10,000 SPECTATORS VIEW PARADE FOR GEN. MEDARIS ON BIG M DAY

Huntsville Honors Gen., Mrs. Medaris

The City of Huntsville honored Maj. Gen. J. B. Medaris, Commanding General of the Army Ordnance Missile Command, last Friday in a celebration designated Big M Day which included a parade in the late afternoon, and a banquet that night.

Mrs. Medaris shared the honors with her husband, accompanying him in the open car which took them to the reviewing stand for the hour-long parade. A crowd of approximately 10,000 citizens lined the parade route in spite of overcast skies in the afternoon.

That night, a banquet at the Huntsville Community Center drew 840 well-wishers including Courtney Johnson, assistant secretary of the Army for Logistics, Rep. Chet Holifield (D-Calif.), Rep. Robert E. Jones of Alabama and local officials.

Johnson was the principal speaker at the banquet.

Gen. and Mrs. Medaris were both presented gifts by the citizens of the community and the general was honored by two professional societies. The Huntsville Chapter of the American Rocket Society gave him the first Hermann Oberth Award for the work he did in missilery. The presentation was made by Konrad K. Dannenberg. Robert Cuthill, president of the Tennessee Valley Post of the American Ordnance Association, presented Gen. Medaris with a lifetime directorship in the post.

Mrs. Medaris was presented three silver serving dishes.

The general's gifts included the desk and chair he used while running the Army's missile program, a metal desk plate made from the first full-scale Jupiter nose cone recovered, and four albums of letters from friends who wish him well in whatever he undertakes (See 10,000 on Page 2)

Graduation Address Delivered at OGMS By Maj. Gen. Ganey

Maj. Gen. Wiley D. Ganey, commander of the Chanute Technical Training Center of the Air Training Command in Illinois, was the principal speaker here yesterday at the graduation of one of the largest groups of U.S. and Italian Air Force students to complete training on the Jupiter IRBM system.

Gen. Ganey, a native of Andalusia, Ala., and a West Point graduate in the class of 1930, flew here from Rantaul, Ill. to address 84 American and Italian officers and airmen who received their diplomas from the Army Ordnance Guided Missile School in exercise at the Post Theater.

Key Men Study New Nike Hercules System

Lt. Col. C. C. Young, chief of the Air Defense Branch, Research and Development Division, Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency welcomed key military and civilian personnel who began study of Target Ranging Radar for the Improved Nike Hercules at the initial meeting on Jan. 13.

The course is designed to give the men essential knowledge and skills pertaining to the operation, maintenance and repair of new equipment for the missile system. The developer is the Western Electric Company.

Resident courses will be established later at the U. S. Army Ordnance Guided Missile School and the U. S. Army Air Defense School at Ft. Bliss, Tex.

The students are attending four classes conducted by field engineers of the Western Electric Company under a contract which also provides for supervision by the Research and Development Division, ARGMA.

Representatives from OGMS the Army Air Defense Command the Army Air Defense School, the Army Air Defense Board, White Sands Missile Range, and ARGMA are taking this course.

Engineers Advertise For Bids on BOQ Building Construction

ABMA-NASA Transfer Is In Nation's Interest

ABMA Is Asked to Obtain Upper Stages for Saturn

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration and the Department of Defense have requested the Army Ballistic Missile Agency to initiate negotiations within a month with industry for procurement of upper stages powered by cryogenic propellants for the Saturn space vehicle.

The actions follow approval by NASA of a Saturn development program recommended by the Saturn Vehicle Team composed of representatives of NASA, ARPA, ABMA, Department of Defense, Research and Engineering and the Air Force. NASA assumed technical direction over Saturn under a NASA-DOD agreement of 18 November 1959 pending formal transfer of ABMA to NASA.

The upper stages will be mounted on the Saturn first stage, a 1,500,000 pound thrust booster under development by ABMA since August 1958. The booster is powered by a cluster of eight Rocketdyne H-1 engines (See SATURN on Page 2)

President's Message To Congress Outlines Reason for Transfer

The following is the text of the message accompanying the Transfer Plan sent to the Congress at noon Thursday, Jan. 14 by the President:

"To the Congress of the United States:

"Pursuant to Section 302 of the National Aeronautics and Space Act of 1958 I transmit herewith a Transfer Plan making certain transfers from the Department of Defense to the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

"This message, together with the Transfer Plan, constitutes the Report to the Congress relative to the transfer as required by the provisions of Section 302 under the National Aeronautics and Space Act of 1958 by which NASA has primary responsibility for the nation's program of space exploration. The Department of Defense has the responsibility for the national defense program including the development and operation of space vehicles for defense purposes.

"I have recently reviewed the needs and requirements of the two agencies in their respective fields. It is clear that NASA, in order to carry on a vigorous and effective program for the exploration of space, both manned and unmanned, requires boosters and space vehicles exceeding greatly the thrust of any booster now available. Furthermore, there is at present no clear Department of Defense requirements for such very large boosters.

"For this reason I assigned sole responsibility for development of space vehicle boosters of very high thrust to NASA last November. In carrying out this responsibility NASA will be fully responsive to specific requirements of the Department of Defense for the development of very large boosters for future military missions. At the same time the Department of Defense and NASA will continue with a coordinated program for the development of boosters based on the current intercontinental ballistic missile (ICBM) and the intermediate range ballistic missile (ICBM) and growth versions of those missiles.

"On the basis of this assign-


Open House Will Mark Retirement And Anniversary

ment of responsibilities, the NASA has assumed technical direction of the Saturn booster program which has been conducted under the direction of the Department of Defense. This booster promises to enhance greatly the nation's ability to explore space. It is now being developed by ABMA and will soon constitute the major workload of the Development Operations Division of that Agency.

"The foregoing reflects the pertinent arrangements as they now exist. I have concluded that it is in the best interests of the Nation to take another step at this time to provide NASA with an organization capable of and equipped for developing and operating large space vehicle boosters and conducting related research. This can be done by transferring to NASA the Development Operations Division of the ABMA and certain supporting personnel. At the same time it is recognized that the Army must continue to discharge its responsibilities for the development of missile systems. The transfer plan forwarded herewith is designed to accomplish these purposes.

"In carrying out the Transfer Plan every effort will be made to prevent the dislocation or disruption of on-going missile or space vehicle projects. The development of military weapons systems and related programs, currently being worked on by the Development Operations Division, will be continued by the Army utilizing the skills of transferred personnel as requested by the Army on a reimbursable basis.

"The transfer of personnel, property and funds under the Plan will be accomplished in such manner as to serve the objectives which I have outlined.

"I urge the Congress to allow the Transfer Plan transmitted herewith to take effect."

TEXT OF PLAN TO TRANSFER ABMA SPACE PROGRAM TO NASA

Transmitted by the President and delivered to the Congress Jan. 14 1960 pursuant to the provisions of Section 302 of the National Aeronautics and Space Act of 1958, making certain transfers from the Department of Defense to the National Aeronautics and Space Administration

Section I

Those functions (including powers, duties, activities and parts of functions) of the Department of Defense, or any officer or organizational entity thereof, relating to the development of space vehicle systems (excluding ballistic missiles) and research connected therewith, which are being performed by the Army Ballistic Missile Agency of the Department of the Army, or by any officer or

organization entity of the said Agency, are transferred to the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

Section II

(A) The following shall be transferred to NASA, pursuant to authority conferred by the provisions of Section 302 (a) of the National Aeronautics and Space Act of 1958 and other applicable authority, at such time or times as may be appropriate:

(1) So much of the unexpended balances of appropriations, allocations and other funds of the Department of Defense, available or to be made available, as the Director of the Bureau of the Budget shall determine to relate

to the functions transferred by provisions of Section I of the Transfer Plan and to be needed by the NASA in connection with those functions.

(2) To the extent needed by NASA in connection with the aforesaid, transferred functions (i) civilian personnel employed in the Development Operations Divisions of the ABMA, and other civilian personnel employed in the Department of the Army for administrative and technical support of the Development Operations Division, together with the respective positions and (ii) records and property of the Department of Defense (including those of any organizational entity of the Department of Defense) relating to the said transferred functions. The Secretary of Defense and the Administrator of NASA, jointly, or, to any extent that they shall fail to agree, the Director of the Bureau of Budget shall

(A) Determine the number of employees to be so transferred and the identity of the particular employees who are to be transferred,

(B) Designate the specific records and property to be transferred, and

(C) Fix the date or dates of these transfers

(b) Without limiting the foregoing provisions of this plan, the functions transferred to NASA by the provisions of Section I of this Transfer Plan shall include so much of the functions of the Department of Defense, or of any officer or organizational entity thereof, as related to the appointment and pay of civilian personnel employed in the Development Operations Division of ABMA, including authority to continue certain transferred positions in Grades 16, 17, and 18 of the General Schedule of the Classification Act of 1949, as amended, pursuant to the provisions of Section I of Public Law 86-377, and authority to continue certain transferred positions requiring the services of specially qualified scientists or professional personnel pursuant to provisions of Section II of Public Law 86-377.

(c) Such further measures and dispositions as the Director of the Bureau of the Budget shall deem to be necessary in order to effectuate transfers under the foregoing provisions of this Section shall be carried out in such manner as he

shall direct and by such agencies as he shall designate.

Section III

The provisions of this Transfer Plan shall become effective upon the expiration of the first period of 60 calendar days of regular session of the Congress following the date stated in the heading hereof unless the Congress has during

that period adopted a concurrent resolution stating that Congress does not favor this Transfer Plan. Thereafter, as promptly as may be, this Transfer Plan shall be published in the Federal Register.

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

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

SAFETY ENGINEER ENDORSES JANUARY "NO FALLS" CAMPAIGN

ARGMA SAFETY ENGINEER
January 1960 has been designated by the Arsenal Safety Director as "No Falls Month."

Year after year, on the job and off, falls continue to pile up a larger number of fatalities and disabling injuries. We do not usually think of falling as being dangerous, but falls rank as a major cause of disabling injuries, second only to automobile accidents. We are often conscious of hazards connected with our jobs but we fail to recognize the one danger that is always present. This danger is injury from falls.

Falls plague even non-hazardous occupations and, in many hazardous operations, men have piled up an immense amount of safe man hours only to have that record broken by a fall due to some trivial and preventable cause.

While the cause of falls, individually, are often simple and easily correctable, there are a lot

of them caused by negligence and hurry. Many times the bystander will get a good laugh out of someone else's apparent awkwardness. Most persons, when they go down, do so with a resounding thud, and then the unfortunate individual fails to come up off the floor, this laughter suddenly changes to concern.

When it comes to avoiding falls, man's habit of walking on two feet places him at a disadvantage as compared with quadrupeds. Man's high center of gravity creates an unstable figure which requires a good sense of balance in keeping upright under certain conditions.

Very few individuals, like circus performers, have learned to fall relaxed. Most people become rigid when they feel they are falling and, consequently, hit the ground as a tense rigid figure. The best way to make a place safe to work in is to make sure that housekeeping is good, with a place for everything and every-

thing in its place. This orderliness helps to form safe habits which are the foundation of a good safety record.

Realizing that you can fall any place and at any time, we must be on the lookout for the little things that cause slips and falls. Our feet seem to get us into the most trouble. How often have you tripped on a slightly uneven spot in an ordinary sidewalk and looked around to see a variance of about 1/4" in the surface? Keeping floors in good repair and clear of spillage or material is the first step in preventing falls.

If our floors are in first-class condition and all material is put away, we must next consider another major cause of falls—our footwear. Shoes in poor repair or shoes not made to be worn for work, can cause fatigue and this becomes an accident maker. Women are constantly finding themselves off balance because of the design of their shoes.

Maintaining a reasonably fall-proof plant does involve considerable care and attention. It, also, requires constant supervision and unrelenting attention to the smallest details of housekeeping. People, being constituted as they are, it takes only a slight slip in the maintenance program to set the stage for a physical slip of some unsuspecting individual.

During January each employe should make a resolution to start the new year by developing a safety conscious attitude toward preventing falls by eliminating the cause within their respective areas. It is necessary that we be especially careful during the winter months when there will be plenty of rain, ice, and perhaps snow on the ground. If we are all safety minded and on the alert to report unsafe conditions, we will be able to eliminate most slips and falls. During January make up your mind not to fall for an accident.

Enlisted Men May Enter Army Military Academy

Enlisted personnel between the ages of 17 and 22 who are physically sound and graduates of a secondary school or have successfully completed a high school GED test, may qualify for an appointment to the United States Military Academy.

Each year a special quota of 90 cadetships is made available to members of the Army and Air Force. These are filled from among those enlisted men of the Army and Air Force who submit application and are found to meet the high standards set for all cadets at the Academy.

The United States Military Academy offers a four year course of undergraduate study leading to a commission as second lieutenant in the Regular Army and

a bachelor of science degree.

Each cadet admitted to the military academy receives, in effect, a scholarship covering all expenses of a four year college education. In addition, as a member of the Regular Army, he receives \$111.15 each month to cover cost of uniforms, textbooks and incidentals.







GUARD TO CELEBRATE

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




NEWBY IS WEEK'S SAFE SUPERVISOR


