



Storm Doesn't Disrupt Activities At Arsenal; Property Damage Light

Gen. Callahan Is The Guest Speaker At OGMS Graduation

Maj. Gen. Daniel F. Callahan, commanding general of the Mobile Air Materiel Area of the U. S. Air Force was the principal speaker Tuesday as 71 officers and airmen of the Italian Air Force received diplomas from the Army Ordnance Guided Missile School.

The Italians completed courses on the maintenance and use of the Jupiter intermediate range ballistic missile developed by the Army at Redstone Arsenal and assigned to the Air Force.

Gen. Callahan, who has executive responsibility for the interservice and Allied training program being conducted here, spoke at the graduation exercises in the Redstone Post Theater at 10 a.m. He was introduced by Col. Charles W. Eifler, Missile School com-

MPs, Transportation, Signal, Engineers Operate Smoothly

Operating under emergency conditions from midnight Friday until 8 a.m. Monday Redstone Arsenal personnel performed a superb job to make possible the continuance of normal work, according to Brig. Gen. J. A. Barclay, Deputy Commanding General, U.S. Army Ordnance Missile Command.

Gen. Barclay praised the efficiency with which Col. Owen T. McCloskey, Arsenal Commander, and his staff organized their forces to battle a six-inch snowfall, sub-freezing cold and strong winds.

Post Engineer crews, under the supervision of Col. Wyatt G. Trainer, began operations at midnight Friday and never let up, Gen. Barclay said. Working on 12-hour shifts, supported by field maintenance and transportation personnel, the crews operated five road graders throughout the night, all day Saturday, Saturday night and Sunday. The only snow plow on the Arsenal was kept in service 48 hours.

Four trucks were pressed into service early Sunday afternoon to spread salt on the cleared roads in order to prevent freezing.

About 50 miles of main traffic arteries were kept open.

In addition, parking areas at the headquarters on the Missile Command, the Army Ballistic Missile Agency, the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency and other principal administrative buildings were cleared out to accommodate thousands of employe automobiles as work resumed this morning.

Lt. Col. Dean H. Jones, Redstone Arsenal Provost Marshal, reported that the around-the-clock maintenance of Arsenal roads made it possible for the Military Police to work normal shifts throughout the weekend, (See STORM, Page 2)

REDSTONE DONORS CONTRIBUTE 747 PINTS TO THE BLOODMOBILE

The Red Cross Bloodmobile received 747 pints of blood from donors at Redstone Arsenal during the bi-weekly visit last Wednesday.

The various Bloodmobile stations were manned by approximately 60 volunteers from Redstone Arsenal.

Mrs. J. N. Jean is Gray Lady chairman for the Arsenal Blood program for which Maj. Jesse A. Garner is the Arsenal coordinator. Maj. Garner is Redstone Arsenal Troop Commander.

Mrs. Henry Arrott is chairman of the Red Cross volunteers at the Arsenal. The volunteers include Gray Ladies and Red Cross Aides.

Mrs. F. W. Conner is chairman of the volunteer nurses, wives of military personnel who are registered nurses and who volunteer their services as such for everything except the "puncture" of the donors. "Puncture" nurses are all members of the regular staff of the Bloodmobile.

According to Sam Howell of the Birmingham Blood Center, the contribution from Redstone Arsenal yesterday will supply the area for approximately two days. More than 115 hospitals in the region, extending from Georgia to the Mississippi Delta, are supplied by the Birmingham Center. The major portion of blood from military installations is turned over to Veterans Administration

hospitals which have no source from which to draw and would otherwise buy blood commercially. These hospitals alone use more than 15,000 pints of blood a year.

Working closely with both the volunteers and the Bloodmobile staff at the Arsenal are Clifford T. Harmon, recently appointed Field Director for the American Red Cross at the Arsenal, and Miss Katherine Farmer of the Arsenal's Red Cross Field Office.



Japanese Officials Visit, Tour AOMC

The Army Ordnance Missile Command was host to a delegation of Japanese defense officials at Redstone Arsenal last week.

The group included a newly-appointed general who, according to a U.S. escort officer, was the first Japanese officer ever to receive promotion on American soil. Maj. Gen. Shigeyoshi Shimanuki was promoted from colonel to his two-star rank last week during a tour of Ft. Monmouth, N. J. (Japan has no rank comparable to the U. S. one-star, or brigadier general.) Gen. Shimanuki is Secretary, Japanese General Staff.



without adding additional personnel or vehicles.

Post Signal Officer Maj. Thomas Koeneman said that telephone communications to and from the Arsenal continued without incident, with the exception of Saturday morning when an "immediate and growing volume of telephone traffic" tied incoming lines up for a short time. One additional telephone operator was placed on duty with each shift from Friday night until today.

The only equipment failure in communications occurred Satur-

day, when a damaged line amplifier cut off television reception on the Arsenal. This, however, was repaired immediately and television was restored the same day.

The Arsenal's airport was kept open for emergency flights. Two flights originated Saturday afternoon.

Navy Researchers Devise Dosimeter

Washington (AFPS) — A new device which may replace the standard radiation-detection device, the film badge, has been developed by the Navy.

The new dosimeter, which uses a special calcium flouride powder rather than the conventional photographic film, is twenty times more sensitive to radiation dosages.

A special envelope containing the powder—which is imbedded in a glass plate—needs only to be heated electrically to reveal the hazardous radiation. The powder emits the stored energy in the form of visible light. The larger the exposure, the brighter the glow, the Navy explains.

Also, the new device is reusable, less expensive and easier to read than the old detection device. It can be worn or carried like the film badge.




Zeta Tau Alphas Plan Dinner Party Last Week of April

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

In his message Mr. Eisenhower referred to America's need for "an ever-increasing number of skilled working men and women" to meet the competition of the 1960's. "These are the Nation's pride and strength," he pointed out. "And their safety at work is a national concern."

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


James Cressy received a special award of Star Scout, as well as merit badges for life saving, first aid and stamp collecting at the ceremony.

Army Asigns MOS To EM Psychologists

Washington (AFPS) — The Army has added a military occupational specialty in grades E-3 and E-4 for Personnel Psychology specialists.

Designated as MOS 076, it is designed to meet the need for qualified enlisted psychologists and will be divided into .1 and .2 skill levels.

Skill level 076.1 covers those positions and individuals needed for psychological test development and administration or in related jobs requiring graduate psychologists. Individuals so classified must hold a bachelor's degree.

Those assigned to MOS 076.2 duty must have a master's degree or equivalent. Positions and personnel in this classification are required in experimental psychological research concerning leadership, learning, training methods, environmental influence on performance and similar problems requiring post-graduate training.

Normally only those positions and personnel qualified for MOS 018.3, Social Science Assistant, will be classified into the new skill category, Army personnel

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

playing host to men and women of the Armed Forces. They, too, were destined to make history but now they were busy in front of and behind the cameras readying a program of training film that was to make the United States soldier the best trained and informed warrior in the world.



Enlisted personnel of Det. A, Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency, and Det. B, Army Ballistic Missile Agency, viewed the newest in light weapons recently during the regular training program for Troop Command.

Both the M-14, the new rapid fire rifle, and the M-60, the new light machine gun were displayed.

C. E. Howell, chief engineer, Industrial Division, ARGMA, conducted the conference. Howell has been identified with research and development programs for many types of armament.



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Will Become Commonplace —

Sixties Are Sure To Be Decade of Space Talk

"FUTURE astronauts won't worry too much about ablation of their bird, but auntie could be a problem if something went wrong with the brain."

Does that sound like a passage from a Jules Verne classic?

It could be, but it's not. This is simply one sentence liberally sprinkled with a few new space age words that will become commonplace during the 1960s.

With space science moving as fast as it is, and talk of 18,000 m.p.h. hypersonic globe-girdling bombers, space stations and million-pound thrust engines, the average person will soon be intellectually lost if he fails to keep up with the new space jargon.

Here are a few new words common in this space age, to keep the "language barrier" away from your door:

Asteroids — Numerous small planets revolving around the sun, largely between Mars and Jupiter.

Astrionics — The science of adopting electronics to space flight.

Alcohol — Not the 90 proof stuff but either ethyl or methyl alcohol which is used with liquid oxygen as a propellant.

Aeropause — A portion of the upper region of the atmosphere which does not give any aerodynamic support of either manned or unmanned flight.

Boattail — The cylindrical, tapering tail section of any missile. It helps reduce over-all aerodynamic drag of airframe.

Biosatellite — A satellite that carries an animal or plant life.

Circumlunar — Trips or missions in which a space ship or missile will circle the moon and return to earth.

Capsule — A fancy term for cockpit in high speed aircraft and space ships. It is the enclosure for the pilots and crew.

Cislunar — Space between the earth and the orbit of the moon.

Dog House — The mound-like housing outside of a rocket which houses instruments.

Dry Weight — The weight of a

rocket or missile without its fuel.

Emissivity — The ability of a surface to effect thermal radiation.

Exosphere — The outermost fringe of the atmosphere.

Exotic Fuel — A fuel which uses chemicals having a very high energy rating such as liquid hydrogen.

Free Fall — Space term referring to a condition in space in which things act as though they were free from the influence of gravity.

Gantry — Name of a special crane or scaffold used in missile and vehicle launchings.

Gimballed Nozzle — A rocket nozzle mounted on a movable frame, or gimbal. It corrects for pitching and yawing rotation movements to steer a missile.

Grain — Sounds familiar but means something else. It's the body (i.e., mass) of a solid propellant used in a rocket. It is tailored or shaped to the rocket's requirements to burn smoothly.

Hydrazene — One of the exotic fuels.

Kinematics — A study of motions.

Lox — Nothing nutritional. It means liquid oxygen.

Parsec — A unit of measure for interstellar space. It is the equivalent of 3.26 light years.

Pick-Up — Not what you think, sir! It's a sensing unit which "picks up" and measures such variables as temperature, pressure and velocity during flight.

Spatial Body — A space body, what else?

Zip Fuel — A term partially borrowed from teen-age jargon (i.e., zip guns), but here refers to special high energy jet engine fuel.

But what about "ablation" "bird," "auntie," and "brain"? Used in the sentence above they mean:

"Future space men won't worry about the nose cones on their space ships melting when they re-enter the earth's atmosphere, but an anti-missile missile might shoot them down if their navigational system went haywire."



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

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The Judge Advocate Advises



PROPERTY IS FAMILY AFFAIR

Property is a family affair, and should be so regarded by every married couple in their consideration of problems relating to their property and in their planning for the future.

The word "property" is derived from the Latin word meaning "belonging to one; one's own." But neither party to a marriage can afford to regard the family property as an exclusively individual possession or right, except in the sense that the parties are a unit by reason of their marriage. Each must consider the other in the sale, use or acquisition of property, and intelligent planning designed to give effect to their joint wishes in the most efficient manner provided by law will often spare them regret and added expense later in life.

A number of jurisdictions in this country and abroad have community property systems which provide for a marital partnership of property. In such a system, property acquired during marriage (except that acquired through individual gift or inheritance) is deemed community in nature and thus owned equally by each spouse. Property which either spouse brings into the marriage or acquires by individual gift or inheritance remains that spouse's separate property.

In the United States there are two opposing rules as to the nature of income derived from the separate property: Under the "Louisiana rule" such increment falls into the community; under the "California rule," income from the separate property of either spouse remains separate in nature. Although a cause of action for personal injury to a husband is generally regarded as community in nature, in several jurisdictions a wife's cause of action for injury to her person is her separate property.

Termination

The community in property is ordinarily terminated by death of either spouse, divorce, or in some cases legal separation evidenced by a court decree. A few jurisdictions provide for partition

of the community property in prescribed instances such as mismanagement by the husband who, as "head and master" of the community, is the manager of all community property.

In some instances, a spouse may forfeit all right to share in community earnings by abandonment or certain misconduct. Upon the death of either partner in the community, the survivor is immediately regarded as owner of one-half of all community property while the other half is subject to the testamentary disposition or will of the deceased partner.

United States jurisdictions which have community property systems in effect now are: Arizona, California, Idaho, Puerto Rico, Washington, Louisiana, Nevada, New Mexico and Texas. Com-

munity property laws of Michigan, Nebraska, Oklahoma, Oregon, Pennsylvania and Hawaii have either been repealed or declared unconstitutional.

Although the Revenue Act of 1948, through its income-splitting and marital deduction provisions, substantially equalized the tax burdens of couples in community and non-community property states, several desirable tax features still exist for the former. For example, a corporate dividend which is community income is considered as having been received half by each spouse, thereby enabling each to qualify for a \$50.00 dividend exclusion even where the stock is registered in the name of only one spouse.

Also, where retirement income is community in nature, each spouse may claim a full retirement income credit because each is legally entitled to one-half the retirement income. In the latter respect, however, it must be noted that earned income by either spouse would serve to diminish the retirement credits of both.

Tax Benefits

Perhaps the greatest tax bene-

fit, based on domicile in a community property state, accrues to the serviceman who marries an alien while overseas. The husband's domicile in a community property state fixes his wife's there also. But since she is a non-resident alien, her share of the community income, even though derived from her husband's performance of services for the United States in a foreign country, is not subject to Federal taxation because it was not income earned within the United States.

The matter of the distribution of estates of intestate decedents is and always has been a matter for state regulation and law. The inheritance laws of the various states differ in many respects, but most follow, in a general way, the scheme of the old English Statute of Distribution. The principles peculiar to the English Canons of Descent have for the most part disappeared from our law. Most United States jurisdictions now provide for succession to both real property and personal property by the same relatives.

It must be emphasized that in community property jurisdictions, separate and community

property do not pass alike and great care must be exercised by the parties concerned to insure that their wishes will be carried out to the last detail. A properly prepared will can save the estate many times what is otherwise might cost in court costs and legal expenses.

Married couples with any property - and particularly if there are children involved - should consult an attorney to check up on their estate situation, and it should be reviewed from time to time.

Proper Use

With ownership of property goes the responsibility for its proper use and management - and the essence of the ownership of anything is that aid which organized society will, through the courts as its agents, give the individual, to the exclusion of all others, to take or keep possession of it. Property belongs to a person as long as he has the right thereto and the power by law to enforce and protect that right, but ownership is not a privilege conferred by government but a right which the government is organized to protect.



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
