HAYES AIRCRAFT GETS CONTRACT FOR SATURN WORK

The Army Friday awarded a \$300,324 contract to the Hayes Aircraft Co. of Birmingham for certain work on ground support equipment for the Saturn heavy space vehicle.

The contract was signed at the Birmingham Ordnance District. The District will administer the contract for the Army Ballistic Missile Agency.

ABMA is developing the giant Saturn for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

The contract calls for the design, development and documentation of mechanical, electrical and electronic components for the Saturn ground support equipment. It also provides for the shop services necessary to fabricate, assemble and test this equipment, which includes such items as checkout fixtures and generator panels.

All of the work is to be performed at the Hayes plant in Birmingham.

The Saturn, the nation's largest space vehicle, will be capable of orbiting multi-ton payloads high above the earth, and placing scientific instruments on the surface of the moon in a soft landing.


CONTRACT IS LET FOR THREE BOQS

Col. R. W. Love, U. S. Army District Engineer, announced today from his office at Mobile, that he has awarded a contract in the amount of \$490,169.65 to the Pearce and Gresham Company of Decatur for the construction of three additional modern BOQ buildings at Redstone Arsenal.

The three two-story buildings will contain a total of 14 single apartments and 28 double apartments, providing quarters for 14 field grade officers and 56 company grade officers.

They will be of wood frame construction with brick veneer facing on the first stories and vertical board and batten siding on the second stories, to correspond to the three BOQ's already under construction in the same area.

Pearce and Gresham is scheduled to begin construction within two weeks and to have the buildings ready for use in a year's time.



A CLOSE-UP view of the Saturn blockhouse, currently under construction at Cape Canaveral, Fla., shows a maze of electrical cables winding cut from under the 38-foot-high, 156-foot-diameter structure. The cables will link the instrument control panels in the blockhouse to the launching pad. The building's sand-packed, steel-reinforced cement wall, which tapers from a thickness of six feet at its base to five feet at its apex, is designed to withstand 3,200 pounds per square inch of blast pressure. Construction of the blockhouse, with its 10,600 square feet of working area divided between two floors, is scheduled for completion by May 1. The blockhouse, one of several impressive structures within the 65-acre Saturn Complex, was designed by Maurice H. Connel and Associates, Inc., of Miami, Fla., and is being constructed by Diversified Builders of Cocoa, Fla., under the supervision of the Jacksonville, Fla., Corps of Engineers. The 1,500,000-pound thrust Saturn booster is being developed by the Army Ballistic Missile Agency, an element of the Army Ordnance Missile Command, for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

MAJ. GEN. H. N. TOFTOY GEN. TOFTOY WILL RETIRE FEB. 29

Ceremonies Will Be Held at Aberdeen

Maj. Gen. H. N. Toftoy, former Deputy Commander of the Army Ordnance Missile Command, has announced he will retire next Monday, Feb. 29.

The General is now commanding Aberdeen Proving Ground, Md., and the formal announcement of the retirement came last week from Secretary of the Army Wilber M. Brucker. Gen. Toftoy is retiring for medical reasons.

Gen. Toftoy, a 1926 graduate of the U.S. Military Academy, was dubbed "Mr. Missile" for his activities which promoted Army Ordnance interest in research and development of rockets and guided missiles.

The General, at the close of World War II, persuaded Dr. Wernher von Braun and his team of missile experts from the German rocket center at Peenemuende to pool their knowledge and efforts under the aegis of the U. S. Army Ordnance Corps. "Operation Paperclip" was organized and executed. As a result, more than 120 members of the Peenemuende team moved to Ft. Bliss, Texas under contract to Ordnance. (See GEN. Space Offered Little Heat Problem Until Men Decided to Travel in It

The purpose was to discover exactly what factors influence the temperature of an object in space, and to attempt to regulate these factors in order to maintain the heat at an acceptable level for sensitive instruments, and ultimately animal and human life.

That was one of the major problems confronting space scientists barely more than two years ago when the first artificial earth satellite was launched.

Scientists of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency have spent many months of study and step-by-step experimentation and have made tremendous progress toward the eventual goal of exact temperature prediction and control in a space vehicle.

It is not an easy task. There are more than 20 factors to be considered in attempting to manipulate the temperature within a space payload — 20 variables to tie down to a reasonable degree of exactness, or run the risk of payload failure.

In the past two years, the Agency, with the cooperation of the NASA Jet Propulsion Laboratory, has launched six earth satellites

and deep space probes, each of which has contributed to a "space-temperature history" which is being gradually built up. With each launching the payloads grow successively more sophisticated, and more challenging from the point of view of heat control. And with each launching one or two or more theories move from the realm of speculation to occupy positions in the enlarging reservoir of fact.

The Missile Agency, a major part of which has been proposed for transfer to the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, concentrates its temperature research work under the direction of Gerhard Heller, deputy director of the Research Projects Laboratory. Here are the principal types of variables Heller and his associates must consider in accomplishing the thermal design of an earth satellite.

1. Satellite environment, which includes electromagnetic radiation, the characteristics of the orbit, and the position of the payload with respect to the sun. The thermal equilibrium depends on direct solar radiation, solar radi-

OGMS Hawk Branch Trains 500 Key Men During First Year

The Hawk branch of the Army Ordnance Guided Missile School is celebrating its first birthday with a record of almost 500 key personnel of Great Britain, Canada and the U.S. Army, Navy and Marine Corps trained on the unusual new weapon which can knock down attacking aircraft almost at treetop level.

Lt. Col. Ward T. Gilbert, chief of the Missile School's air defense division, is hosting a series of tours for his staff and their families through the \$2,000,000 academic building and laboratory completed last year to house the training program for the Army's newest operational missile. The Hawk is the seventh missile to be included in the curriculum.

The Hawk is a slender supersonic weapon using a solid propellant and can be transported by

The Army's newest and most advanced free flight rocket system, the Littlejohn, has been released for industrial production by the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency, a segment of the Army Ordnance Missile Command.

Emerson Electric Manufacturing Company, St. Louis Mo., has been awarded the \$234,864 contract for the industrial production of the rocket's airframe components.

The Littlejohn system was developed by ARGMA with the assistance of industry and other Army Ordnance Corps installations.

Consolidated Western Steel and the Emerson Company assisted in the rocket's development. Rock Island Arsenal has been responsible for design and fabrication of the launcher and ancillary equipment. Warheads were developed by the General Electric Company, Minneapolis Honeywell Company, and the Diamond Ordnance Fuze Laboratory under the supervision of Picatinny Arsenal, an element of the Ordnance Special Weapons - Ammunition Command.

ce. Most of them arrived in 1948.

In 1950 the Ordnance rocket and guided missile program was centered at Redstone Arsenal, again under Gen. Toftoy's guidance. At the time he was chief of the Rocket Branch, Research and Development Division, in the Chief of Ordnance's office.

It was under the direction of Gen. Toftoy that the Nike and Corporal guided missile systems were developed and the record 250-mile high rocket flight was successfully executed at White Sands Missile Range in 1949. He was also responsible for the initial development of the Redstone missile and a number of post-war rocket weapons including the super bazooka and the Honest John.

Gen. Toftoy was assigned at Redstone Arsenal in 1952. While assigned as director of the Ordnance Missile Laboratories, he was promoted to brigadier general. He received his promotion to major general in 1956.

In 1954, he took over command of Redstone Arsenal and remained in that position until the Army Ordnance Missile Command was formed on Mar. 31, 1958. He became the deputy Commanding general.

While stationed here, Gen. and Mrs. Toftoy took an active part in community life as well as in the activities on post.

A reception is planned for Gen. Toftoy at Aberdeen, Md., on Feb. 27. His retirement is effective Feb. 29.

Gen. and Mrs. Toftoy are scheduled to depart Aberdeen Proving Ground the morning of March 1. While their immediate destination is not known, it has been learned that they will visit Huntsville in the near future, and that they will make their home in St. Petersburg, Fla.

Gen. Toftoy is a graduate of the Command and General Staff College, the Coast Artillery School, and the Army-Navy-Staff College. He taught five years at West Point, from 1930-1935.

Among his decorations he has the Distinguished Service Medal, highest Army peacetime award, the Legion of Merit, the Bronze

Star, and the French Croix de Guerre with Palm. He was awarded an honorary Doctor of Laws degree by Athens College.



 ation reflected from the earth, infrared radiation from the earth's surface and the earth's atmosphere, and, finally, the radiation from the skin of the satellite into space. The characteristics of the orbit and their time-dependent changes determine the percentage of time the satellite is to be in the sunlight.

2. Satellite configuration, which includes the size and shape of the payload, the thermal design concepts such as the insulation of the instrument package from the skin, and the flow and distribution of heat between parts of the satellite. The angle at which the sun's rays strike the satellite has a marked influence upon internal heat.

3. Finally, material properties, which includes surface treatments, surface coatings, characteristics of insulation, materials for critical components, and the rate at which the "skin" materials allow heat to be absorbed and given out. For instance, a light-colored titanium dioxide paint was used on the interior of Explorer VII's fiberglass shells to maximize the infrared radiation between shells. The surface temperature was thus reduced from a possible maximum of 127 degrees to 69 degrees centigrade.

On earlier Explorers, external surfaces were partially covered with aluminum oxide to obtain the proper thermal balance. Explorer IV's surface was of sand blasted stainless steel to fulfill the specific thermal requirements for this satellite which differed from those of previous Explorers. The instrument column of Explorer VII was covered with gold foil, which proved a very effective heat control method.

Already, a requirement can be foreseen to control the temperature within an instrumented payload to within one degree over a relatively short period; that is, the temperature would have to remain essentially stable over a period of several hours, but a gradual departure of several degrees would be acceptable when this change is spread over a period of days or weeks.

It is also expected, Heller said, that biological payloads of the more distant future — various plant and animal organisms — will require a constant temperature over long periods of times, permitting no deviation regardless of changing conditions exter-

nally. It appears that heat control in deep space, several hundred thousand miles away, will present few or no space heat problems which are not present within the near vicinity of the earth where our present satellites orbit.

The heat control of the early cylinder-shape Army satellites was satisfactory. Explorer I was designed for a mean temperature instrument of 20 degrees. Measured temperatures were between 0 degrees and 40 degrees C. Temperature sensors were located at four places, two internal and two external.

Explorer III was perhaps less successful from the heat viewpoint. It did, however, successfully withstand several days of consecutive 100 per cent sunlight without exceeding the maximum design limit, a fact significant to the designers. The temperature then dipped to below zero, causing the batteries in the satellite to "freeze out." The transmitters went off for lack of power until after the satellite entered a "warm cycle" and the batteries thawed.

The design of Explorer IV called for a higher mean temperature of 40 degrees C. This requirement was successfully met. Likewise, the Pioneer III and IV space probes maintained the proper temperature level.

Explorer VII, which is now in orbit and which is the only satellite at present whose instruments are operating, presented a greater challenge to the scientists.

Some ten different materials occur on the surface of the satellite, nonetheless, actual measured temperatures agree almost perfectly with those predicted.

There are fourteen temperature sensors on the exterior and interior of the satellite. The design specifications required that the temperature in the instrumentation column be maintained between zero and 60 degrees C. During the first four months of operation, Heller reports the measured temperatures in the column ranged from 16 to 41 degrees, depending upon the ratio of the time in sunlight to the time in the shadow of the earth. The high measurement of 41 degrees occurred in a period of seven days when the payload was in 100 per cent sunlight. From November 1 to December 15, following an October 13 launching, transmitter temperature remained at 18 degrees C with variations of no more than two degrees.

Skin temperature measurements, which vary more widely with satellite and earth position relative to the sun, have ranged between -12.4 and plus 53 degrees, however, these values do not constitute the extremes as expected from theoretical considerations.

Results obtained from telemetered records of present satellites are valuable for the solution of thermal design problems of larger and more complex satellites.





New trends in boating, as displayed at the 50th annual National Motor Boat Show in New York City, show concern for many of the sportsman's problems.

In many cases costs have come down, better navigational and safety devices are now available, and the problem of storage has been eased by some manufacturers.

Some of the highlights of the show include:

A collapsible sailing catamaran. Aided by special neoprene fittings, the 16-foot sailing craft folds into a container 16 feet by 7 feet by 2 feet.

An inboard motor craft that

uses a water jet propulsion unit for thrust.

Another inboard with a special hull (monocaque), inspired by airplane wing design, made especially for water skiing.

A 22-foot fiberglass sloop that sleeps two.

A 12-foot sailing catamaran

that can be converted to an ice-boat or an outboard motor boat, in less than five minutes (according to the manufacturer.)

A kit for building a fiberglass outboard runabout (15-feet) that uses the "sock" principle. Sellers claim the boat can be built in 20 hours work over a four-day period.

Two motor manufacturers are firsts with automatic chokes as optical equipment for their outboards.

DEER GET AIRBORNE HAY

VICENZA, Italy (ANS) — Some 3000 snow-obund chamois and roe deer got a big hay-lift from a helicopter of the mobile U.S. Army's 110th Aviation Company which made a 50-bale drop to animals marooned high in the Dolomite Mountains.







NASA Interviews Cover Management, Technicians

Interviewing of Army Ordnance Missile Command personnel who may fill management and technical support positions with the Huntsville facility of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration is now in progress at Redstone Arsenal.

By agreement with the Army,

NASA will recruit from the Army support organization, principally from ABMA and Redstone Arsenal, approximately 815 employees exclusive of the staff remaining with the Development Operations Division which will transfer intact on July 1, 1960. Transfer of the Division headed by Dr. Werner von Braun to NASA has been proposed by the President for Congressional approval. The House of Representatives acted

favorably on the plan last week. The NASA recruiting plans call for filling an advance cadre of up to 100 NASA positions prior to the July 1 date on which the main transfer will take place. Advance appointments will be limited to some of the key people, supporting staff and clerical assistants necessary to set up NASA functions and be ready for business by mid-year.

NASA representatives have re-

cently been engaged in reviewing the folders of prospective personnel to fill the up to 100 jobs. The majority of interviewees will come from the organizations that will lose people to NASA as a result of the transfer of functions and responsibilities. Where candidates are not available other interested applicants will be considered.

Until NASA establishes its own Personnel Office, the ABMA Ci-

vilian Personnel Office is serving as coordinating organization in arranging interviews on the request of NASA or individual applicants.

Some NASA positions may be filled as early as March 1.
