ARMY NEGOTIATES WITH RESIDENTS TO USE DESERT

Negotiations between the Army and approximately 60 resident families for use of approximately 1,500 square miles of New Mexico desert area north of the White Sands Missile Range will begin in the near future, the Department of the Army announced today.

The Army said the area is needed in order to test developmental elements of the Nike Zeus anti-missile missile system. The system is under development by the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency here. ARGMA and White Sands are elements of the Army Ordnance Missile Command led by Major General J. B. Medaris.

Although only simulated ballistic missile targets will be used in conducting the Zeus tests, the additional area will guarantee that debris resulting from the firings will fall in uninhabited areas.

Consideration has been given to using other test areas. However, the White Sands Missile Range is particularly suited for the Nike Zeus tests because of extensive instrumentation, valued at more than \$75,000,000, and qualified personnel to operate this equipment. In addition, use of an over-land, rather than an over-water range, enables the Army to recover missile components for post-firing study.

It is anticipated that 20 firing periods a year will accommodate schedule firings. The Army proposed that during each period, limited to about 12 hours each, the 60 families will be removed from the area. It will not be necessary to move livestock or personal property from the area since danger of damage is remote. However, arrangements will be made for expeditious payment in event of damage.

If the Army's proposed method of operation is accepted, each occupant of the area will receive advance schedules of firings and residents will be evacuated for the period required for the test. Highway 380, a paved road crossing the proposed area, may have to be closed for short periods.

Zeus is presently the nation's only defense system against ballistic missiles which is in the test stage. The industrial team working with the Army includes Western Electric, Douglas Aircraft Company and Bell Telephone Laboratories. The same team produced the Nike Ajax and Nike Hercules air defense missile systems.

TACTICAL JUPITER PROVES VERSATILE

The Army fired a tactical Jupiter Intermediate Range Ballistic Missile last week at Cape Canaveral, in a continuation of the advanced testing program.

This missile was programmed for considerably less than the normal Jupiter range, to demonstrate its versatility in tactical use. Standard range of the weapon is about 1500 nautical miles.

This missile was fabricated by the Jupiter development team, the Army Ballistic Missile Agency, Army Ordnance Missile Command at Huntsville, Ala. The main Jupiter production, however, is being done by Chrysler Corporation at the Army Ordnance Missile plant near Detroit.

The missile was fired by the ABMA Missile Firing Laboratory headed by Dr. Kurt H. Debus. Personnel of the Air Force 864th Technical Training Squadron, Strategic Air Command, assisted in the preparation and launching of the vehicle. This is the sixth time that AF personnel have participated in Jupiter launchings.

The 864th, commanded by Col. William C. Erlenbusch, USAF, was trained at Redstone Arsenal in the deployment of the missile.

FIRST ZEUS FLIGHT TEST IS LISTED AS PARTIAL SUCCESS

A preliminary test firing of a Nike Zeus research and development missile at White Sands Missile Range Aug. 26 was partially successful, the Department of the Army announced.

After a successful launching, the flight was terminated when technical difficulties developed causing an apparent explosion of the missile.

The booster and second stage of the missile, which is designed as an anti-ICBM weapon, were to be fired over a ballistic trajectory. The booster rocket had been static fired successfully at Redstone Arsenal. The second stage, or sustainer motor, had also been static fired successfully at Redstone Arsenal and elsewhere.

The Nike Zeus is a project of the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency.

Quartermaster Corps Office Opened at AOMC Headquarters

The Army Quartermaster Corps has established an office at the Army Ordnance Missile Command headquarters here, Maj. Gen. J. B. Medaris, Commanding General, announces.

Other branches and technical services of the Army, such as Signal, Engineer and Transportation Corps, the Continental Army Command and the Army Air Defense Command, also have staff representatives at the AOMC headquarters to round out a fully-integrated Army missile development organization.

The Quartermaster office is being headed by Maj. Kermet H. Applewhite.

Maj. Applewhite has been in the Office of the Chief of Army Research and Development since 1955, where he served as a research and development staff officer.

He is a veteran of World War II who has served in research and development in the office of the Quartermaster General as well as O.C.R.D.

He studied at Cornell University to earn his master's degree in biological sciences. Maj. Applewhite is a member of the Alpha Tau Alpha fraternity, the Alpha Zeta fraternity, and the Beta Beta Beta fraternity. He studied science and agriculture at Pearl River Junior College and at Mississippi State College where he gained a bachelor's degree in that field.

Maj. Applewhite served with the Army in Europe during World War II, and in Korea and Okinawa since then.

During his service in Europe, he was awarded the Bronze Star Medal and earned an oak leaf cluster in Korea where he also received the Republic of Korea's Presidential Unit Citation.

Maj. Applewhite worked as an entomologist with the U. S. Department of Agriculture at New Orleans prior to entering the Armed forces in 1942.

He is a graduate of the Command and General Staff College and the Quartermaster Advance Course.

District Engineer Asks For Bids on Fence Post Timber

Col. R. W. Love, U.S. Army District Engineer at Mobile, Alabama, announced last week that approximately 1,000 pieces of Black Locust fence post timber located in future construction areas at Redstone Arsenal will be sold to the highest bidder.

The timber has been marked. It is contained in an area of approximately 23 acres in the northern portion of the military reservation. Harvesting and removal must be completed by November 1.

COL. PICKETT HEADS AOMC SIGNAL OFFICE

Col. George E. Pickett recently was assigned chief of the Army Ordnance Missile Command Signal Office at Redstone Arsenal. It was announced by the AOMC Commander, Maj. Gen. J. B. Medaris.

Col. Pickett has also attended the Armed Forces Staff College at Norfolk, Va., and the National War College at Ft. McNair.

Young Rocketeers See Jupiter Firing At Cape Canaveral

Jimmy Blackmon the young rocketeer who gained prominence three years ago as an amateur rocket designer, and two other youthful rocketry enthusiasts visited the Army Ballistic Missile Agency Missile Firing Lab at Cape Canaveral last week and witnessed the launching of a Jupiter missile.

Blackmon, 20, from Charlotte, N. C. is a physics student at Caltech. The other two visitors were Thomas Little 19, electrical engineering major at Michigan Institute of Technology, and David Beste, 20, a physics student at the University of Michigan.

All three are summer employees of the Chrysler Corporation Missile Division, prime contractor for the Redstone and Jupiter missiles, and were at the Cape as guests of Chrysler and the Army.

Several years ago Blackmon designed a six-foot liquid-fuel rocket which the Civil Aeronautics Administration, for safety reasons, refused him permission to launch in his home state. Post Surgeon Adds Pediatrics Service

The Post Surgeon has added a pediatric clinic and pediatrician, Capt. J. K. Eakins, to his staff at the U. S. Army Hospital at Redstone Arsenal.

Space is being allotted at the Post Hospital and the Dispensary for use in pediatrics.

Also, a series of lecture-seminars are programmed to begin at the Post Chapel on the Third Thursday of each month beginning Sept. 17 at 7 p.m. and running until 8:30 p.m. The first half of the program will be a lecture, and the second half will be devoted to discussion. All military families have been invited to participate in these seminars which will be aimed at prevention and treatment of children's diseases, behaviour problems, handicaps, and other common problems.

It is estimated that there are approximately 8,000 children in the military community. A well-baby clinic is also to be established.

Capt. Eakins, a graduate of the University of Illinois, interned in pediatrics at Akron, Ohio. He is a native of Missouri. Mrs. Eakin comes from Indiana. The couple have two children, Douglas, 5½ and Nancy, 2½.

The captain said that the hospital space will be ready for use around the middle of September and that he will have a nursing staff on duty as soon as the area is equipped. Plans at present are to decorate with a nursery motif to hold the children's interest.

No definite date has been set for opening the new wing of the Dispensary, where outpatient care will be administered. However, the present plan calls for completion in October.

Redstone Arsenal employees will have the opportunity to receive a Civil Defense orientation course at the Rocket Auditorium Sept. 15 from 8 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. was announced by Col. O. T. McCloskey, Redstone Arsenal commander.

The course is being offered as a part of the Arsenal program to work in this field with State and National Civil Defense agencies.

In May, the Alabama State Civil Defense held classes lasting one week in Huntsville, but few Arsenal employees were able to attend because of conflict with their workloads. Therefore, a condensed course has been devised with the aid of the Redstone S-3 Office under the direction of Col. Jay A. Dasche. The one-day course includes all the essentials contained in the longer course offered earlier.

Howard Slayden will give the introductory address. Ransome E. Crawford, director and coordinator of the Madison County-Huntsville Civil Defense Corps will describe the role of the individual in civil defense and will discuss the structure of the local organization.

Some of the subjects to be covered will include: "Probable use of Nuclear Weapons," "Capabilities of Potential Enemies," "Scope of Probable Attack," and others. The discussion will also include the Redstone Arsenal Emergency Unclassified Plans.

Eighty men from the Arsenal and the community have already donated over 5000 hours of police service with the local Civil Defense Corps. The men completed a 13-week police training course and bought their own uniforms and equipment, to become a bona fide Auxiliary Police Unit. This unit is headed by William C. Cunningham, an employee in the Fabrication and Engineering Assembly Laboratory of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency.

Joe Foster, director of Civil Defense for the State of Alabama has been invited to attend this meeting. Among the speakers scheduled is James H. Kelley, advisor for the Survival Planning Staff in the State Civil Defense Office at Montgomery.

New Safety Courses Are Offered at OGMS

A new course in Guided Missile and Special Weapons safety will bring 525 additional students to the Army Ordnance Guided Missile School during the 1959-60 academic year, Col. Charles W. Eifler, commandant, announced today at Redstone Arsenal.

Addition of the new course will boost the number of graduates to more than 5,000 during the current year, he said.

The new course will be conducted in 21 one-week sessions beginning October 4th and ending next June 19. It will teach selected officers and civilians from Army installations across the nation, the proper Ordnance procedures for installing, transporting and keeping special warheads and propellents for missiles in constant combat readiness.

The course will be conducted by the officer training division of the school, headed by Lt. Col. Z. F. Rael.

Dr. Sweigert Is Guest Of Georgia Tech Alumni


Dr. Ray L. Sweigert, dean of the graduate division at Georgia Tech, was the guest speaker at a recent meeting of the Huntsville Georgia Tech Alumni Club which was attended by 65 members and their guests, including Mrs. Sweigert.

Dr. Sweigert spoke on the advancement and growth of the engineering graduate schools in the United States. He stated that there is a continuing demand by industry and the government for graduates with M.S. and Ph.D. degrees which cannot be supplied by the present 150 accredited engineering colleges in the United States.

The rapid progress being made in the scientific development fields of this space age require specialized trainings in physics, mathematics, and chemical engineering which are needed to solve the complex problems encountered in advancing the engineering state of the art.

This college training is in addition to the 4 years required for a B.S. degree, so Dr. Sweigert predicts that by 1975 the professional status of the scientific engineer will require a total of 7 years, or three years of graduate work, to meet the demands of new scientific achievements.

In answer to this demand the Georgia Tech Graduate School is offering 22 M.S. and 7 Ph.D. degrees in the engineering field. Last year about 150 graduate degrees were awarded and 500 graduate students are enrolled

NO PRESIDENT HAD JUNE BIRTHDAY

From now until 1960, when American go to the polls to choose their 35th President, the nation's highest elective office will be a prime news subject. And while, as AP columnist Hal Boyle observes, no one can say with certainty who will succeed President Eisenhower, the odds are that he won't have a June birthday.

Not one of the 34 U. S. Presidents was a June baby. The months that have given us the most of our Chief Executives are two—October and November with five each.

Some other Presidentiana: although George Washington was

called the Father of his country, the real patriarch in the White House was President John Tyler who, by two marriages, had 14 children.

James Buchanan, our 15th President, was the only bachelor. Theodore Roosevelt, less than 43 years old, was the youngest to take office. James A. Garfield, assassinated at 49, was the youngest to die. John Adams, who died at 90, was the oldest.

Virginia, "the cradle of Presidents," gave the nation eight Ohio ranks second with six. Only three Presidents—Herbert Hoover (who has just observed his 85th birthday), Harry S. Truman and Mr. Eisenhower—were born west of the Mississippi.

Zachary Taylor, our 12th President, never lived to see his son-in-law become President of the



The report showed that 64 percent of civilian employees and 31 percent of military personnel at the Missile School participated in


the bond purchase program. These percentages were 14 percent and 7.6 percent higher, respectively, than any other agency on the post.



Duck Hunting Season Cut 30 Days; to Open Nov. 25

Rabbit Hunters Get Break As Season Is Prolonged

Montgomery — Alabama duck hunters will have 30 days less shooting this season according to an announcement made by the Alabama Department of Conservation. In addition to the reduction in hunting days for ducks, the coot limit was reduced from 10 last season to a total of four this year. The season on ducks is Nov. 25 - Jan. 3.

Conservation Director William C. Younger stated that the framework allowed by federal waterfowl regulations made it mandatory to cut the length of the duck season and the bag limit on coots. "The Alabama Advisory Board of Conservation had a choice of allowing a 50 day season with a daily limit of three ducks or a 40 day season with a limit of four ducks," Younger said, "and the board decided to accept the shorter season with the larger bag limit since most duck hunters prefer a reduction in days rather than a reduction in the bag limit."

Younger also announced a change in the rabbit season which was set at the July Board meeting. A previous announcement

stated that the rabbit season would open in all counties north of Jefferson on Nov. 26 and continue through February 20 and in the remainder of the state on Oct. 1 through February 20. Younger stated that the Advisory Board members reconsidered the above dates and a majority voted to have a statewide rabbit season opening on Oct. 15 and continuing through February 20.

Another change made in the regulations passed at the July Board meeting pertained to turkey hunting in Marengo County. Board members voted to allow both a fall and spring season instead of a spring season only.

Other changes in the waterfowl regulations stipulated by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service are a reduction in the bag limit on Canvasback, Redhead, and Ruddy ducks from last year's two to one for the coming season and the reduction in the bag limit on Sora from 25 to 15. Hunting hours this year will be from sunrise to sundown except on opening day when the legal time will be 12 noon.

Season dates and bag limits are: Ducks and coots, four a day or eight in possession, Nov. 25 through Jan. 3.



Anderson Is New OGMS Branch Chief

Maj. Claude C. Anderson, who recently reported to the Army Ordnance Guided Missile School after a tour of duty with the Joint U. S. Military Mission for Aid to Turkey, has been assigned as chief of the maintenance branch of the school's Logistics

Division, it is announced by Col. Charles W. Eifler, commandant.

Maj. Anderson has also received a special letter of appreciation from his former headquarters for assistance he rendered to the Second Turkish Army.

Born in Gulfport, Miss., he has served in the Army for 18 years. He and his wife Edwina now reside at 214 Dyer Circle on the Arsenal.

Dr. Woodbridge Delivers Paper at London Meeting

Dr. David D. Woodbridge of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency is presenting a scientific paper this week on the Army's "Operation Gaslight" at the International Astronautical Congress in London.

Woodbridge, a physicist in the ABMA Research Projects Laboratory, is in charge of the project.

"Gaslight" is a program to measure radiation emitted by the Jupiter Intermediate range ballistic missile as it re-enters the atmosphere following flight through outer space. The Jupiter is a 500-mile weapon developed by ABMA.

Re-entry phenomena has been recorded on more than a dozen Jupiter missiles since the Gaslight program began in August, 1959. The missiles are launched in dusk or darkness, allowing the Army and supporting contractor organizations to take photographic and infrared measurements of the re-entering bodies from ships and from island stations of the Atlantic Missile Range.

The upper atmosphere research worker, Woodbridge noted, can profit from such studies by gaining information helpful in planning successful recovery of space bodies, "or in making sure that such bodies are safely disintegrated before reaching the earth when recovery is not to be attempted."

The Jupiter missile re-enters Earth's atmosphere in three bodies, listed in order of their brilliance: the booster or fuel tank sections, instrument compart-

ment, and the heat-protected nose cone. The Jupiter nose cone has been recovered successfully a number of times, demonstrating a satisfactory solution to the re-entry heating problem.


