Students From Navy Study Hawk at OGMS

All three branches of the U. S. Armed Forces are now represented at the Army Ordnance Guided Missile School with enrollment of the first Navy students for training in maintenance of the new Hawk air defense missile, it is announced by Col. C. W. Eifler, commandant.

Four Navy Guided Missile Technicians are the first bluejackets to begin training on the supersonic Hawk missile which has a homing device that enables it to destroy enemy targets at tree-top or wave-crest level. More Navy students are to report early next year.

These Navy men are Harold M. Everhart, Jr. of Corpus Christi, Texas; David W. Kelly, of Point Mugu, Calif.; Louis E. Scott and Charles E. Peterson, both of Fallbrook, Calif.

They are joining students from the Air Force, Army and 12 Allied nations who are assigned to a variety of courses dealing with seven operational missile systems, ranging from the mighty Jupiter intermediate range ballistic missile to the small and highly mobile Hawk and Lacrosse.

The Missile School is the Army's only school devoted entirely to training in the new weapons and in six years of operations has graduated almost 18,000 missile technicians.

OGMS Instructors Receive Courses On Job at Cape

Ten men from the Ordnance Guided Missile School have recently returned from a three-week course of on-the-job training at the ABMA Missile Firing Laboratory, Cape Canaveral, Fla.

The group studied techniques of preparation and launching of the Army-developed Jupiter intermediate range ballistic missile.

Scientists and technicians of the Missile Firing Laboratory, under Dr. Kurt H. Debus, worked side-by-side with the visiting trainees. Instruction was in the latest methods used at the Laboratory.

POLICY MAKERS FOR BLUE STREAK HOLDING MEETING

The Blue Streak Procurement Conference being held at the U.S. Army Ordnance Missile Command will end tomorrow afternoon.

The conference opened in the Rocket Auditorium Tuesday morning with a welcome address by Brig. Gen. John A. Barclay, Deputy Commanding General of the AOMC.

The conference keynote address which followed Gen. Barclay's welcome was delivered by Lt. Col. William Mulheron, Jr., Office of the Chief of Ordnance. Col. Mulheron's talk centered on the "Blue Streak" procurement program. The conference is a policy establishing group which will outline the rules governing requisitioning procedures for support of the customers or users of the items requisitioned.

Col. Sylvester A. Hall, Assistant Chief of Staff for Support Operations, AOMC, is the moderator.

'Mail Now' Is Advice

The Redstone Arsenal Postoffice is ready for the Christmas rush and the personnel is hoping that everyone mails early to assure arrival of cards and packages by Dec. 25.

Marvin Berry, the postmaster, recommends that anyone shipping packages or cards overseas for Christmas delivery now ship them air mail.

Packages and cards going to points on the West Coast and inland in the U. S. are urged to get these items in the mail this week if ordinary mail is used.

The Postoffice department is furnishing labels for out-of-town and Huntsville mail which can be obtained by individuals in order to help the Post Office personnel speed bundles of cards and letters to the proper destinations.

Barry says that at Redstone the postal worker has the same responsibility to receive and dispatch mail in and out of the Post Office as the offices serving in municipalities.

However, he sees one difference. The bundles of mail for Arsenal offices remain the same steady flow the year round, unaffected by the up and down surges of the seasons.

The staff at the Redstone Arsenal Postoffice consists of four full time postal clerks, one man who divides his time between the Arsenal and the Huntsville Post Office as a clerk, two mail carriers and the Postmaster.

Payday is one of the biggest days of the month at Redstone Arsenal, but this pay day was a little different. Many of the people were sending packages.


Barry anticipates that this season will be similar to last year. The rush of Christmas cards from the people in the two housing (See POSTOFFICE, Page 2)

SEWAGE DISPOSAL PLANT—An auxiliary sewage disposal system has been installed on the Eastern boundary of Redstone Arsenal by the Post Engineer at a cost of \$333,700. Harbert Construction Co., of Birmingham, Ala., built the system which recently was placed in operation. Pumping capacity of this system is one million gallons a day. This would adequately take care of a town of 5,000 people. This system serves the Arsenal as well as the offices and shops North of the Main Motor Pool. This sewage disposal system occupies approximately three acres of ground and can be modified to work round-the-clock automatically.



The Judge Advocate Advises



Buying and Selling Real Estate

At sometime in his life, almost everyone is confronted with the problems involved in the buying and selling of real estate. Usually it is the purchase of a home, the culmination of years of planning and saving, and the largest single business operation the buyer ever undertakes.

A mistake at this time can undo a lifetime of effort. The technical problems involved in the transfer of a piece of real estate are too complicated to be understood without years of legal training, and his brief outline is intended to give the prospective buyer or seller only a general idea of the problem areas involved.

Frequently the purchaser is requested to sign a written memorandum of transaction, called a "binder," at the time he pays the

deposit or "earnest money." If the purchaser is without legal advice at this point, he is apt to assume that the binder is a mere receipt and of no significance other than as evidence of payment of the deposit.

Rights Lost

It is quite the contrary, for the contents of the memorandum can be very important. Later, when the purchaser consults a lawyer seeking his representation on the formal contract, it is frequently found that he has already given up important rights in signing the binder.

For example, he may have agreed to purchase property which he will be unable to use for the very purpose for which he is buying it because of deed or zoning restrictions. For this reason attorneys usually advise clients who are purchasing real estate not to sign anything without their approval but simply to draw a check as a good faith deposit, if required, and if a cash deposit is made, just to get an ordinary receipt from the broker or seller.

The real estate broker serves a very useful function in the sale and purchase of real estate, for without his services the arranging of the deal might prove unduly burdensome to both parties.

"A Little Learning"

But sometimes the broker may overstep the bounds of his limited field and offer to draw the contract of sale - and nowhere else is the saying more graphically illustrated: "A little learning is a dangerous thing."

Not only may the broker get the parties into trouble if he undertakes to draw the papers, but it is not within his province to prepare contracts and instruments affecting real estate as part of his services to the parties, unless he is an attorney as well as a broker.

Most real estate brokers appreciate this and are careful to avoid any such actions. In any

case, since the advice and guidance of a member of the legal profession will be needed by both parties before the transfer of the property is concluded, it is obviously the better part of wisdom to bring the attorneys in at the beginning before any damage is done.

It is customary for the parties, as soon as possible after they have come to an agreement, to sign a contract of sale providing for the delivery or closing of title at a later date.


This is important, for under such contract both the buyer and seller remain obligated to complete the transaction during the time needed for investigation of title, financing, and related details.

All details of the agreement should be contained in this contract for anything left out, even though agreed upon in the discussion leading to the contract, is generally unenforceable.

When Bagging Game Get It in the Bag Hunters Are Warned

Recently a national magazine published an article condemning bowhunters for wounding game without recovering it. The article provided a lot of food for thought.

All hunters, no matter what weapon they prefer, have an obligation to make sure they follow up any possible hit. A clean miss is one thing, but if you're in doubt do all that is in your power to either finish the job or make darned sure that the animal or bird will recover.

Many times it is difficult to know whether you've wounded game or not. However, most good hunters who follow the rule of shooting only at what they see can call their shots on game as well as good service marksmen do on a rifle range.

If you feel you've scored a hit, the best policy is to stay right where you are for an hour or so. For most, this is the hardest part of hunting, but it pays off. A seriously wounded animal will not run too far if it isn't being chased.

After the waiting period is over carefully track the animal to its hiding place. If you use caution you should find it and, if neces-

sary, get in the shot that counts. If after a careful search you fail to find any trace of your game you can be reasonably sure that the animal has "lit out for parts unknown."




