NATO GENERALS VISIT AOMC FOR BRIEFING


The Military Committee of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization visited the Army Ordnance Missile Command last week for orientation on the U. S. Army's missile and space programs.

Seventeen generals and admirals representing all of the NATO countries were present. Chairman of the committee is General B. R. P. F. Hasselman of the Netherlands.

The group arrived at mid-morning and departed late in the afternoon. Maj. Gen. J. B. Medaris, commander of AOMC, and Dr. Wernher von Braun, director of Development Operations at the Army Ballistic Missile Agency, were among the briefing officials.

The committee also visited the Ordnance Guided Missile School where they were given training demonstrations on several missile systems.

Later they toured several laboratories of the ABMA where the Redstone and Jupiter missiles were developed. They saw the fabrication of ballistic missiles and space vehicles at the Fabri- (See NATO on Page 2)

Test Facility Contract Awarded Local Firm

The Huntsville firm of Ashburn and Gray, Inc., has been awarded a contract amounting to \$807,461.50 for site preparation work for a new missile systems test facility at Redstone Arsenal, according to an announcement made today by Colonel R. W. Love, U. S. Army District Engineer at Mobile.

The test facility, which will be located south of Buxton Road and north of the Tennessee River and will include a test stand, a block house, and numerous support buildings, will be used by the U. S. Army Ballistic Missile Agency for testing solid propellant motors for the Pershing, a mobile, ground-to-ground ballistic missile being developed as a close support weapon for the Army.

Ashburn and Gray will clear about 120 acres for the facility, excavate about 57,000 cubic yards of earth and rock, perform extensive exterior electrical work, and construct a booster pump station building, a ground storage reservoir, a hydropneumatic water tank, industrial and domestic water distribution systems, a drainage system, a paved access road, and a security fence.

The District Engineer said that the contractor is expected to start operations within the next two weeks and to complete the (See TEST FACILITY on Page 2)

Chinese Nationalists Complete Courses At Missile School

The first class of Nationalist Chinese missile men will be graduated from the Army Ordnance Guided Missile School Friday.

Col. H. S. Newhall, school commandant, said the class, consisting of one officer and eight enlisted men, is the first of a series of classes from Formosa that will complete training on the Nike-Hercules anti-aircraft missile system in the next few months.

Brig. Gen. John A. Barclay, commanding general of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency, will be principal speaker at the graduation ceremonies at 10 a. m. in the Redstone Arsenal post theatre.

The Chinese, whose name for their island country is "the Great Republic of China", brings to 12 the number of Allied nations whose pioneer missile classes have been trained here.

DR. QUARLES WILL BE ADVISOR TO ENGINEERS

Dr. Gilford G. Quarles has resigned his position as chief scientist of the Army Ordnance Missile Command, effective May 26.

On June 1 he will become chief scientific advisor to the Chief of Engineers, Department of the Army, Washington.

Dr. Quarles has been engaged in Army missile work since 1956 when he became technical and scientific advisor to Maj. Gen. J. B. Medaris, then Commander of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency. When the AOMC was formed last year Dr. Quarles was named to the position of chief scientist in the new headquarters.

A former university professor, Dr. Quarles holds engineering and physics degrees from the University of Virginia. He received a doctorate in Physics there in 1934.

Prior to his departure he was cited by Gen. Medaris for his outstanding contributions to the Missile Command's programs.

DR. SHOOK IS SPACE MEDICINE CHAIRMAN

Dr. Burton S. Shook of Redstone Arsenal has been appointed chairman of the new Committee on Space Medicine of the Medical Association of Alabama.

Dr. Shook is chief of the Occupational Health Service, U. S. Army Hospital, Redstone Arsenal.

The most recently announced space project is the launching of unmanned and manned space capsules as a part of NASA's Mercury manned satellite program.

Here Are Facts About Saturn

ABMA Is Developing Super-Booster

A super-booster with 1,500,000 pounds of thrust is under development at the Army Ballistic Missile Agency. The booster, named Saturn, is being developed for the Advanced Research Projects Agency, Department of Defense, for heavy space application. The project was initiated in August, 1958. The first flight test is scheduled in 1960.

The Saturn booster uses a grouping of eight H-1 liquid propellant engines built from existing Jupiter and Thor engine components. Total thrust of the clustered engines will be equivalent to 30,000,000 horsepower. No announcement has been made regarding upper stage or stages.

Booster Designed Here
The booster unit is being designed, fabricated and tested at the Missile Agency. Rocketdyne Division of North American Aviation is supplying the basic H-1 engines. ARPA said the cluster concept was chosen because of the proven extreme reliability of the existing engine.

The H-1 engine is considerably more compact than companion Jupiter and Thor engines in the same 150,000 pound thrust range, resulting in a major move for simplification and high reliability. ABMA's huge 140-foot static

test tower is being modified to accommodate the Saturn. The booster, following static test at Redstone Arsenal, will be flight tested at Cape Canaveral, Fla.

ABMA Is Space Pioneer
A pioneer in space exploration, ABMA launched the Free World's first satellites of the Earth and Sun, Explorer I and Pioneer IV, and other satellites and space probes. The Agency also developed the Redstone and Jupiter ballistic missiles.

The Saturn system will answer the nation's urgent demand for quick, relatively inexpensive, reliable delivery of an extremely high-thrust booster capable of lifting into satellite orbit or outward to space journeys, a multiton load of instrumentation. One possible use of the vehicle would be to orbit a large communication satellite at high altitude. The thrust will be nearly four times that of the nation's currently most powerful flight-tested propulsion system, the Atlas ICBM cluster of engines.

The Saturn engines are profiting by the ten-year development period on the Redstone, Jupiter, Thor and Atlas engines. Continual analysis of the static test firing reports on these engines have permitted design of the H-1 on

the basis of elimination of trouble spots, and improvement of other components.

Eight Engines in Cluster
Each of the eight H-1 engines comprising the Saturn cluster operates independently of its own gas generator and turbopump. The propellant tankage supplying liquid oxygen and RP-1 fuel is a common source for all engines.

Directional stability of the entire missile will be maintained by swiveling the four outer engines of the cluster. These engines will be mounted on gimbals — a part of their assembly — and moved by struts actuated by the guidance equipment of the space vehicle.

No details of the overall configuration of the Saturn space vehicle have been released, but in other multi-stage rocket powered vehicles the booster is jettisoned after operating for the programmed duration, permitting the upper stages and instrumentation to continue on the space journey. Parachute recovery of the booster is planned.

Present Engines Modified
Modification of existing Thor and Jupiter engines to arrive at the new H-1 engine for use in the Saturn space vehicle consisted (See SATURN on Page 2)

R. F. HOELKER RECEIVES SPACE AGE AWARD

Presentation Made By Rocket Club

Dr. Rudolph F. Hoelker, deputy director of the Aeroballistics Laboratory at the Army Ballistic Missile Agency, Monday, received the first "Astronautics Engineer Achievement Award" to be presented by the National Rocket Club.

The presentation was made during the Space Age luncheon of the Club's Second Annual National Missile Industry Conference, held in Washington. The new award, established by Norman Baker of Space Business Daily, will be given annually to an accredited engineer for his personal contribution to astronautics.

Dr. Hoelker was cited for his major contributions to the success of such missiles as the Redstone, Jupiter, Jupiter C and Juno II. The Jupiter C rocket was used to launch the Pioneer III and IV space probes. Dr. Hoelker was assigned overall responsibility for flight performance of these satellite and space flights which included:

Calculating and establishing the trajectories. (See DR. HOELKER on Page 2)

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MAY 30 MARKS 90TH MEMORIAL DAY OBSERVANCE

MEMORIAL Day is less than 10 years short of being a century old. The Civil War dead it originally honored have since been joined by the Americans who fell in four other conflicts. This spring, as in past years, MAY 30 will see their graves bright with wreaths and flowers, mute but moving testimonials that time does not let their memory fade in the hearts of the living.

And, as in the past, there will be speeches in which well-meaning speakers will say long-familiar things. The fact that they have been said before will not debase their honest sentiment. All of us deserve a reminder of

the great debt we owe the men who died fighting our wars.

We see the Civil War as our greatest national agony—a bitter division of beliefs that we know could never happen again. Yet it is well to remember that Memorial Day originated in the South when women of the Confederacy adorned the graves of soldiers with spring flowers, making no distinction between the men in gray and the men in blue.

It is true that the day as it is observed in the North dates from 1868 when the Commander in Chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, Gen. John A. Logan, marked May 30 as a day to honor the Union dead. And it is true that the South has other days for honoring the dead of the Confederacy—April 26 for Alabama, Florida, Georgia and Mississippi; May 10 for the Carolinas; June 3 for Louisiana and Tennessee.

But they are all, really, one

Predicting exact time the missile should be fired, velocity to be used, and direction missile should be fired.

Calculating the exact time missile stages should ignite to achieve predicted apogee.

Running error analyses to determine expected deviations to assure successful orbit of the Explorer satellites.

Establishing limits for deviations from trajectories to insure flight safety.

Dr. Hoelker is presently engaged in developing new schemes and techniques to be used for future lunar, satellite and space flights. ABMA, an element of the Army Ordnance Missile Command, conducts space assignments for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration and the Advanced Research Projects Agency.

Dr. Hoelker received his doctor of science degree from Muenster University after only a little more than five years of study. He has been working in the field of ballistic missiles since May 1940. One of the Peenemuende scientists, he came to the United States with Dr. Wernher von Braun in 1945 and has been employed in U. S. Army rocket and guided missile programs since that time. He became an American citizen in 1955.

In addition to serving as deputy director of the Aeroballistics Laboratory, Dr. Hoelker also heads the laboratory's Flight Mechanics Branch.

primarily of repackaging components to achieve a compact grouping within the booster frame. For example, the turbopump is now slung side-saddle on the thrust chamber as contrasted with its former position atop the chamber.

The start sequence is the simplest of any yet provided in the family of liquid propellant engines. Safety devices have been built into the engine—an added factor in manned flight. One of the safety factors is the assurance that all eight engines of the cluster must be functioning normally before the missile can be released.

Self Igniting

Hypergolic ignition (self-igniting) will further increase the reliability of the H-1.

The individual H-1 engines used in the propulsion system developed thrust from the propulsive gases created by the combustion of liquid oxygen and RP-1, a hydro-carbon fuel similar to that used in turbo-jet engines. Combustion within the thrust chamber occurs at temperatures above 5000 degrees Fahrenheit.

The walls of the thrust chambers are formed of thin, lightweight metal through which fuel is forced at high speed. The fuel flow, acting in the same manner as liquid within a pot on an oven

burner, prevents the metal from melting under the extremely high temperatures encountered.

Light weight turbopumps, proven in repeated flights of Jupiter and other ballistic missiles, are utilized in the H-1 engine to draw the propellants from the storage tanks and force them at high flow rates into the combustion chamber.

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
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

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

Post Rifle Team Wins Big Share of Trophies at Meet

The Redstone Arsenal rifle team recently won more than 30 per cent of all trophies at a National Rifle Association meet at Oak Ridge, Tenn.

Shooting against an infantry team from Fort Benning, Ga., the airborne from Fort Bragg, N.C., the military police from Fort Gordon, Ga., and civilian teams from Tennessee, the Arsenal marksmen walked off with 29 trophies while winning 41 places.

The performance was considered outstanding since the Redstone team has no range on which to practice and shoots only at the meets they compete in.

"We may go as long as two months without shooting," said team captain Lt. Ben M. Phillips, of OGMS.

It was the outstanding performance of Phillips at the Oak Ridge meet which projects his team into prominence. He won the match open class trophy by firing 10 rounds from a standing-to-sitting position into a six-inch circle inside the standard 12-inch bullseye 200 yards downfield, using an M-1.

The feat is considered by many sports enthusiasts as more re-

markable than a golfer's hole-in-one. The feat was accomplished within a specified 50-second limit and stands as a range record at Oak Ridge.

The target has since been framed and is now in the office of Col. Owen T. McCloskey, Redstone Arsenal Commander.

Phillips is assigned to Hawk Branch of the surface-to-air Missile Division as chief of a teaching section on Hawk missile guidance.

Phillips, of Nashville, Tenn., learned to shoot hunting squirrels and while competing in intramural shooting matches at Vanderbilt University.

Other members of the Redstone Arsenal team are:

Capt. Fred Dean, CWO John Mann, Sfc. Robert Payette, Sfc. Harley Winterrowd, Sgt. Buford Harrison, Pfc. James Fox, and Pvt. Michael Travisano.

Dean is assigned to the Hawk Branch and his section teaches classes on Hawk system radar. He hails from Henrietta, Okla., and previously shot with the military while stationed in Japan.

Mann, from Florida, is an in-

structor on the Hawk system. Payette is assigned to the maintenance branch of OGMS. Harrison, an Alabamian, is the post game warden.

Winterrowd is an instructor in the surface-to-air missile division, while Fox is assigned to the Army Ballistic Missile Agency and Travisano is a student on the Hawk system.

In addition to Phillips' four firsts in the expert class, Dean won the 200-yard match from a sitting position and the 300-yard match from a prone position in the sharpshooters class. Mann won a first in the 500-yard prone position, a first in the 300-yard prone position and a first in the 200-yard offhand of the sharpshooters class. Harrison was first in the marksman class in the 200-yard offhand, 200 yard sitting, 300-yard prone and aggregate No. 2.

The Redstone Arsenal team is about two years old and was organized by Phillips when he was assigned here from White Sands Missile Range, N. M. He explained that the team has to be rebuilt about once a year as the result of transfers and discharges or release from active duty. The team will be composed of 25 percent new men most of the time, he said.

The next scheduled meet for the Arsenal marksmen is at Fort Campbell, Ky., on June 6-7.

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
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

Army Lists Rules To Follow During Hot Months Ahead

Washington (AFPS) — Evading sunstroke and heat prostration during training and summer sports hinges on how well a soldier uses his head, the Army maintains.

Successful prevention of heat injury depends largely on the education of troops and commanders to proper precautions in outdoor summer activities, according to D-A Circular 40-36, dated May 4.

The Army directive lays down safe ground rules for prolonged exposures to high temperatures and humidity. Basic rules are:

Wear clothing loosely, especially at neck, wrists and lower legs, to allow free circulation of air.

Drink water sparingly but frequently and remember—thirst does not necessarily indicate the amount of water being lost by the body.

Sunburn and long exposure to the sun, particularly during strenuous physical exertion increase the dangers of heat prostration.

Play it cool! Use your head and don't overdo, the Army cautions.
