Anti-Missile Program Undergoes Streamlining

Nike-Zeus Missile System Will Be The First Affected

The Army has adopted an action program for anti-missile and space defense systems which will provide the stream-lined management successfully applied by the Army in the development of the Jupiter IRBM.

The program was jointly developed by Lt. Gen. J. H. Hinrichs, Chief of Ordnance, and Maj. Gen. J. B. Medaris, Commanding General, Army Ordnance Missile Command.

The Nike Zeus anti-missile missile system will be the first of the Army's development programs to be affected.

"This step may be taken as positive proof of the tremendous importance the Army attaches to the task of providing the nation with an effective defense against the threat of ballistic missile attack," General Medaris said.

"We are determined to leave no stone unturned which would assure the successful prosecution of the vital Zeus program. By installing this management system, we will be able to swing as much of the Army's resources as may be necessary behind the Zeus development, whether those resources are within the Government or our contractor organizations."

The anti-missile or space defense systems, for which AOMC is responsible, will remain under the control of the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency commanded by Brig. Gen. J. G. Shinkle.

A Deputy Commander, ARGMA, will be designated as the individual responsible for the execution of the program. Col. John G. Zierdt, Chief of Staff, of the Missile Command, has been selected for the assignment and will in effect become "Mr. Zeus."

Col. Zierdt will have cognizance over all phases of the Zeus program and will be responsible also for representing the Command. (See ANTI-MISSILE on Page 2)

COL. COOKE IS NAMED AOMC CHIEF OF STAFF

Col. Thomas W. Cooke has been designated Chief of Staff, Army Ordnance Missile Command, succeeding Col. John G. Zierdt, it was announced today by Maj. Gen. J. B. Medaris, Commanding General. Col. Cooke will assume his new duties on or about Jan. 15.

Col. Zierdt will become Deputy Commander, Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency, in charge of the Army's anti-missile and space defense programs including the Nike Zeus system.

Col. Cooke is a native of Dayton, O. He was graduated from Western High School, Washington, D. C., and also attended Devitt Preparatory School in that city.

AP POLL ELECTS DR. VON BRAUN TOP NEWSMAKER

An Associated Press poll elected Dr. Wernher von Braun top newsmaker in the field of science for the third consecutive year.

Dr. von Braun is the director of the Development Operations Division of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency.

In a recent interview, when asked about his reaction to this honor, Dr. von Braun said, "the first time I was greatly honored, the second time I was surprised, and now I am embarrassed." He also said that the "general popularity of the space field" helped to center him in the limelight because of the accomplishments in this field which emanated from the Army Ballistic Missile Agency.

Arsenal Has 56,687 Official Visitors

Visitors to the Army Ordnance Missile Command and its elements at Redstone Arsenal in 1959 totaled 56,687, according to the figures issued by the Intelligence and Security Office, Redstone Arsenal, which issues badges to all visitors.

Among the 56,687 people who visited the Arsenal were foreign dignitaries, representatives from the North Atlantic Treaty Organization, from the Far East, contractors representatives, and officials from the Department of Defense, and other U. S. Government agencies.

Seven members of the Intelligence and Security Office process all visitors to the Arsenal. They are located in the Headquarters of the Army Ordnance Missile Command, Headquarters of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency, and the combined Headquarters of the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency and Redstone Arsenal.

He Will Become Deputy Commander ARGMA on Jan. 15

Col. John G. Zierdt, Chief of Staff of the Army Ordnance Missile Command since its activation Mar. 31, 1958, has been designated Deputy Commander, Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency, effective on or about Jan. 15.

He will be responsible, in his new assignment, for the anti-

missile and space defense systems under development by ARGMA. The ARGMA Commander is Brig. Gen. J. G. Shinkle.

Col. Zierdt will be in charge of the Nike Zeus anti-missile missile program, the Army's most urgent missile project.

Prior to joining AOMC Col. Zierdt was Chief, Control Office, Army Ballistic Missile Agency, during the development of the Jupiter IRBM system.

He is the son of Col. W. Henry Zierdt, retired, of Grantsville, Pa. He was graduated from the U. S. Military Academy and the Command and General Staff College. He also studied at Trinity College, Hartford, Conn. and Massachusetts Institute of Technology. (See COL ZIERDT on Page 2)

SIGNIFICANT ACCOMPLISHMENTS IN MISSILES, SPACE ARE LISTED

Significant accomplishments of the U. S. Army Ordnance Missile Command in missile and space programs during 1959 are summarized as follows:

January

Hawk air defense missile user tests started at Ft. Bliss, Texas.

First Chrysler Corporation production line Jupiter IRBM was successfully fired at Atlantic Missile Range and impacted on its pre-selected target.

The Army Ordnance Missile Command assigned to the Army Ballistic Missile Agency responsibility for the development of ballistic targets to be used in the Nike-Zeus program.

February

Little John (Phase II) demonstration firing using the "Spin on Straight Rail" (SOSR) concept staged at Ft. Bliss.

March

A Juno II rocket launched the Free World's first solar satellite, Pioneer IV, for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration. Radio signals from the space probe were received over a distance of 408,000 miles, proving the feasibility of communications with vehicles in deep space.

ABMA completed the Saturn System Study, defining various upper stage configurations, and submitted it to the Advanced Re-

search Projects Agency.

A Nike-Hercules missile intercepted a Q-5 drone traveling at a speed of greater than Mach 3 at an altitude of over 70,000 feet at White Sands Missile Range.

A \$9.95 million contract was awarded to Western Electric Company for pre-production planning for the Nike-Zeus program.

April

The first Pershing Missile was delivered to ABMA by the Martin Company for static testing.

The Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency was given overall authority for development of the Shillelagh Missile System.

The "American Mariner," a converted Liberty vessel, was put into operation in connection with Project Damp (Down Range Anti-missile Measurement Program.) The ship is equipped with advanced electronic equipment to track ballistic missiles fired over the Atlantic Missile Range.

May

A contract was awarded for construction of the Pershing captive test facility at Redstone Arsenal.

The first engine for the Saturn 1,500,000 pound thrust booster was successfully test fired at ABMA.

A Jupiter missile carried two monkeys, Able and Baker, 300 (See ROUNDUP on Page 3)

mand in all Zeus matters.

Action offices will be established at the plants of major contractors, including the Bell Telephone Laboratories, Whippany, N.J., which is responsible for the technical development of the Zeus system.

The Western Electric Company is prime contractor. Douglas Aircraft Company fabricates and assembles the missiles, utilizing solid propellant motors supplied by the Thiokol Corporation and Grand Central Rocket Company.

Special communications systems will be established immediately linking the action offices with the ARGMA Deputy Commander's office.

A Zeus field office is to be established also at White Sands Missile Range in New Mexico, another element of AOMC, where Zeus missiles are undergoing evaluation firings. This office will be directly responsible to the ARGMA Deputy Commander.

"The purpose is to assure current knowledge of all aspects of the program," Gen. Medaris explained, "and to provide the capability for fast coordinated action in support of the program whenever and wherever required."

"By this means we will introduce into the Zeus project the internal urgency and assure the external attention that the Jupiter IRBM development received. These were the important factors contributing to the successful completion of the Jupiter program

the direction of the U.S. Army Ordnance Missile Command's Rocket and Guided Missile Agency to defend the nation against hostile ballistic missiles.

Specifications call for the construction of a motor conditioning building with a floor area of about 5,600 square feet and a boiler house with a floor area of about 600 feet, both of concrete construction, all necessary utilities, a paved access drive, and a security fence.

Bids will also be opened on Jan. 13 for the construction of a boiler house addition to provide more capacity in the Arsenal headquarters area. The addition will be one story high, about 41 feet by 18 feet, of reinforced concrete construction with clay tile masonry wall panels. It will contain an oil-fired steam boiler with all appurtenant steam piping.

Bids will be opened on Jan. 14 for the expansion of the electrical distribution system at the Arsenal to provide additional capacity for the Capehart housing area. The work will include the construction of two new unit substations, an addition to an existing unit substation, and 46-KV and 4160-V line extensions.

The bid openings will be held at 11 a.m., C.S.T., on the scheduled dates at the Corps of Engineers district office, 2301 Grant Street, Mobile, Ala.

miles into space on a ballistic trajectory at speeds in excess of 10,000 miles an hour in an experiment sponsored by NASA. Both were recovered unharmed from the missile nose cone.

The first Pershing missile was successfully captive fired at Redstone Arsenal.

June

Construction of the launch facility for the Saturn space vehicle began at the Atlantic Missile Range.

Project Mercury Astronauts visited Redstone Arsenal for briefings by ABMA personnel.

A contract in the amount of \$3,303,704 for Shillelagh missile research and development was awarded to Aeronutronic Systems, Inc.

Environmental tests of the experimental model of the Sergeant missile system were begun.

Contracts for production of Hawk air defense missiles for NATO forces were finalized.

A contract for development of the Redeye missile was awarded to Convair.

A contract for pre-production planning effort on the Nike-Zeus was finalized in the amount of \$19 million.

July

The first U. S. Army Lacrosse missile unit (5th Battalion, 41st Artillery) was activated.

An assault phase operation including helicopter lift, emplacement, and firing of the Hawk missile was conducted under simulated tactical conditions.

The general nature and purpose of the extensive Nike-Zeus test program was disclosed by the Army. The test program will be carried out at Ascension Island in the Atlantic Ocean, White Sands Missile Range in New Mexico, Pt. Mugu, Calif., and Kwajalein and Johnston Islands in the Pacific

Ocean area.

August

The first minimum range firing of a tactical type Jupiter was successfully accomplished.

ARGMA selected Picatinny Arsenal to develop the motor propellant and igniter for the Shillelagh missile. Picatinny will also develop the warhead and fuse.

The second Lacrosse unit (5th Battalion, 42nd Artillery) was activated.

A Little John system demonstration was given for the Joint Chiefs of Staff at Ft. Sill, Okla.

First flight test of the Nike-Zeus anti-missile system was conducted at WSMR.

September

The 864th Squadron, U.S. Air Force, completed formal training in the Jupiter weapons system at Redstone Arsenal.

Italian Air Force personnel began Jupiter training at the Ordnance Guided Missile School, Redstone Arsenal.

Third Lacrosse unit (4th Battalion, 28th Artillery) was activated. The 1,000th Honest John rocket was test fired at WSMR.

Fourth Redstone missile of year successfully launched at WSMR.

A contract of \$188,402,905 was awarded to Western Electric Company to continue research and development phase of the Nike-Zeus program on an accelerated basis.

October

Second Nike-Zeus firing was staged at WSMR. Both the booster—most powerful single-grain solid propellant rocket motor ever flight tested—and the sustainer motor functioned properly.

A Juno II rocket successfully orbited Explorer VII, the heaviest scientific earth satellite yet launched in the Free World, for NASA.

All contractor modifications to the ABMA static test tower for captive firings of the eight-engine Saturn booster were completed.

President Eisenhower ordered transfer of the ABMA Develop-

Saturn Service Tower To Be Built In Florida

America's biggest space vehicle, the 1.5-million-pound-thrust SATURN missile now being developed by Army Ballistic Missile Agency at Redstone Arsenal was again in the nation's spotlight when Colonel Paul D. Troxler, District Engineer for the U. S. Army's Jacksonville (Fla.) District, awarded a \$118,353 contract for the construction of the first stage umbilical tower for servicing the missile last week.

Nichols-Southern Division, Yuba Consolidated Industries, Inc. of Baton Rouge, La. was awarded the construction contract. This work will take place at the Atlantic Missile Range, Cape Canaveral, Fla.

Mr. Joseph L. Harvey, chief of the Engineering Division's Military Branch, stated the present contract calls for a 27-foot section of a structural steel tower ultimately to be constructed to a height of from 240 to 270 feet. The two-story section, inclosed with asbestos siding, will have about 675 square feet of usable space on each floor. Harvey also said that the roof will be constructed to provide a working platform for missile servicing the SATURN.

The tower will be built in two stages, and, if the need arises, possibly three. The contract for the second stage will be awarded at a future date. The second stage would be 240 feet above the ground, or approximately as high as a ten to twelve-story building. When the second-stage contract is awarded, an elevator will also be

installed.

The umbilical tower receives its name from the arms that extend from the floors of the tower to control cables which are attached to various stages of the missile within the nation's largest gantry, a 310-foot monster which will tower into the sky as high as a 23-story building. The Jacksonville District last August awarded Kaiser Steel Corporation of Los Angeles, Calif. a \$3,898,999 contract for the construction of this mammoth gantry, and construction is now underway.

Prior to the launching of SATURN, the huge portable gantry on wheels will be moved under its own power away from the missile and parked in a safety area. This will leave only the missile and umbilical tower on the test stand. When the missile is ready for launching, the umbilical arms on the tower will fall free from the space missile.

The SATURN is being developed for orbiting multi-ton payloads into space. The booster is composed of eight JUPITER-type liquid rocket engines with a combined thrust of 1,500,000 pounds. The booster, coupled with upper stages, will be capable of orbiting payloads of some 15 tons around the earth and of placing approximately one ton of payload in a soft landing on the moon.





Construction, Payroll, Employment Increase

Year-end Figures Show Substantial Gains in 1959

The Army activities at Redstone Arsenal, headquarters of the Army Ordnance Missile Command, wound up 1959 with personnel, payroll, and construction figures showing substantial increases over those for the previous year.

Employment in the five agencies located on the Arsenal now stands at 21,996, including civilian, military, and contractor employees. This is an increase of approximately 2,000 over 1958 year-end strength.

The agencies include the Headquarters, Army Ordnance Missile Command, and its three subordinate elements, the Army Ballistic Missile Agency, the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency, and Redstone Arsenal; and the Ordnance Guided Missile School.

Salaries and wages paid to military and civilian personnel during 1959 totaled \$132,349,000. In 1958 the total payroll amounted to approximately \$125,000,000.

Construction contracts totaling more than \$31,000,000 initiated or completed in 1959 have added more facilities to the Arsenal complex. In the previous year construction amounted to about \$20,000,000.

Current strength includes 12,562 Civil Service employees, 4,090 military personnel, 3,492 contractor employees, and 1,100 construction workers.

Of the civilian personnel, 2,994

are employed at ARGMA, 5,238 by ABMA, 3,781 by Redstone Arsenal, 406 by AOMC Headquarters, and 328 at OGMS.

Military strength includes 981 officers and 3,109 enlisted personnel, distributed as follows: ARGMA, 168 officers, 183 enlisted men; ABMA, 84 officers, 273 enlisted men; Redstone Arsenal, 85 officers, 547 enlisted men; AOMC Headquarters, 144 officers, 76 enlisted men; OGMS, 465 officers, 1,667 enlisted men.

Employment among contractors is as follows: ARGMA (including Thiokol and Rohm & Haas), 2,302, ABMA, 954; Redstone Arsenal, 280; and OGMS, 336.

Payrolls were divided as follows: OGMS, \$13,250,000; Thiokol

Chemical Corporation, \$1,315,000; Rohm & Haas Chemical Company, \$1,594,000; other contractor personnel, \$7,500,000; AOMC including ARGMA, ABMA, and Redstone Arsenal, \$98,390,000.

Construction completed during 1959 included 316 units of Capehart housing at a cost of \$5,214,000. Also finished were interim troop housing, a Post Exchange, off-site facilities for Capehart housing, and a water treatment plant. These totaled approximately \$2,500,000.

Construction projects totaling \$4,282,116 begun prior to 1959 will continue during 1960. These include additions to ABMA's Guidance and Control Laboratory, costing \$2,500,000, and a Pre-Flight Evaluation Laboratory costing over \$1,000,000.

Construction begun in 1959 included OGMS barracks, mess, administration, and storage buildings totaling over \$3,000,000. Other major items, for AOMC, were work on a Mission Engineering Building, costing approximately \$3,000,000 and a Missile Systems Test Facility, \$3,000,000.

Thiokol Employees Trying to Surpass Their Safety Record

Thiokol Chemical Corp. Redstone Division at Huntsville, Ala., reached a total of one million man-hours without a 1st-time accident on Dec. 21.

In making the announcement to employees, management of the Division said this is only the first step towards surpassing the previous record of approximately 2,900,000 man-hours and urged attention to good safety practices be carried onto the highways and into the home.

Thiokol safety practices have prevented serious injuries in the propellant and chemical areas during recent years, and accidents that have happened have been of the type that could occur in any industrial plant. A workman drops a hammer on his foot, another backs a car into a post, or an office worker slams a file drawer shut on his hand. These are the areas that require the most attention to keep the record going, according to Thiokol's Safety De-

partment.

In accordance with established custom, two silver dollars per employee will be distributed next week in celebration of the passing of the one million man-hours. This will be doubled at the two million mark and tripled at the three million goal. Approximately eighty working days are required for Thiokol's two thousand employees to earn one million man-hours.



The Judge Advocate Advises



STATE INCOME TAX LIABILITY (REPRINT)

Questions recently presented to legal assistance advisors in the Office of the Staff Judge Advocate indicate that all personnel are not aware that they or their dependents may be subject to state income taxation by the State of Alabama, their home state (if other than Alabama) or both. The possibility of taxation by two states arises since some personnel, although stationed in Alabama, are legal residents of another state.

The determination of the state of legal residence is often difficult. For the purpose of this discussion, it will be assumed that there is no question as to which state is the legal residence.

Although it would seem that taxation by two states of the same income is unfair, there are logical reasons behind the principles of law involved.

First, any state may tax the gross income of its residents even though they may be temporarily living and working in another state.

Second, any state may tax income produced within its boundaries by either residents or non-residents. The reason for both rules is basically the same. In each case the taxing state provides certain protection and grants certain privileges thereby creating a duty on the part of the recipient to help bear the cost of government.

For example, a resident of Cali-

fornia stationed here still is entitled to vote in California, receives the protection of California courts, and may receive the benefits of California schools for his dependents. On the other hand, while in Alabama he receives

fire and police protection, the privileges of using Alabama streets and highways, and may also be entitled to send his children to Alabama schools. The Supreme Court of the United States has held that, where a person receives the benefits of two states, both may tax his income.

Thus the entire gross income of all military personnel and their dependents is subject to taxation by their home states. Some states of course have no income tax requirements and others offer special benefits to servicemen. Each person must examine the laws of his own state in determining whether


any tax is due. The home state may continue to tax her residents no matter how long they remain absent as long as they have not since become residents of another state.

In the absence of other law, all servicemen and their dependents would be required to pay income tax to the State of Alabama for all income earned here. The Soldiers' and Sailors' Civil Relief Act provides, however, that no state may tax the MILITARY PAY of any person who is not a resident. Therefore, servicemen stationed here are not required to pay Alabama tax on their MILITARY

PAY unless they also happen to be Alabama residents. Any servicemen who have earned "outside income" in Alabama, and all dependents, are required to pay Alabama tax on all such income earned within Alabama. Many other states will, however, allow a deduction from the tax due to them for the amount paid in Alabama.

Legal assistance personnel in the Office of the Command Staff Judge Advocate are prepared to help all military personnel and their dependents in the solution of their state income tax problems.


