## Johnson Will Be Principal Speaker At Banquet Friday

### He Will Be Briefed On Missile Program During His Visit

Courtney Johnson, assistant Secretary of the Army for Logistics, will be a guest at the Army Ordnance Missile Command Jan. 13-16.

Johnson is scheduled to be the principal speaker at the Big M Day banquet to be held at the Community Center in Huntsville at 7 p.m. Friday.

He will also take part in the parade scheduled for 3:15 p.m. on Friday in downtown Huntsville.

Johnson and a party of 12 will also receive briefings at the Missile Command on the Army missile systems programs, and tour various missile facilities in the Army Ballistic Missile Agency, the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency, and the Ordnance Guided Missile School.

The three-day visit to Command headquarters follows a tour of the facilities at the ABMA Missile Firing Laboratories facilities at Cape Canaveral, Fla.

## AOA Division Will Meet Here Jan. 21

The fifteenth annual meeting of the Standards and Metrology Division of the American Ordnance Association will be held at the Army Ordnance Missile Command, Redstone Arsenal, Huntsville, Ala., on Jan. 21 and 22, 1960.

Effects of environmental factors on accuracy of measurement will be the technical theme of the meeting. Technical papers and workshop sessions will cover the environmental influences on all units of measure in the electronic, dimensional and general physical standards fields as they pertain to the manufacture and measurement of weapons.

All levels of the calibration structure from national and industrial standards, to the area of shop problems will be included in the papers and discussions.

C. Thorpe Thompson, chairman of the Standards and Metrology Division, AOA, will preside at the meeting.

## MARINES ENROLL IN ARMY SCHOOL

The Marines have landed at the Army Ordnance Guided Missile School in this land-locked city, and the instructors report the situation is well in hand.

Col. C. W. Eifler, missile school commandant, announced that the first Marines of a contingent of eight officers and 58 enlisted men began classes Monday in maintenance for the new Hawk missile system now in production for use by both the Army and the Marine Corps.

Enrollment of the Marines, he said, adds another arm of the service to the missile school student body which already includes men from the Army, Navy, Air Force and twelve Allied Nations.

## Questionnaires Will Be Circulated To All Personnel

Information Questionnaires will be distributed Thursday and Friday of this week to all military and civilian personnel at Redstone Arsenal by the Control Office, Redstone Arsenal.

Every person working on the post should receive one of these forms. The Control Office requests that they be filled out promptly and accurately, and returned through Mail and Records.

The information gathered will be used by the AOMC and OGMS Public Information Offices for the release of appropriate statistics to the press, and by other Offices for personnel management. Information will not be used directly from this form for public release. Any individual will be contacted personally for privileged information.

Examples of the type of information obtained from previous questionnaires are: Forty per cent of the employes at Redstone Arsenal have attended college. Forty-one people live more than 75 miles from the Arsenal and commute daily. Sixty-one per cent of the employes at Redstone own or are buying their own home.

To reduce the work of coding the information, in some instances personnel are asked to enter a coded number instead of words. Full instructions accompany the form. If there is any question about filling it out, please consult with the supervisor concerned.

## DR. NILS MUENCH APPOINTED ARGMA CHIEF SCIENTIST

Dr. Nils L. Muench of Houston, Texas, has been named chief Scientist of the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency by Brigadier General J. G. Shinkle, Agency Commander.

The agency is an element of the Army Ordnance Missile Command which is responsible for all missile and space programs assigned to the Army. Among the agency's projects are a number of rocket and missile systems including the Honest John, Little John, Corporal, Sergeant, LaCrosse, Hawk, Nike Ajax, Nike Hercules and the Nike Zeus anti-missile missile.

Dr. Muench was formerly a senior research engineer with the Production Research Division of the Humble Oil and Refining Company.

He received his B.A., M.A., and Ph.D degrees in physics from the Rice Institute where he was a graduate student of President William V. Houston and Professor Charles F. Squire.

Dr. Muench served in the U.S. Navy from June 1950 until June 1953, completing active duty as communications officer aboard the U.S.S. Queenfish (SS-393). He has also been active in the Naval Reserves, serving most recently as Commanding Officer of the Naval Reserve Submarine Division 8-95 aboard the U.S.S. PETO (SS-265) moored on the Houston Ship Channel, Galena Park, Texas.

# Gen. Medaris Will Be Honored By Huntsville

## GEN. MEDARIS WILL RECEIVE 13-GUN SALUTE

A Fort Benning battery will fire a 13-gun salute when Maj. Gen. John B. Medaris, commanding general of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency, retires from active duty in ceremonies at Redstone Arsenal, Huntsville Ala., Jan. 29.

Gen. Medaris has commanded the agency since February, 1956.

Six 105-mm howitzers manned by 30 men from Battery B, Second Field Artillery Battalion, 10th Artillery will go to Redstone on three-day temporary duty to take part in the honors to be rendered Gen. Medaris.

Commanding the battery will be Capt. Roscoe Melton of Wootton, Ky., with 1st Lt. Robert M. Justiss (sic) of El Dorado, Ark., as executive officer.

The battery will depart Fort Benning Jan. 28 and return Jan. 30.

## LACROSSE MISSILE TO UNDERGO COLD WEATHER TESTS

The Department of Defense announced today a series of cold weather trials of the United States Army Lacrosse guided missile will be held at Fort Churchill, Manitoba, during January and February of this year.

The tests are designed to demonstrate the field operation of the Lacrosse under arctic conditions.

The Lacrosse is a surface-to-surface field missile system. The missile is capable of carrying conventional or nuclear warhead. Test missiles fired in Canada will not be fitted with atomic warheads.

The Lacrosse was developed under direction of the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency.

Selected Canadian and United States Army personnel, some of whom were trained at U.S. Army guided missile training establishments, will carry out the Lacrosse trails on a joint basis.

The Canadian portion of the test team is made up of three officers and 17 men of the Royal (See LACROSSE on Page 2)

## Directory Is Issued For Missile Ground Support Equipment

Dr. Herbert F. York, Director of Research and Engineering, has sent the military departments for study and guidance, the report of an advisory group on ground support equipment for guided missiles.


The group, composed of representatives of private industry, was formed in March, 1958. Its recommendations, which are not mandatory, are intended to point out major areas where it is believed that improvements in cost, efficiency and performance can be effected in the field of Missile ground support equipment.

Acting on the first recommendation of the group, Dr. York's office has issued a technical resources directory, "Missile Ground Support Equipment," listing fields of knowledge and technology, together with the cognizant agencies. The directory, designed for a broad interchange of knowledge, was assembled with the cooperation of the military services and distributed among prime contractors in the field. It will be revised as required.

The full report is classified. The recommendations cover ten important categories listed as interchange of knowledge, research and development programs, planning, specifications, paper work, management, procurement, standard items, design changes and lead time.

In the research and development programs category, it is recommended that military planners call on the military research and development agencies for improvements in ground support equipment, eliminating random attempts to design better items for each missile. The report points out that research and development in this field should take into account both short and long-range needs.

## ARGMA ORGANIZES '1500 HOUR CLUB'

The most recently organized club at the Army Ordnance Missile Command is the "1500 Hour Club."

The maximum number of hours that any individual could have accumulated since Civil Service Act of Jan. 6, 1952, is 1552 hours. Before the bill was enacted the maximum accumulation for an individual was 90 days. With the change in policy, sick leave continues to accumulate.

## Civil Service Has 77th Anniversary

Civil Service employees across the Nation will observe the 77th anniversary of the Civil Service Act during the week of Jan. 16-23.

Congress signed the bill which established the merit system on Jan. 16, 1883 as a means to end the "spoils" system wherein presidents appointed men to public office on the basis of qualifications. The "spoils system" reached such proportions that 30,000 to 40,000 office seekers swarmed into the capital seeking the 23,700 available jobs in 1853. It took a month after a change of administration to straighten out the mess.

Originally limited to selection of about 10 per cent of Federal employees, the merit system and the modern personnel system built around it today include more than 86 per cent of all employees who staff the 70 Federal agencies.

The merit system guarantees the citizen who applies for a Federal job that he may qualify for the job on the basis of ability to do the work without discrimina-

tion. Race, religion, national origin or politics are not considerations. The same yardstick is used for promotions, and the Civil Service Act provides protection from arbitrary dismissal or obligations to political parties.

The merit system is designed to guarantee that the best qualified people are available for public service and will preserve the continuity of essential Government programs without upheavals at the change of administration that could bring the whole Government machinery to a halt until new appointments are made.

Canadian Artillery and one officer and four enlisted men of the Royal Canadian Electrical and Mechanical Engineers.

The U.S. portion of the test team is made up of two officers, four warrant officers and 22 enlisted men from the U.S. Army Air Defense Center, Fort Bliss, Texas.

## The Judge Advocate Advises



### SICK PAY MAY NOT BE TAXED AS INCOME

(Because of the timeliness of its subject matter, this article, published in 1959, has been revised for this publication.)

Were you absent from work during 1959? Was this the result of illness or injury? Were you marked "quarters" or hospitalized? These are matters for you to consider in completing your income tax return.

The tax law provides for the exclusion from gross income of amounts received by employees under accident and health plans financed by one's employer. There are some employees who do not

receive pay from their employers when they are absent because of illness or injury. Military personnel are more fortunate. Their pay continues when they are absent from duty because of illness or injury sustained in line of duty.

As to employees covered by employer-financed accident and health plans, the rule generally is that amounts received as wages during a period of absence from work as a result of injury or illness are excludable from gross income. Basic pay received by military personnel while absent from work due to sickness or injury qualified them for this exclusion.

Income or wages received while

a taxpayer was absent from work is included as income on the withholding statement of the taxpayer. The appropriate amount, however, can be excluded when computing his income tax obligation for the year. The amount to be excluded depends upon the nature of the disability, the amount earned during the period, and the basic pay of the taxpayer.

When the taxpayer is ABSENT FROM WORK because of illness, as for example marked "QUARTERS," his sick pay exclusion starts on the eighth day of his absence. If, however, he is HOSPITALIZED by the illness for as much as one day his exclusion starts the first day of absence from work and continues until he is returned to duty status. If he has been removed from duty status by injury instead of by illness, the exclusion continues from the first day of absence until return to duty status, even in the absence of any hospitalization.

A taxpayer who is a member of the armed services may be considered absent from work because of illness or injury even on a day for which he has no assigned duty but to stand ready for duty, if the illness or injury prevents him from answering any duty call whether or not he is actually called. Further, while he is a patient, in a hospital he is considered to be absent from work, even though he may be doing a small amount of light work in the hospital while he is convalescing.

The amount of the permitted exclusion depends on the weekly basic pay of the taxpayer. For military personnel, this is determined by multiplying the monthly rate by 12 and dividing by 52. However, the exclusion may not

exceed \$100.00 per week. Therefore, if the weekly rate exceeds that amount, only \$100.00 will be allowed per week for the exclusion from income.

In some cases, excusable sick pay will be received for a fraction of a week. It therefore becomes necessary to know the daily rate of pay. Since military personnel are on duty seven days a week, the daily pay would be the weekly rate divided by seven. Where weekly pay exceeds \$100.00 the maximum exclusion allowed would be \$14.29 per day. Some examples are:

**EXAMPLE 1:** Taxpayer earned \$455.00 per month and was on duty seven days per week. He was injured and was removed from duty status for four days. His weekly rate of pay is \$105.00 (\$455.00x12÷52). Since this is more than \$100.00 per week, the taxpayer's daily exclusion is \$14.29 (\$100.00 ÷ 7). This being an injury, there is no seven day waiting period. The exclusion therefore is \$57.16 (4x\$14.29).

**EXAMPLE 2:** The same taxpayer was sick, hospitalized, and removed from duty status for four days. His exclusion would be the same as in Example 1.

**EXAMPLE 3:** The same taxpayer was sick and removed from duty status for four days but not hospitalized. Because of the seven day waiting period, there is no exclusion.

**EXAMPLE 4:** The same taxpayer was sick and removed from duty status for eleven days but not hospitalized. The seven day waiting period would apply, so that there would be a four day exclusion equal to that in Examples 1 and 2.


**EXAMPLE 5:** If in the previous examples, the taxpayer had earned \$227.50 per month, this weekly rate of pay would be \$52.50

(\$227.50x12÷52), and his daily rate would be only \$7.50 (\$52.50 ÷ 7), since this is less than the maximum allowed exclusion. The exclusion in Examples 1, 2, and 4 would therefore be \$30.00 (\$7.50 x4).

To substantiate his declared exclusion the taxpayer should attach to his return a statement from the medical officer indicating dates he was absent from work, the nature of his illness or injury, and if hospitalized, the dates on which he was admitted to the hospital and discharged. Also, a statement from the finance officer should be included indicating the amount of pay received during such illness or injury.

Taxpayers who were unaware of the permitted exclusion when they filed prior returns are allowed to file amended returns seeking refund of the overpayment of taxes in the years of illness or injury. However, such claim must be filed within three years from the due date of the return, or within three years of the time the return was filed, or within two years from the time the tax was paid, whichever time is latest.

**SAFETY TIP:** Avoid that run-down feeling. Cross the street carefully.



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

## Toastmasters Hold Survey Before Forming New Clubs

Maj. Jack Caryi, Canadian Liaison Officer and Area Governor of Toastmaster's International, announced tentative plans to form additional Toastmaster's Clubs in this area.

Interest is indicated by military and civilian operating officials in forming clubs to meet at noon or after work in addition to those now meeting in the evening.

The Civilian Personnel Office at the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency is coordinating this program for the Army Ordnance Missile Command. Any person interested in joining a Toastmaster's Club should send his name, grade or rank, organization an phone number in writing to ARGMA Civilian Personnel. Other necessary information is the time and day the individual would like to meet, and whether or not the meeting is desired in some city other than Huntsville. Interested personnel will be notified of the results of the survey.

Some organizations urge employees to join Toastmasters as a self-development project in connection with Department of the Army Career Development Plans. Training time might be arranged during duty hours if sufficient interest is displayed.

Toastmasters is an organized group of men, over 21 years of age, who seek to improve them-

selves in speech and leadership. It is a nonprofit, noncommercial corporation with chartered clubs throughout the U.S., Great Britain, Canada, South Africa and Australia; Hawaii, Japan, Guam, Korea, the Phillipines and other South Pacific Islands. Approximately 300 new clubs are added each year.

The fundamental purposes of these clubs is to improve members in oral expression of thought; develop ability to appear effectively before an audience; provide constructive criticism and comment to allow each speaker the benefit of audience reaction; develop the habit of analytical listening; instruct in chairmanship and parliamentary procedure; and promote good fellowship among men interested in speech improvement.

During Toastmasters dinner meetings, every member has an opportunity to make speeches before the formal program which usually consists of prepared speeches lasting from six to ten minutes. A regular feature is "Table Topics" in which many have the chance to deliver brief impromptu speeches. The president introduces the "toastmaster" at the beginning of the formal meeting. The toastmaster then conducts the program.

Following the speeches, they are evaluated by the membership. The usual way is to have a member serve as critic for each speaker with a general critic to review the entire program. Critics are limited to two minutes, the general critic to eight.

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



Zero hour was approaching. Lt. Col. George Phillip, the officer-in-charge, was busy organizing the administrative details of the unit. Capt. Nancy Wood, the advance officer, was preparing the necessary material in order to check arrangements for the unit and the show at every installation enroute. 
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# INCENTIVE AWARDS

The number of incentive awards presented in 1959 increased over the 1958 total, it was announced by the Incentive Awards Office at Redstone Arsenal.
