PHONE CUTOVER SCHEDULED FOR FRIDAY

The telephone exchange cut-over to the five-digit telephone dial system is scheduled at 10 p. m. Friday night with Col. O. T. McCloskey, Redstone Arsenal commander, scheduled to throw the switch placing the new system in operation.

New phone books were distributed last week, with many of the old numbers carrying a pre-fix to the number the individuals already had; but new numbers have been added, Maj. Thomas Koenean, Redstone Arsenal Signal officer, said.

It took a team of 49 military and 10 civilian installer-repairers approximately eight months to install the new service. This team from the Army Signal Engineering Agency was headed by Andrew Green, installation team supervisor, and Lt. Robert P. Reeves, officer in charge.

The 10,200 telephones on the Arsenal already have the new five digit numbers inserted under the old numbers so that personnel will be able to lift the present strip of cardboards holding their present numbers and the new numbers will be visible.

The phone facilities serve the Army Ordnance Missile Command headquarters, the three major elements of the Command, the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency, the Army Ballistic Missile Agency, and Redstone Arsenal, and the Ordnance Guided Missile School.

It takes a complement of 38 telephone operators to man the switchboards with average 1450 long distance calls daily and 1645 local calls an hour at peak hours. The two information operators handle as many as 135 calls an hour at peak hours.

The new switchboard has 22 positions, counting two for information operators.

The telephone exchange is located in Bldg. 5698.

Space Projects to Be Transferred to Services

Defense Action

A plan for the "progressive and orderly" transfer of space projects from the Advanced Research Projects Agency to the military departments was announced last Wednesday by the Department of Defense. This is being done to prepare for the shift from development to use of space systems, and to simplify administrative procedures.

ARPA will continue to be responsible for advanced research in fields such as advanced missile defense, solid propellant research materials and such other projects as the Secretary of Defense may decide.

Basically, the plan provides for the eventual assignment to the Air Force of responsibility for the development, production and launching of military space boosters, and for the separate assignment of the developmental responsibilities for payloads and specialized ground support equipment for space and satellite systems to the military departments on the basis of primary interest or special competence.

The following specific assignments for development of payloads have been approved—

1. Midas, the satellite for early warning against ballistic missiles, to the Air Force.
2. Samos, a reconnaissance satellite system, to the Air Force.
3. Transit, the satellite-borne navigation system, to the Navy.
4. Notus, the interim satellite-borne communications system, to the Air Force.

AOMC Reaction

Maj. Gen. J. B. Medaris, Commanding General, Army Ordnance Missile Command, made the following statement in answer to queries from press media in regard to a news release issued last week by the Department of Defense:

"We have not seen the text of the order which has apparently been issued by the Secretary of Defense and on which the news release and press conference were apparently based. Therefore, we know nothing of its details.

"We are delighted that the Saturn project has been reaffirmed and that it will continue here at ABMA.

"ABMA has consistently, in addition to its major obligation as an in-house resource of the Army in the military weapons field, and because of the special competence that has been created here, devoted its talents to projects not within the Army zone of responsibility as a contract service, if you want to call it that, for other agencies and services such as ARPA, NASA, the Air Force and the Navy."

This is the Day Care Center for white children of widowed mothers or mothers who have been separated or divorced or in any way do not have a husband that can support the family. These children are able to be placed in adequate facilities where they can receive education, food, good professional supervision and rest periods necessary for youngsters of this age. Fees are charged on a sliding scale basis upon the income of the mothers. In this Center as well as the Council Day Care Center the lowest fee charged is \$2.00 a week.

American Red Cross

The American Red Cross is a multi-function agency operating the following programs for civilian and military personnel:

McConaha Is Named Deputy Director of AOMC Personnel

Jack N. McConaha has recently been named as deputy director of Civilian Personnel for the Army Ordnance Missile Command.

Col. Wood, ARGMA Leaves Service After 26 Years

Brig. Gen. Joseph M. Colby, deputy commanding general, Army Ordnance Missile Command, will retire from the Army this afternoon after some 36 years of active service.

Missile Command troops will hold a retirement parade in his honor beginning at 4:30 p. m. at the Redstone Arsenal parade ground, near the Post Theater. The public is invited.

In addition, three other Redstone-based Army men are terminating their active duty today. They are: Col. Thomas E. Wood, director of the Ordnance Missile Laboratories, Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency, CWO Robert L. Vowell, executive officer of the 283rd Ordnance Detachment (Technical Intelligence) and Operational Control Officer, Technical Intelligence Division, assistant Chief of Staff, Research and Development, AOMC; and M/Sgt. Eugene C. Appleby, machinist, Field Maintenance Division, Redstone Arsenal.

General Colby's Army career covers a period of about 36 years and includes duty in North Africa and Europe during World War II, and in Japan and Korea during the Korean Conflict. He is a top authority in the design, manufacture and use of tank and automotive equipment for military purposes, and has played a leading role in the Army's transition from the tank-automotive phase of World War II to the present era of 24,000 miles-per-hour missiles.

The Missile Command, of which the general is deputy commander, is responsible for all missile and space projects assigned to the Army. The commanding general is

Gen. Medaris Gets Advice From Irish Junior Rocketeers

Among his heavy volume of official mail, the Commanding General, U. S. Army Ordnance Missile Command, occasionally finds a welcome relief.

The other day Maj. Gen. J. B. Medaris received an air mail letter from the Belfast, Ireland Junior Rocket Society. It was signed by J. King, president and Raymond M. Lee, secretary and it said, in part:

"We wish to forward some of our own humble views.

"Although rocket failures should be made public, the details should not be released until a prolonged period after the launching.

"The successes should be publicized in a big way.

"Public morale has sunk to a degrading level. We are sure that the Soviet Union probably had more failures before they put a satellite into orbit. At one time America led the field in rocket engineering. Now this lead is being cut down by the rapid approach of Russian success.

"Let not America be daunted by this 'soon will die' spurt. Let the American attitude always be, Go Forward and Let Not the Sky Be Our Barrier."

Gen. Medaris has acknowledged the suggestions with thanks. He assured the Belfast group that his Command will continue to press forward in the peaceful exploration of outer space.

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

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

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
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HUMAN ENGINEERING FACTORS DINNER—Dr. Charles A. Lundquist was the principal speaker at the windup dinner of the Human Engineering Conference held at Redstone Arsenal last week. The conference encompassed progress of engineers who fit design of equipment to human limitations both physically and mentally so that the machines and implements of the soldiers are not too complicated to handle efficiently. The engineers aim is to design everything from missiles to gloves to fit the men who will handle them.

ARMY SCIENTIST WARNS: SPACE SN'T 'BIG REGION OF NOTHING'

"It's a dangerous point of view to consider interplanetary space as a 'big region of nothing' simply because we are still without much information concerning it," an Army scientist told the Fifth Annual Human Factors Engineering Conference here last week.

The speaker, Dr. Charles A. Lundquist of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency, Army Ordnance Missile Command, addressed over 100 scientists and engineers from

throughout the country. The conference is devoted to man-machine compatibility—making modern tools of war fit the capabilities and limitations of the men who must use them. Sponsoring the conference was the Office of Chief of Research and Development of the Army. Host was the Missile Command at Redstone Arsenal.

"The modern tendency, when a region is inaccessible to man's experiments, is to assume that nothing exists in the region," said Dr. Lundquist, who is Chief, Physics and Astrophysics Section, Research Projects Laboratory, Development Operations Division, ABMA. The Missile Command is parent organization to ABMA.

The regions of the earth and of space which were inaccessible to primitive men were populated in their imaginations by gods, demons, and grotesque animals, Dr. Lundquist pointed out. The superstitions and lore which arose were hard for man to shake off—but

gradually he did. For example, the solar system was recognized; astrology became astronomy.

"Scientific progress was profoundly influenced by the point of view taken by man, or by the experimenter, toward his environment," the speaker said. "Thus there was a profound interplay between human factors and the machinery of scientific progress."

The pendulum today has swung far to the other extreme from the view of ancient man who peopled the unknown regions with fancies of his own imagination, Dr. Lundquist pointed out. "There was a time not long ago when, after shaking off the myth of sea monsters, the ocean depths were assumed void of all life."

A more recent example cited by the speaker was the fact that—since only cosmic rays were expected to be found high above the earth—some scientists were somewhat critical of the Van Allen experiment carried in the Explorer earth satellites. Yet it was through this experiment that the Van Allen or Great Radiation Belt was discovered.

Dr. Lundquist's address was given at a dinner meeting of the

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Your Vision and You!

If the services of an eyesight specialist (or of a general physician, for that matter) were like sugar or potatoes, you could buy as little or as much as you want and pay accordingly. With sugar or potatoes, the quality is the same whether you buy one pound or ten.

2. One result of the corner-cutting examination is the possible failure to detect diseased conditions, or incipient glaucoma or cataract that may make you blind. The conscientious specialist, on the other hand, will find that 3 out of every 100 patients have diseases of the eye or body. He will either help or advise you in these matters.
3. The "quickie" as a rule doesn't bother to correct small degrees of astigmatism. It takes time, and the glasses needed to correct it are more costly. And too often his other findings are not correct, due to his speed-up methods.
4. The high-grade professional man wants his patients to have only the finest lenses and materials from reputable manufacturers.
5. So you see, it's perfectly easy to cut prices. Anybody can do it, if he has little ethics and less reputation to protect. As far as you are concerned, the point is that you don't save anything in the long run—and your eyes pay the bill of damages—that one and only pair of eyes that must serve you in comfort and safety for a full lifetime.





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
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

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





STUDENT PREPARES FOR SCIENCE FAIR; SEEKS HELP OF EXPERTS

A space-minded young Athens, Ala., student has enlisted the advice of experts at Redstone Arsenal on his plan to build a self-contained capsule in which animals can live amid simulated conditions such as could exist on the planet Mars. David J. Wilson, Jr., 17, a senior at Athens High School, plans to construct the environmental space capsule as an entry in the North Alabama Regional Science Fair scheduled in his

home town next April. At Redstone, headquarters of the Army Ordnance Missile Command and working site of some of the nation's top space authorities, David has discussed his project with a group of seven experts in various fields of interest. All have worked directly with such programs as construction of the space capsule in which the famed monkeys Able and Baker took during their historic trip through outer space in a Jupiter missile nose cone on May 28 of this year. Heading David's volunteer advisers was Dr. S. J. Gerathwohl, chief, Bioastronautics Office, AOMC, U. S. Army Medical Service Research and Development Command. Dr. Gerathwohl discussed the overall aspects of the project, touching on such problems as generation of oxygen, food consumption, waste disposal, space needed, and best type of animal to use in the experiment. David is undecided as to whether to use white mice, guinea pigs, hamsters, squirrel monkeys, or spider monkeys. Whichever he chooses, he plans to put two of them in the closed capsule and keep them alive there for several weeks or possibly months. Advising David on overall design for his space capsule were G. P. Pedigo and W. G. Kistler. Pedigo is chief and Kistler deputy chief of the Missiles Systems Layout Section, Structures and Mechanics Laboratory, Army Ballistic Missile Agency. S. L. Burt, chief, Rubber and Plastics Section, S&M Lab, discussed the best type of plastic to use in the capsule and methods of forming the material. J. L. Johnson, of the Special Fields Section, Research Projects Laboratory, ABMA, discussed David's project from the standpoint of prevention of animal


