

The experiment was sponsored by the Surgeon General of the Army as a part of the biomedical program. Chairman Brooks and 12 members of the House Space and Astronautics Committee spent two days at Redstone Arsenal (13-14 Feb.), becoming familiar with Army missile and space activities. The Missile Command also conducts space projects for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration and the Advanced Research Projects Agency.

ABMA SPEEDS 'PROJECT SATURN'

1½ Million Lb. Is Planned for Booster

The Department of Defense, for the Advanced Research Projects Agency, last week announced that the program to develop a 1½ million pound thrust super-booster for heavy space payloads has been designated "Project Saturn."

As previously announced, the booster will be composed of a cluster of liquid rocket engines of the type used in the Jupiter and Thor IRBMs and the Atlas ICBM.

This approach, combining a number of engines which have been tested and are now in production, is the quickest means for making the large increase in payloads which can be placed in orbit.

The Saturn development program, according to Roy W. Johnson, ARPA director, is progressing at an accelerated rate at the Army Ballistic Missile Agency.

The booster is expected to be test flown in 1960.

NEW RSA BADGES ISSUED TO 4,000

Rebadging Team In Tenth Day

More than 4,000 new Redstone Arsenal Security Badges have been issued to personnel since the rebadging program was begun by the RSA Provost Marshal Office ten days ago.

The new security badges are white with a red border and have numerical symbols which indicate the activities considered under the new badging system. They are 1-AOMC; 2-ABMA; 3-ARGMA; 4-OGMS and 5-RSA.

Each of the five activities have been assigned letter symbols from A thru I to denote Limited Security Areas operated by the activity. As yet AOMC has not designated such an area and its badges will not utilize letter symbols.

Colored Strips
Security clearance will be shown on badges by colored strip in which black will denote UNCLEARED; blue will denote CONFIDENTIAL; red denotes SEC RET and green, TOP SECRET. (See New Badges, Page 12)

House Space Committee Praises Army Missilemen

High praise was expressed for the Army's team of scientists and engineers by members of the House Space Committee following its two-day visit to the Army Ordnance Missile Command last week.

"The people of the United States are aware of your achievements," Congressman Overton Brooks (D-La.), Committee Chairman, said at a press conference

Saturday just before the group returned to Washington.

He expressed an opinion that the Army Ballistic Missile Agency "team" has "actually been held back," in the past and should have been given more support financially. "I believe you will find more push, pressure, and interest in the future," he said, "that the United States might leap-frog ahead. To come out second-best in this race is to fail completely."

Deeply Impressed

He said the committee members were deeply impressed by the activity here, and the sincerity and zeal of the personnel.

In answer to questions by reporters, Cong. Brooks said the Army's capabilities should be used to the fullest extent. "The missions of the services were outlined in such a way that the Army was held back," he said.

He said that ballistic missile programs should be given the highest priority. "The Army also (See House Space, Page 2)


'AMERICAN MARINER' TO TRACK BALLISTIC MISSILES AT SEA

A floating laboratory operating out of Port Canaveral, Fla. is the latest addition to the nation's facilities in the expanding missile and space programs.

The "American Mariner" is equipped from stem to stern with the most advanced radar, electronic, and optical apparatus. The ship will be utilized in tracking ballistic missiles and outer space vehicles launched over the Atlantic Missile Range.

Capt. Seaton McPherson commands the Mariner and Rear Admiral Lampman, retired Navy officer, is operations manager. The ship was outfitted for the Army Ordnance Missile Command with sponsorship of the Advanced Research Projects Agency of the Defense Department.



Washington the Patrician Also Had a Human Side

Martha Washington called her celebrated husband "my old man," one of many homely little sidelights that help to humanize a great man who too often seems a cold and austere figure enshrined in history.

Washington was a great military leader and statesman. He was also an intensely human being who loved life, dancing, good food and drink. His early biographers meant well, but by putting him on a pedestal they obscured many of his endearing traits.

He was no priggish paragon of virtue "who never told a lie." He had a hot temper and he frequently lost it—but has any man in history ever had more provocation?

Washington was a patrician, an American aristocrat, yes. But he was also a farmer, a man close to the soil, wise in the ways of nature. He cut an elegant figure at balls and loved nothing more than to relax at Mount Vernon with his step-grandchildren—a simple family man.

Of our national heroes, we associate Lincoln with humility and Washington with grandeur of character. Majestic he certainly was, but he never stopped being the man who, as a boy of 15, had written in his schoolbook: "Labour to keep alive in your Breast that Little Spark of Celestial fire Called Conscience."

needs more money for its Nike-Zeus and 1,500,000-lb. thrust programs. These should be pushed."

Ahead on G&C

Cong. James G. Fulton of Pennsylvania, ranking Republican on the Committee, expressed a belief that the United States is ahead of Russia on instrumentation and guidance and control, which he termed "more refined."

We have pursued much broader programs, while Russia has concentrated on a "particular perpendicular program" of greater weight-carrying capacity, he stated.

Cong. Fulton said that he foresaw phasing out of the defense of the country by the Strategic Air Command by 1963, and the use of ballistic missiles for this purpose.

He favored a manned spaced platform for more accurate weather predictions and improved communications, and supplying of troops by ballistic missiles.

Cong. Fulton expressed his liking for the Nike-Zeus anti-missile system, under development by the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency. "This needs to be in operation as soon as possible," he said.

Cong. Benjamin F. Sisk (D-Calif.) said that some delay in missile development was due to lack of decision at high levels. "Our committee hearings have helped expedite decisions on several programs," he said.

First on Moon

"America must be first in putting a man on the moon," according to Cong. Leonard G. Wolf (D-Iowa). "We are definitely in a psychological war with Russia, and the American people must be given a new awareness of this challenge."

"We do not know how fast the Russians are traveling in research, but we do know they are putting more emphasis on scientific education," said Cong. David S. King (D-Utah). He said that America must put more stress on education.

Concern for education was expressed also by Cong. Walter H. Moeller (D-Ohio) who said America must toughen and put more punch in the entire educational system. "Our youngsters are getting by too easily," he said.

Tragic Mistake

In reply to another question, Cong. Brooks said he felt it would be a "tragic mistake" to disrupt workers here by shifting any to other agencies.

Cong. Joseph E. Karth (D-Minn.) said that he felt the Advanced Research Projects Agency had suffered greatly in the lack of financial support.

"ARPA's concern with planning work ten years from now will save crash programs later," he said.



The money was raised at the P-TA Carnival held at the school



NEW MACHINE IN OPERATION AT ABMA COMP LAB

The ABMA Computation Laboratory has placed into operation a new Burroughs 205 medium speed electronic digital computer, which increases the Lab's ability to rapidly process data from static and flight tests of missiles.

The 205, according to Lab director Dr. H. Hoelzer, is being used in conjunction with another machine, a MillisADIC analog-to-digital converter. The 205 was chosen because of its compatibility with the MillisADIC, which unit converts data to digital form and makes it available either on punched cards or paper tape.

The 205's output can be in the form of punch cards, printed

forms or tapes.

Other units in AOMC also have computers of this type in use. Rocket Development Labs, ARGMA, and the ABMA Missile Firing and Guidance and Control labs are using the same model of machine. A 205 is being installed at present in the Aeroballistics Lab, ABMA.


All of these systems are maintained by Burroughs Corp. engi-





5,000,000 Man-Hour Safety Goal May Be Reached

Redstone Arsenal civilian personnel, as of last Monday, had worked 82 consecutive days without a disabling injury. This represents well over 4,000,000 man-hours and it is expected that if an injury does not occur, the coveted 5,000,000 man-hour goal will be reached tomorrow.

Eighty-two days represent the longest consecutive number of days that civilians have worked without a disabling injury since the Scoreboard was started. Seventy-seven days were worked injury-free last October and during this period slightly over 5,000,000 man-hours were reached. Because of less overtime during this latter period it has taken longer

SAFE DRIVING URGED DURING HOLIDAY PERIOD

According to the RSA Safety Division, the usual campaign against highway accidents over the forthcoming long week-end is being conducted throughout the installation. Supervisors at all levels are being reminded to talk with their employees and urge that they avoid accidents by "driving defensively." The important thing is to avoid the accident, not whether a driver is right or wrong legally after the accident has happened. To assist in driving defensively the Safety Division is passing along these tips:

1. Slow down for existing weather and road conditions. Reduce speed at night.
2. Use hand signals to indicate an intention to slow down or back up. Automatic turn signals won't do that for you.
3. Adjust your speed to the flow of traffic. Stay in your own lane until reasonably sure there is no danger in passing.
4. Follow at a safe distance. Remember, the following driver governs the distance between his vehicle and the one in front of him. In a rear end collision, it is always the fault of the following driver.
5. Prepare for turns or stops by maneuvering safely into the proper lane or position before signaling for turn.
6. Be alert to dangers near parked cars. Such things as pedestrians (knifing between parked cars illegally) and street-side vehicle doors (opening unexpectedly) create hazards.
7. Obey all traffic signs, signals, and markings (including center lines) but watch particularly for the diamond-shaped warning signs. They call for defensive driving to meet some hazardous or unusual condition ahead.
8. Expect the unexpected from children, particularly in school, park, playground, and residential zones. Kids are not adults, and they cannot be expected to use the judgment of an older person.
9. Railroad trains can't weave or dodge to miss your vehicle. They claimed 1,350 lives of motorists in CY 1957. Slow down and stop, look, and listen if necessary, even when grade crossings are protected by warning signals. Look out for that "sleep-

er"—the train that pounces on you from the other direction after you have waited for one to pass!

10. Go out of your way to be courteous. Have you ever noticed the startled, almost unbelieving (yet appreciative) look on the guy's face when you have been courteous to him? It's been said that driving isn't a pleasure any more; but being courteous will bring back a lot of the joy to motor vehicle operation. Ask the man who has tried it!







mitted by the Army to the Pentagon and over such a distance—730 miles, according to Col. H. S. Newhall, commandant of the Missile School, which is the educational adjunct of the huge Redstone Arsenal rocket and guided missile center and the Army's only school devoted exclusively to missile training.

Sec. Brucker
Arranged by the Army's Deputy Chief of Staff for Logistics, the program was viewed in a Pentagon theater by Secretary of the Army Wilbur M. Brucker and about 300 high-ranking officers of the Department of the Army.

On a large screen measuring 15 by 12 feet, the military audience watched the two-hour "space age spectacular" which deals with maintenance methods used to keep five of the Army's operational guided missiles in constant combat readiness. These anti-aircraft, close support, and ballistic missiles include the Hawk, Nike-Hercules, Lacrosse, Corporal, and Redstone.

The program presented at the Pentagon today was also transmitted simultaneously to the Armor School as part of a regularly scheduled series for senior officers that began last October. This was the 13th such program.

Closed Circuit
The large-screen closed circuit live television course was developed by Col. Newhall and Col. Carl T. Isham, director of the Senior Officer Preventive Maintenance Course for the Armor School at Fort Knox, Kentucky, for presentation to groups of com-

manders who periodically study phases of the Army's entire armory of weapons, including the new missiles.

To make economical use of costly equipment and skilled instructors and training aids already available at the Missile School and to avoid duplication of effort at the Armor School, which is 280 miles north of Redstone Arsenal, the large screen closed circuit courses are transmitted three times per month.

A special introduction to the televised missile course seen at the Pentagon was made by Maj. Gen. John L. Ryan, commanding the Army Armor Center at Fort Knox and Brig. Gen. A. J. Adams, director of supply operations for the Army's Deputy Chief of Staff for Logistics.

One of the advantages of the large screen closed circuit television teaching technique according to Col. Newhall, is that it can be used to instruct large classes simultaneously at many installations, a factor of great value in a national emergency and also as a means of speeding today's urgent missile educational schedules.

Giant Screen
Another is that use of the giant screen television enables large groups to study tiny missile components, of which there may be as many as 300,000 in a single weapon. Techniques used are similar to those used by medical schools to televise actual operations for student doctors.

A third advantage is that scarce missiles and training equipment as well as top-flight instructors can become available to any training center in the continental U. S. without costly duplication of effort and material.

The Ordnance Guided Missile School is now in its seventh year. It has a staff and faculty of 2,000 and this year expects to train about 7,000 students from the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps, and 11 member nations of





PERSHING LAUNCH COMPLEX UNDER DEVELOPMENT AT CAPE

Structure to Service Two Pads

PERSHING MISSILE SYSTEM SITE CLEARANCE HAS BEGUN AT CAPE

Clearing of the site at Cape Canaveral, Fla., for the vertical launch facility to be utilized in development of the PERSHING Ballistic Missile System, has begun under supervision of Jacksonville District, Corps of Engineers.

The facility is located in the general area of the launch complexes occupied by the Navy for its POLARIS program and the Army for its JUPITER IRBM program and for space vehicles.

It will consist of a blockhouse, two launch pads, a nose installation building, and a mobile service structure which will be self-powered and capable of servicing either pad.

Power Room
A partial second floor will provide space for 50 non-operational personnel in the reinforced concrete blockhouse. The nose installation building will provide missile processing bays with adjoining control room, power room, terminal room, and shop.

The mobile rectangular service structure will be equipped with platforms at three levels permitting access to all parts of the missile. It will be built by the

PERSHING prime contractor, Martin-Orlando, from designs of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency which is responsible for the missile system.

When the launch facility is completed, missiles fabricated by Martin will be moved from Orlando to Cape Canaveral, checked out in the nose section building, then moved to the firing pads.

Firing Team

The firing team will be composed of Army Ballistic Missile Agency personnel and Martin representatives. ABMA will train the Martin employees in check-out and firing procedures. As the program advances, the Army experts will be withdrawn and ABMA will retain technical supervision over all firing activities, which will then be by troops.

The Missile Firing Laboratory of ABMA will be responsible for telemetry and data coordination functions during the research and development tests.

PERSHING is a solid propellant weapon which will eventually replace the larger, liquid-fueled REDSTONE Ballistic Missile developed by ABMA in the Army's arsenal. ABMA is an element of the Army Ordnance Missile Command.

New Badges

(Continued from Page 1)

RSA security officials have emphasized that a security clearance alone does not give anyone the right to have access to any government information and definitely to classified information.

Finished badges will show the bearer's name, description, photograph, fingerprints, signature, category (Military, Civil Service, Contractor, NATO, Vendor, Tradesman, Visitor, etc.); the activity to which he is assigned, employed or sponsored by; and the limited Security Areas which he may enter without being required to register in or be escorted.

If the bearer's duties are such that access to limited type Security Areas of one or more of the activities on the post is essential and he should not be delayed, the badge will show those areas into which he may enter without signing in or being escorted.

No Escort

For certain personnel it will denote access to ALL LIMITED AREAS on the installation, except Thiokol and Rohm and Haas areas, without requiring registration or escort.

The symbol of a star will be used to denote that the bearer of the badge has a NEED and APPROVAL for ready access to all limited areas.

The reverse side of the new badges will be utilized to indicate the limited areas of two activities to which entry is authorized. For instance, an employee assigned to ABMA would have the letter 2 stamped in the left-bottom corner of his badge. If he were authorized access to ARGMA and OGMS areas, the reverse side of the badge, would have a 3 (for ARGMA) and 4 (for OGMS) stamped at the top. Limited areas within the activity to which the bearer were authorized access would be designated by letter symbol, up to and including six areas.

red to Germany in early April, 1959, to provide additional tactical missile fire support for the NATO Shield Forces.

paign. The CRUSADE was launched in 1950 by Dwight D. Eisenhower. Its founders included Lucius Clay, Joseph Grew and other leaders from every segment of American life. Their mission was to keep the Communist-held people of East Europe from being cut off from all hope of eventual freedom and freedom of thought.

Without a free press or free radio and hearing only what the Communists allow, the people of East Europe might well have been isolated and absorbed into the Soviet Empire with all the rest of the Communist victim states.
