosphere of a modern financial institution, backed up by sound operating procedures and financial security dedicated to the service of the membership. The annual meeting report bro-

Unit Level Volleyball League Set

Advice Offered Military Personnel On Federal Income Tax Returns

(Editor's note: The following article was written for The Redstone Rocket by Lt. Col. Morton S. Jaffe, Command Staff Judge Advocate, AOMC, to serve as an aide to military personnel in preparation of their Federal income tax returns.)

All military personnel are reminded that their income is subject to taxation by the Federal Government, and may be subject to taxation by their home states.

Due to the diversity of state income tax regulations, the following remarks will be confined to the Federal income tax system.

Any questions of military personnel relating to state taxation should be referred to the office of the Command Staff Judge Advocate for advice.

The treatment of military pay and allowable deductions for income tax purposes has remained virtually unchanged from last year with two notable exceptions. Generally, persons will be permitted the same deductions as in 1957 and required to include the same items as income. As in past years, items as subsistence allowance, allowances for quarters and rations, cash received in lieu of subsistence and quarters, disability pay, widows pensions, etc., are excluded from gross income and need not be reported. The foregoing list is now, however, inclusive.

The changes in this year's tax return were designed to simplify reporting of income and thereby reduce much burdensome administrative work. The resultant changes should prove beneficial to most members of the military. First, the 1040A card form can this year be used to report wages up to \$10,000 subject to withholding, and \$200 in additional income. In the past the qualifying limit for its use was \$5,000 in wages and \$100 on income, not subject to withholding. Accordingly, most military personnel can and should use the simple card form 1040A. It should be noted, however, that use of the card form precludes itemizing personal deductions.

Another and perhaps the most ambiguous area in the preparation of Federal Income Tax returns by military personnel was recently clarified. This concerns per diem accounting. A simplified method of reporting taxable gain and loss from that source is now provided. According to a recent determination, all military personnel receiving per diem pay for travel within the continental United States are considered as employees who are required to, and do, account to their employers for

such pay. The effect of this tax status is clearly set forth in detail on Page 6 of the IRS instruction booklet distributed with the 1040 forms. The instructions generally provide that in such instances, itemizing is required of the taxpayer only when his actual expenses exceed his reimbursement and he desires to deduct such excess from his gross income. Form 1040, rather than 1040A, must be used in such cases. When the taxpayer shows no gain or loss, or when he suffers a loss on his expenses but chooses to

ignore his deduction no entry is necessary other than checking the appropriate boxes on Page 1 of Form 1040 or on Form 1040A. In cases where the employer realizes a gain on his travel allowance such gain must be reported as income and reflected on his return as excess reimbursement on line 5 of Form 1040.

The foregoing is not intended to serve as a complete guide on filing your tax returns. Rather it is to apprise military personnel of two of the more significant changes in reporting their income.

Unusual or unique tax questions should be referred to the Office of the Command Staff Judge Advocate.



In addition to showing the number of accidents for the calendar year, the number of days since the last accident will be shown.


An accident will be charged against an organization when the driver is assigned to that organization without regard to who is considered at fault. When a vehicle is properly halted or parked, no accident will be charged.

He stated that "overstocking is just as costly as understocking." Hurt further pointed out that of all inventory items purchased by Reynolds in 1958 45% increased in price, 27% remained constant, and 28% were lower than in prior years.

Nettles praised the new electronic computing equipment for making it possible to keep accurate records on the vast numbers of stores items necessary in large

companies. Chynoweth discussed methods used to keep all of the Ford plants throughout the country advised of plant inventory levels, thus allowing plants to shift inventories for good economic use. Morton Prouty, Alabama-Tennessee Natural Gas Co., president, presided at the meeting.





Redstone Commander Issues Appeal for Safe Driving on Post




