DR. McCALL IS NEW ASSISTANT TO DR. VON BRAUN

Dr. Jerry C. McCall, 32, of Oxford, Miss., has been named assistant to Dr. Werner von Braun, director of the Development Operations Division, Army Ballistic Missile Agency.

Dr. McCall's duties will include carrying out special projects and conducting program studies for the director, and maintaining liaison with Dr. von Braun's laboratories, other government agencies and industry.

The organization which Dr. von Braun heads is proposed for transfer to the National Aeronautics and Space Administration July 1 under terms of a Presidential recommendation to Congress.

Dr. McCall joined the Missile Agency late last year as a member of the scientific staff in the Computation Laboratory. He assumed the new position effective March 1.

Dr. McCall holds BA and MA degrees in mathematics from the University of Mississippi, and BS and PhD degrees in mathematics from the University of Illinois. In the field of pure mathematics he specialized in theoretical aspects of the design of electrical systems.

Formerly he taught mathematics at both Illinois and Mississippi. At Illinois, his work included the application of digital compu-

Plan for Recreation Association Trip to Europe Is Complete

The Redstone Recreation Association announces that arrangements have been completed for the thirty day European vacation it is sponsoring this summer.

The vacation tour will depart New York on Saturday, June 11, direct to Frankfurt, Germany, and return on or about July 10 from Frankfurt with a stop in London, England.

A comprehensive tour of attractions in Germany, Austria, Italy, Switzerland, France, and England has been made available to members at a cost of approximately \$650.00, which includes air transportation between Europe and New York. This low cost European vacation is made possible only through the efforts of the Association in sponsoring group travel.

For those members of the Association planning their own itineraries, roundtrip air transportation will be offered for \$256.00, per person, from New York to Frankfurt and return. This price is less than one-half the current economy class fare. Travel to and from Europe will be via a Super-Starliner aircraft chartered from Lufthansa German Airlines.

The European vacation program has been planned so that only nineteen days annual leave will be required for the thirty day trip.

In addition to this European tour, vacation programs to Mexico and Nassau are now being planned. These tours will be for one week to ten day periods and several offerings will be made if response justifies them.

Special tours to cultural and sporting events are planned for the summer to provide a complete vacation program for members.

All civilian, military or contractor personnel at Redstone Arsenal are eligible for membership in the Redstone Recreation Association. Dues are a nominal \$3.00 per year.

VERSATILE ZEUS IS U. S. ANSWER TO ICBM ATTACK

Highlights of the Nike-Zeus anti-missile missile system, the newest defense weapon of the United States, were outlined at graduation exercises Friday at the U.S. Army Ordnance Guided Missile School for 41 students in Hawk, Nike-Hercules and Lacrosse systems.

In a non-technical address to members of the four graduating classes, Charles C. Goodrich, a representative of Douglas Aircraft Co., the major subcontractor of the Nike-Zeus, spoke of the progress and capabilities of the new missile, the only system of its kind advanced in development.

"The underlying concepts of any successful anti-missile system—and of Zeus in particular—must include the principals of flexibility and invulnerability," he said. According to the speaker, the new system will provide the U.S. with protection from the threat of the deadly ICBM. Self-defense against an enemy attack to its own installation by use of decoys is another need fulfilled by the Zeus.

Goodrich elaborated on the three basic, interlocking elements that comprise the system: the acquisition and tracking radar; a computer which processes the acquired data and issues launch and guidance commands to the missiles; and the missiles themselves, carrying the necessary warhead.

"Our research and development program, plus our experience with Ajax, Hercules, and Thor, tells us that high capabilities may be expected of the Zeus system," he explained.

Regarding the development of the main elements of the system, Goodrich sketched the progress in data-gathering radar, and in superior guidance techniques. He stated that present research has provided a missile of light weight structure which will withstand the temperatures associated with hypersonic speeds, as well as a solid engine which will allow velocity performance goals to be reached with economical size.

In his closing remarks, the speaker pointed out the strong deterrent force which the Nike-Zeus concept will provide the U. S. in her role as a protector of the Free World.


COL. LAMOURE IS NOW DEPUTY AT ARSENAL

He Became Major General March 1

Maj. Gen. H. F. Bigelow, Deputy Chief of Ordnance, is a guest at the Army Ordnance Missile Command.

Gen. Bigelow, who moved into the vacancy of the Deputy Chief of Ordnance created when Maj. Gen. August Schomburg was appointed Commanding General of the Army Ordnance Missile Command, received his promotion to major general on March 1.

Prior to his assignment in his present position, he was Chief of Ordnance-Manpower.

This is his first visit to the Command since he became Deputy Chief of Ordnance.

Gen. Bigelow is receiving briefings and tours of the facilities of the missile agencies. He is visiting both the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency and the Army Ballistic Missile Agency to discuss weapons programs and missions.

During his visit here, the general is staying at the Goddard House on post.

A 1932 graduate from the U.S. Military Academy, Gen. Bigelow was an Artillery officer until he was detailed to Ordnance in 1942.

Since then he has held such important posts as Chief Ordnance Officer of the Peninsular Bay Section and Allied Force Headquarters in Italy; Executive Officer to the Chief, Field Service Division, OCO; commander of Letterkenny Ordnance Depot; and Ordnance Officers in Headquarters, U.S. Armed Forces, Far East, and later G-4 in Japan.

Health, Federal Service Campaign Is in Second Week

The National Health Agencies and the Federal Service Joint Crusade opened a campaign at Redstone Arsenal on March 1.

President Dwight D. Eisenhower made the following announcement to all Federal employes and military personnel:

"Our support of this crusade is direct evidence to the peoples of the world of our personal interest in their hopes and welfare. As a free American, it is a privilege to participate in this crusade by the voluntary giving of our substance and our spirit."

There will be no direct solicitation. Each employe will be given two envelopes in which contributions can be made. It has been requested that each employe return both envelopes to his campaign representative sealed.

Man Offers One Per Cent of His Salary for Missiles

Every week for the past five weeks, Dr. Werner von Braun, Technical Director of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency at Redstone Arsenal, Ala., has received 96 cents in postage stamps to further the advancement of the United States defense and space exploration program.

Joseph E. Noonan, of Baldwin, N. Y., convinced that present appropriations are insufficient, wrote von Braun that he would send one per cent of his weekly salary each week "until the United States is once more a leader in the space and missile race."

Concerned over the nation's relative position in these fields, Noonan

In a letter in which he returned the stamps, Dr. von Braun explained that while he was "deeply impressed" with the sincere desire to support the nation's space effort, Federal procedure prohibited acceptance of such contributions. Dr. von Braun told Noonan he hoped his "unselfish interest" was shared by other Americans.

Reserves, Guards To Train With Active Army Units

Men from the 283rd Ordnance Detachment (Technical Intelligence) are one of the Army units joining with the National Guard and the Army Reserve in Exercise Big Slam-Puerto Pine, an Army-Air Force training exercise to be held in Puerto Rico March 14-23.

The 283rd Ord. Det. is stationed at Redstone Arsenal, and is the only troops unit from here taking

part in the exercise.

Their participation is in furtherance of the One Army concept being emphasized by the Department of the Army. This concept is aimed at unifying the National Guard and Army Reserve effort with the active Army to maintain combat readiness at peak efficiency.

The exercise will involve the movement of 21,000 Army troops and 11,000 tons of equipment from bases in the United States to Puerto Rico and return. It is being conducted by the U.S. Continental Army Cmd. and the Mi-

litary Air Transport Service.

Guardsmen from the 2d Bn, 222d Field Artillery, Utah National Guard will be joined by Pennsylvania reservists from the 3d Bn., 15th Artillery, 79th Infantry Div.

It will mark the first time Reserve component units have been involved in an exercise of this type. Their participation is designed to give them an idea of the scope and magnitude of large-scale exercises and at the same time, accomplish their two-week annual duty for training.

Units will move with individual and minimum organizational equipment. The units will move to and from Puerto Rico under the control of Lt. Gen. Robert F. Sink, XVIII Airborne Corps and Ft Bragg commander. While in Puerto Rico, units will accomplish their annual active duty training under the control and


supervision of Brig Gen. John H. McGee, Antilles Cmd. commander.

Guardsmen will depart from Hill Air Force Base, Ogden, Utah, near their home station of Cedar City. The reservists, from Reading Pa., will embark on MATS planes from McGuire AFB, N.J. Both groups are scheduled to depart about March 15 and will return about March 26.

Five MATS C-121 aircraft will

lift 300 soldiers and 2,000 pounds of equipment of the National Guard unit. A detachment from the 77th Special Forces Group now training in Utah, will arrange air transportability training for the Guardsmen.

Daughter, Elizabeth Hodgin Worley, works as a clerk general at the Aeroballistics Missile Lab.



The Judge Advocate Advises



FEDERAL INCOME TAX - EXCLUSIONS

Property, including money, which a taxpayer receives is not in every instance includable in his gross income for Federal income tax purposes. That property which is not included in gross income is called an exclusion. Some of these exclusions will be discussed here.

When a taxpayer, either military or civilian, is the recipient of an inheritance by will or intestacy or of a gift, the property which he receives is an exclusion, although other income such as rent, interest, and the like, derived therefrom would not be excluded, but would be income to the recipient for tax purposes.

Other exclusions are life insurance policy proceeds received because of the death of the insured, as well as death benefit payments with the characteristics of life insurance proceeds and payable by reason of death under contracts such as workmen's compensation insurance contracts. The life insurance and death benefit exclusions apply whether the payment is directly to the beneficiary or to the insured's estate or whether it is direct or in trust.

Although the general rule is that compensation for active military service is included as income just as is civilian pay, military personnel and their dependents have, in addition, the benefit of several other exclusions, some related to the gift and inheritance exclusions, but others specially provided for by statute.

Among the military exclusions are subsistence and uniform allowances granted to military personnel and the amounts they receive as allowances for quarters and subsistence furnished to them. Military personnel who are transferred on a permanent change of station also may exclude the allowances received by them for moving their immediate families, household goods, and personal effects.

The sick pay exclusion of up to \$100 per week of the taxable portion of the pay of Army members who are hospitalized or absent from work for prescribed periods of time has been discussed in another "The Staff Judge Advocate Advises" column (Jan. 13, 1960).


Upon separation from active service, mustering out payments to military personnel are exclusions, but payments of accrued leave pay are not exclusions. Dividends on G.I. insurance are not taxed. Also, bonus payments awarded war veterans by their states and benefits under the G.I. Bill of Rights are exclusions.

Payments received under law administered by the Veterans Administration are exclusions, including amounts which are received as pensions, annuities, or other allowances for personal injury or illness incurred as a result of active military service

and amounts which are received as pensions, annuities or other allowances by the beneficiaries of a member of the service because of such member's death from a personal injury or illness resulting from active military service.

Although retirement pay (other than for physical disability retirement) of military personnel is included as tax income, any person who is entitled to receive veteran's benefits for disability may waive part of his taxable retirement pay and receive instead the tax-exempt veterans' pension, annuity, or allowance.
