## TV REPORT WILL BE ON AUSA PROGRAM TODAY

A closed circuit television report direct from the Redstone Arsenal will be a highlight of the closing session of the convention of the Association of the U.S. Army on Aug. 5.

Entitled "Modern Weapons for

the Modern Army" the 45-minute report will be transmitted 730 miles north from the Army Ordnance Guided Missile School to give an estimated 2500 members of AUSA a broad view of new weapons and techniques developed by various services of the Army, concluding with a sequence devoted to present and future missile and space programs.

The video report will be seen on a huge screen measuring 15' x 20' in the ballroom of the Sheraton-Park Hotel from 10:45 to 11:30 a.m. (Washington time) on Wed. Aug. 5.

Maj. Gen. John B. Medaris, commanding general of the U. S. Army Ordnance Missile Command at Redstone, will be in Washington to participate in the program from the stage of the ballroom to discuss missile progress and plans.

From Alabama, the AUSA delegates will see Col. Charles W. Eifler, commandant of the Missile School, Col. E. W. Ewbank, assistant commandant, and a number of the school's almost 3500 faculty members and students describe and demonstrate new methods and techniques that speed Army missile training.

The closed circuit program will be the third that the missile school has beamed to Washington. (See TV REPORT on Page 3)

## Electric Power Lines Being Constructed To Pershing Test Site

Col. W. G. Trainer, Post Engineer of RSA, disclosed today that an extension of the existing distribution system for electrical power is being made in the installation, for use at a new Pershing missile testing facility under construction in the southern part of the Arsenal.

Two primaries, central sources for the entrance of TVA power from the north boundary of RSA, feed electricity at a level of 161 kilovolts. This power is fed from two substations where a reduction in voltage is made for distribution to using agencies at a suitable voltage level.

The new utility poles now in process of erection along Patton Road are intended to conduct this additional power to the new facility.

The prime contracting firm performing the work is Pearce and Gresham. It is anticipated that the project will be completed by March 1960.

## Gen. Medaris Warns Graduates "To Keep Pace With Science"

"The true educational level of the populace has failed to keep pace with the swift advance of scientific knowledge," warned Maj. Gen. John B. Medaris Saturday night in a commencement address at New Mexico State University, located at Las Cruces.

Directing his remarks toward the future, and what the future offers youths, Gen. Medaris remarked that man has not yet demonstrated his ability to control, and employ wisely, the wondrous instruments that science and technology have provided, and "even more doubtful is his ability to control the tremendous natural forces which are being released for his exploitation as science probes deeper into the fundamental organization of the Universe."

"It is of urgent concern," he said, "that a gap does exist, and threatens to widen, between the capabilities of human understanding and the increasing momentum with which science and technology are opening new avenues for achievement. The future of civilization depends on

## ARMY, MARINES PLAN TO USE NEW "RED EYE"

An announcement was made by the Army and Marine Corps of plans to develop a new surface-to-air guided missile system proposed by the Convair Division of General Dynamics Corp., of Pomona, Calif.

Following the announcement, the missile system known as "Red Eye," was unveiled at the convention of the Association of the U. S. Army this week.

The Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency, U. S. Army Ordnance Missile Command, has awarded a contract for the development to Convair. The missile is designed to provide combat troops with the capability to destroy low-flying strafing or bombing aircraft.

ARGMA said the decision to develop the system was based upon a feasibility demonstration conducted by Convair under government contract during the past year.

"Red Eye" is described as a portable, man-fired missile which can track down low-flying jets or conventional planes.

The missile's launcher resembles the famed "bazooka" launcher in appearance only. The launch tube is four feet in length and also serves as a shipping container for the missile when capped at both ends.

The missile itself is a composite structure containing propellant, warhead and an electronic guidance system. Both the missile and its launcher can easily be carried through underbrush and rugged terrain where no other type of anti-aircraft weapon could be transported.

In the field a battery-powered hand grip is attached to the launch tube and, when end caps are removed, the unit is ready for use. On approach of a plane an Army or Marine Infantryman, launch tube resting on his shoulder, presses a switch that warms up the guidance system to prepare the missile for firing.

The missile's guidance system aims the projectile automatically. Guidance vanes which snap out from the side of the rocket will bring it back on intercept course should it waver.

## Secretary Gates Visits AOMC For First Time

Thomas S. Gates, Deputy Secretary of Defense, and General Lyman L. Lemnitzer, Chief of Staff of the Army, visited the Army Ordnance Missile Command for a one day orientation last week.

Both visitors have recently assumed their present positions in the Department of Defense. Mr. Gates was formerly Secretary of the Navy, and Gen. Lemnitzer was Deputy Army Chief of Staff. This is the Secretary's first visit to Redstone Arsenal; Gen. Lem-

nitzer has been here previously.

They were met at the Redstone Airfield by Maj. Gen. J. B. Medaris, AOMC Commanding General, and other AOMC officials.

The day's schedule called for general briefings on the Army's missile and space programs and recent progress in the field. Particular emphasis was placed on the Saturn heavy space vehicle and the Pershing ballistic missile, being developed by the Army Ballistic Missile Agency, and the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency's Nike-Zeus anti-missile. Both agencies are units of the AOMC.

Among officials scheduled to give presentations to the visitors were Gen. Medaris and Dr. Wernher von Braun, director of ABMA Development Operations.

This afternoon they will visit various research, development and testing facilities of ABMA and ARGMA. In ABMA shops they will see mock-ups of the new Saturn and Pershing vehicles.

Others in the eight-man visiting party include Mr. Richard S. Morse, Director of Research and Development, Department of the Army, and Lt. Gen. Clark L. Ruffner, Commanding General of the Third Army, Ft. McPherson, Ga.

The group will depart mid-afternoon for a similar orientation visit to Ft. Bragg, N.C.


## CENTER OFFERS PLACEMENT TESTS FOR COLLEGE



injury that the SAMVA campaign is intended to reduce to a minimum the representative said. Most of the accidents are the results of carelessness indicating that one or both drivers just aren't thinking about what they are doing.

The campaign, running through August, is planned by a special committee of personnel from various organizations named in last week's Rocket.

The campaign is based on an appeal to the pride of drivers. The accidents indicate a lack, either of driving ability or ordinary common sense.

It is believed that Redstone personnel lack neither and can have the best driving record in the U. S. Army, the representative said.

## ABMA Re-Tools Fab Lab For Saturn Space Vehicle

The Army Ballistic Missile Agency's Fabrication & Assembly Engineering Lab, re-tooling for the Saturn space vehicle project, last week ended its part in the fabrication phase of Jupiter missile research and development program.

All Jupiter ballistic shell fabrication in the future will be done by the Chrysler Corporation of Detroit, Mich. The contractor firm has been fabricating Jupiters concurrently with ABMA for some time.

Assembly of already-fabricated Jupiter components will continue at ABMA for several months un-

til phased out. Re-tooling in preparation for Project Saturn is proceeding in ABMA's Fabrication and Assembly Engineering Laboratory with installation of new fixtures and modification of existing ones.

The Saturn vehicle, developing 1,500,000 pounds of thrust at lift-off, will be capable of lifting multi-ton loads into high orbit around the earth and into deep space.

The Saturn project is being carried out by ABMA for the Advanced Research Project Agency, Department of Defense.

A brief ceremony held in ABMA's "Fab Lab" and attended by Lab employees formally marked the completion of Jupiter fabrication. Employees were congratulated for their past work on the Jupiter program by Hans H. Maus, lab director. Col. T. T. Paul, Jr., ABMA Deputy Com-

mander, also lauded the group for its achievements.

Development of the Jupiter was the primary responsibility of ABMA when the Agency was established in February, 1956. A number of "firsts" have been accomplished in the Jupiter development program. The Jupiter was the first U. S. intermediate range ballistic missile to be launched successfully. It is now operational and in the hands of Air Force troops. In May, 1958, the Jupiter development team launched and recovered, with assistance of the Navy, the first full-scale, heat-protected IRBM nose cone, demonstrating that a practical solution had been found for the aerodynamic reentry heating problem. Jupiter served as the first stage of the Juno II vehicle which launched the first "made-in-USA" satellite of the Sun in March, 1959. In May, 1959, Monkeys Able and Baker were recovered after riding a Jupiter nose cone 1,500 miles and reaching a maximum altitude of 300 miles.

The Jupiter is presently planned for deployment in Italy.

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

 ton audiences since it pioneered the use of large-screen closed circuit television in missile training last year by regularly transmitting missile courses to the Armored school at Ft. Knox, Ky., 250 miles north of Redstone; and also by using TV sequences on seven missile systems taught in its own classrooms to students from the Army, Navy, Marine Corps and 12 allied Nations.  
 Last February a two-hour program was sent to a Pentagon theater to demonstrate the new medium to Secretary of the Army Wilber M. Brucker and 500 high-ranking officers. In April, a special one-hour report was sent

to a select audience of 400 newsmen at the National Press Club in Washington. A course is to be transmitted to the U.S. Military Academy at West Point next Spring.


Urgent requirements of missile training schedules, plus complex subject matter, led the missile school to begin experiments last year with closed circuit television and a number of ultra-modern audio-visual aids.

Significant advances have been scored, the school states. Closed circuit TV has enabled the school to transmit courses to other training centers, thus avoiding costly duplication or transportation of scarce equipment and skilled instructors.

Use of giant screens has immeasurably enhanced student interest and retention of subject matter.

Experimental studies made during the past year of the use of TV and group communications equipment indicated 27 per cent saving in training time in lecture and conference type instruction, a five per cent rise in examination grades, and seven percent increase in the student retention of the difficult Nike Hercules anti-aircraft missile system courses.

The experimental studies will be continued during the coming academic year as the missile school continues transmissions to the Senior Officers Preventive Maintenance Course at the Ft. Knox Armored School; extends TV through its own classrooms, and surveys the possibilities of sending television missile courses to other training centers.

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

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

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### ARPA Research Seeks Means to Control Satellite

Washington (AFPS) — The United States is now conducting space research which this year will lead to a capability of bringing an orbiting satellite down on command, recovering it, and then setting it up for re-launching.

Roy W. Johnson, director of the Defense Department's Advanced Research Projects Agency, recently made this report to the House Space Committee in closed session hearings.


Portions of the testimony, just released, also made reference to a giant communications satellite in orbit some 22,000 miles from earth. The time table reads 1962 or early 1963 to accomplish this feat.

Mr. Johnson said the communications satellite will be launched in such a way that it will orbit the earth once every 24 hours, thus remaining stationary over one prescribed point.

Future plans, Mr. Johnson said, call for sending mechanics up to repair the satellite.

"We definitely have in the study stage," he said, "a kind of program that would allow a serviceman to go up there and take care of it."

The first such target, however,

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

Lt. Phillips, captain of the Redstone Arsenal Rifle Team, is the first arsenal member to receive this classification.



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

**If You Save 65 Seconds, What Then?**

Over the past few months many of you as operators and passengers of motor vehicles using Rideout Road during the rush hours have no doubt observed at least one motor vehicle accident.

Most of us usually make a complete verbal or mental analysis after viewing one of these accidents such as "that guy was driving too close" or "Well, he got what he deserved for weaving in and out of traffic" and "no wonder they collided, no signal was given." Many more comments could be made regarding lane weaving to gain a car advantage, excessive speeds, tailgating and lack of signal indications. But let's all analyze our own driving habits—COULD ANY OF THE ABOVE MENTIONED COMMENTS EVER BE MADE ABOUT US?

Recently a survey was made by the Safety Office during the afternoon traffic rush hour to determine the time it would take to drive from Gate No. 5 to Gate No. 9 on Rideout Road, staying in the left lane and maintaining a speed between 50 and 55 mph. The time recorded was 3

MINUTES and 5 SECONDS.

A similar test over the same distance with the permission of the Provost Marshall was made by the Safety Office in a non rush hour at approximately 70 mph with no traffic to contend with. The time recorded was 2 MINUTES and 30 SECONDS.

Does it not seem foolhardy therefore, to drive fast and switch lanes to save ONE MINUTE AND FIVE SECONDS and risk having an accident involving possibly you and others?

Assuredly we will all agree the time saved is not worth the risk involved.

To make Rideout Road a safer place to drive, let's all follow the "Golden Rule" of driving and maintain a COURTEOUS ATTITUDE in our driving habits.







**Army Rockets Used In Reentry Studies**

Washington (AFPS) — Solution of the complex physical problems involved in effecting the reentry of space vehicles into the earth's atmosphere may be speeded by the use of a six-stage rocket system.

Recent tests of the six-stage rockets were the first ever made by the U.S. research programs, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration has announced.

Made up of Army's Honest John and Nike missiles plus a Lance booster rocket, the first three stages propel the vehicle to an altitude of 200 miles. A single air-frame houses the final stages which include Thiokol T-44 and T-55 rocket motors and a spherical rocket motor, five inches in diameter, developed and built by NASA's Langley Research Center.

Upon reaching its approximate 200-mile altitude, the vehicle coasts for awhile, then zooms earthward at about 16,000 miles per hour. This thunderous speed gives the payload the appearance of a flaming meteor, but before the final stage is burned up by atmospheric pressure, scientists

secure valuable tracking data from optical, radar and telemetric devices.

Part of a broad study of the physical conditions occurring when a space object reenters the atmosphere, the six-stage launchings were made from NASA's Space Flight Station, Wallops Island, Va.

## The Judge Advocate Advises



### WILLS

Most military personnel and, indeed, persons in all walks of life, never feel the need or desire to make a will. In a few cases such has been considered and the omission so to do is intentional and even desirable. Most likely, however, it is because the making of a will is considered a rather depressing and complicated process. In such cases, therefore, the execution of a will is often postponed until too late.

It is true that most people are

unable throughout their lives to accumulate and leave estates of really substantial dimensions. Also, the lion's share of most assets often would not even be subject to a will.

For example, property owned jointly by a husband and wife ordinarily will pass to the survivor regardless of a will. Life insurance is payable to the named beneficiary irrespective of will provisions unless the policy has been expressly made payable to the estate. Most Government benefits are by operation of law payable to certain dependents. There are, however, several compelling reasons for making a will in the ordinary case.

### WHEN ESTATE INCREASES

First, a person's estate may increase suddenly at or before his death. For example, the estate of a person killed in an automobile accident may be entitled to recover substantial damages from the party at fault. There are, of course, many other ways in which any estate may be suddenly, substantially increased.

Second, in the case of a couple with minor children, the hus-

band may believe that, should he die without a will, the property will automatically go to his family in any event. In a sense this is true.

However, at least half of the property would usually go directly to the children. The surviving wife is then deprived of absolute control of the estate and must rely on frequent court appearances and rather substantial expenses in order to use the money to support the children.

### SITUATION CHANGES

Third, in any case involving unusual family situations, a will is generally necessary. Where there has been a divorce or an adoption, special provisions are desirable to insure proper distribution of the estate.

Fourth, most people would desire to insure proper distribution of their estate in the event that the primary heirs should die at the same or nearly the same time as they, as for example, in a common disaster. Special provisions must be made for these situations.

Fifth, the making of a will offers an opportunity to name selected persons to take charge of an estate or to have custody of minor children. In addition to insuring that proper care is taken of your family and possessions, such may often substantially reduce the cost of distributing the estate.

### PROBATE COSTS

Sixth, in any event, the costs of probating a will are generally less than those of dividing an estate without a will. Extra and unnecessary costs, of course,






